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## Brainard, Reeve garner Golden Nail awards

Brainard received the Individual Award "for outstanding support and service to the fine arts, both financially and personally, by an individual or individuals in Amarillo and the Panhandle."

Reeve received the Distinguished Volunteer Award "for exemplary volunteer service by an individual in Amarillo and the Panhandle."

Brainard and Reeve have been active volunteers and supporters of Pampa for many years. Brainard has served more than 25

years as membership chairman of the Community Concert Association. She is currently maintaining the Pampa Fine Arts Association office at Pampa Community Building, 200 N. Ballard.

She is an active member of the PFAA board, the Pampa Woody Guthrie board, the Foundation of Southwest Art board in Canyon and the Texas Panhandle Heritage Foundation, which produces the summer musical drama staged each year in Palo Duro Canyon.

Brainard donates to a number of artistic organizations, including the Amarillo Symphony, Lone Star Ballet and the Amarillo Opera. She contributed to the build-

This magazine combines a comprehensive recap of the volunteer firefighters who fought the wildfires that plagued the area beginning on March 12, and includes 30 full-color photos taken during the week of the threatening blazes.

This collectible production has 24 pages of full color and no advertising.

Publisher Sean Smith said that a portion of the pro-

ceeds will be donated to area volunteer fire departments.

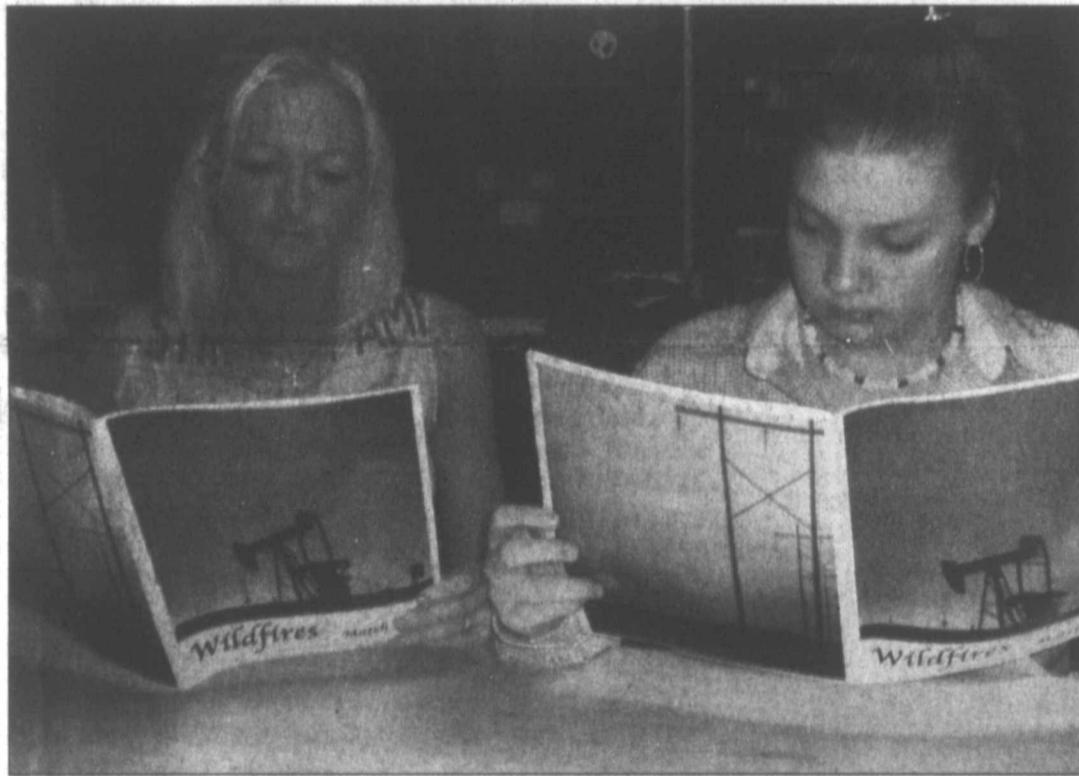
These volunteer fire departments were spread thin fighting the fires that were described as the largest grass fire in Texas history.

One volunteer firefighter died of injuries sustained when his fire truck rolled over. He was among the 12 people who died as a result of the fires.

Volunteer fire departments depend on local support for their equipment. When the smoke cleared, departments found that some firefighting equipment was lost or damaged.

This historic event galvanized communities in the area, and a combined effort by an army of volunteers triumphed over the wildfires.

The publication is dedicated to all the volunteers who rose to the occasion.

## Old West exhibit to open at museum

"The Old West: Revisited" is a new summer exhibit which will open May 3 at White Deer Land Museum. Many of the artifacts in the exhibit are from the museum's own collection, except for rifles and handguns, which are on loan from a local collector.

At the close of hostilities between the U.S. Army and hostile Native Americans in the Panhandle-Plains

region, there was a belt of land in north-west Texas extending from the Pecos River to the Oklahoma Panhandle which is now 67 counties and which at that time had uncertain status.

Fort Concho, Fort Stockton and Fort Elliott, which later became Wheeler County, were the only U.S. forts in or near that region.

The Texas Constitutional convention

which framed the current constitution and adopted it in early 1876 provided that the Legislature should have the authority to cut up into counties all of the region not marked off in counties, with the new counties to be not less than 900 square miles in size.

