During the four weeks he's been on the lam, the 22-pound African spur thigh tortoise been sighted west of Pampa near the city's water treatment plant, the new microwave tower and Memory Gardens Cemetery.

Tugie's owner, Lynn Ledford of Kentucky Acres, wants her hard-shelled pet back home and she's willing to pay \$50 to anyone who can find him.

A windstorm about a month ago blew the gate open to the backyard where Tugie lives. (Tugie is short for tortuga, the

Spanish word for turtle, Ledford explained.) Tugie pushed the gate open wide enough to escape and he's been on the

crawl ever since.

The tortoise has lived with Ledford for four years, since he was the size of a 50cent piece, she said. She ordered him for the pet shop she previously owned. When fullgrown, Tugie can weigh close to 150 pounds, she said. Right now, he's about the size of a platter, approximately 12 inches by

His brown shell is covered with distinctive triangular, pyramid shaped patches. He's a desert-dweller that eats grass, but broccoli is his favorite freat, Ledford said.

Burial will be in Fairview Cemetery under the direction of Carmichael-Whatley Funeral Directors of Pampa.


Mr. Parker was born May 5, 1931, in Clarendon. He was a veteran of the U.S. Army and the National Guard, serving during the Korean Conflict.

Perryton, who was appointed earlier this year to explore the possibility of state criminal charges against Roach, filed an objection June 20 to the affidavit of financial sta-

The objection states that Roach made false statements in the affidavit when he answered "N/A" to questions asking if he owned any land ed he had \$197.50 in a com-

missary account paid by his mother, with "all other assts (sic) used up in federal case."

Scott stated in the objection that Roach owns "Lots 11-14, Block 5 Bennett Addition to the Original Town of Miami, Roberts County, Texas." He also stated that Roach-"holds title to a 1996 Chevrolet Pickup.

Other assets and property owned by Roach, according to Scott, include "County and District Retirement Account. accessible to Defendant; Employee Retirement; or any cars, and when he stat- Antique Coin Collection (valued at \$30,000.00); and other Roach and are included in

personal property."

A Gray County grand jury on June 21 indicted Roach on charges of aggravated perjury in connection with the statements made by Roach concerning his financial status and the request for a court appointed attorney to represent him.

Fifteen pages of records provided by Ricky Green, identified in an affidavit as custodian of the records of Plains Capital Bank of in Canyon, have been filed in including the opening bal-

Clerk's office.

The 15 pages are photocopies of bank statements, including checks and deposit slips, concerning an interestbearing checking account opened Feb. 7 of this year. The name on the account is Richard J. Roach and lists a Canyon street address.

The opening balance of the account is shown as \$25,502.75. Between Feb. 7 and June 11, deposits and Lubbock, which has a branch credits totaling \$64,546.84, the state's cases against ance, were credited to Roach's account. The balance

files in the 31st District as of June 11 is shown as \$398.28.

Most of the checks and debits were to various credit card companies, with others including a mortgage company; family members; an attorney retained for a divorce action, according to a memo on the check; and a florist.

One document dated June 1 and marked "VOID" concerning an MBNA Corporate Card showed a Plainview address beneath Roach's

Records provided by Jennifer Hymel of the Texas County and District Attorney Retirement System, also included in Roach's court documents on file, shows that Roach has a balance of \$29,469.70 in a retirement account as of June 16.

Roach was indicted May 17 by a Gray County grand jury on two state charges of possession of a controlled substance with intent to deliver.

The charges involve methamphetamine cocaine. Both indictments state that a handgun was present at the time of the incident, that the amount of the substance was four grams or more but less than 200 grams, that the incidents occurred Jan. 11, and that they occurred within 1,000 feet of a drug-free zone.

Community Christian

School, 220 N. Ballard, is within 1,000 feet of Gray County Courthouse, where Roach was arrested Jan. 11 by agents of the Federal Bureau of Investigation's Amarillo office on a federal charge of possession of methampheta-

Roach pled guilty Feb. 8 to a federal firearms charge, in a plea bargain agreement in which three other federal charges concerning methamphetamine and cocaine were dropped.

