Beginning May 19, minors will not be allowed out on the streets of Pampa after midnight.

The Pampa City Commission passed on second reading Tuesday afternoon an ordinance that would establish a curfew for youths under 17 years of age that will go into effect May 19.

Pampa Police Chief Trevlyn Pitner told the commission that he had gotten four positive calls regard-

the ordinance provides for various defenses for youths being out past midnight, including being with their parents or attending an adult-sponsored event.

The proposed ordinance, which will come up for a second and final vote in two weeks, should direct the water into the city's sewer system through either a direct tie-in to the system or into the street where it would flow into the city's drainage

Donny Hooper with the city's Public Works Department said this will be the third year that Lewis Construction has gotten the seal coating contract.

"They do a really good job," Hooper said.

Ranchers confront Peet over lack of aid

County Judge Richard Peet promised angry Gray County ranchers Tuesday that he would support their requests for help.

About a half dozen ranchers who suffered losses in wildfires earlier this spring met with Peet Tuesday concerning emergency relief and an apparent lack of action by county officials.

Rebecca Simmons, who spearheaded a volunteer organization in McLean to care for horses and cattle injured in the wildfires and who had contacted the Texas Animal Health Commission for veterinary help, said she had received a letter from the commission saying that Peet had reported the county needed no help.

Peet said he was unaware of anyone from the Texas Animal Health Commission contacting his office. He also said he was unaware of the extent of damage to ranchers in the south and east part of the county.

"I'm quite irritated that these people are sending out a letter that says they contacted me to determine if there were ongoing animal needs and were informed that there were none," Peet said.

He said no one from the Animal Health Texas Commission had talked to

Peet said he's been trying to contact the official who wrote that letter because he wanted to talk to him personally.

Simmons, her husband Mark, Lane Thompson, Jeff Haley, Bill Gething and Farm Bureau representatives Ricky Martin and Brandon Wheeler met with Peet for an hour Tuesday morning to vent their frustration over a lack of support.

Simmons said several groups, including the Humane American

Association and Habitat for Horses, had offered to help with injured livestock but couldn't unless they were invited into an area by state and local officials.

Mark Simmons said it has been particularly frustrating because much of the help that has been offered was volunteer, and it wouldn't cost the taxpayers anything.

"Who would I contact to get that kind of assistance?" Peet asked. "No one has ever informed me that it was available. The governor's office has not told me anything as far as what's available. Then I get the stuff thrown back on my back that I'm not helping you, and that's incorrect."

Rebecca Simmons con-Texas A&M University veterinary school officials and was told that

Tuesday was the first time he'd heard about the possibility of bringing in veterinarians, Peet said.

Peet said the commissioner's court signed the application for disaster aid and the disaster declaration and gave them to Ken Hall, the county and city emergency coordi-

"He sent them to the gov-

ernor's office," Peet said. Peet said Gov. Rick Perry declared the area a disaster immediately after the fires broke out about two months ago, although he criticized the governor for not coming to Pampa and only flying over the area and holding a

WESTMINSTER, Texas (AP) - Late-night tornadoes swept through rural North Texas, killing three people, hospitalizing 10 and reducing homes to bare concrete slabs, officials said

today.


An elderly couple were found dead in a destroyed mobile home in the tiny community of Westminster, about 45 miles northeast of Dallas, Collin County Fire Marshal Steve Deffibaugh said. He said a 14-year-old was found dead in a home in neighboring

County. "It sounded like a regular thunderstorm, then it went crazy," said Cathy Dotson, who huddled on the floor of her Westminster home with her 13- and 10-year-old grandchildren when the tornado hit about 10:30 p.m. Tuesday. "I could actually feel my house move. I looked outside my window, and all I could see was gray."

Christy Adame, who lives a half-mile from the home where the elderly couple died, weathered the tornado in a closet with her husband and two sons. When they emerged, she found her horse barn gone, one of her horses in a tree and a smell of propane so strong that officials wouldn't let a neighbor shoot his suffering cow, which had been impaled on a two-by-four. "We realized this was the

real thing this time," Adame said. "This was not just a



According to the Tax Foundation, over the past 25 years - in inflation adjusted dollars - oil and gas companies have paid in royalties and state and federal taxes \$2.2 trillion dollars. At the same time they have made a little over \$630 billion dollars in profits. So their taxes and royalties are three times greater than their profits.


The comeback in Game 2 was typical Pampa. All season long the Harvesters maintained a down-butnever-out attitude in the dugout.

Mavericks 113, Spurs 91

SAN ANTONIO (AP) - By shaking up his lineup, Dallas Mavericks coach Avery Johnson took the risk of being accused of panicking.

Instead, he's got the San Antonio Spurs wondering how they're going to keep up with new starting point guard Devin Harris.

Harris' speed and a take-it-tothe-rim attitude revived an offense that looked sleepy in the opener, helping the Mavericks go ahead by 21 points before halftime on their way to a 113-91 victory Tuesday night that tied this second-round series at one game apiece.

"Devin is the quickest guy we've got," teammate Jerry Stackhouse said. "He did a good job of keeping pressure on them and making the right plays."

Harris scored 20 points, two shy of the career high he set against San Antonio in November. Although he had only three assists, his energy and aggressiveness set the tone Johnson wanted after Dallas scored only 85 points in Game 1.

"He really got in the paint and attacked us very well," Spurs star Tim Duncan said. "It's another adjustment we have to make for the

next (game)." By starting Harris, Johnson moved Jason Terry to shooting guard and put defense-minded

Adrian Griffin on the bench. It was the kind of move Johnson's predecessor Don Nelson would've made long ago. For Johnson, it was a bit surprising considering how much he values defense.

But it's hard to question the NBA's Coach of the Year. His last big risk was benching starting center Erick Dampier in place of backup DeSagana Diop. All that did was start a 13-game winning streak.

It's too early to say where this one will lead - and Johnson doesn't want anyone getting carried away with the result.

"We're not 20 points better than the Spurs," Johnson said. "They're the champions, they're still the champions. One win by a team in the Western Conference semifinals doesn't mean anything has been taken away from them.

With Game 3 on Saturday night in Dallas, the Mavericks have plenty of time to savor this.

The Spurs are just glad to have plenty of time. They've played three games in five days, with a 1,500-mile flight from Sacramento squeezed in. Coach Gregg Popovich gave his players the day off today.

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

For more information, call 665-6127. Phone counseling is available with local leader Judith Loyd.

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