Few of these newly-created counties

## Mexican immigrants across state prepare to boycott work Monday

HOUSTON (AP) — Mexican immigrant Marcos Garcia will get the day off Monday from his job at a Houston landscaping company so he can participate in the "Day Without Immigrants" protest. Immigrants across Texas and the nation will stay home from work and school, and boycott the purchase of American products for one day to protest legislative proposals aimed at cracking down on illegal immigrants. While some immigrants worry about losing their jobs if they miss work, or losing vacation or sick time to participate, Garcia said his boss gave him his blessing.

"He understands what this means for us. He told us, 'This is going to benefit you,'" said Garcia, who illegally entered the U.S. in 1980.

Garcia wouldn't identify his employer, but other Texas businesses appeared sympathetic to the boycott and rallies planned in Houston, Dallas, Lubbock and other Texas cities.

Malone's Cost-Plus, a chain of nine Dallas supermarkets and over 800 restaurants owned by Malone's Food Stores Ltd., will close Monday in a show of support for a community the company has served for 30 years, general manager Rick Gomez said.

He said the company's work force is 95 percent Hispanic and the store's customers are about 90 percent Hispanic.

Cozymel's Restaurant, a Tex-Mex chain with at least two stores in Texas, said it will remain open, but give all the day's profits to Hispanic charities.

"As a company, we had to decide what the best course of action was for us to take," Cozymel's co-owner and CEO Jack Baum said in a release. "We needed to balance our desire to stand together with our responsibility to make sure that those who needed to work could do so."

## Debate continues over whether attack was hate crime

HOUSTON (AP) — Debate continues to swirl over whether racial hate motivated two white teens to viciously beat and sodomize a 17-year-old Hispanic boy during an attack at a suburban Houston home.

Authorities said that during a get-together, the two

white suspects attacked the teen, stomping him in the head with steel-toe boots. They then sodomized him with the plastic pole from a patio-table umbrella into which they had poured bleach, then doused the boy's body in bleach.

Through the attack, the suspects shouted racial slurs at the Hispanic teen, authorities said.

The victim remained in critical condition Friday, in a coma and on a respirator and dialysis.

Local civil rights groups say they believe racial hate motivated the attack and want it labeled a hate crime.

"This clearly is a crime motivated by prejudice and bias against Hispanics," said

LULAC district director Rick Dovalina. "No other reason exists for this crime to have been committed against this young boy."

But Detective Michael Weinel of the Harris County Sheriff's Department disagreed because the teens at the home drank, smoked marijuana and took Xanax.

"I believe alcohol and drugs had a major part to do with this," he said.

Weinel said the suspects, David Henry Tuck, 18, and Keith Robert Turner, 17,

have told authorities they beat the boy because he kissed a 12-year-old girl at the home. But Weinel said investigators were verifying if that was really the reason.

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# State Department report says al-Qaida leaders losing control

WASHINGTON (AP) — Leaders of al-Qaida lost some control of the terror network last year due to the arrests and deaths of top operational planners, but the group remains the most prominent terror threat facing the United States and its allies, the State Department said Friday.

In its annual report on worldwide terrorism, the department singled out Iran as the most active state sponsor of terrorism, saying

that its Islamic Revolutionary Guard Corps and Ministry of Intelligence and Security directly have been involved in the planning and support of terrorist acts.

Overall, the report tallied about 11,000 terror attacks around the world last year, resulting in more than 14,600 deaths. That is almost a fourfold increase in attacks from 2004, though the agency attributes the change largely on new ways of tallying the incidents.

At least 10,000 to 15,000 of the approximately 40,000 people killed or wounded worldwide were Muslims, most of them in Iraq, said the National Counterterrorism Center, which provided statistical information to the State Department.

About 3,500 of last year's attacks occurred in Iraq and about 8,300 of the deaths occurred there, accounting for a large part of the increase over 2004.

The report said Iraq is not a safe haven for terrorists, but Shiite and Sunni extremist groups are trying to turn it into one. While the U.S. and its allies have thwarted some attacks and kidnappings by groups like al-Qaida in Iraq, led by Abu Musab al-Zarqawi, "the battle is far from over," it said.

The report said that Osama bin Laden and other al-Qaida leaders are scattered and on the run and Afghanistan is no longer a safe

haven for the network. In addition, al-Qaida's relations with the Taliban that once ruled Afghanistan are growing weaker and the group's finances and logistics have been disrupted, the report said.

"Al-Qaida is not the organization it was four years ago," the report said.

However, "overall, we are in the first phase of a potentially long war," it said.

had any citizens, and none of them at that time had the required number of 150 qualified voters to organize self-government, so it was necessary to "attach" them to the most conveniently located counties which had been organized.

Gray County was one of 54 attached to Clay, Jack, Young and Shackelford counties. The 54 counties comprise an area the size of the states of Connecticut, Maryland, Massachusetts, New Jersey, Vermont, New Hampshire, Delaware, Rhode Island and the District of Columbia combined.

There was not a single resident in the block of 54 counties according to the 1870 census, but by 1880 the area had a population of 3,175. By 1900, 13 counties, including Gray, were still unorganized, but the entire 54-county area had a population of 45,000.

