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## Hearing on hazardous trees scheduled Thursday

The Amarillo District of the Texas Department of Transportation (TxDOT) will hold a public hearing at 6 p.m. Thursday at the M.K. Brown Building in Pampa.

Amarillo District Engineer Mark Tomlinson and Pampa Area Engineer Kenneth Corse will present

TxDOT's updated plan to reduce hazards along 145 miles of U.S. 83 and U.S. 60 in Gray, Roberts, Hemphill, Lipscomb and Ochiltree counties.

The original Hazard Elimination plan identified 1,185 trees that were to be removed within a 30-foot clear

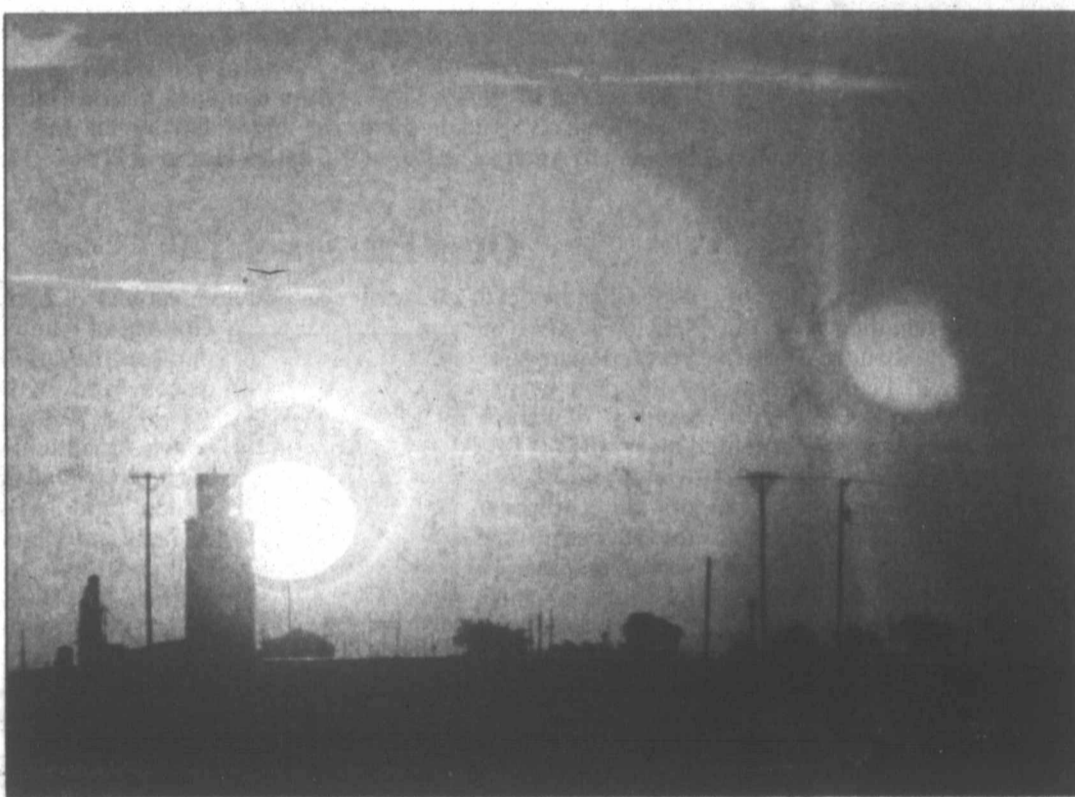
zone, along with grade and slope reductions, and added safety features around concrete and metal culverts.

During subsequent public meetings, TxDOT learned of the public's desire to save as many trees as possible due to their aesthetic and economic importance to the region. The

plan to be presented Thursday identifies 97 trees that must be removed in the interest of safety to the traveling public.

"Providing a transportation system that safely moves people and

## Hot weather spells danger for kids in cars

Hot weather can turn a vehicle into an oven in well under an hour, putting children, pets and others at risk of heatstroke and even death, according to Pampa Police Chief Trevlyn Pitner.

