## White House won't play 'blame game' on rescue

WASHINGTON (AP) — Criticized for its sluggish response to Hurricane Katrina, the White House said today that "we're not going to engage in the blame game" but instead would keep the focus on rescue and recovery efforts across the heavily battered Gulf Coast.

"There are ongoing problems that need to be addressed," said Scott McClellan, the spokesman for President Bush. "We've got to keep our energies focused on the task at hand." He said there would be time later for a thorough analysis of the government's response.

Bush was devoting the day to the recovery effort, meeting with his Cabinet, the congressional leadership, representatives of charitable organizations and with Education Secretary Margaret Spellings to talk about assistance for displaced students and closed schools. McClellan said the president also was increasing what he described as a sizable personal contribution to the Red Cross and also was sending money to the Salvation

Senate Majority Leader Bill Frist, R-Tenn., had told reporters Monday that the Homeland Security Committee would convene hearings as Congress returns this week to examine the "weaknesses and strengths" of the federal response and to "apply the lessons learned."

There has been heavy criticism of the government's response to the hurricane, and city and state officials, Republicans and Democrats have assailed the Federal Emergency Management Agency led by Michael Brown. Bush, during an inspection tour of the devastated region last Friday, praised Brown, telling him, "Brownie, you're doing a heck of a job."

McClellan said Bush was not satisfied with the response and that there are problems that need to be addressed. But he would not talk about Brown or say whether any officials had offered their resignation because of the widespread criticism.

BEAUMONT, (AP) — At shelters in Southeast Texas, volunteers witnessed acts of tolerance and selflessness.


At the Bridge City Baptist church, serving as a shelter, Muslims and Christians came together and prayed.

"We had a family arrive who are Muslim," said Bridge City business owner Barry Murchison, who is acting director of the shelter. "About midnight last Sunday they had come in and we got them settled and a group of us were sitting together visiting, waiting for the storm to hit.'

While waiting for the storm, evacuees and volunteers got to know each other, he said.

"I've never had the opportunity to talk with someone who had read the Quran before and knew their religion (Islam) so well," Murchison said. "In turn, we shared our religion with them. We weren't forcing our religion on them, we talked a long time about religions and faiths and compared and contrasted them."





Nationally, the average per gallon price for regular gasoline is \$2.50.

Are gasoline prices high? That's not the best way to ask that question. It's akin to asking, "Is Williams tall?" The average height of U.S. women is 5'4", and for men, it's 5'10". Being 6'4", I'd be tall relative to the general U.S. population. But put me on a basketball court, next to the average NBA basketball player, and I wouldn't be tall; I'd be short. So when we ask whether a price is high or low, we have to ask relative to what.

In 1950, a gallon of regular gasoline sold for about 30 cents; today, it's \$2.50. Are today's gasoline prices high compared to 1950? Before answering that question, we have to take into account inflation that has occurred since 1950. ## Infrastructure networks vulnerable to attack

Back in pre-computer days, if terrorists wanted to disrupt a power grid, they would have had to destroy generators or power stations or pull down transmission towers or lines.

Today, they can accomplish much the same goal by hacking into the computer network that controls that power grid.

## Israel OKs construction of homes in Ariel settlement

JERUSALEM (AP) — Israel has authorized construction of 117 homes in one of the West Bank's largest settlements and approved preliminary plans for another 3,000 housing units there, officials said Tuesday.

The decision came despite repeated U.S. appeals that Israel freeze settlement expansion and threatened to raise tensions with the United States just days before Prime Minister Ariel Sharon travels to New York to address the U.N. General Assembly. He is expected to meet with President Bush and other leaders.

The plans also drew swift condemnations from the Palestinians, who claim all the West Bank for part of a future independent state.

Nachman told The Associated Press the Defense Ministry also has approved preliminary plans for a 3,000-home neighborhood in the southern part of his settlement. The project would nearly double the size of Ariel.

The new construction is planned in Ariel, a sprawling settlement of nearly 18,000 people deep inside the West Bank.