Gray County was organized in 1902, with 152 qualified voters who had filed for petition to hold an elec-

tion for organizing the county. The petition was approved by the Roberts County commissioners, since Gray County had been attached to Roberts County since 1885.

The county's organization began an era of settlement, primarily by White Deer Land Company. The main industry and economic base was agriculture.

"The land was plentiful, and the work was hard, but settlers continued to come by train, wagon and horseback. They have built for us a fine heritage, and this is what will be revisited at White Deer Land Museum," said Anne Davidson, museum director.

"The recent prairie fires have reminded all of us how hard life has been for those who make their living off of the land. And in this area, their lives directly affect our lives," Davidson said.

The Old West exhibit is in the Holland Wing of the museum, which is located at 116 S. Cuyler. Museum visiting hours are 1 to 4 p.m., Tuesdays through Sundays.

The exhibit will be open through the summer.

## 'The clear' supplier enters guilty plea

SAN FRANCISCO (AP) — A noted scientist in the sports nutritional supplement world pleaded guilty Friday to supplying the Bay Area Laboratory Cooperative with the performance-enhancing drug known as "the clear."

Patrick Arnold pleaded guilty to one count of conspiracy to distribute steroids.

He's scheduled to be sentenced in August and will likely face three months in jail and three months of home detention.

A San Francisco federal grand jury indicted Arnold in November of conspiring with BALCO founder Victor Conte to distribute the once-undetectable substance tetrahydrogestrinone.

Arnold's plea comes as a grand jury is investigating whether Barry Bonds, the San Francisco Giants' star outfielder, lied about using "the clear" to another grand jury that investigated the BALCO lab more than two years ago.

So far, the BALCO probe has netted guilty pleas from Arnold, Conte, Bonds' train-

er Greg Anderson, BALCO vice president James Valente and track coach Remi Korchemny.

Arnold was snared after federal agents raided his Champaign, Ill., lab last year.

Prosecutors say Arnold was intimately involved with distributing steroids through BALCO from 2000 to 2003.

## Cases of mad cow 'extraordinarily low'

WASHINGTON (AP) — There are probably a few undetected cases of mad cow disease in the United States, but the total — estimated at four to seven — is "extraordinarily low," Agriculture Secretary Mike Johanns says.

The calculation comes from new testing data released Friday. Testing is likely to be scaled back after a panel of independent scientists reviews the figures, Johanns said.

"The data shows the prevalence of BSE in the United States is extraordinarily low," Johanns told reporters on a conference call. "In other words, we have an extremely healthy herd of cattle in our country."

The brain-wasting disorder infected more than 180,000 cows and was blamed for more than 150 human deaths during a European outbreak that peaked in 1993.

The first American animal case appeared a decade later, prompting the United States to increase its testing for mad cow disease, which is medically known as bovine spongiform encephalopathy, or BSE. So far, the U.S. has

found three cows infected with the disease, including one born in Texas, the nation's leading cattle producer.

But the first case, a Canadian cow found in Washington state, is not included in the testing analysis. Including that animal would have revised the estimate of infected cows upward to five to 11 nationwide.

The scientific peer review should be finished by the end of May, Johanns said.

Johanns said there is little justification for keeping up the higher testing levels, which rose to about 1,000 samples daily, from about 55 samples daily, after mad cow turned up in the U.S. The current level is around 1 percent of the 35 million cattle slaughtered last year in the U.S.

"I didn't even know there was a

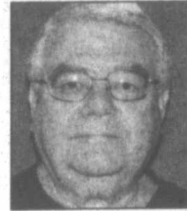
draft," he said.

Today's Highlight in History:

On April 30, 1945, as Russian troops approached his Berlin bunker, Adolf Hitler committed suicide along with his wife of one day, Eva Braun.

On this date:

In 1789, George Washington took office in New York as the first president of the United States.

In 1803, the United States purchased the Louisiana Territory from France for \$60 million francs, the equivalent of about (U.S.) \$15 million.

In 1812, Louisiana became the 18th state of the Union.

In 1900, engineer John Luther "Casey" Jones of the Illinois Central Railroad died in a wreck near Vaughan, Miss., after staying at the controls in an effort to save the passengers.

In 1904, the Louisiana Purchase Exposition opened in St. Louis.

In 1939, the New York World's Fair officially opened.

In 1945, "Arthur Godfrey Time" made its debut on the CBS radio network.

In 1970, President Nixon announced the U.S. was sending troops into Cambodia, an action that sparked widespread protest.

In 1973, President Nixon announced the resignations of top aides H.R. Haldeman and John Ehrlichman, along with Attorney General Richard G. Kleindienst and White House counsel John Dean.

In 1975, the South Vietnamese capital of Saigon fell to Communist forces.

