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## Devon Energy steps up for volunteer fire campaign

Devon Energy Co. of Oklahoma City is donating \$10,000 to Panhandle Producers and Royalty Owners' Association's volunteer fire department campaign.

H. Wayne Hughes, executive director of the PPROA, said today that Devon Energy was the first donor to step forward in the campaign.

"There's no question that the disaster would have been much, much greater if it hadn't been for the hero-

ism of volunteer fire departments across the Panhandle and western Oklahoma," said David Walker, president of the PPROA. "These fire departments worked around the clock to save lives and property, including much of the valuable infrastructure of the oil and gas industry in the region. We're very pleased with Devon's gift. I know more companies will step in with their contributions soon."

Kristin Carlson with Devon Energy said there will be a presentation ceremony at the Top o' Texas

Rodeo grounds at 9:30 a.m. Tuesday. Hughes said today that the money will go to help replace equipment for volunteer fire departments. The fund-raising drive, he said, will run through May 24, when the total gifts will be announced at the association's convention in Amarillo.

The gifts are part of a larger campaign being coordinated by the Amarillo Area Foundation's Panhandle Disaster Fund. Hughes indicated that while there is no set goal, PPROA hopes to raise \$50,000. Walker noted that the wildfires,

which burned close to a million acres over the past few weeks, resulted in the deaths of 11 people, including four roughnecks from a Unit Drilling rig north of Miami. The four men are to be memorialized at the PPROA convention in May.

"More than a 1,000 pumpjacks are temporarily out of commission," Walker said.

Hughes said that the PPROA staff was working with the Panhandle Regional Planning Commission and volunteer fire departments to process grant applications.

## CRMWA board to discuss purchase of water rights

The purchase of new groundwater rights will top the agenda for the Canadian River Municipal Water Authority's board of directors when they meet at 10:30 a.m. Wednesday at Plainview Country Club.

The board is expected to go into executive session to discuss the potential purchase of property. They are also expected to review and ratify groundwater purchases and prioritize those purchases in open session.

The board is expected to consider an amendment for the purchase of groundwater

supplies with each of the 11 member cities, including Pampa, and consider the designation of underwriters for a new bond issue.

They will consider a resolution authorizing the issuance of Canadian River Municipal Water Authority Contract Revenue Bonds, Series 2006, for the conjunctive use groundwater supply district.

The board will also consider water sales from O'Donnell, Lubbock and other member cities to Wilson.

## Early voting turnout saw 541 cast ballots; Runoff set Tuesday

Early voting ended at 5 p.m. Friday, with 531 Republican and 10 Democratic ballots cast in Gray County, according to County Clerk Susan Winborne.

"I think that for a runoff, it was a really good turnout. That's an average of 100 a day, and that's what we averaged for the primary," Winborne said.

The only local race in the primary runoff election is between incumbent F. Lee Cornelison and Scott Hahn, both on the Republican ticket for county treasurer. Hahn served 16 years as county treasurer before Cornelison was elected. Cornelison is completing his first term.

The Republican runoff ballot also offers a choice between Terry Keel and Charles Holcomb for Court of Criminal Appeals judge, place 8.

The Democratic Party ballot has a runoff race between Barbara Ann Radnofsky and Gene Kelly

for United States senator, and a choice between Benjamin Z. Grant and Maria Luisa Alvarado for lieutenant governor.

The only voters able to use paper ballots in early voting for the primary runoffs were those requesting mail-in ballots. Voters at the early voting site in the non-jury courtroom on the ground floor of the courthouse had to use the electronic voting machines, and will also use the machines in Tuesday's election.

The polls will be open from 7 a.m. to 7 p.m. Tuesday at each of the seven precinct polling places: Precinct 1, Lefors community building; Precinct 2, Lovett Memorial Library in Pampa; Precinct 3, Grandview-Hopkins School; Precinct 4, Lovett Memorial Library in McLean; Precinct 5, Travis Elementary School; Precinct 6, Austin Elementary School; and Precinct 7, M.K. Brown Civic Auditorium.

## City to lease voting machines from county

The Pampa City Commission will take up a contract Tuesday with Gray County concerning leasing electronic voting machines.

City Secretary Phyllis Jeffers said that under the proposed contract, the city would pick up the machines April 28, the Friday before early voting in city elections begins on May 1, and return the machines election day, May 13, after the polls close. Election tabulations will be done by the county.

