Committee members are asked to take a tour of school facilities. Meetings are scheduled on Monday, Tuesday and Wednesday to allow ample time for all committee members to attend.

The facilities study committee was named to look at long range solutions to the problems.

"We have to look at two things," Porter said. "We have to decide whether to spend money fixing up the older structures or whether to build new facilities."

"The elementary school were renovated in 1997 and 1998 and they are in fairly good shape,"he said. "There are only minor problems with

But there are structures other than the junior high and high school that need attention.

"The Carver Center Central Administration Building and the Horace Mann center both have problems," Porter said.

"We have to decide whether to put in a new facility for central administration or modernize the facilities

The Horace Mann Center houses technology, food service, maintenance and the Pampa Learning Center.


"And the basic problem is how to pay for either renovation or new construction. We would have to look at a bond issue, and grants from private and corporate donors."

Porter said the state can pay 35 to 40 percent on projects that are contracted on a bond issue.

He said he hopes to have a plan in place by mid spring 2006.

Roach was indicted May 17 by a Gray County grand jury on charges of Gray County grand jury on two state charges of possession of a controlled substance with intent to deliver.

One indictment concerns methamphetamine, and the other specifies cocaine.

Both indictments state that a handgun was present at the time of the incident, that the amount of the substance

grams, that the incidents occurred Jan. 11, and that they occurred within 1,000 feet of a drug-free zone.

Community Christian School, 220 N. Ballard, is within 1,000 feet of Gray County Courthouse, where Roach was arrested Jan. 11 by agents of the FBI's Amarillo office on a federal charge of possession of methamphetamine. Further federal charges involving methamphetamine, cocaine and firearms were added to the federal indictment on Jan. 12.

Roach pled guilty to the firearms charge in a plea bargain agreement on Feb. 8, the same day that he resigned as 31st District Attorney. In a June 1 hearing in federal court in Amarillo, he was sentenced to five years in federal prison followed by three years' supervised

Roach is currently incarcerated at Federal Medical Center of Fort Worth.

## Austin school tour reveals moderate needs

In the third week of meetings about the school districts, facilities, the committee focused on a campus with only moderate needs: Austin Elementary.

"The problems at the junior high and high school are very serious," committee chairman Lee Porter said. "The elementary schools" problems do not need emergency repair."

The current status of the campus can be attributed to a complete renovation in 1997. However, some things have since grown outdated.

There is no computer lab in the school that could be used for activities involving every member of a class. The classrooms are only equipped with two to four computers, some of which still do not have internet

Security is another issue that has not been seriously re-evaluated in recent years.

With several outlying doors that must often be. open, new measures aimed at reducing accessibility were discussed. One idea would safeguard the doors by means of locks operated with numeric codes. The other would involve placing bar codes on teachers' identification badges.

Other issues discussed included the possibility of expanding the parking lot, lack of handicap accessibility to south and east entrances, size of need-specific rooms and slight damages to the building's older sections.

Porter expressed a need to not only renew the facilities but to maintain them.

"Will the board 20 or 25 years down the road have to replace this?" he asked. "We want to be prepared for the future."

As for the near future, the committee will meet again in the Austin Elementary library at 6 tonight.



# Rice reveals strategy for Iraq's future

WASHINGTON (AP) — Secretary of State Condoleezza Rice today outlined a strategy for helping Iraqis clear out insurgents and build durable, national institutions as she sought to reassure jittery members of Congress about the path to peace in Iraq.

Rice said the United States will follow a model that was successful in Afghanistan. Starting next month, she said, joint diplomatic-military groups — Provincial Reconstruction Teams will work alongside Iraqis as they train police, set up courts, and help local governments establish essential services.

Even as Rice tried to crystalize the strategy before the Senate Foreign Relations Committee, Republicans and Democrats pressed her for more specifics that they say will help Americans determine when U.S. troops in Iraq can return home.

Sen. Richard Lugar, R-Ind., the committee chairman, questioned whether Iraqis should have benchmarks for progress. "At what point do we try to set some markers?" he asked.