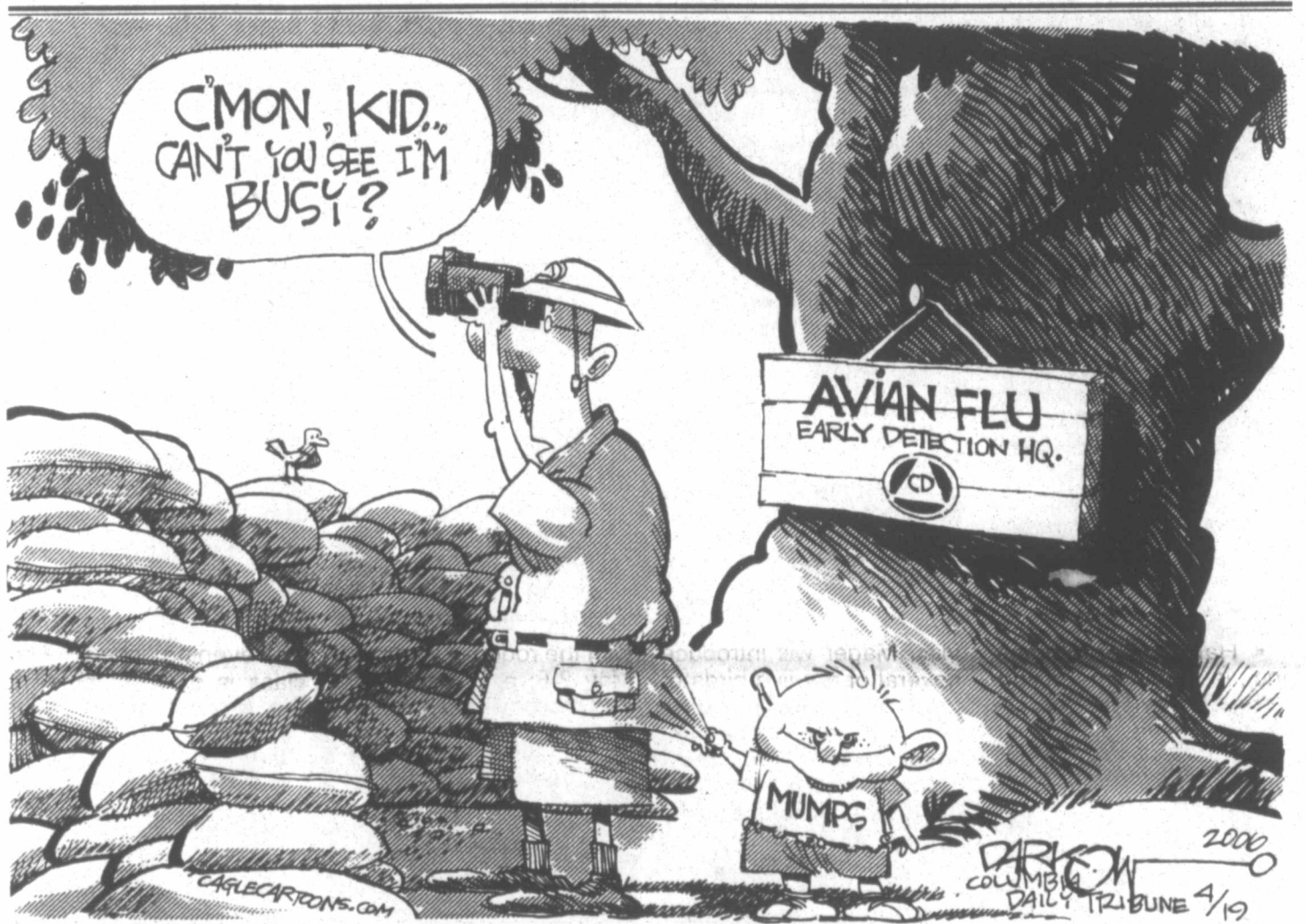
Ten years ago: President Clinton and Israeli Prime Minister Shimon Peres signed an accord in Washington extending U.S. help to Israel in countering terrorism.

Five years ago: California businessman Dennis Tito arrived at the international space station aboard a Russian spacecraft. Intern Chandra Levy was last seen at a health club near her apartment in Washington, D.C., before vanishing. (Her body was found in a Washington park in May 2002, but the circumstances of her disappearance and death remain a mystery).

One year ago: Missing Georgia woman Jennifer Wilbanks turned up in Albuquerque, N.M., originally claiming to have been abducted but then admitting she was a "runaway bride."

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## Texas Thoughts

The Dallas Morning News on Mexico's presidential race:

Mexico's presidential race revs up tomorrow when two of the three candidates meet for the campaign's initial debate. Unfortunately, front-runner Andrés Manuel López-Obrador apparently thinks he shouldn't have to share a stage with Felipe Calderón and Roberto Madrazo, so he's skipping the event. That speaks poorly of him, and, worse, hamstring voters and interested Americans.

The forum will focus on how Mexico can develop its economy, a

subject close to the United States' heart. Washington arguably wouldn't be returning this week to focus on the high-pitched immigration debate if Mexico had enough good-paying jobs. Surveys show that Mexicans have access to jobs back home but not enough with decent wages. Too many poor Mexicans still peddle ice cream, corn or, worse, drugs.

How Mexico fills this vacuum is arguably the issue of the presidential race. The 2000 election was about creating a transparent government; today's is about economics.

Andrés Manuel López-Obrador, of the Party of the Democratic Revolution, speaks of expanding industrial jobs, investing in Mexico's agriculture sector and increasing domestic

markets for Mexican goods. Fine, so long as he doesn't re-create a state-centralized haven or reopen the North American Free Trade Agreement. The 1994 pact hasn't worked perfectly, but it spurred the development of Mexican factories.

Felipe Calderón, of the National Action Party, emphasizes how he wants to improve the rule of law so Mexico attracts investment dollars. And he told this newspaper recently how he would explore using the North American Development Bank to target areas of high migration with development loans. Sounds plausible, but the trick is finding enough private dollars to generate jobs.