The proposed contract calls for the city to pay the

county up to 10 percent of the cost of the voting machines per day to cover manpower involved in configuring and maintaining the machines and tabulating the results. The fee is estimated to be \$22.85 per hour per employee.

The commission will consider the city's continuation in the Selective Traffic Enforcement Project and authorize Pampa City Manager John Horst to apply for a \$4,000 Click it or Ticket seat belt grant from the Texas Department of

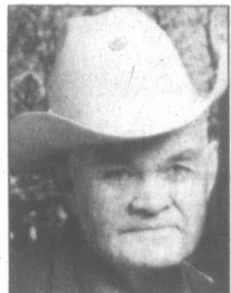
Mr. Gillispie bred and raised horses all his life. He also showed and raced horses. He was a strong Christian man who was saved shortly after he married. He was a member

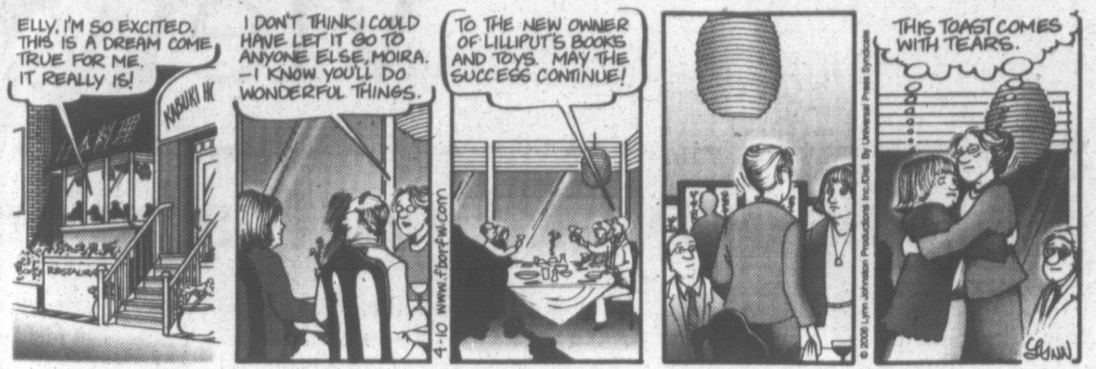

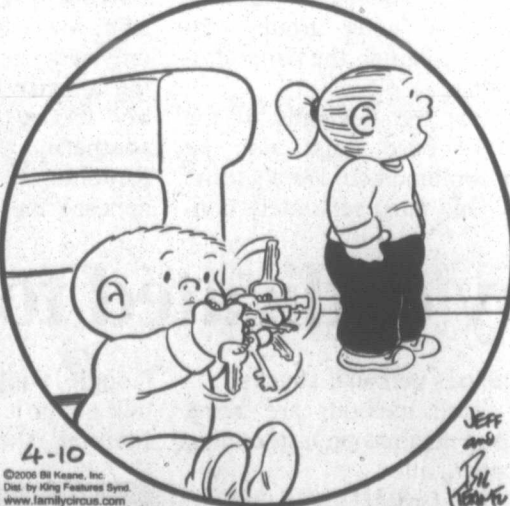

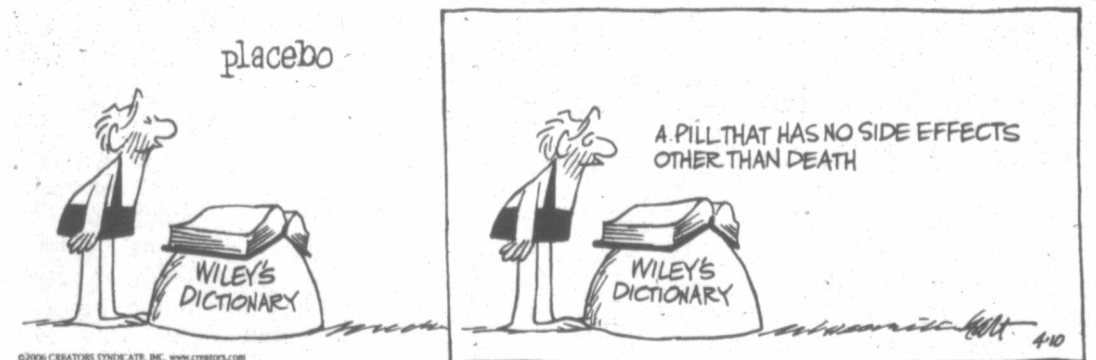

## Oceans of bluebonnets a colorful backdrop for photographs

The Oceans of Texas: Don't pick the bluebonnets

Spring in Texas offers a wonderful opportunity to take in the natural beauty of the Lone Star State. An afternoon drive down a highway or a backcountry road is made more enjoyable by the sight of flowers blooming along the roadside. And each year, around this time, we are graced by the return of our state flower — the bluebonnet.

