CBS fires four staffers after critical report on **National Guard story**

NEW YORK (AP) -CBS issued a damning independent Monday of mistakes related to last fall's "60 Wednesday" Minutes report on President Bush's National Guard service and fired three news executives and a producer for their "myopic zeal" in rushing it on the air.

The review said CBS compounded the damage with a circle-the-wagons mentality once the report came under fire. The independent investigators added, however, that they found no evidence of a political bias against Bush.

CBS News President Andrew Heyward and Dan Rather, who announced in November he was stepping down as the anchor of "CBS Evening News," escaped without any disciplinary action. But Rather, who narrated the Sept. 8 story and subsequent follow-ups, was criticized by CBS chief executive Leslie Moonves "errors of credulity and over-enthusiasm."

"The system broke down on this one, for sure," said Louis D. Boccardi, retired chief executive officer of The Associated Press, who conducted the investigation along with former Republican Attorney General Dick Thornburgh. They delivered their 224page report to Moonves

last week. Fired were Mary Mapes, the story's producer; Josh Howard, executive producer of "60 Wednesday"; Minutes Howard's top deputy, Mary Murphy; and CBS News senior vice president Betsy West.



PEDC board reaching light at end of tunnel

Tuesday. But he still faces Heflin's challenge of the election results before a special House committee, which ordered voters to fill out questionnaires or give depositions to lawyers representing Heflin and Vo.

Meanwhile, the Senate State Affairs Committee on Monday dismissed an election challenge filed against Sen. Mario Gallegos by a former opponent who is also his former ex-mistress.

The panel found that Susan Delgado "failed to state the grounds necessary to maintain an election contest" Houston against Democrat. Committee members voted 9-0 to send the report to the full Senate for a

Delgado had contended that Gallegos lived in the 11th District, although he represents the 6th District. Gallegos, who has represented the east Harris County district since 1995, was overwhelmingly re-elected in November.

A former stripper who claimed she had a 17-year affair with Gallegos, Delgado ran as a write-in candidate against the incumbent. She contended that Gallegos took a homestead tax exemption

on a house outside of his district. But Gallegos is registered to vote at his mother's house within the 6th District and also claims to live there.

Heflin lost to Vo by 33 votes out of more than 40,000 cast in the November general election. But House Speaker Tom Craddick appointed the special committee to investigate the 11-term Houston legislator's allegations of voting irregularities. More than 100 ballots are in question.

Aledigna Staats, who moved with her husband Michael from Harris County to Fort Bend County in October 2003, was told at a Harris County polling place that they could vote there as long as they completed a change of address form. The voted Republican tickets

"I didn't think twice about it," said Aledigna Staats. "Then we got subpoenaed and had to give depositions. We were kind of upset by the whole thing. This is ridicu-

Another subpoenaed voter, Henry Akuchie, had lived in Vo's and Heflin's district until a recent move to Sugar Land. He was sent to three different polling sites on Election Day.

"It took me almost two hours," said Akuchie, a native of Nigeria who has been a U.S. citizen since 1993. "I just hope my vote counts. How could I have done anything wrong?"

"Everyone has their hopes up because they found someone alive two days ago," Miller said Monday. "We know that is only a miracle, but more miracles could happen."





of June, and the revenues would continue to be paid to the PEDC through August.

The consensus of the board notify Comptroller's office by the first of March to halt sales tax collections.

Doug Locke, president of the board of directors, reported that the PEDC has on hand about \$170,000. This month's tax income, Locke said, would bring the balance to about \$240,000 Another \$70,000 in tax revenue is expected in February.

The monthly sales tax revenues, he said, should be more than enough to provide for a commitment to United Medicorp. The PEDC had, as part of an enticement to bring United Medicorp to Pampa, committed to incentive payments based on the number of iobs the company would bring to the city.

Once the PEDC is dissolved, the PEDC sales tax money will go to the city.

Board member Sutherland said he wants to include in the dissolution resolution the board's desire that the PEDC money goes into a PEDC account to pay any commitment to United Medicorp. Locke said he would like to see that done so there will be an historical record ending the PEDC's

"They'll do what's right," said board member Bill Allison of the Pampa City Commission.

While there was discussion concerning loans to Billy Scribner and George Kilcrease, no action was taken. A settlement with the two men could be reached before the PEDC shuts down or the City of Pampa, which will take over PEDC assets when the organization closes shop, could end up with them.

"The city is not set up to be a collection agency," Locke

The board also formalized the payoff of a note to the National Bank of Commerce and payment of insurance. The insurance is for a year, but Locke said that the city could get a refund after the PEDC shuts down.

The next meeting of PEDC is scheduled for 5 p.m., Monday, Feb. 21. The location will be announced later.

I'm not suggesting a revolutionary return to the agrarian America of the 19th century, but it is time for American citizens to read and understand their Constitution and begin to insist that public officials obey

no authority whatsoever to legislate on matters that are intrastate. It has Constitutional authority in such matters as education and welfare. Surely no one at this late date believes that federal involvement in education has been anything but a boondoggle and a disaster.

At any rate, read the book. This country, after all, belongs to the people and not the government. Its job is to protect our liberties, not to run our lives.

New rules to govern publications by CIA officers

WASHINGTON (AP) — The CIA is drafting new rules for agency employees who want to become authors following publication of a controversial critique of the war on terror by a counterterrorism official who headed the unit tracking Osama bin Laden.

A CIA spokesman said the new procedures, still in draft form, are not intended to change the standards for publication, but to ensure that the rules on the books are enforced in a uniform way.