"They are taking over responsibility for some of the toughest places those are good benchmarks," Rice

responded.

Democrats urged her to explain how the strategy would impact the number of U.S. troops serving in Iraq.

"I'm not looking for a date to get out of Iraq," Sen. Joseph Biden of Delaware, the top Democrat on the panel, said. "But at what point, assuming the strategy works, do you think we'll be able to see some sign of bringing some American forces home?

Rice demurred to the opinions of military commanders, saying: "I don't want to hazard what I think would be a guess, even if it were an assessment, of when that might be possible."

By State Department design, Rice testified before the committee just days after Iraq apparently approved its first constitution since a U.S.-led coalition ousted Iraqi dictator Saddam Hussein in 2003. Her appearance also coincided with the start of Saddam's trial in Baghdad for a massacre of 150 of his fellow Iraqis.

At the White House, press secretary Scott McClellan praised Saddam's trial as "a symbol that the rule of law is returning to Iraq."

Rice heralded the referendum on the


charter as "a landmark" and said the US. strategy was moving from a stage of transition to a stage of preparing a permanent Iraqi government.

"Clear areas from insurgent control, to hold them securely, and to build durable, national Iraqi institutions," Rice said

"Our strategy is to clear, hold, and build," she said. "The enemy's strategy is to infect, terrorize, and pull down."

With Iraqi allies, she said, the United States is working to dismantle the insurgent network and disrupt foreign support for them, maintain security in areas insurgents no longer hold, and build national institutions to "sustain security forces, bring rule of law, visibly deliver essential services, and offer the Iraqi people hope for a better economic future.'

Rice said that to ensure success in Iraq, the country's ethnic sects must work together to build the new permanent democracy, and the new government must show financial accountability and professionalism while demonstrating a willingness to make tough decisions.

# Media shield law causes clash in Senate

WASHINGTON (AP) — Skeptical senators, concerned over the jailing of New York Times reporter Judy Miller, grilled a Justice Department representative who testified that government procedures for getting information from reporters had worked well for 33 years and didn't need to be altered.

"Here you have a reporter in jail for 85 days and millions of Americans wonder why? I'm one of those," Sen. Arlen Specter said today as the Judiciary Committee he heads called Miller and others to tetstify on a proposed bill that would allow reporters to keep the identity of their sources

The jailing of Miller for refusing to discuss her sources with federal prosecutors investigating the disclosure of undercover CIA agent Valerie Plame's identity "has had an obvious chilling effect on other reporters" around the country, said Specter, a Pennsylvania Republican.

Representing Department, Chuck Rosenberg, a-U.S. attorney in Texas, declined to discuss

the specifics of Miller's case but said, "We should not enter this debate believing that the First Amendment is under assault by the Department of Justice. Manifestly it is not."

Rosenberg said that since 1991 only 12 of 243 subpoenas issued under Justice Department guidelines to news media called for confidential source information.

"We seek information about confidential sources from reporters only when it really, really matters," Rosenberg said. "What is broken about the way we are handling subpoenas to the media? ... I don't see anything in our work that justifies discarding 33 years of careful practice that has served the nation well."

On her way into the hearing, Miller offered a different view: "We need a federal shield law. That's why I'm here. I went through a lot to be able to make this statement."

Former U.S. attorney Joseph DiGenova suggested that the committee enact the existing Justice guidelines into law, so reporters could get

courts to enforce them because "notwithstanding what they're saying today, they don't always do that.'

Sen. Dianne Feinstein, D-Calif., asked Rosenberg if the department would support that, but Rosenberg said even that would be a bad idea because court appeals could delay action at times "when we need to move fast."

"Is that your argument — to have no bill at all?" Feinstein asked. "Yes," Rosenberg replied.

In her testimony, Miller acknowledged her own stories suggesting Iraq had weapons of mass destruction were flawed by sources with wrong information. But Miller argued that "even flawed reporters should not be jailed

for protecting even flawed sources." Many sources with accurate information needed by the public will provide it only to reporters who promise confidentiality even before the reporter can assess the information, she claimed.