There are more than 5,000 species of wildflowers in Texas, but there is something special about bluebonnets. Texas Monthly recently listed "75 Things We Love About Texas," and bluebonnets topped the magazine's rankings at number one. Texas offers so much to appreciate, and I commend the magazine's editors for its choice.

As spring arrives, small patches of bluebonnets form. Soon these

patches grow into plentiful fields of blue that rival any body of water. The vivid color of bluebonnets makes a wonderful backdrop for a photo. Fields of bluebonnets in bloom are picturesque settings that entice countless families each year to pull off on the side of the road and photograph children, loved ones, and even pets among these wonderful flowers.

This time-honored tradition is an experience that is almost obligatory to be considered a true Texan. Most people who have lived in Texas for any period of time have their own story about taking photos in a field of bluebonnets. When I lived in Austin during my time as state treasurer, my house had a small patch of bluebonnets in the yard, where I often found parents taking pictures of their children — a welcome sight.

The original bluebonnet, *Lupinus Subcarnosus* (or buffalo

clover), was adopted in 1901 by the Texas Legislature as the official state flower. However, *Lupinus Texensis*, the bold, blue flower most popular today, was such a favorite of Texans that the Legislature in 1971 formally recognized *Lupinus Texensis* and any other varieties of bluebonnet as

equally the official state flower.

The Texas Department of Transportation does its part to support Texas wildflowers. Each year, the department spreads more than 33,000 pounds of wildflower seeds along the 79,000 miles of the Texas highway system and Texas road-

ways. Each pound has 170,000 seeds from more than 30 varieties of wildflowers.

The department also provides information on the best spots to find wildflowers through a wildflower hotline at (800) 452-9292 that is updated each week as well as an online database (<http://www.dot.state.tx.us/wflwr/main.htm>) featuring current information from district offices.

Texas also owe a debt of gratitude to Lady Bird Johnson for her contribution to wildflowers in our state. As First Lady in the 1960s, Lady Bird worked to beautify our nation's roadways. She planted bulbs and trees on roadsides and parkways, and was instrumental in the passage of the 1965 Highway Beautification Act, known as "Lady Bird's Bill."

In 1982, Lady Bird founded the National Wildflower Research Center in Austin, and it was

renamed in her honor in 1998. The center is full of wonderful programs and exhibits on Texas' natural assets.

Across the state, festivals celebrate bluebonnet season. One of the biggest is in Ennis, "The Bluebonnet City of Texas." An estimated 100,000 visitors come to Ennis each April to explore over 40 miles of Bluebonnet Trails sponsored by the Ennis Garden Club. In 1997, the state legislature designated these trails as the official Bluebonnet Trails of Texas.

Of course, there are factors beyond our control that dictate to what extent the bluebonnets bloom. Texas has not received much rain over the past few months, which has led to projections of a low bloom this season. There will always be bluebonnets in Texas. There just may not be as

## GOP can survive immigration debate

The immigration bill pending in Congress poses as crucial a test for GOP efforts to reach out to Hispanic voters as the 1964 Civil Rights Act did in determining the future partisan preferences of America's African-Americans.

In 1964, the Republican Party, led by Barry Goldwater, was painted as sacrificing the interests of civil rights to its goal of attracting Southern support, although Republicans backed the bill in far greater numbers than Democrats did. But when Goldwater ran for president rejecting civil rights legislation, it doomed GOP chances among black voters for at least the next 40 years.

Will the Republican need to appease its anti-immigration base similarly vitiate

President Bush's efforts to appeal to Hispanic voters?

Hispanics, let's remember, were the swing voter group in 2004. Having voted for Al Gore by 30 points in 2000, they sufficiently trusted

Bush to back Sen. John Kerry by only an eight-point margin. If the Republican Party now turns its back on these newly swing Latino voters, it may permanently lose its ability to win America's fastest-growing voter group, perhaps dooming the party altogether.

