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

GOP: Dubai ports deal faces defeat

WASHINGTON (AP) -Republican congressional leaders told President Bush today the House and Senate both appear ready to block a Dubai-owned company from taking over operations at several U.S. ports, officials

The GOP leadership delivered the assessment in a private meeting at virtually the same time White House spokesman Scott McClellan reiterated Bush's vow to veto any legislation to interfere with the deal.

The developments came one day after a GOP-controlled House committee voted 62-2 to block the transfer, which has prompted an unusual, election-year Republican revolt against the administration.

Across the Capitol, Senate Democrats demanded a vote on the issue, placing Republicans on the political





Rumsfeld: Iraq security forces would respond to any civil war

WASHINGTON (AP) -If Iraq were to plunge into all-out civil war the U.S. military would depend on Baghdad's own security forces to deal with it "to the extent they are able to," Defense Secretary Donald H. Rumsfeld said today.

Testifying with Secretary of State Condoleezza Rice in support of the administration's request for \$91 billion in funds mainly to pay for the wars in Iraq and Afghanistan, Rumsfeld was pressed to explain the U.S. military's plan to respond in the event that Iraq's sectarian violence grows into a full-fledged civil war.

"The plan is to prevent a civil war, and to the extent one were to occur, to have the - from a security standpoint — have the Iraqi security forces deal with it, to the extent they are able to," Rumsfeld told the Senate Appropriations Committee.

He said the key to avoiding civil war is for Iraq's political leaders to form a government of national unity.

An AP-Ipsos poll released Thursday shows 77 percent

of Americans think civil war ductive to set a timetable for is likely to break out in Iraq. They're evenly divided on whether a stable democratic government can survive in Iraq.

More than half of Americans continue to disapprove of President Bush's handling of the war in Iraq. Administration officials have generally shied away from saying that Iraq may be on the brink of an all-out civil war.

Sen. Robert Byrd, D-W.Va., repeatedly pressed Rumsfeld to say what U.S. troops would do if civil war broke out, noting that in his own view the country "only narrowly missed descending into all-out civil war" in recent days.

Rumsfeld said the key to avoiding civil war is for Iraq's political leaders to form a government of national unity. He also said that it would be counterpro-

withdrawing U.S. forces, stressing that he's confident the Iraqis realize the enormity of the stakes at this stage of the process.

"They have everything to lose," he said. "If they are not able to put together a government in a relatively short period of time they are facing a very difficult situation for all of the people involved in governance in that country.'

Also responding to Byrd's question, Gen. John Abizaid, head of the U.S. Central Command, suggested that Iraq has been moving in the direction of civil war.

"There's no doubt that the sectarian tensions are higher than we've seen, and it is of great concern to all of us," Abizaid said, adding that he was pleased with the professionalism that Iraq's own security forces have demon-

Appropriations Committee Wednesday ignored that threat and voted to bar DP World, which is run by the government of Dubai in the United Arab Emirates, from holding leases or contracts at U.S. ports. The provision was added to a must-pass measure funding the war in Iraq and providing new hurricane relief.

Since House lawmakers attached the ports language to the pending \$91 billion bill that would pay for hurricane recovery and wars in Iraq and Afghanistan, Bush's veto threats may carry less weight with lawmakers.

The imbroglio over the port operations deal overshadowed the substance of the funding measure for Iraq operations and rebuilding projects on the Gulf Coast.


The underlying \$91.1 billion spending bill provides \$67.6 billion to fund the wars in Iraq and Afghanistan and \$19.1 billion in new money for hurricane relief and rebuilding along the Gulf Coast.

The bill would bring total funding for the wars in Iraq and Afghanistan to \$117.6 billion for the budget year ending Sept. 30. Total spending on Iraq and Afghanistan since the terrorist attacks of Sept. 11, 2001 would reach almost \$400 billion.

The Appropriations Committee plan largely adopts Bush's requests for the war, the bulk of which would fund operations and maintenance costs, replacement of equipment, and per-

sonnel costs. For hurricane relief, the House measure adopts Bush's \$4.2 billion request but does not dedicate the money exclusively for Louisiana as he requested. The \$19.1 billion for hurricane relief would bring total hurricane-related spending to more than \$100 billion.