Roberto Madrazo perhaps has the hardest sell. His Institutional

Revolutionary Party ruled Mexico for 70 years, relying upon union bosses and corrupt programs. He talks about creating 9.6 million new jobs and attracting new businesses through making Mexico secure.

But he still must show his party understands the competitive global

economy and not just public largesse.

Minus good-paying jobs, Mexico will keep losing its young men and women. The challenge obviously has consequences from California to Texas to Maine. The audience for tomorrow's debate clearly resides on both sides of the border.

## NBA playoffs: Kings take Game 3, 94-93

SACRAMENTO, Calif. (AP) — The lucky bounce went to the Sacramento Kings this time - and what a bounce it was!

Kevin Martin tossed in an improbable, twisting fast-break layup over Tim Duncan as time expired, and the Kings got back into their first-round playoff series against San Antonio with a 94-93 victory in Game 3 Friday night, cutting the Spurs' lead to 2-1.

The Spurs won an overtime thriller in Game 2, with Brent Barry's game-tying regulation 3-pointer bouncing twice on the rim and backboard before falling through. The Kings got the luck back home in front of a crazed crowd - and Martin delivered the biggest shot of his short NBA career.

Michael Finley hit a go-ahead 3-pointer with 41.1 seconds left for San Antonio, and Ron Artest turned the ball over with 27 seconds left in his return from a one-game suspension. The Spurs ran down the clock until the final seconds - but Manu Ginobili capped a terrible game by losing the ball on a drive for his seventh turnover.

Mike Bibby, who had 25 points, rushed the ball to midcourt and fed Martin, the Kings' second-year shooting guard. He drove the lane and somehow lofted a shot over Duncan, who blocked six shots in a dominant performance also featuring 29 points and 12 rebounds.

The ball bounced delicately on the

rim before falling through as the buzzer sounded, setting off pandemonium in Arco Arena.

Game 4 is Sunday night in Sacramento, with Game 5 back in San Antonio on Tuesday.

Artest had 22 points and 12 rebounds for the Kings, while Bibby had 25 points and eight assists. Bonzi Wells had 19 points - eight in the fourth quarter - and 14 rebounds in another inspired effort as the Kings survived a physical final period in a game featuring 48 fouls and 56 free throws.

Martin finished with 10 points and six rebounds.

Artest also turned in a defensive gem on Ginobili after sitting out Game 2 for elbowing the Argentine forward in the head in Game 1, a 34-point Spurs victory.

Duncan made a solid recovery from two sub-par efforts for the Spurs, but Ginobili and Tony Parker managed just 20 points on 7-of-21 shooting for the defending NBA champions. Finley scored 17 points, hitting four 3-pointers in the Spurs' latest outstanding performance by a reserve from their loaded bench.

Finley's third 3-pointer put San Antonio up 72-70 with 9:48 to play - the Spurs' first lead since the first quarter, capping a 24-8 surge. The game stayed tight to the end, with neither team leading by more than four points

in the fourth quarter.

Artest couldn't conceal his excitement about being back in uniform for his first home playoff game with the Kings: He grabbed the opening tip and drove straight to the hoop for a layup attempt, drawing a foul from Parker. He scored Sacramento's first six points and finished the first half with 13 points and eight rebounds.

The Kings led by 12 points late in the half, but San Antonio closed the halftime deficit to 47-41 on six quick points from Beno Udrih, the backup point guard who has struggled mightily in previous playoffs.

Sacramento led by 14 points in the third quarter before a 16-5 San Antonio run.

**Notes:**@ Spurs C Rasha Nesterovic hit the first 3-pointer of his eight NBA seasons at the first-quarter buzzer. In Game 1, Spurs C Nazr Mohammed hit the second 3-pointer of his career. ... All four Maloof brothers, including principal Kings owners Joe and Gavin, watched the game together at court-side. The brothers stormed the court in celebration after Martin's basket. ... Wells went down in a heap after Finley elbowed him in the face late in the first half - but referee Ken Mauer inexplicably allowed San Antonio to inbound the ball anyway, and Duncan hit a layup while Wells still was down on the other end.

## Indian's Wickman fearless in 7-6 win over Rangers

CLEVELAND (AP) — Bob Wickman didn't care about Kevin Mench's home run streak. The Indians closer went after Mench like any other hitter.

Mench homered in his seventh straight game for Texas, but made the final out against Wickman as the Cleveland Indians held on to beat the Rangers 7-6 Friday night for their third straight victory.

"I was coming after him because he already had his homer tonight," Wickman said after yielding a run in the ninth before getting Mench to pop out with a runner on third for his fifth save.

Wickman thought he had Mench struck out on a 2-2 pitch.

"I wanted that punch-out," he said. "I was going

for a strikeout. I figured if I went and got beat it would have been on good pitches. I made a lot of good ones to him."

Mench then fouled off three straight with a 3-2 count before popping to second baseman Ronnie Belliard - as Wickman pumped his fist in exhalation.

Wickman tied a career high with his 21st consecutive save since Aug. 6 and matched Doug Jones for the Cleveland club record with 129.

"There's huge satisfaction in that, but I've got to credit all the doctors and trainers in Cleveland," said Wickman, who missed all of 2003 and part of 2004 after having elbow surgery before recording a career-best 45 saves last season.