But the demands of the GOP base must also be accommodated. Here's how: One must separately con-

sider the three key elements of immigration reform under discussion: The border fence, the guest-worker program and the criminalization of illegal aliens and those who employ them.

The GOP base wants a fence. It is vital to the entire concept of whether or not we can control our borders. All efforts to beef up manpower on the border have failed to stem the daily flow of illegal immigrants from Mexico. A fence is the only way to do it. By backing a fence and demonstrably taking control of our southern border, the Republican Party will appease the demands of its

base.

But to prevent disaster among Latino voters, it must accompany the fence with a more liberal policy on guest workers and criminalization.

Simply put, the fence must have a gate that swings open for immigrants we want and need. To avoid permanently antagonizing our southern neighbors and to keep the labor supply on which so much of American business and prosperity depend, we need a guest-worker program.

The GOP base, happy with the fence, will probably go along with it. Whatever the Congress needs to do to differentiate the guest-worker program from amnesty it should do, but it must pass a generous guest-worker pro-

## Israel lobby dedicated to stifling dissent

The first weapon of choice for the Israeli lobby when someone with prestige publishes a soundly researched paper or book critical of Israel or its powerful lobby is silence. If it's a book, it rarely gets reviewed; its author doesn't get interviewed. If it's a paper, there are no news stories in the big corporate press, no interviews with the authors, no television appearances.

For the average American who depends on the press to tell him what's going on, it's as if the criticism never existed. The second weapon is, of course, to launch

vicious personal attacks.

Both methods are being used against an astounding paper titled "The Israel Lobby and U.S. Foreign Policy." It was written by two renowned academics, John J. Mearsheimer of the University of Chicago and Stephen M. Walt of the John F. Kennedy School of Government at Harvard University.

So far as I've been able to determine with the help of

Google, while the paper and talk about it are all over the Internet, they are missing

from the big corporate press as of this writing. It was published in the London Review of Books, and you can read it or download an edited version at [www.lrb.co.uk](http://www.lrb.co.uk). There was one news story about it in the Christian Science Monitor and an attack on it by David Gergen in U.S. News & World Report. Gergen is editor at large of

the magazine, which is owned by an ardent Zionist, Mortimer Zuckerman. Gergen is a professional spinmeister who has always served the people who have the butter for his bread.

The essence of the paper, which is thoroughly footnoted, is that Israel's lobby has so skewed American foreign policy in the Middle East that the U.S. places the security of Israel ahead of security for the United States.

"This situation has no equal in American history," the authors state.

League was quoted in a Jewish publication as saying that if the paper gained the attention of the mainstream media, then a "more vigorous attack" would be launched. So far, it has not, though in the Christian Science Monitor story one of the attack dogs of the Israel lobby branded these two esteemed academics from prestigious universities as "incompetents."

This paper isn't the first to criticize the Israeli lobby. There have been lots of

papers and books written by distinguished individuals, none of which you've probably ever heard of. "They Dare to Speak Out," by former Rep. Paul Findley, and "The Passionate Attachment," by George W. Ball, one of America's most distinguished diplomats, are two that come to mind. It was the late Sen. William J. Fulbright who first called Congress "Israeli-occupied territory."

What the authors of the current paper hope to do is start a sensible public debate about the Israeli lobby and America's policy in the Middle East. Of course, avoiding an honest debate is one of the primary objec-

tives of the lobby. That's why it uses silence and, if that doesn't work, vicious personal attacks. It has certainly buffaloed Congress and most of America's news media.

Another author given the silent treatment as well as vicious personal attacks is Norman Finkelstein, a professor at DePaul University. He's written three outstanding books you've probably not heard of: "The Holocaust Industry," "Image and Reality of the Israel-Palestine Conflict," and his latest, which got not a line of review, "Beyond Chutzpah: On the Misuse of Anti-Semitism and the Abuse of History." Finkelstein, by the

way, is Jewish and the son of Holocaust survivors.

This is a most serious issue and deserves an honest public debate. Whether you agree with any of the above authors and academics, you should read what they have to say and not be deterred by cheap ad hominem attacks.