Roach also resigned as 31st District Attorney on Feb. 8.

One June 1, he was sentenced in Amarillo federal court to five years in a federal penitentiary, followed by three years' supervised release.



He also loves to eat bind

"I don't know why everyone doesn't have one just to eat the bind weed," Ledford

Tugie suns in the morning, sleeps during the day,

and feeds in the early morning and evening, she said.

The tortoise's walk is distinctive. He holds his head high and stands up three to four inches off the ground: But he may be hard to see when he's retreated into his

Ledford said. Tugie's owner said she's enlisted the help of several one to come get him if she's families with children who live near where the tortoise has been seen, but welcomes any others who want to search for the animal.

"I hope the kid patrol will hunt him down," she said.

funds approximating \$210,000 for Gray County will be used to cover the costs of buying the machines.

"Every county in the nation in 2006 has to be on this equipment," Winborne said at the meeting.

"We will have them by the end of the year," she said after the meeting.

Precinct 3 Commissioner Gerald Wright asked about eliminating paper ballots altogether and using only the electronic voting machines.

Winborne explained that some voters would not be comfortable using the new machines, and that they were being purchased because "the law says you have to have a voting place be handicap accessible," not as a replacement for paper ballots. If all voters were to use only the electronic machines, more machines would likely be needed, she said.

"Randall and Moore counties are doing a blended plan, too, of paper and electronic ballots," she said.

Hart was chosen over ES&S as the company to provide the voting machine's. The equipment will include the capability for the county to print ballots, which it currently cannot do, Winborne

Commissioners approved making the purchase through the Texas Procurement Commission.

Precinct 2 radio equipment will be upgraded as a result of commissioners' unanimous approval.

"The system has not been upgraded in 25 years," said Precinct 2 Commissioner Gary Willoughby.

## Junk e-mail revisited, Part 1

Two years ago, I wrote a two-part piece on junk e-mail. Many readers have asked that it be reprinted, so here goes:

Every day I receive around 80 pieces of e-mail. Do you think I read every one of those? Of course not. I delete over half of them without even opening them. Am I being rude? No, because the messages I am deleting are "junk e-mail."

The purest definition of junk e-mail is "any unsolicited sales message sent to your address." Most of these messages fall into three cate-

Most people on the Internet don't use the phrase "junk email" to "describe this garbage. We call it "spam." Much to Hormel's frustration, the term "spam" has been used to describe junk e-mail. This maligned word can be used as a noun and a verb. For instance: A piece of junk email is called "a spam." The person who sent it is called a 'spammer." If you received it, you have been "spammed." Iknow that sounds funny, but trust me, you'll hear it described that way.

Spamming is definitely a no-no on the Net. In fact, Internet Service Providers specifically outline this offense in their "terms and conditions." Spam is a serious issue with ISPs, but not for the reasons you assume.

Let's say I run a small ISP, EricNet, and I have five hundred customers. If one of those customers decides to

spam a million or so addresspen? Well, think about it.

Depending on the quality of the e-mail address list used, about 20 percent (200,000) of the messages will "bounce" back to the sender as being bad addresses. Around 50 percent of the recipients will be so livid, they will write angry replies demanding to be removed from the spammer's list. In fact, only about 500 or so people will respond "with interest" in the offer.

You may not think "500" is not a very good return on one million messages. But remember: How much does it cost a spammer to send a thousand e-

mail mes-Eric sages? A million e-mail Spellmann messages? Columnist That's right, nada, noth-

My point is this: Over 700,000 e-mail replies (most of them "angry") will be dropped on EricNet within the course of a few hours. What do you think will happen to Internet Access at EricNet during that time? Can you say, "No Access?" That's right. One bad spammer could make EricNet the enemy of every hacker on the Net. Going out of business is a real possibility.