Pampa Police Department has received three calls so far this season concerning children left in vehicles in hot temperatures. One occurred June 8, when police were called to a residence at the south end of town because a parent had placed a child in a vehicle parked in the sun and then left the child there.

Officers responded quickly, and the call had been placed at the time the incident was occurring, but the interior temperature of the SUV was already an estimated 120 degrees when the child was removed, Pitner said. The outdoor temperature at the time was 91 degrees.

The relatively rapid rise in temperature inside the vehicle occurred even though at least two windows were open to a greater or lesser degree. The tod-

ler was removed from the vehicle before heatstroke or more serious illness could occur.

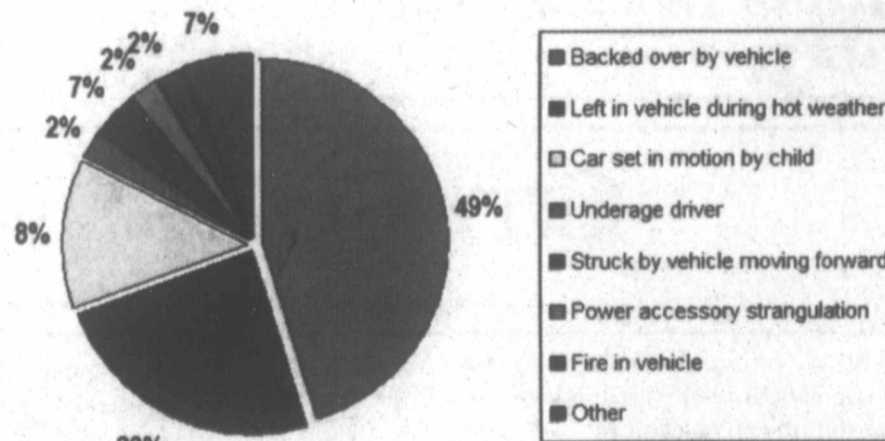
Under Texas state law, a person commits an offense if he intentionally or knowingly leaves a child in a motor vehicle for longer than five minutes, knowing that the child is younger than seven years of age and not attended by an individual in the vehicle who is 14 years of age or older.

The offense is a Class C misdemeanor, punishable by fine, unless the child is injured as a result of being left in the vehicle under the specified circumstances. The offense is then considered child endangerment and is a felony, with a penalty of six months to two years in jail and a fine up to \$10,000.

"We will file charges on every call of children unattended in a vehicle," Pitner said. The offender can also expect a call from a Children's Protective Services caseworker.

In 2005, PPD received six calls of children left in vehicles in hot weather. One call resulted in police

Nontraffic noncrash fatalities involving children under 15

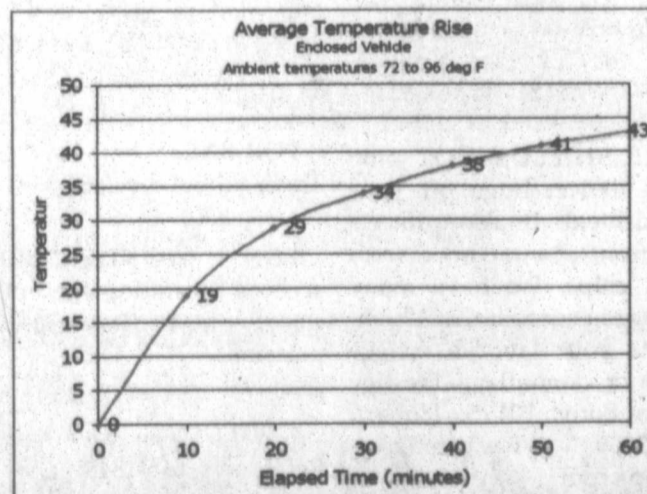

breaking a window to remove an infant from a hot car in a supermarket parking lot. An arrest was made in connection with the incident, Pitner said.

