

Teachers test board hopefuls

Pampa teachers tested prospective school board members' opinions on a number of tough topics Monday night, but which candidates passed or failed won't be known until the May 7 election.

Five candidates vying for three places on the Pampa Independent School District Board of Education met for a candidates forum sponsored by the Pampa Classroom Teachers Association Monday evening in the Pampa Junior High School library. Approximately 50

teachers and members of the public Place 1 on the school board. All attended the event.

Candidates were each given three minutes to answer seven previously decided questions presented by PCTA members. Then the forum was opened for an audience question and answer time.

Incumbent Lance DeFever is running unopposed for Place 2, his spot on the board. Local CPA Kenneth Cargill and Dana Terry, travel agency owner, have both filed for Place 3, Dr. Jay Johnson's board seat. Johnson chose not to run for another term. Incumbent John Curry faces Derrell DeLoach in the race for

three positions are for four-year

Here are the questions asked by PCTA members and a brief synopsis of the candidates' responses.

1. Why are you running for the school board? What do you hope to offer to the educational community by serving on the school board? Or as a returning board member, what do you hope to accomplish or do differently during another term?




"I've enjoyed serving our community through these organizations," Pingel said. "It's our duty to serve in some of these capacities."

"Economic development is very important," Pingel said. "We've got to have economic development."

He said he embraces the concept of economic development, but he said it needs to be organized in a way that reflects Pampa, its values, and remain in the hands of the citizens and do a good job for the city.

"It's got to be viable and responsive," Pingel said.

He said it is an issue that needs to be carefully researched, studied and explained, but he said that he thinks it is something that the city needs. The key issue is not so much creating an economic development council as getting people to come together to work with such a council. Pingel said it will have to take unity, unity of resources and unity of

purpose. He said the citizens of Pampa need to work together. With that teams work, he said, great strides can be taken.

While he supports an economic development council, he takes a conservative business approach

to the issue. "I think that's important,' Pingel said. "The new construction going on in the city is exciting. We see the motels coming in, but I think we also need to look around at some

of our basic buildings that I can bring new ideas and we have here. Our existing buildings - the Coronado said. "We can get some Shopping Center, the Pampa things accomplished."

Viewpoints

To err is human, and so are journalists

Mistakes.

We all hate to make them. And we all make them any-

Errors can be especially distasteful if you are a journalist, a career which requires that you get accurate, complete information and present it to your customers.

No type of media is immune to stubbing its toe on a mistake. But I think it is especially bothersome for print media.

The reason for this is that, with a few exceptions, a radio or television news broadcast is not available for repeat listening or viewing. But a newspaper or magazine can hang around indefi-

You can keep newspaper

pers. You can go to the library and look up past issues. You can even access print archives on the Internet.

If a story has an error in it, it is there for all posterity. You can't go back and cor-

Corrections can be printed as soon as the error is discovered and the correct information is verified. But that doesn't erase the original mistake.

Mistakes can be troublesome for journalists as well as readers. A writer who refers to previous articles on a topic in order to write an update might repeat a mistake if one was made in one of those previous stories.

in a news, feature, or sports story is attributed to someone, whether in a direct

quote or followed by words such as "according to."

One of the most regular targets

claims that mistakes were made is information on arrests made by law enforcement.

Periodically, we get a call that so-and-so, who was listed as having been arrested, doesn't live at the address listed for that person.

One time, a person called ed accurate data and knows me about just such an occa-

sion. He was very upset and asked if it was indeed true that we were supposed to print the truth.

I assured him that that was our goal. He then asked why we didn't verify all the information before putting it in the paper, specifically arrest records.

I explained that the information in the arrest records, as with other information throughout the paper, was attributed to its source, in this case the jail arrest records and arresting agency.

If an error was present in those arrest records, its source was not the paper but the agency which provided the information.

I also explained that it was reasonable to expect

that law enforcement and detention facilities would provide us with the best, most accurate information available.