You've heard the same message from me, of course, but I'm only a country boy turned journalist with no fancy degrees. If you're impressed with credentials, Finkelstein, Findley, Walt, Mearsheimer and Ball have them up to their armpits.

gram. (If it is necessary for those here illegally to return to Mexico and reenter as registered and enrolled guest workers, to convince the right that a guest-worker program is not amnesty, so be it).

With a 4.7 percent unemployment rate, we will be slitting our own throats by denying our economy access to Mexican workers. We just need to make them legal, not illegal. With a border fence to enforce the difference, a guest-worker program will work politically.

And it is also important for the Republicans to

avoid symbolic acts like making it a felony to be here illegally or to employ someone who is. The same practical deterrence is quite possible through the fence.

Judges, in any event, are not about to crowd our jails with millions of felony illegal entrants. Deportation is and will be the answer to those we catch — and deportation has new meaning with a fence in place.

Yes to the fence, yes to guest workers and no to greater criminalization are the keys to giving the Republican Party access to Latino votes in the future while coping with an issue that roils tens of millions of Americans.

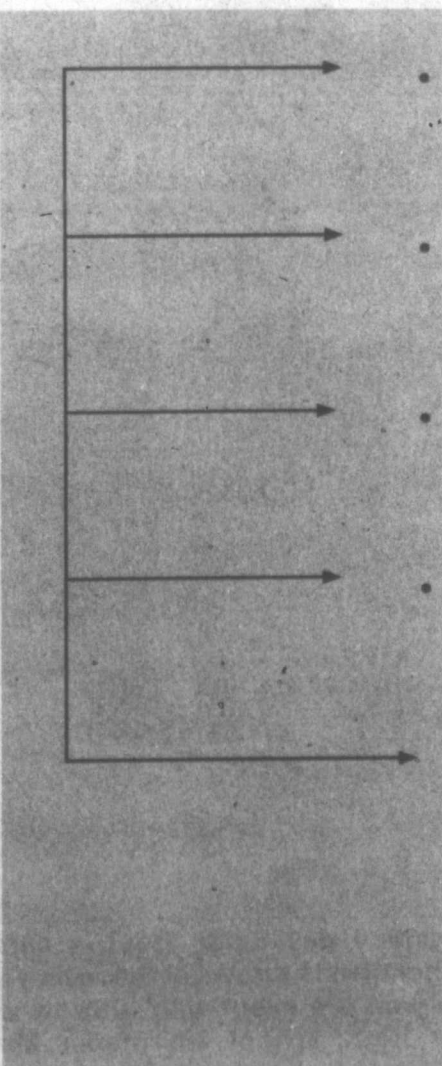

## Part of Augusta airport evacuated as golf fans and players leave town

AUGUSTA, Ga. (AP) - Part of an airport terminal was evacuated for about two hours today and a bomb squad was called in after an unattended bag was spotted as fans and players from the Masters golf tournament headed out of town.

The baggage area inside the terminal at Augusta Regional Airport was cordoned off and passengers were evacuated from the area after an airport employee identified a suspicious bag on the sidewalk outside around 8 a.m., said Christopher White, a spokesman for the Transportation Security Administration.

The bag was considered

suspicious because it was unattended, though authorities didn't immediately know what it contained, White said. No further details were released.

The bag was removed and normal airport operations resumed about 10:20 a.m., White said.

Some commercial flights were delayed for more than two hours because passengers were delayed in boarding; airport spokeswoman Diane Johnston did not know how many.

People getting off planes also were delayed in picking up their baggage, and bags headed on planes were delayed in getting to their destination, White said.

The Nuggets said earlier Hodge was expected to recover and could play in two to three weeks.