Ariel's mayor, Ron Nachman, said the government recently approved construction of the units in the center of town, part of a plan frozen in the mid-1990s by then-Prime Minister Yitzhak Rabin. The Defense Ministry and officials in Sharon's office

confirmed the project's approval.

Nachman told The Associated Press the Defense Ministry also has approved preliminary plans for a 3,000-home neighborhood in the southern part of his settlement. The project would nearly double the size of Ariel.

Defense Ministry officials confirmed the plan received initial approval, though actual construction would need further authorization. The officials spoke on condition of anonymity because of department regula-

Construction in Jewish settlements is an especially contentious issue in the Israeli-Palestinian conflict. Palestinians want all settlements dismantled so they can establish an independent state in the West Bank, Gaza Strip and east Jerusalem, lands Israel occupied in the 1967 Mideast war.

"I think we have 3,000 more obstacles to peace and we will have, if this program is carried out, 3,000 reasons to undermine President Bush's efforts for a two-state solution," Palestinian negotiator Saeb Erekat said.

prevented us from drilling for it. They've also had success in restricting drilling in the Gulf of Mexico and off the shore of

California. Another part of our energy problem has to do with refining capacity. Again, because of environmentalists' successful efforts, it's been 30 years since we've built a new oil refinery.

Few people realize that the United States is also a major oil-producing country. After Saudi Arabia, producing 10.4 million barrels a day, then Russia with 9.4 million barrels, the United States with 8.7 million barrels a day is the third-largest producer of oil. But we could produce more. Why aren't we? Producers have a variety of techniques to win monopoly power and higher profits that come with that power. What's a way for OPEC to gain more power? I have a hypothesis, for which I have no evidence, but it ought to be tested. If I were an OPEC

big cheese, I'd easily conclude that I could restrict output and charge higher oil prices if somehow U.S. oil drilling were restricted. I'd see U.S. environmental groups as allies, and I would make "charitable" contributions to assist their efforts to reduce U.S. output. Again, I have no evidence, but it's a hypothesis worth examination.

## **Dutch suspect in Aruba case flies to Amsterdam**

AMSTERDAM, Netherlands (AP) - An 18-year-old Dutch man who had been held by police on the Caribbean island of Aruba in connection with the disappearance of an American tourist arrived in the Netherlands on Tuesday.

Joran van der Sloot and his father arrived at Amsterdam's Schiphol Airport, ignored questions from reporters, and quickly departed. The 18-year-old was to attend college in Holland, his mother said.

Van der Sloot, a resident of Aruba, suspicion of involvement

suspects in the disappearance of American teenager Natalee Holloway were released on condition they remain available to police.

Holloway was last seen May 30, on the last day of her high school graduation trip to the Dutch Caribbean island, leaving a bar with van der Sloot and the two brothers, Satish and Deepak Kalpoe.

The three were arrested June 9 on

and two Surinamese brothers who were Holloway's disappearance. All denied any connection to the disappearance. Van der Sloot acknowledged spending the evening before with Holloway, but denied any wrongdoing.

The release of all three suspects on Saturday was a serious setback to the prosecution. Police insist the investigation into Holloway's widely publicized disappearance will continue, but legal observers in Aruba say the release indicates the government has no case.

## No. 14 ends losing streak against No. 9 Miami

(AP) — Another blown field goal try decided a Florida State-Miami game. Nothing new there.

The difference Monday night was the Seminoles were the team celebrating when Miami messed up, instead of the other way around.

The Hurricanes botched a short, potential game-tying field-goal attempt in the final minutes to hand Florida State a 10-7 victory that snapped Miami's sixgame winning streak against their bitter rivals.

After Miami's gaffe Monday night, all Florida State had to do was run out the clock to secure its first victory over the Hurricanes since 1999.

Florida State overcame its own inept offense (170 total yards) with a defense that registered nine sacks by seven players, two by Kamerion Wimbley.

"Defensively, we were determined not to put it in the hands of the offense and the kicking game," said linebacker Ernie Sims, who had one of Florida State's two interceptions.