## Texans tap Williams with No. 1 pick

HOUSTON (AP) — The Houston Texans' decision to snub Heisman Trophy winner Reggie Bush and sign defensive end Mario Williams with the No. 1 pick in the NFL draft has cut a slack-jawed swath across

the NFL. But general manager Charley Casserly said the move Friday night shouldn't be that surprising.

"I think if people had just listened to what we had said, they would have seen that we were serious about Mario Williams," Casserly said. "Once we brought him in here our statements never changed that we were seriously considering him for the first pick in the draft and I understand that people didn't believe it, but we always said it and we believed it."

Houston started negotiating with both Williams and Bush this week. While many expected the Southern California running back to be the Texans' choice, they went for the North Carolina State lineman instead.

"This is a decision that took a lot of time to make, but at the end of the day we felt this was the best player for our football team," Casserly said. "Both players, Reggie Bush and Mario Williams, are going to, I think, be great pros. We made the decision to go

with defense."

The Texans signed Williams to a six-year, \$54 million contract, with \$26.5 million guaranteed. San Francisco quarterback Alex Smith, the top pick in last year's draft, got a six-year, \$49.5 million contract from the 49ers, with \$24 million guaranteed.

Though most believed Williams was simply a bargaining tool to aid negotiations with Bush, Casserly said the team was "seriously" about Williams long before they brought him in for an April 10 visit.

"It's just we were never going to tell anybody that," Casserly said. "We weren't going to deny it, but nobody asked the question and I understand why they wouldn't ask the question early on."

Bush has been embroiled in some controversy this week concerning who paid the rent for a home his parents lived in, and whether an agent was involved - which would be an NCAA rules violation. But Casserly said that did not influence their decision.

## Twenty time's the charm

CINCINNATI (AP) — On their 20th try, the Cincinnati Reds finally beat Roy Oswalt.

Brandon Phillips doubled, singled and scored twice off the pitcher who had the Reds' number until Friday night, then added a bases-loaded single off the bullpen for a 5-4 victory over the Houston Astros.

With their eighth victory in nine games, the Reds moved into first place in the AL Central, a half-game ahead of the Astros. Cincinnati (16-7) also matched its club record for most victories in April, with two chances left to top it.

This one will be remembered for who lost.

Oswalt was the only pitcher in major league history to go 15-0 against a team, an unblemished stretch that included 17 starts and two relief appearances scattered over three ballparks - two in Cincinnati, one in Houston.

What's more, Oswalt had won his last seven starts against the Reds, who knew

they'd need a few breaks to finally beat him.

They got them.

Oswalt (4-1) gave up runs on an opposite-field single, an infield single and a sacrifice fly in six innings, and got topped by a starter coming off the worst performance of his career. Left-hander Brandon Claussen (2-2) gave up a career-high nine runs - including four homers in one inning - in an 11-0 loss in Milwaukee on Saturday.

This time, Claussen gave up two runs in 5 1-3 innings, including Preston Wilson's solo homer, to give the Reds a chance. David Weathers gave up a two-run homer in the ninth to Lance Berkman before finishing it for his seventh save in eight chances.

Phillips, the NL's most recent player of the week, was again the catalyst, going 3-for-4 in the breakthrough win. He scored the first two runs off Oswalt, and his two-run single on an 0-2 pitch from Chad Qualls made it 5-2 in the seventh inning.

Cincinnati pressed on without Ken Griffey Jr., who was eligible to come off the 15-day disabled list Friday. Griffey, bothered by an inflamed tendon behind

his right knee, hasn't fully recovered from the nagging injury.

Not that he would have been much help against Oswalt - he's only 4-for-25 in his career without a homer off the right-hander.

Instead, a player who had never faced Oswalt led the Reds to victory over their biggest nemesis. Phillips doubled to left and came around on Jason LaRue's soft, opposite-field single for a 1-0 lead in the second inning - Claussen's first career lead when facing the Astros. In all of his three previous starts against Houston, the Reds were shut out.

Claussen doubled his good fortune by driving in Phillips with an infield single in the fourth, his first RBI since June 28, 2003. Austin Kearns added a sacrifice fly in the fifth.

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**STEVE HOWE DEAD**

**Former MLB pitcher killed in truck accident**

NEW YORK (AP) — Steve Howe, the relief pitcher whose promising career was derailed by cocaine and alcohol abuse, died Friday when his pickup truck rolled over in Coachella, Calif. He was 48.

Howe was killed at 5:55 a.m. PDT about 130 miles east of Los Angeles, said Dalyn Backes of the Riverside County coroner's office. He had been in Arizona on business and was driving back to the family home in Valencia, Calif., business partner Judy Welp said.

Toxicology tests had not yet been performed.

The hard-throwing lefty was the 1980 NL Rookie of the Year with the Los Angeles Dodgers, closed out their 1981 World Series championship and was an All-Star the next year.

But for all of his success on the field, Howe was constantly troubled by addictions — he was suspended seven times and became a symbol of the rampant cocaine problem that plagued baseball in the 1980s.

"I just saw Steve last winter when his son was pitching against my son," former teammate and Angels manager Mike Scioscia said Friday night. "Everything was looking up for him and he looked great. It makes you numb when you hear about a situation like this. He had a roller-coaster ride."