The average elapsed time and temperature rise in a vehicle in warm weather is 19 degrees within 10 minutes, 29 degrees in 20 minutes, 34 degrees in 30 minutes, 43 degrees in 60 minutes and 45 to 50 degrees

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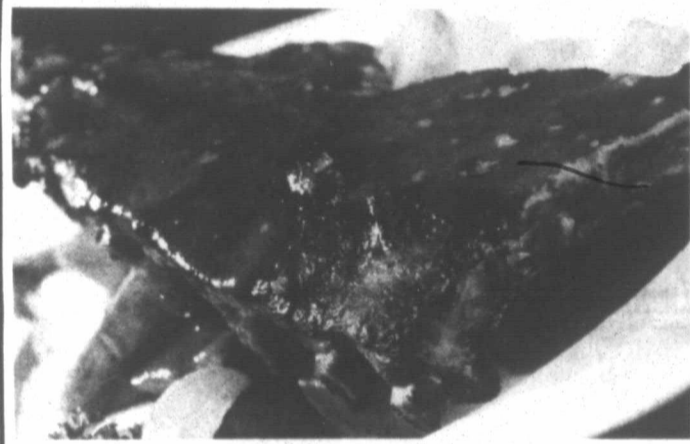

between one and two hours, according to Jan Null, certified consulting meteorologist at Golden Gate Weather Services.

From 1998 through 2005, there were 290 hyperthermia deaths of U.S. children left in vehicles, including 36 in Texas. A study which examined the circumstances that led to such fatalities determined that 39 percent of the cases were a result of the child being "forgotten" by the caregiver. Twenty-seven percent were children playing in an unattended vehicle, and 20 percent involved children intentionally left in the vehicle by an adult. The remaining 14 percent of cases involved circumstances that were unclear.

"Cracking" or lowering the vehicle's windows has been found to have little effect in warding off rising temperatures inside the passenger compartment. The largest single factor in the temperature increase was found to be the color of the vehicle's interior.

Heatstroke, or hyperthermia, occurs when the core body temperature reaches 104 degrees Fahrenheit. A core body temperature of 107 degrees F is considered lethal. Children's thermoregulatory systems are not as efficient as an adult's, and their bodies warm at a rate three to five times faster than an adult's.

The rising temperatures inside a vehicle in warm weather can also be dangerous for pets, the elderly, and others, Pitner said.

He offered the following safety recommendations to prevent heat-related illness and death in vehicles:

- Do not leave a child in an unattended car, even with the windows down.

- Be sure that all occupants leave the vehicle when unloading. Don't overlook sleeping babies.

- Always lock your car. If a child is missing, check the car first, including the trunk. Teach your children that vehicles are never to be used as a play area.

- Keep a stuffed animal in the child's car seat, and when the child is put in the seat, place the animal in the front with the driver as a reminder that the child is in the seat. Or, place your purse or briefcase in the back seat as a reminder that you have your child in the car.

- Make "look before you leave" a routine whenever you get out of the car.

# Mosquito fish put to work

NEW ORLEANS (AP) — In a large aboveground pool here, entomologists are breeding front-line mosquito fighters.

Hiding in the fibrous root systems dangling in the brown water, these fighters are being raised to be deployed to thousands of festering, flooded-out pools, ponds and hot tubs abandoned in New Orleans and the Gulf Coast since Hurricane Katrina.

Their mission: devour mosquito larvae and, potentially, prevent the spread of diseases like mosquito-borne encephalitis and the sometimes deadly West Nile virus. In the process, they'll help minimize one of this region's most annoying summer pests.

"They're incredible little fish," said Greg Thompson, a research entomologist for the New Orleans Mosquito and Termite Control

Board, as he sprinkled flakes of fish food into the harvesting pool.

The fish have been used to control mosquito populations since the 1930s, but this post-Katrina offensive marks the first time they've been harvested by the thousands for deposit into pools that have become scummy breeding tanks for mosquito larvae.

The abundance of standing water and hot summer temperatures can create a mosquito-breeding haven. And with as many as 6,000 abandoned pools in New Orleans alone, mosquito experts say the tiny fish are their biggest allies in protecting the Gulf Coast from a nasty mosquito infestation.

"Just a bucket of water can breed thousands of mosquitoes," said Ashley Gray, a college student interning this summer.