Both Florida State's Drew Weatherford and Miami's Kyle Wright were making their first collegiate starts at quarterback and, at times, neither looked ready to lead a team to victory in one of college football's fiercest rivalries.

## Saints try regaining normalcy

Meetings in a convention center. A 10-minute bus ride. Then practice at a high school facility and a bus ride back "home," to their

That's the new routine for the New Orleans Saints, forced out of their normal surroundings by Hurricane

The Saints returned to work Monday, trying to focus on their opener-Sunday in Carolina instead of the awful pictures of what's happening in New

Orleans. "We all talked about what was going on before practice," said special teams standout Michael Lewis, who was born in New Orleans and has more than 30 relatives in the area. Everybody in my family is OK. But now that we're here, we know what we have to do.

Coach Jim Haslett was glad to be doing something besides watching news reports on television.

"I think being on the field and in the meetings is a time that's away from all that," he said. "It's good for your mind to get on the field and practice and be where you're with your peers."

Though the Saints still

are awaiting word where they will play the balance of their home games, the team expects to practice in San Antonio for the rest of the season.

The NFL announced Monday that their second game — which was supposed to be their home opener against the New York Giants — will be on Monday, Sept. 19, at Giants

The game will begin at 7:30 EDT on ABC, then be switched to ESPN at 9 p.m., when ABC goes to the regu-larly scheduled game between Washington and Dallas in Irving, Texas. In New York and Louisiana, as well as other parts of the Gult Coast, ABC will con-tinue to carry the Giants-Saints game, switching to Redskins-Cowboys when the Saints game ends.

The team left New Orleans a few days before, the storm, then played their

Oakland on Thursday night. Players had been off between then and Monday.

They gathered for meetings at the San Antonio Convention Center, then traveled by bus to a practice facility at the San Antonio School District Spring Sports Complex.

It's the same facility the team used temporarily last year while waiting out Hurricane Ivan, and also was used by the Dallas Cowboys during training camp in 2002 and '03. Saints receiver Joe Horn

said the field was "decent." "I can take you over to the Astrodome or the Air Force base (in San Antonio) and show you a lot harsher conditions," he said.



Cajun History

The ancestors of today's Cajuns originally came from France. They established the first French colony in the New World in Nova Scotia (Acadie) in 1604. They were trappers, hunters, and fishermen. After a war, France lost Acadie to the English.

The Acadians obeyed their new rulers and continued to live the way they had always lived. France tried to get the Acadians to revolt against the English in another war in 1744, but they refused. Because of their refusal, Nova Scotia (Acadie) continued to be under the

English flag.

The Grand Dérangement (great displacement) began in 1755. The Acadians were told to leave their homes on a Sunday morning in church. Several days later the expulsion began. People were put on ships, many separated from their families.

More than 8,000 Acadians were deported. Half of them died at sea. The survivors were deposited along the Atlantic coast in Pennsylvania, Massachusetts, Georgia, Connecticut, North and South Carolina, New York, and Maryland.





## **luseum Mementos: Bones Hooks made history in Pampa**

Cowboy," a new book by Bruce G. Todd of Amarillo begins with an account of Bones Hooks' historic ride on an outlaw horse. The event occurred south of the Santa Fe

depot in Pampa on March 12, 1910.

Lane White Deer "Bones" Hooks, born Land Nov. 3, 1867, in Museum, Robertson Pampa County, Texas, was the first of

the eight children of Alex and Annie Hooks, a freed slave couple. Alex, a school teacher and a Baptist preacher, and Annie wanted their children to have academic and religious training, but money was scarce and there were many mouths to feed.

At the age of 7, Matthew got his first job - driving a meat wagon for a butcher. The next year he learned to ride a horse – probably on a farm where he worked.

Matthew was 9 years old when he began to work as a teamster on D. Steve Donald's DSD ranch in Denton County. While there, he proved that he could ride an outlaw horse and acquired the nickname that would follow him the rest of his life. Unaware that dice were called bones, he thought that one of the cowboys was calling him when he heard the cowboy say, "Hand me them bones!" Angrily he protested, "My name ain't Bones!" One-byone, the fun-loving cowboys assured him that his name was Bones, and the name stuck.