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Gunmen abduct 50 Iraqis; bomb kills 9, injures 6

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BAGHDAD, Iraq (AP) -Gunmen wearing commando uniforms of the Shiite-dominated Interior Ministry stormed an Iraqi security company that relied heavily on Sunni ex-military men from the Saddam regime, spiriting away 50 hostages. The ministry denied involvement and called the operation a "terrorist act."

Today a roadside bombing targeting an Iraqi patrol killed at least nine civilians and injured six, police said.

The blast missed an army patrol in Amariyah, a mostly Sunni neighborhood in west Baghdad, according to Interior Ministry Maj. Falah al-Mohammedawi

Another bombing was aimed at a police patrol in Jihad, a mostly Sunni western neighborhood, and injured three bystanders, said police Lt. Mohammed Kheyoun.





Mail-merge doesn't have to be hard ...

struggled with WordPerfect's and Microsoft Word's mail merge features. Despite these companys' many attempts to simplify the process, they have yet to make it "easy."

In my next couple of columns, I'll demystify the merging process and show you step-by-step how to complete some simple projects. So, let's start at the very beginning:

When you hear the phrase, "mail merge," what do you think it means? The word "mail" is used because in nine times out of 10, this process will be used to send out a large number of items via the Postal Service. The word "merge" signifies the two pieces that must be present to create this mail-out.

Now, listen up, here's the important part: These two pieces are the "Main

For years, people have Document" and the "Data Source." By combining, or "merging" them together, we get the finished product - a bunch of personalized letters, mailing labels, name tags, etc.

Many word processors Eric have differ-Spellmann ent ways of performing Columnist merges. For

this example, I will be using Microsoft Word 2002. These instructions should still work pretty well, though, if you have version 2000 or 2003. Here's our sample project:

You need to send a "thank you for your cash donation" letter to 40 different people. The body of the letter will remain the same in each letter. Only the person's name, address, and amount they

gave will be different.

Create Main **Document** Open up Microsoft Word,

as you normally would. As with all professional correspondence, type today's date, then

hit ENTER a couple of times. Type your name and address next, and then hit ENTER a

couple of times.

You are now at the point where each recipient's name and address will go. For now, just type the following: **FIRSTNAME** LAST-

NAME **COMPANY ADDRESS**

CITY, ST ZIP

I haven't done anything magical or technical at this point. All I've done is type

some dummy information where I want the merged data to go. Later we will replace those words with the actual codes that will allow the merge.

Hit ENTER a couple of times. Type

Dear FIRSTNAME,

Thank you so much for vour kind donation of \$AMOUNT. Your generosity will not be forgotten.

Sincerely Yours

Eric Spellmann (type your name, of course)

Save the document with a filename like, "Donation Letter Main" but do not close it. Notice I put the word "Main" in the file name. I do that to remind me this is the main document in a merge operation.

agents trying to chase the good, hardworking people down," Bush told the U.S. Conference of Mayors more than a year ago. "If we make the system work right, if we make it legitimate, then our Border Patrol will be able to chase down true threats to our national

With the assaults against journalists in Nuevo Laredo and the intimidation of deputies in Hudspeth County, those threats have become more serious than

Instead of helping solve it, the Minutemen aggravate the problem. Samaniego is right; Texas does not

need them.

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
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



Coach Wood leaving, returning to Sunray

come between you and your goal." This was just part of the speech Pampa head football coach Bryan Wood shared with his team Wednesday. The purpose for the team. meeting was to give Wood the opportunity to tell his team he was leaving.

After just one season at the helm of a proud Harvester football program, Coach Wood has decided to return to Sunray where he will serve as head football coach

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and as part-time principal. It is the latter that attracted Wood. Wood says he is not taking any coaches with him. So far as a possible replacement, Wood said, "I have offered an opinion. I didn't wait to be asked." He did not say who he suggested

as his replacement, but did say, "There are multiple guys on this staff that could do the

Coach Wood met with the Pampa players Wednesday before going to Sunray to meet with the Bobcats. "There were mixed emotions. Some of the younger players (Sunray) were excited at the news. A few of the seniors felt a little betrayed because I left for a year," Wood said.

Dunham says the process to fill the coaching vacancy has already started. Dunham says there is a wish list of possible names and they will be contacted soon. Look for an announcement to come shortly after spring break. Especially if the search doesn't require any traveling.

Yao continues dominant stretch, leads Rockets past Pacers, 103-99

(AP) — Yao Ming has gone from disappointing to dominating in less than a month.