Howe was 47-41 with 91 saves and a 3.03 ERA with the Dodgers, Twins, Rangers and Yankees. His final season in the majors was 1996, and the Yankees

released him in June.

A moment of silence was observed at Yankee Stadium before New York played Toronto on Friday night. Howe played for the Yankees from 1991-96.

"I wish more people knew Steve Howe the way I knew him," Yankees general manager Brian Cashman said. "His struggles in life were well documented, but he always tried to fight through them and I will always respect that."

Two days after the Yankees let him go in 1996, Howe was arrested at a Delta Airlines terminal at New York's John F. Kennedy International Airport when a loaded .357 Magnum was detected inside his suitcase. He later pleaded guilty to gun possession and was placed on three years' probation and given 150 hours of community service.

Chicago White Sox coach Tim Lincecum played with Howe in that final year.

"You always get second chances — third and fourth sometimes. And people really believed in him and that he'd eventually kick the problem. Unfortunately, it didn't happen for him," he said.

Howe tried a comeback in 1997 with Sioux Falls of the independent Northern League and retired after injuring his forearm. That August, he was critically injured in a motorcycle accident in Montana and charged with drunken driving; those charges were later dropped when prosecutors decided his blood test was improperly obtained.

**Desperados 54, Rattlers 46**

DALLAS (AP) — Clint Dolezel threw seven touchdown passes to help the Dallas Desperados clinch home-field advantage throughout the Arena Football League playoffs with a 54-46 victory over the Arizona Rattlers on Friday night.

Dolezel was 25-of-41 for 290 yards for the Desperados, who improved to 11-3 and matched the team record for consecutive victories with five.

Will Pettis led Dallas in receiving with eight catches for 117 yards and three touchdowns, and Terrill Shaw had eight receptions for 101 yards and a TD.

Sherdrick Bonner was 23-of-44 for 312 yards and seven touchdowns for the Rattlers (7-7). Randy Gatewood had 10 catches for 138 yards and two touchdowns, and Curtis Fagan caught eight passes for 110 yards and four TDs.

**Sprinter Montgomery charged with fraud scheme**

NEW YORK (AP) — Olympic gold medalist Tim Montgomery was arrested Friday on charges he was connected to a multimillion-dollar bank fraud and money laundering scheme.

A grand jury indictment unsealed in New York accused the star sprinter, his gold medalist track coach, Steven Riddick, and 12 other people of being involved in a conspiracy that deposited \$5 million in stolen, altered or counterfeit checks over three years.

Some of the money was laundered through two businesses owned by a New York couple accused of being behind the scam, according to the indictment.

Montgomery, the former 100-meter world record holder, surrendered to U.S.

Immigration and Customs Enforcement agents in Norfolk, Va., on Friday morning and spent the afternoon in custody.

A U.S. magistrate set bond for release at \$10,000, which Montgomery was expected to post. His attorney, Robert McFarland, did not immediately return a phone message.

Investigators accused Montgomery of being a lesser player in a scheme hatched by lead defendants Douglas Shyne and Natasha Singh.

Shyne and Singh are accused of setting up sham businesses to take checks stolen from banks and either alter them or make counterfeit copies. Most of the checks involved accounts at large companies that didn't immediately notice the cash missing, federal agents said.

# Why raise telephone prices when all you need is a new fee?

NEW YORK (AP) — It's hard for phone companies to raise prices in the hyper-competitive telecom business. But since phone bills are already a blur of surcharges and taxes, many companies find there's no need to risk angering customers with a rate hike. They can just tack on another fee with a confusing name.

The latest example comes from AT&T Inc., which is imposing a new "Local Connectivity Charge" of up to \$4 a month for 1.6 million of its local phone subscribers rather than just boosting its basic rates.

As with so many other surcharges assessed by AT&T and just about every other major wired and wireless phone company, this new fee is designed to defray a basic cost of supplying the service being provided. And like the other fees, it will generate tens of millions of dollars per year in added revenue for the company.

In just about every other industry but telecommunications, the advertised price of a good or service reflects the entire cost of that product except for taxes and, in cases such as a cab or restaurant, the tip. Sometimes, as with gasoline, the advertised price covers all applicable taxes.

Not so with phone service, where it's become a widely accepted norm for companies to advertise rates that don't come close to reflecting the final tab a customer will pay. Airlines have been treading this path also, advertising one rate, then adding on surcharges for rising fuel and security costs.

To be sure, a century of federal and state regulation has saddled the telecom industry with an array of costly burdens, from providing 911 emergency calling capabilities to ensuring that rural and low-income customers have phone service.

Federal and local lawmakers also have set a poor example for companies to follow. For a century, elected officials treated phone bills as a piggy bank to cover unrelated government spending. In recent years, state and local governments have repeatedly diverted funds that were supposed to be used to upgrade 911 emergency systems so dispatchers can better locate cell phone callers.

Phone companies often argue that surcharges drive home a point to customers and government officials, highlighting the costs of regulatory compliance they bear. While this argument has merit, it's fast become an addictive excuse

for stealth rate hikes. In reality, these surcharges cover the full cost of doing business in the telecom industry even if companies believe them unfair.