If journalists tracked down every scrap of information to its source, such as seeking a birth certificate on each individual to verify their age, for example, or knocking on doors to see who lived at every address, nothing would ever get written because none of us would have the time or resources to check everything to that degree.

Even so, we still hate it when a mistake is printed in the paper.

Today in History

Today is Tuesday, April 26, the 116th day of 2005. There are 249 days left in the year.



Let's start at the beginning, part II

Your Computer.' Following, you will find the second installment in a basic explanation of your computer's 'parts.' In the last column, I explained the basic function of the monitor, keyboard, mouse, floppy drive, and hard drive. This week, we will dive into CD drives, CPUs, and modems.

First, to the CD Drive. 'CD' is short for compact disk. You probably knew that. The 'drive' is the device you put the CD into. It is always located in the 'boxy' part of your system and can be accessed by pushing a button on the front panel. The five-inch tray that pops out looks very much like a cupholder (but DON'T use it as one!) and receives the CD shiny-side-down.

You see, the information is stored only on one side of a CD, the shiny side. This and CD-RW drives. CD-

puters. Some newer computers come equipped with CD-RW drives. You don't need both. though. CD-RW drives can do everything a CD-ROM drive; they just have the added capability of CREAT-ING CDs. And, yes, they can create music CDs.

The CPU is the most important part of your PC. It is the 'brains' of your system. It stands for 'central processing unit,' but you

only need to remember that if you want to impress people at parties. If you were to open up the boxy part of your computer, you could identify the CPU as the large, black, piece of plastic on the big circuit board. However, don't let its boring appearance fool you. It is the most expensive part of your computer. Roughly one fourth to one third of the total price for your computer goes for this chip!

Intel Corporation makes 80 percent of the world's CPUs. When they first started, the names for their CPUs were very boring. One of their first chips was called the 80286 (boy, that's marketing!) Most people just shortened the name to 286. Intel created a faster chip and called it the 80386 (or just 386). The next chip they made was named (can you

Eighty seven Girl Scouts took part in the festivities and represented 12 troops from the Pampa area. Violinist Miss Jennifer Frautfchi, herself a former Girl Scout, performed for the girls. Four Pampa area Girl Scout troops participated in the opening flag ceremony. Several troops also took part in the fund gifting which is used to assist girls in financial need with camp tuition, uniforms, books and dues.

The Five Star Girl Scout Council awarded the "Silver Award" to Rachelle Graue from Miami. This award is the highest award received by Girl Scouts ages 11-14. To earn this award Rachelle had to meet with an advisor and develop a timeline for completion of all the projects needed for completion of the award. She had to earn three interest projects awards related to the Girl Scout Promise and Law; the Uniquely Me! The Real Deal charm; and Your Own Business Interest Project award; and the Looking In, Reaching Out charm.

Rachelle also had to set goals for self-improvement, spend 15 hours in a leadership role,; and Identify an issue in her school or community that she felt strongly about and focus on coming up with a solution to address the problem. She had to do a community service project that she planned and mapped out, taking no less than 40 hours to complete and was required to keep records and a journal of all of her activities. When all of the proj-


Dodson was instrumental initiating the search for a new Girl Scout house in Pampa and continues the search and preparation of a safe place for the girls to

guess?) 486. Well, by this time, other companies were copying Intel's designs. They even called their competing CPUs, 486's!

Intel was busy developing the 586, but did not want other companies to call their CPUs by that name, so ... They went to the US Government, and attempted to trademark the term '586.' Uncle Sam just laughed, though. 'You cannot own a number!' the government said. So, Intel decided to call their 586 the 'Pentium,' which they could trademark. And for you word scholars: 'Pent' means five.

