Put your money where your mouth is to help tsunami victims

WASHINGTON (AP) When former President Bush watches as his firstborn son is sworn in for a second term as president, the tears may really flow this time. The son is getting what the father was denied.

Both men teared up at George W. Bush's first inauguration in 2001, after the younger Bush worried aloud about belonging to a family of "weepers" who can't keep their emotions in check.

After the swearing-in four years ago, George Herbert Walker Bush wiped away a tear after hugging his son. Tears welled up in the eyes of the newly minted president. but didn't spill over.

"The pride we feel this week is the same pride every parent feels when they see their son hit a home run or their daughter come home with straight A's," the former president, who lost a bid for re-election in 1992, said Wednesday.

The two George Bushes - who playfully call each other "41" and "43" in honor of their place in the lineup of U.S. presidents - are only the second father-son presidential team. They follow John Adams and John Quincy Adams, who each served one term.

Continental posts \$206 million loss

HOUSTON (AP) Continental Airlines Inc. on Thursday blamed a \$206 million fourth-quarter loss on continued high fuel costs, fare erosion from competitive pressures and what it called excessive government taxes and fees. Continental lost \$363 million or \$5.55 per share for the year, joining other struggling air carriers in wrapping up 2004 on a negative note.

Methalya Jackson has haunting images of the death and destruction in her homeland, and she is raising funds to do something about it.

Jackson, manager of the Thai Delight restaurant in Coronado Center, was born in Chiang Mai, in northern Thailand. Her younger brother is a counselor with the U.S. consulate in Chiang Mai, and he helps American visitors in the island nation with issues such as legal matters.

Jackson and her brother have relatives who may be victims of the deadly tsunami that hit Thailand and neighboring countries last Dec. 26.

"I didn't lose any close family, but some uncles who are fishermen are unaccounted for. Of one of my (extended) families, a six-

W. Bush swore a presidential oath for a second term in turbulent times Thursday and issued a sweeping pledge to spread liberty and freedom "to the darkest corners of the world."

"Our country has accepted obligations that are difficult to fulfill and would be dishonorable to abandon," said the president, who led the nation to war in Iraq in a first term marked by terrorist attacks on the United States.

Bush, the nation's 43rd president, raised one hand **Bush**

and placed the other on a family Bible as he vowed to preserve, protect and defend the Constitution in a 35-word pledge as old as the Republic.

In a speech delivered before a vast throng of fellow Americans spilling away from the steps of the Capitol,

on the side of the world's oppressed people. "All who live in tyranny and hopelessness can know: the United States will not ignore your oppress, or excuse your oppressors. When

you stand for your liberty, we will stand with you."

Chief Justice William H. Rehnquist, 80 and ailing with thyroid cancer, administered the oath of office.

My father had chosen to break tradition and have the swearing-in ceremony on the West front of the Capitol instead of the East front. When I stood with my father on the podium on West front I understood. The view down the mall was superb, far better than the view of a huge parking lot on the other side.

It was a gray overcast day, but when my dad stepped to the podium to be sworn in, the sun suddenly burst out of the clouds. As we turned to go inside, the doorman said to me and Colleen and my son Cameron, "Enjoy today. It's your day.'

During the inaugural parade my father kept updating us on the whereabouts of the hostages as they left captivity in Iran and started their journey home. As I listened I kept my eyes on five-star General Omar Bradley, who was sitting in a corner of the reviewing booth in his wheelchair. During the course of that long parade General Bradley never missed saluting each flag as it was carried by - as every flag went by his right hand went up, and he saluted each and every one of the hundreds of flags that passed in front of us.

That night Colleen and I were the host and hostess of the first inaugural ball at the Washington Hilton, where my father and Nancy would attend. Ironically it was the hotel where he was shot just a few weeks later.





DEAR BEEN THERE: Thank you for the suggestion. That letter brought responses from many readers who viewed the problem in a different light. Read on:

DEAR ABBY: In my younger days I hitchhiked extensively from coast to coast. The longest rides were with truckers. They popped little white pills -amphetamines -- to help them stay alert during long hauls. "Speed" is a great drug for loosening the tongue. The faster the mouth runs, the less discretion. Almost all of the drivers I rode with engaged in loud, nonstop talking. It took lots of patience to endure their rap -- but it was worth it to get where I was going.