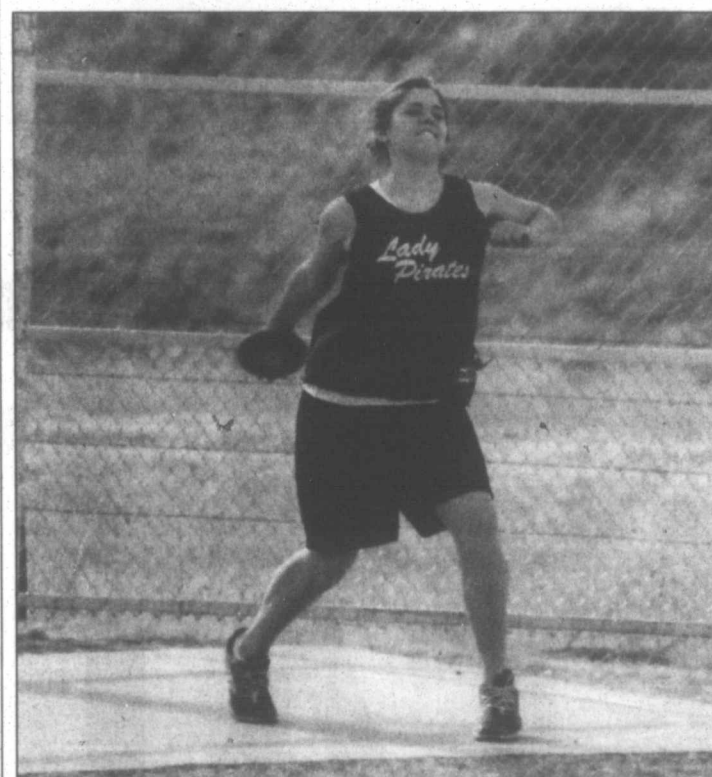
Adams County sheriff's deputies said the 22-year-old was shot while driving on Interstate 76 in north Denver at about 2 a.m. Saturday.

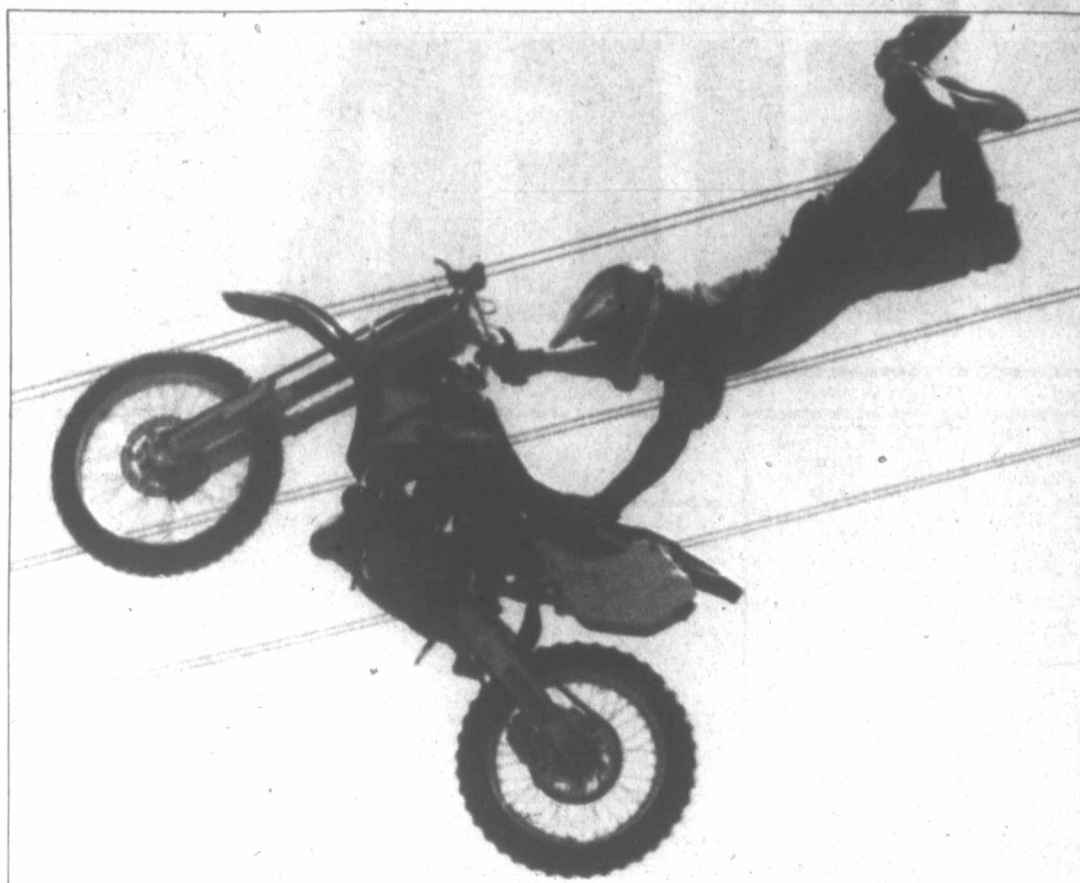