When shopping for computers, one of the key descriptors you'll see on the box will be the CPU model. For instance, you might see a computer described as a 'Pentium IV 2.4ghz.' The 'IV' is simply a better, faster version of the Pentium. Think of it as 'version 4 of the Pentium.' The 2.4ghz is more perplexing, though. 'Ghz' is short for gigahertz. Think of a gigahertz as the ability for a computer to process one billion instructions per second. Therefore, a 2.4ghz CPU could process 2.4 billion instructions per second. In other words, more gigahertz

equals a faster computer. Now, onto the modem. Most computers have modems built into them. The word modem is actually an abbreviation. It stands

for 'modulator-demodulator' (another one of those definitions useful only to impress friends). The modem's function is very simple. It takes computer information and changes it into sound, which can then be sent over a normal phone line. Modems can also receive these sounds and then turn them back into computer information. Modems can be used to send faxes and connect to other computers. However, the number-one use for modems today is to connect to the Internet.







Cabot. Malone went four for four including a double and a home run to lead Glo-Valve. He scored three





Coach gunned down in field house released from hospital

TYLER, Texas (AP) — A Canton High School football coach who authorities say was gunned down by a player's father has been released from a hospital, a spokesman said Tuesday.

Coach Gary Joe Kinne, the school's athletic director, was released late Monday, said John Moore, a spokesman at Trinity Mother Frances Hospital.

"We're very excited for him; we're very excited for the family," Moore said.

Kinne was critically injured April 7 at the school's athletic field house when, police say, Jeffrey Robertson shot him in the abdomen. Kinne had improved to fair condition after several surgeries, including pro-

cedures on his severely damaged liver, where the bullet left a fist-sized hole, Moore said.

Robertson could face life in prison if convicted of a first-degree felony assault charge, prosecutor Leslie Poynter Dixon has said. Robertson, whose son played freshman football, had several confrontations with students and coaches. He had been banned from school property at the time Kinne was shot.

A message left for Kinne's doctor and at a number listed for the Kinne family was not immediately returned Tuesday to The Associated Press.

Houston Texans cut veteran Glenn

HOUSTON (AP) - The Houston and strong safety Eric Brown were released Texans have released veteran cornerback Aaron Glenn to make room for recent trade acquisition Phillip Buchanon, general manager Charley Casserly said Tuesday.

Casserly declined to give more details, saying a news release would come out later in the day.

The Texans gave Glenn permission to seek a deal with another team following last week's trade with Oakland for Buchanon.

Houston coach Dom Capers met with the 12-year veteran shortly after the trade and offered him the option of reduced playing time or the chance to play with another

The addition of Buchanon made Glenn expendable. The Texans will team Buchanon with 2004 first-round draft pick Dunta Robinson, giving them a pair of speedy and talented 24-year-old corner-

Glenn, who turns 33 in September, becomes the fourth defensive starter for the Texans to leave in the offseason. Inside linebackers Jamie Sharper and Jay Foreman

in March, part of the Texans' offseason makeover of a defense that finished in the bottom third of the NFL for a second straight season.

It was an unceremonious end, though, for one of the expansion franchise's most popular players, a fan favorite and locker room leader.

Glenn played with the New York Jets for eight seasons before joining his hometown Texans in the 2002 expansion draft. He was selected to his third Pro Bowl in the team's first year but was limited to only 11 games in 2003 because of various injuries.

He rebounded with a solid season in 2004, intercepting five passes and making 63 tackles while serving as a mentor for Robinson.

"It was a good stint with Houston. I got a lot out of it," Glenn told Houston television station KRIV. "If there is going to be a done deal, it will probably be with Dallas. There are still some other teams involved where I can be a starter. I still have some decisions to make."


Bananas do not grow on trees







Amendment banning gay marriages passes House

AUSTIN, Texas (AP) members who House approved a constitutional amendment banning samesex marriage got a cool reception from one con-10-year-old stituent Kimberly Norman.

"I don't think that they're opening their eyes to look at the world to see everything," the fifth-grader, who is being raised by two women she calls mom, said Monday at the Capitol.