Assuming that woman's description of her husband is accurate, he needs to detox -the sooner the better. If he's at the point of driving others away, he's near "crashing" and could be unsafe on the road. In addition, his emotions could start

DEAR ABBY: I work in the safety department of a large trucking company. It has been my experience that most drivers talk a lot. Our drivers are longhaul truckers, who often spend long, lonely hours, weeks at a time, on the road. They need contact with another human voice. When they call in to the company, given the chance, they'll talk for hours. They love to tell stories of their adventures, and I have found that if I listen, I learn a lot.

Perhaps "Down in T-Town" should make a few trips with her husband. It might change her perspective. If, after she spends some time with him on the road, the problem continues, I would ask him to talk to the family doctor. -- KATY IN SPRING-DALE, ARIZ.

DEAR KATY: You may be onto something. I have a stack of letters from truckers' wives, all saying the same thing. One woman wrote; "It takes a special person to be a truck driver. People who work in offices and restaurants have co-workers to talk to and become friends with. It may not be that the husband needs counseling. He may just be lonely."

A former dispatcher in South Carolina said: "When a trucker gets home, he wants to talk to his wife because he hasn't had any other human contact all day -- especially from someone who loves him. Please tell 'Really Down in T-Town' she should make time to sit down and talk. That way her husband can get the emotional attention he's craving."

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
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
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IRS Tax Tip Choosing a tax return preparer

Most tax return preparers are professional, honest and provide excellent service to their clients. But if you pay someone to prepare your tax return, choose that preparer wisely, advises the IRS. Taxpayers are legally responsible for what's on their returns-even if prepared by someone else.

Here are a few points to keep in mind when someone else prepares your tax return:

-A paid preparer is required by law to sign the return, fill in the preparer areas on the form and give you a copy of the return.

-Before signing, review the complete return to ensure the tax information and your name, address and social security numbers(s) are correct and that you understand the entries and are comfortable with the accuracy of the return.

-Never sign a blank return and never sign in pencil.

-If you have provided specific authorization in a power of attorney filed with the IRS, you may have copies of notices or refund checks mailed to your preparer or representative; but you are the only one that can sign and cash your refund check.

-A Third Party Designee Check Box on Form 1040 allows you to designate a representative to speak to the IRS concerning how your return

was prepared or about payment and refund issues and mathematical errors.

It is important that you find a qualified tax professional if you need help preparing and filing your tax return Unqualified tax preparers may overlook legitimate deductions or credits which could result in you paying more tax than you should. They may also make costly mistakes that could end with you owing additional tax, along with penalties and interest.

Here are a few pointers from the IRS:

A paid preparer is required by law to sign the return, fill in the preparer areas on the form and give you a copy of the return.

Before signing, review the complete return to ensure the tax information and your name, address and social security numbers(s) are correct and that you understand the entries and are comfortable with the accuracy of the return.

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Following are some suggestions to consider when hiring a tax professional:

-Avoid preparers who claim they can obtain larger refunds than other preparers, or who guarantee results or base fees on a percentage of the amount of the refund.

-Choose a preparer you will be able to contact after the return is filed and one that will be responsive to your needs. Ask questions and get references from clients who have used the tax professional before. Were they satisfied with the service received?

-Check to see if the preparer has any questionable history with the Better Business Bureau, the state's board of accountancy for CPAs, the state's bar association for attorneys or the state's Attorney General's office.

-Determine if the preparer's credentials meet your needs. Is he or she an Enrolled Agent, Certified Public Accountant (CPA) or Tax Attorney? Only attorneys, CPAs and enrolled agents can represent taxpayers before the IRS in all matters including audits, collection actions and appeals. Other return preparers may represent taxpayers only in audits regarding a return that they signed as a preparer.

-Find out if the preparer belongs to a professional organization that provides or requires its members to pursue continuing education and also holds them accountable to a code of ethics.

Unfortunately, unscrupulous tax return preparers do exist and can cause considerable financial and legal problems for their clients. Examples of improper actions by unscrupulous preparers include the preparation and filing of false income tax returns that claim inflated personal or business expenses, false deductions, unallowable credits or excessive exemptions.

You can check IRS.gov for information regarding tax schemes and scams-including abusive tax shelters. Tax evasion is both risky and a crime punishable by up to five years imprisonment and a \$250,000 fine. Remember-no matter who prepares your tax return, you are legally responsible for the information on it.

Report suspected tax fraud and abusive return preparers to the nearest IRS office, either by telephone at toll-free 1-800-829-0433 or in writing to the local IRS office. You can find the local IRS offices on the IRS Web site at www.irs.gov.