Yet the changes, first disclosed by former agency officials, have raised concerns among some intelligence veterans that the CIA may try to further censor the alreadylimited speech of agency employees.

Speaking on condition of anonymity, the agency spokesman said the new regulations have been in the works since July, shortly after former CIA Director George Tenet

ing under the pen name "Anonymous" published the best seller "Imperial Hubris: How the West is Losing the War on Terrorism." Scheuer's 309-page book on the U.S. government's Middle East policy is widely believed to have angered senior White House officials during the election

He retired from the agency Nov. 12 to speak more publicly on problems in the war on terrorism.

Under the current system, agency employees can write books or articles that must be cleared by the chief of their office to

guard against release of classified material. The publication also cannot hurt the official's ability to do his or her job or the CIA's

The draft rules would require all current personnel to submit manuscripts to a Publications Review Board for approval the same panel that now must clear the works of former agency officials. The staff of four, overseen by a CIA attorney, reviewed 30,000 pages last year.

During much of the 1990s, few books touching on current events were written by current and former agency employees.

Among those who started bucking the trend was former Middle East case officer Robert Baer, whose 2002 book, "See No Evil," faults the CIA's response to Muslim extremism and terrorism. Baer left the agency in 1997.

Relatively few active CIA employees write books, making Scheuer unusual. In an interview, he said he had heard that rule changes might be coming and said he'll be the last to know precisely why his book got cleared.

"I wrote because I couldn't find a way to get the message to the people who were leading the country," he said. "I couldn't believe that they wouldn't factor accurate ideas into their thought processes."

But he and other authors are worried about the effect of new rules on manuscripts by agency officials. "I think it is going to be very difficult to publish a book on anything except cooking or civil war history if you are a serving officer," Scheuer said.

Panel finds far more perchlorate can be ingested before safety risk

WASHINGTON (AP) — The debate about perchlorate contamination in drinking water is getting more heated as environmentalists object to a report claiming the widespread toxin is far less dangerous than was

A National Academy of Sciences panel said Monday that perchlorate, a toxic chemical used in rocket fuel and explosives, is safe for consumption at levels 20 times the standard being considered by the Environmental Protection

Agency. The study is expected to influence the EPA as it develops its first national standard for perchlorate in drinking water. But environmentalists contended such a high standard could endanger children's health while letting defense contractors off the hook for cleanup costs.

"Wherever this standard is applied, most perchlorate contamination sites will be wiped off the

map," said Lenny Siegel, director of the Center for Public Environmental Oversight in Mountain View, Calif. "Millions of children and pregnant women will continue to be guinea pigs in the great perchlorate exposure experiment."

The study comes after years of disagreement over how dangerous it is for people to drink water tainted with perchlorate, a pervasive leftover of Cold War defense manufacturing that has been found in drinking water academy's study in order to get a weaker

in 35 states. The chemical, which leaches easily into groundwater from defense and manufacturing sites, can inhibit thyroid function and is considered particularly dangerous to children.

While the chemical also is found in nature, the panel said its presence in the environment primarily comes from the manufacture and use of rocket fuels as well as

explosives and fireworks. The NAS panel recommended a level for

safe human consumption that translates to approximately 20 parts per billion in drinking water. Two years ago, the EPA issued a preliminary recommendation of 1 part per billion.

"The committee disagrees with EPA's conclusion and thinks that perchlorate exposure is unlikely to lead to thyroid tumors in humans," the panel said in a statement accompanying its report.

The academy study was ordered by the Bush

administration in 2003 to review the stricter standard the EPA had proposed in 2002. The Pentagon had criticized that standard as too stringent and recommended one as high as 200 parts per billion.

The Natural Resources Defense Council contended that documents obtained under Freedom of Information Act requests showed the Pentagon and the White House had sought to influence the scope of the

Witness: SEALs beat prisoners during interrogation in Iraq

SAN DIEGO (AP) — A former Navy SEAL says he saw fellow SEALs and CIA officials kick, choke and eyegouge detainees at a U.S. military base in Iraq.

The former SEAL testified at a military hearing Monday that he saw "interrogation by means of abuse" take place at Camp Jenny Pozzi, the SEAL base at Baghdad International Airport

He said a prisoner under interrogation by the CIA was abused in October 2003 by two or three SEALs. On another occasion a month later, the witness said he watched as SEALs punched, choked and poked their fingers in the eye of Iraqi Manadel al-Jamadi, who also was punched by a CIA official when he didn't answer ques-

Al-Jamadi, a suspect in the bombing of a Red Cross facility in Iraq, died a few hours after he was captured during a joint CIA-special operations mission in November 2003. He died while being interroshower room of the Abu

Ghraib prison.

The former SEAL, who was not identified, was the government's main witness at Monday's Article 32 hearing.

The hearing, the military equivalent of a civilian grand jury, was for a Navy SEAL lieutenant who is accused of assault, maltreatment and conduct unbecoming an officer for his handling of detainees, including al-Jamadi.

A Navy officer hearing the evidence will make a recommendation whether the lieutenant, who was not identified, should face a court-martial.

Although the lieutenant is not charged with al-Jamadi's death, it could be an aggravating factor that could yield stiffer punishment.

The ex-SEAL who testified Monday, and who also served under the lieutenant in Iraq, was kicked out of the elite unit after he was convicted of stealing a fellow SEAL's bulletproof vest — an act that earned him the nickname "Klepto." The sailor said he saw the lieutenant abuse prisgated by CIA personnel in the oners, including al-Jamadi, three times.