The measure aims to stem possible court challenges to an existing Texas law making same-sex marriages illegal. It passed with a vote of 101-29, more than the 100 needed for approval of a constitutional amendment in the House.

"I think marriage is important enough to the people of this state that it deserves the highest level of protection," said Republican Rep. Warren Chisum, who sponsored the

The measure still must win approval in the Senate and from Texas voters to become ples part of the state constitution. Chisum said no senator has agreed to sponsor the bill in the upper chamber.

The few Democrats who opposed the measure said it would constitutionalize discrimination. "This amendment is blowing smoke to fuel the hell fire flames of

bigotry," said Rep. Senfronia Thompson.

The debate comes less than a week after House members approved a measure that would ban same-sex couples from becoming foster parents.

'I think marriage is important enough to the people of this state that it deserves the highest level of protection."

Gay and lesbian rights advocates criticized both measures, saying Legislature needs to prioritize building up Texas families with public education and social services, rather than discriminating against the state's 43,000 gay cou-

"What they're doing really flies in face of family values," said Heath Riddles, Lesbian Gay Rights Lobby of Texas spokesman.

The marriage ban, Riddles said, would also hurt unmarried heterosexual couples, making it difficult for them to enter into end-of-life con-

tractual agreements or give a partner power of attorney.

Chisum added a measure he said is meant to give gay and straight Texans the same contractual rights they currently have. It allows private contracts for guardianship, hospital visitation rights, insurance benefits and property ownership.

But Karen Langsley and her partner Jill Wilcox, who are raising Kimberly and her 12-year-old brother Zach Norman, said they were disgusted with legislators who approved the ban.

"They put down who we are as individuals, as humans, who ought to be protected by the constitution that applies to every citizen," Langsley said.

To become law, the ban must next be approved by 21 of 31 senators. If approved by the Legislature, a majority of Texas voters must then approve it on Nov. 8.

If the amendment is approved by voters, Texas would join 14 states, including Oklahoma, Montana and Louisiana, that statutorily and constitutionally ban same-sex marriage.

Nationally, President Bush supports conservative advocacy groups pushing for congressional approval of a federal constitutional amendment banning gay marriage.

Bush adds embattled DeLay to Social Security road tour

GALVESTON (AP) — President Bush on Tuesday added a helper to his Social Security road tour: House Majority Leader DeLay, who is facing allegations of ethical improprieties but is seen by the White House as crucial to pushing Bush's plans through Congress.

Bush was traveling here to discuss his proposal to add private investment accounts to Social Security and included DeLay in the event being held near his district to show that "the president appreciates his leadership in the House," White House secretary McClellan said. DeLay was also scheduled to fly back to Washington with Bush on Air Force One along with a few other Republican members of Congress from

As Bush nears the end of a 60-day nationwide blitz aimed at building support for his proposal, the Senate Finance Committee back in Washington was holding a hearing on Social Security.

despite all of Bush's efforts, there has been a decline in public support for his private-accounts idea — and that his overall job approval rating is at a level that matches his all-time low.

DeLay is facing questions about the source of funding for some of his foreign trips, political fund-raising for Texas elections and his ties to a lobbyist under federal criminal investigation. He repeatedly denied wrongdoing.

Far from trying to distance Bush from DeLay's troubles, White House has responded to criticism from Democrats with steadfast support for the majority leader, as it did anew Tuesday.

Asked by reporters how strongly Bush was supportthe embattled Republican, McClellan said, "Strongly as he ever has, which is strongly."

Investigators seek clues into Japan's train crash

(AP) — Rescuers pulled two survivors — but also more bodies — from the gnarled wreckage of Japan's worst train crash in decades Tuesday, and investigators raided the 'rail 'operator's offices for clues about why

Power shovels picked at the piles of twisted railway cars, peeling away crushed metal to get into the two train cars that struck an apartment building in Monday's accident. Workers found more bodies Tuesday in the wreckage of the 580passenger train, and an unknown number were still there, a police spokesman

At least 456 people were injured.