Automakers don't tack on a special fee for the costs of complying with factory safety laws. A supermarket doesn't add a nickel surcharge for every quart of ice cream

Inc. Sprint Nextel Corp. charges a fee for "Federal Wireless Number Pooling and Portability" to Sprint cell phone users and a surcharge for "Federal Program Cost Recovery" to Nextel customers.

Thanks to all this conveniently confusing terminology, consumers are hard pressed to understand what the fees are about. Many mistakenly presume that their phone company is collecting taxes for the government rather than additional cash for its own bottom line.

To its credit, AT&T is being forthright about its new charge. "This fee will help AT&T recover increased connectivity costs associated with providing local service," a notice to customers states. "This fee is not a tax or charge required by the government."

Still, the rationale is twisted. The expense being "recovered" by AT&T does not involve some peripheral regulatory burden. It is central to the cost of providing phone service, not unlike the price of cotton for a clothing manufacturer or the cost of washing the dishes at a restaurant.

The new fee is being charged to 1.6 million subscribers who live outside the 13 states where AT&T owns most of the local phone net-

work. Because it can't use its own phone lines to serve these customers, AT&T has to pay a monthly fee to other companies such as Verizon to use their local networks. Likewise, rivals such as MCI, now a unit of Verizon, pay a monthly fee to AT&T so they can sell local service in AT&T's 13-state region.

Until recently, local network owners were forced to discount these wholesale rates under regulations designed to fuel competition. AT&T was among the most outspoken opponents of this system, arguing that the discounted rate didn't cover its operating costs. Once the Federal Communications Commission backed away from dictating wholesale rates, AT&T and other local operators began charging more.

By imposing the new fee, it would appear AT&T wants it both ways: to charge rivals more for access to its network, but to pay the old discounted rates to use another company's property. Otherwise, it makes no sense to start treating the recent increase in the wholesale rates it pays Verizon and others as a separate expense from what it already pays those companies to serve the 1.6 million customers affected.

## Fight continues to stop porn trend

NEW YORK (AP) — The industry's VIPs mingle at political galas and Super Bowl parties. Their product is available on cell phones, podcasts, and particularly the Internet — there it's an attraction like no other, patronized by tens of millions of Americans.

It's pornography. And if you're a consumer, John Harmer thinks you're damaging your brain.

Harmer is part of a cadre of anti-porn activists seeking new tactics to fight an unprecedented deluge of porn which they see as wrecking countless marriages and warping human sexuality. They are urging federal prosecutors to pursue more obscenity cases and raising funds for high-tech brain research that they hope will fuel lawsuits against porn magnates.

"We don't think it's a lost cause," said Harmer, a Utah-based auto executive and former politician who's been fighting porn for 40 years.

"It's the most profitable industry in the world," he said. "But I'm convinced we'll demonstrate in the not-too-distant future the actual physical harm that pornography causes and hold them financially accountable. That could be the straw that breaks their back."

The activists' adversary is a sprawling industry that, by some counts, offers more than 4 million porn sites on the Internet, that in the United States alone is estimated to be worth \$12 billion a year. A tracking firm, comScore Media Metrix, says about 40 percent of Internet users in the United States visit adult sites each month.

Porn products are featured at popular sex expositions and retail chains such as Hustler Hollywood. Major hotels provide in-room porn, and adult film stars are now mainstream celebrities. Mary Carey attended a VIP Republican fundraiser in Washington in mid-March; Jenna Jameson's "How to Make Love Like a Porn Star" hit the best-seller lists and she hosted a raucous Super Bowl party in Detroit in February.

As much as there is national consensus on the evils of child pornography, there is none whatever on porn featuring adults and marketed to them. It's more pervasive than ever, yet activists and experts disagree bitterly over the extent of harm it causes.

"The form of entertainment is no problem," said Paul Cambria, general counsel for the porn industry's Adult Freedom Foundation. "There are individuals who are going to react abnormally to normal material, but it's not a problem for the average person."

For every couple driven apart by porn, there are others whose relationship is enlivened, Cambria argued. He dismissed contentions that porn is highly addictive or brain-damaging.

"Some people lie about it," Cambria said. "It's their way of excusing personally unacceptable conduct — 'It wasn't me, it was porn.'"

Such attitudes infuriate experts on the other side who say online porn is as addictive as crack cocaine.

"The Internet is the perfect delivery system for anti-social behavior — it's free, it's piped into your house," said Mary Anne Layden, a psychologist and addiction expert at the University of Pennsylvania. "Internet porn is probably the biggest mis-education system we can devise in terms of sexuality, misuse of women."

She says many of her patients, rather than improving their sex lives with porn, suffer sexual dysfunction.

Interest in porn is age-old and normal, says psychologist David Greenfield of West Hartford, Conn., an expert on Internet behaviors, but it can become a destructive obsession for a minority who indulge in it at the expense of healthy relationships. Easy availability is part of the issue.

"It's not your father's porn," he said. "With little or no effort, as long as you have a computer, you can access some of the most stimulating content on the planet. There's no delay, no person watching. It's designed to very quickly get to a point where you're not in full control."

He estimates that for up to 10 percent of porn users, relationships suffer.

Divorce lawyers report that porn use is an increasingly common factor in marriage breakups: It can cause immense pain when a wife discovers her husband's porn habit.

"I compare it to your house burning down," said Laurie Hall, who divorced her husband after writing a book called "An Affair of the Mind," about his 20-year obsession with porn.