When an ISP discovers that one of it's customers is a spammer, they immediately cancel the user's account. In fact, the perpetrator is "blacklisted" from ever using EricNet again. Like I said, ISPs take spamming serious-

Perhaps the most-asked spam question I receive is,

"How did I get on Satan's list es on the Net, what will hap-; in the first place?" The answer is more complex than most people realize. Let me start at the beginning:

> Pretend you just discovered your uncle is on the Internet. However, you don't know his e-mail address. Is there a way for you to find it? You bet. Get a pencil and paper. You'll want to write this down. Are you ready?... Pick up the phone and ask

> You will not find a comprehensive list of everyone's email address on the Internet. Nor would you want there to be one. If such a list existed, every cretin would harvest it

> > and would be buried in junk.

So, once again, "How does y o u r address get

on those lists?" Remember that joke Aunt Edna e-mailed to you last week? Get ready for this. She sold you out, albeit unintentionally. Most people send jokes to more than one person at a time. They put everyone's e-mail address in the "To:" field. Usually, when someone receives the joke, they simply forward it to their friends, and so forth, and so on. After a while, these jokes have so many addresses on them, you have to scroll quite a bit just to see the funny story.

Many spammers have software that can extract e-mail addresses out of messages. Even if you don't forward jokes to others, if anyone has sent a joke to you, your address becomes public knowledge. My advice: When forwarding jokes, put all of your friends' addresses in the BCC (blind carbon copy) field. They will all still receive the joke, but their addresses will not show up on the messages. Not only are you protecting their privacy, you are preventing spammers from using their addresses.

Another technique used by spammers is called the "Dictionary Harvest." A spammer will program his computer to send e-mail to every-word-in-the-dictionary@somedomain.com. In other words, if your user name is a dictionary word, you could get spam automatically. Common user names are also thrown into the mix. Trust me, everyone's address that begins with cooldude or superman will receive more than their share of junk e-

At this point, I need to make an important clarification. Attention, jealous spouses: If your husband or wife receives a piece of "adult" junk e-mail, it doesn't mean they have been frequenting those types of web sites. Everyone will receive adult email at some time or another. It just goes with the territory.

As you've probably noticed, it's not a question of "if" you will ever receive junk e-mail, it's just a matter of "when." So, how can you stop it? Find out next week. -





## Dear Abby...

DEAR ABBY: My wife and I are very lying around with children in the house is worried about the safety of our two toddlers -- a 3-year-old boy and a 15-monthold girl. Their twin 7-year-old cousins have no manners, discipline or consequences in their lives. They have recently begun seeing a psychiatrist because they have been found with knives, or making stabbing motions toward themselves screaming, "Kill me now!"

Every member of the family agrees they are out of control, but nobody does anything to correct their behavior. When we told my mother-in-law we didn't want our children around the twins without direct supervision, her response was she "couldn't watch them every minute." We said fine, we would bring the kids over and one of us would directly supervise them. This led to an uncomfortable silence that lasted a few days, until today when my wife took the kids to her parents' for a birthday party. The afternoon went by with the twins' usual-defiance, rudeness and belittling of any adult in sight.

After she returned from my in-laws', my wife proceeded to tell me their bay window had a hole in it because one of the twins had shot a loaded gun through it. I am stunned that while we have been discussing the safety of our children, her parents have been leaving a loaded gun lying around. (Publish this for the world: If you need a gun to defend your bird feeder, especially when it's smack dab in the middle of two houses -- get rid of the bird feeder.) My wife said her father yelled at the twins, although he had left his loaded gun in plain sight.

How can I make it clear to my in-laws that they must step up their level of supervision, and that my sister-in-law's kids are. headed for serious trouble? -- WORRIED DAD IN VERMONT

**DEAR WORRIED DAD:** To paraphrase an old saying, there are none so blind as they who will not see -- so stop trying to "reason" with them. To leave a loaded gun

reckless endangerment. Because it should be clear to both you and your wife by now that your children are not safe at her parents' house, visits with their grandparents should be at your house or on neutral turf. 