When J.R. Norris, a cattleman from the JRE Ranch on the Pecos, visited the DSD, he was very impressed with Bones and promised to make him a real cowboy if he would join the JRE outfit. Bones eagerly accepted Norris' offer and began his career as a horse trainer on the isolated JRE Ranch. He took part in many cattle drives to Kansas before 1886 - his 19th year - when he helped to bring a herd to the young Texas town of Clarendon.

For the next 23 years, with Clarendon as his home base, Bones worked on many ranches in the Texas Panhandle and in other places as well. He knew many of

"Bones Hooks: Pioneer Negro the area cattlemen including Charles Goodnight and Alfred Rowe.

J.S. "Jess" Wynne, an expert horse trainer, helped Bones improve his skill of training horses.

It was said that Bones could take a wild colt and have it follow him like a dog in less than two hours.

On the Bar CC Ranch, Bones was befriended by Dave Lard who had fights

with new hands for teasing Bones because he was black. Bones said that he was a black Angus in a herd of Hereford "white faces."

At the Fourth of July picnics in Clarendon, Bones sold hot tamales to get money to enjoy the holiday and to save for the next celebration. Once a stranger set up a rival stand, and when some of the cowboys started to buy from the stranger, they were reprimanded, "What do you mean? That feller'll be gone next week and Bones will be right here. Buy from Bones until e sells


When Tom Clayton (a white man) died in the early 1890s, Bones took a bunch of white wildflowers to the funeral. This was the beginning of a tradition with Bones who ever afterward sent a single white flower to the funeral of every pioneer he knew.

In May, 1909, Bones left the range to work as a porter for the Santa Fe Railway. In the spring of 1910, he was working in a day coach when he overheard four men talking about horses. Bones said later, "I sort of hung around, dusting the seats, because I don't like to miss any horse talk."

The men were talking about Old Bob, a black mustang that nobody could ride. The horse's owner was Moore Davidson, who lived with the family of his widowed sister-inlaw, Myrtle "Mert" Davidson. The Davidson place was south of Pampa in Section 64 where there was a huge running spring of water.

Bones continued, "I broke in finally and said, 'I can ride that horse.'

The men were amused when Bones asked them to telegraph



Davidson and ask him to have the horse at the depot when the train was scheduled to reach Pampa. This was arranged, and it was agreed that Bones would receive \$25 if he succeeded in riding Old

Bones had broken horses for J. Frank Meers when Meers was the foreman on the Masterson Ranch, and Meers was one of the men who brought Old Bob to the place where a large crowd gathered south of the depot at Pampa. Lewis F. Meers, son of J. Frank, played "hooky" from school to watch the event.

It was about 2 p.m. when the train arrived at the depot. Bones, booted and spurred and minus his white porter's jacket, descended

from the train. It is reported later that he said, "I combed that bronc from his ears to his tail, rode him to a standstill, collected my money, and was back on the train when it pulled out seven minutes later.'

Bones Hooks' ride was widely publicized nationwide as well as ocally.

Hallie Case (Mrs. A.A. Tiemann) was a young girl attending the Catholic convent at Canadian when Bones was a porter on the Santa Fe. It was customary for Bones to meet Hallie and her mother at the depot in Pampa and watch to see that she arrived safely at Canadian where a nun was waiting for her. Then Bones would meet Hallie at Canadian for the return trip to Pampa and watch until she was with her mother. In later years when Bones came to Pampa for rodeos or gatherings of old-timers, he always visited "my little Hallie."

Bones moved to Amarillo about 1911 and remained there for most of the rest of his life. He retired from the railroad in April, 1930 and thereafter devoted his time to participating in civic affairs and working for the betterment of his people. At his funeral service in February, 1951, the Mount Zion Baptist Church in Amarillo was crowded with his friends, white and black. One-by-one, they laid on his coffin a single white flower, his longtime symbol of respect.