Houston's All-Star center turned in perhaps his best game of the season Wednesday night, carrying the Rockets past the Indiana Pacers 103-99. He scored a season-high 38 points, grabbed 10 rebounds and blocked five shots.

Last month, Yao was the runner-up as the NBA's most overrated player in a survey of players done by Sports Illustrated. But now that he is fully recovered from the toe injury that cost him 21 games, it's hard to say anything bad about him.

"Since he's come back, he's been an unbelievable player," Indiana's Peja Stojakovic said. "He's so much better this year. He's unstoppable right now. He reminds me of when Shaquille (O'Neal) was winning championships in Los Angeles."

Yao topped 30 points for the third straight game and went 10-for-10 from the free throw line. He's gone over 20 points in nine straight games and reached double digits in rebounds in eight of them.

"I know my job," Yao said. "I know what the team needs me to do. I need to score, rebound, guard people. I know who I am and I know what I need to do."

French man convicted for drugging children's tennis rivals, leading to death

MONT-DE-MARSAN, France (AP) - A father who drugged his children's tennis opponents, leading to a player's death, was sentenced to eight years in prison after being convicted Thursday.

Christophe Fauviau had confessed to the crime during his trial in Mont-de-Marsan in southwestern France.

The former military pilot was accused of spiking the water bottles of his children's opponents 27 times in tournaments across France from 2000 to 2003, using the antianxiety drug Temesta, which can cause drowsiness.

Prosecutor Serge Mackowiack had asked for a sentence of eight to 10 years in prison — below the 20-year maximum for the charge of unintentionally causing death by administering toxic substances.

In asking for the lighter sentence, Mackowiack said Fauviau had been a good soldier and said he did not seek to kill or injure the players.

Still, the prosecutor described Fauviau as "an adult who turned his children into objects of his own fantasies of success" and whose actions were premeditated.

"Nothing stopped you: Players collapsing on the court, the sight of gurneys, of an 11-year-old girl, a young woman who collapses against a fence. Nothing stopped you," Mackowiack said.

Tucker named AP player of the year

AUSTIN, Texas (AP) - P.J. Tucker could have faded away.

The Texas forward was declared academically ineligible midway through last season and watched his teammates struggle to a first-round exit in the NCAA tournament without their floor leader.

Had Tucker never returned, he wouldn't have been the first college athlete to let bad grades end an athlet-

Instead, he turned around his grades and got back on the basketball court. And after leading the eighth-ranked Longhorns to a share of their first conference championship since 1999, the junior forward was named The Associated Press Big 12 player of the year.

Tucker received 20 votes from a panel of 24 media representatives who regularly cover the league. His teammate, LaMarcus Aldridge, received the other four

"I've had a pretty good season," Tucker said. "The guys look to me to be a leader, to make plays. It feels

Tucker led the Longhorns in scoring (16.1) and the league in rebounding (9.0). Texas (25-5) set a school record

for most victories in a regular season. Brandon Rush of Kansas is the AP Big 12 freshman of the year, receiving 18 votes. He topped the Jayhawks in scoring (14.9) and rebounding (6.0) in leading a team that started three freshmen and two sophomores to a share of the league championship with Texas.

"I think he's just scratching the surface of how good he can be," said Kansas' Bill Self, who was voted the AP's Big 12 coach of the year.

"You look at how much he's improved in just the last five months ball-handling, passing, shot selec-

tion, defense. Everything has improved so much. He could be a great, great player.'

Oklahoma's Michael Neal was voted newcomer of the year with 23 votes. A transfer from Lon Morris College, Neal averaged 13 points per game and his .431 percentage on 3pointers was No. 2 in the league.

Tucker is an undersized, but powerfully built 6-foot-5 forward, with the strength to bull past bigger players to the basket and the ball-handling skills to occasionally run the point.

Oklahoma coach Kelvin Sampson called Tucker "the ultimate warrior." "His versatility is what separates him," Texas coach Rick Barnes said. 'There's not really a part of the game

he can't handle." Barnes still marvels that he was able to snag Tucker out of Raleigh, N.C., where he wasn't recruited by Duke

and North Carolina. The fact that he's at Texas tells you that he was not appreciated in the state of North Carolina," Barnes said. "People thought he was overweight, an undersized post player, whatever."