# Iraq: Insurgents kill 13 in attacks

BAGHDAD, Iraq (AP) Insurgents killed 13 people Wednesday, including three election officials tallying votes from Iraq's constitutional referendum and an American and a British soldier, in widespread attacks that coincided with the start of Saddam Hussein's trial, police said.

A bomb also went off at a famous monument in a Baghdad square honoring the 8th-century founder of Baghdad to whom Saddam often compared himself. The blast, which toppled the bust of Abu Jaafar Al-Mansour but caused no injuries, appeared to be a jab at the former dictator.

Iraqis are still awaiting the outcome of last weekend's referendum, as the slower-than-expected vote counting continued. Questions about the integrity of the vote and delays in getting marked ballots to the capital mean final results from the landmark vote won't be announced until Friday at the earliest, officials said.

The returns have raised questions over the possibility of irregularities in

An argumentative Saddam and seven senior members of his regime went on trial Wednesday for a 1982 massacre of about 150 Shiites in the town of Dujail, north of Baghdad. He immediately challenged the legitimacy

of the court and pleaded innocent to all charges.

The judge later adjourned the session until Nov. 28.

Less than an hour after the prosecution began, insurgents shot and killed three election commission officials on the outskirts of the capital in Abu Ghraib, as they drove home after another round of counting referendum ballots, said police Capt. Qassim Hassan.

At about the same time, insurgents opened fire on a police checkpoint near the Hai Al-Adil highway in a western Baghdad, killing four policemen and wounding 11, said police Capt. Qassim Hassan. The fighting continued for several hours, and it was not immediately known if any militants were hurt, Hassan said.

In other attacks in Baghdad on Wednesday, insurgents shot and killed Hakim Mirza, a municipal director, and his driver, in the Dora neighborhood, and Muhsin Chitheer in front of his home in the al-l'alam area, police said.

# Astros confident, loose for Game 6

ST. LOUIS (AP) — The Houston Astros hardly sounded shaken.

Even after a stunning loss to St. Louis in Game 5 of the NL championship series, they made sure to needle All-Star closer Brad Lidge about the jaw-dropping homer he gave up to Albert Pujols with two outs in the ninth inning.

"We kidded with him the whole time on the plane today. We actually told him we almost got hit by the ball when it took off," Roy Oswalt said Tuesday. "The mood on the plane was actually pretty cool."

Pujols' home run Monday night, already one of the most memorable in postseason history, denied the Astros their first World Series berth - at least for a couple of days — and sent the best-of-seven NLCS back to St. Louis for Game 6 on Wednesday night.

Houston leading 3-2, Cardinals lefty Mark Mulder will pitch against Oswalt, who won their Game 2 matchup. What's more, after a long season that produced this playoff rematch, the Astros and Cardinals are right back where they were a year ago. Busch Stadium, Game 6.

"If I can make a difference in someone else's life, then Jeff didn't die without a purpose," Hipple told the Detroit Free Press for a Wednesday story.

The Lubbock, Texas, native who played with the Lions from 1980 to 1990 also is active in the National "We need to teach people that this is Football League Players Association. dealing with divorce, depression and substance abuse issues.

> Hipple's only son, Jeff, killed himself in April 2000, using a shotgun he found under his father's bed.

> One in four high school students considers suicide, said Heather Irish, executive director of MINDS. According to the National Institute of Mental Health, suicide was the third leading cause of death among people ages 15 to 24 in 2001, after unintentional injuries and homicide.

Hipple said his son had gone through many changes as a young child. Hipple and his first wife had divorced when Jeff was 5 years old and the boy lived in Utah with his mother, who married and divorced two more times. The boy was 14 when he moved back to Michigan to live with his father in Fenton and attend high school.

While the fall went well — Jeff was captain of the freshman basketball team at his Hartland high school — things started to slip in the spring, Hipple said.

Jeff was sleeping in, complaining of headaches and stomachaches - all signs of depression.

When Hipple asked his son what was wrong the boy just told him, "'I don't feel good," Hipple said. A doctor's tests came up with nothing.