### Rogers faces uncertain future

ARLINGTON, Texas (AP) - Kenny Rogers was having the kind of season to warrant the contract extension he wants from the Texas Rangers.

After two angry outbursts, the latest coming when he shoved two cameramen on the field, the 40-year-old left-hander faces an uncertain future.

The Rangers waited for word from Major League Baseball on Friday regarding possible discipline for the pitcher. After talking multiple times with commissioner Bud Selig, who was personally handling the case, Texas owner Tom Hicks anticipated that Rogers would be suspended for the incident that is also being investigated by police.

"At this point, there's nothing the Texas Rangers will or can do," Hicks said. "We will support whatever the commissioner decides to do."

General manager John Hart also said the

team wouldn't have any further contract talks with Rogers or his agent until after the

Rogers (9-3) traveled with the team to Seattle, where he's scheduled to pitch the series finale Sunday. The pitcher smiled and joked with teammates, but didn't respond to questions from reporters in the clubhouse after Thursday's 18-5 win over the Los Angeles Angels.

Rogers shoved two cameramen before Wednesday's game against the Angels in a tirade that included throwing a camera to the ground, kicking it and threatening to break more. The outburst was captured on videotape and led to KDFW cameraman

Larry Rodriguez being treated at a hospital. Rodriguez filed an assault report, and Arlington police spokeswoman Christy Gilfour said the case was being investigated as a misdemeanor assault.

Rogers hadn't been interviewed by investigators and no charges had been filed Thursday.

He made it very clear to me that he did the wrong thing and it was mappropriate," Hart said. "It was out of character, way out of character for Kenny."

The previous outburst came June 17 when Rogers punched a water cooler in the dugout after being pulled from a game against Washington. The 17-year veteran won his career-best ninth straight decision that night, when he was the AL ERA leader and a potential All-Star starter.

During that outburst, when he also knocked other coolers to the ground, Rogers broke a small bone at the base of the pinkie on his nonthrowing hand.

The injury wasn't made public until Rogers missed his start against the Angels on Tuesday, a week after he gave up six runs on 10 hits in 3 1-3 innings at Los Angeles.

Rogers lashed out at the cameramen Wednesday as they filmed him walking to the field for pregame stretching. A day earlier, he had ordered cameras turned off around him in the clubhouse.

Hart said "the crux of the matter" for Rogers was the perception by some media and fans that he skipped his start against the firstplace Angels as a possible ploy in contract negotiations.

While saying Rogers regretted what happened, Hicks and Hart also described the pitcher as being "defensive" when they spoke to

Rogers was a 17-year-old outfielder when he was drafted by the Rangers in 1982, and has spent 12 of his 17 major league seasons with the team for which he threw a perfect game in 1994. He became the first pitcher with three stints in Texas when he signed a \$6 million, two-year contract before last sea-

The pitcher met with Hicks before spring training and asked about an extension. Rogers denied a report that he threatened to retire and has since quit talking to most media.

Hart said there had been recent talks with Rogers' agent, Scott Boras, but would be no more until after the season.

### Poll: Religious zeal in U.S. surpasses levels of faith in many other nations

(AP) - Religious devotion University. "It's one thing that sets the United States apart makes a tremendous differfrom some of its closest allies. Americans profess unquestioning belief in God and are far more willing to mix faith and politics than people in other countries, AP-Ipsos

polling found. In Western Europe, where Pope Benedict XVI complains that growing secularism has left churches unfilled on Sundays, people are the least devout among the 10 countries surveyed for The U.S. respondents Associated Press by Ipsos.

Only Mexicans come close to Americans in embracing faith, the poll found. But unlike Americans, Mexicans strongly object to clergy lobbying lawmakers, in line with the nation's historical opposition to church influence.

"In the United States, you have an abundance of religions trying to motivate Americans to greater involvement," said Roger Finke, a public policy, otherwise sociologist at Penn State they're wimps," said David

The polling was conducted in May in the United States, Australia, Britain, Canada, France, Germany, Italy, Mexico, South Korea