Barnes said he never worried about losing Tucker for good to the academic problems.

"He loves this game," Barnes said.
"I knew he would be a person that would come back from it." The coach and player had a heart-to-

heart talk soon after Tucker was declared ineligible. Barnes told him he had no one to blame but himself. "The bottom line is you could have

done a lot more," Barnes told him. "Regardless of what the world throws at you, you're responsible for yourself. From that day on, he's been terrific.'

The academic problems also prompted jeers from opposing fans this season. Tucker shrugs those off

"My GPA is probably higher than a lot of students'," Tucker said. "I laugh at it knowing where I came from and where I'm going.

As dependable as Tucker has been this season, he had an embarrassing moment that cost Texas a chance to

win the Big 12 title outright.

Tied with Texas A&M in the final minute, he lost track of the shot clock and dribbled around until it expired instead of taking a shot to win the game. The turnover set up A&M's game-winning shot in the final second.

After the Longhorns drove back to Austin, Tucker got off the bus and went straight to gym, shooting by himself until well after midnight. He came back to score 13 points and

Bonds rejoins Giants

SCOTTSDALE, Ariz. (AP) — book's release later in the month to Barry Bonds rejoined the Francisco Giants and was quickly put into the lineup to make his spring training debut Thursday, two days after details of his alleged extensive steroid program were released.

Bonds waved to fans as he made his way into Scottsdale Stadium, did a couple of twists to stretch by his locker and said little as he walked out of the clubhouse.

"I gotta go," the slugger said. "I gotta keep on schedule.'

Bonds wasn't in the original lineup posted in the morning for San Francisco's game against the Angels in nearby Tempe, but manager Felipe Alou quickly wrote him in as designated hitter.

The day before, Bonds was in California to attend a child custody hearing that had been scheduled for a month.

Commissioner Bud Selig said Wednesday that he plans to be extremely cautious before buying into the idea Bonds took steroids for years. Selig, who spent months pushing through the get-tough drug policy he wanted for baseball, insists he won't be part of ruining the slugger's reputation based on "anecdotal evidence."

First, Selig wants to get all the facts, meaning he wants to read the soon-to-be-released book that describes in vivid detail Bonds' alleged use of performance-enhancing drugs. Then he'll decide whether any action is necessary — or possible.

"I'm going to be very sensitive about all that because, after all, you're playing with people's lives and their reputations," Selig said Wednesday, a day after Sports Illustrated released excerpts from "Game of Shadows," written by two San Francisco Chronicle reporters.

"All of us ought to be careful," Selig said. "The commissioner certainly is going to be careful. It doesn't mean I don't have interest. I've spent more time talking to doctors, trainers, players from different generations. I've talked with a lot of people, more than anybody will ever know."

Selig, in Phoenix for the Canada-U.S. World Baseball Classic game, said he had no plans to meet with Bonds and would wait until the

commissioner. Bonds, who has repeatedly denied using steroids, posted a note on his Web site thanking fans for their support without mentioning the newest allegations. His lawyer, meanwhile, questioned the book's credibility.

"If you're guilty and you got caught, come clean. I think you can get a lot more respect from people than (by) lying," Wells said.

Roger Clemens offered another opinion.

"I worry more about the man's health than I do about him hitting home runs or whatever this witch hunt we're on," the Team USA ace said. "I think he got hammered pretty good last year, and it seems to be happening again this year. I don't know if it's going to change anything."

Yankees manager Joe Torre said Bonds' Hall of Fame status was up to individual voters, adding that the overall steroids scandal has given baseball "a black eye" and watered down home run numbers.

"I think right now we have already diluted that," Torre said.

Bonds, who is third on the all-time list with 708 homers and only 48 shy of breaking Hank Aaron's career mark, found the right time to be absent Wednesday, providing him a brief respite from the scrutiny.

At the San Mateo County Superior Courthouse in Redwood City, Calif., Bonds smiled as he exited with his legal staff, refusing to respond to a barrage of questions.

His attorney, Michael L. Rains, issued a statement on www.barrybonds.com.

"My client, Barry Bonds, has not read the Sports Illustrated article and does not intend to. Furthermore, he does not intend to read the book from which the article is excerpted. Barry regards this as an unfortunate distraction to his friends and teammates at the San Francisco Giants and to the good name and the great players in Major League Baseball," Rains said.