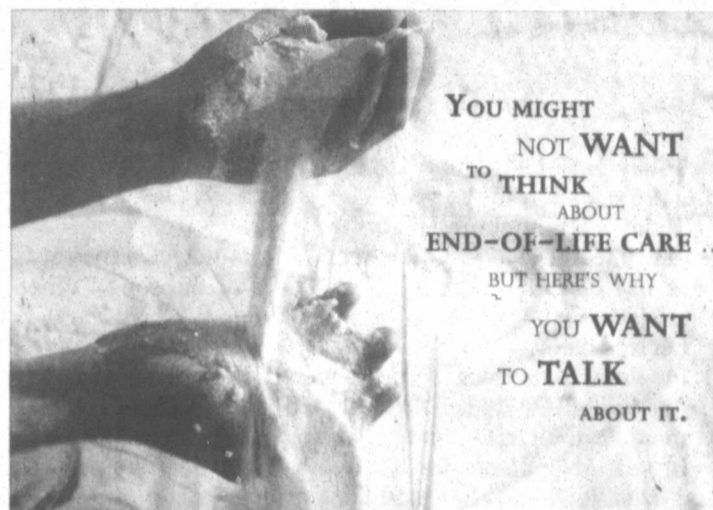

The board meets in the Administration Office at 100 Warrior Lane.



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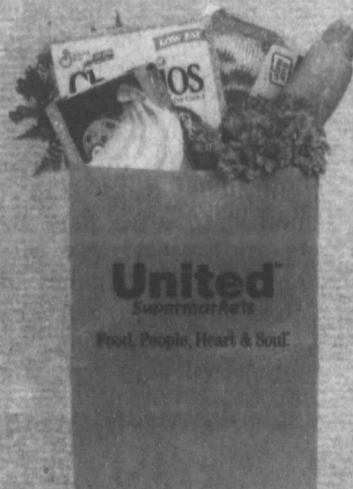

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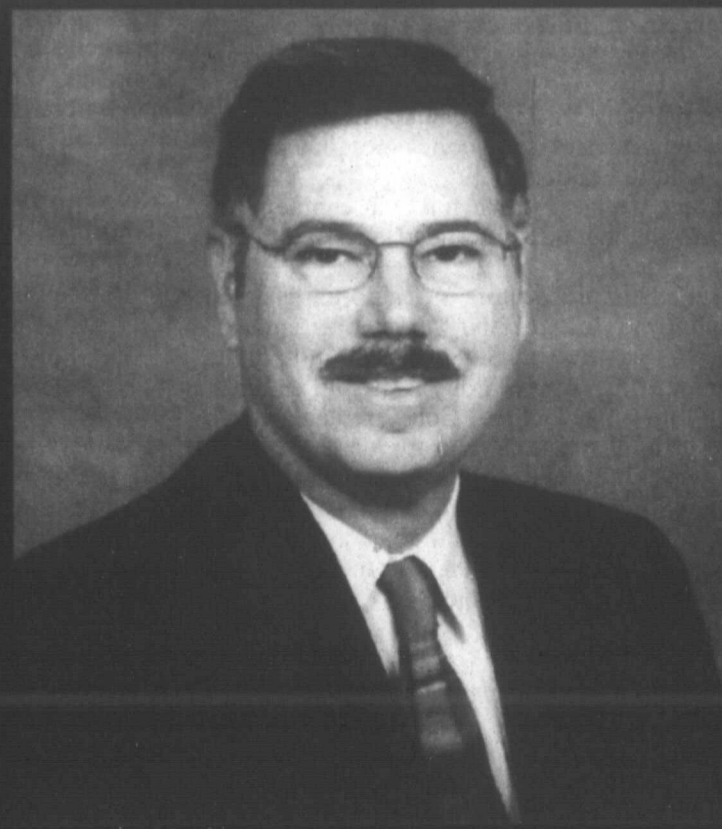


Of course this is the easy way to pick them up, but eventually the shrink wrap gets stretched and bottles of water fall out onto the floor.

That irritated me some, but I got over it. However, on subsequent shopping trips I always made sure

to lift the cases from the bottom so as not to disturb the shrink wrap. I would then lay the cases on their sides so the cashier could scan

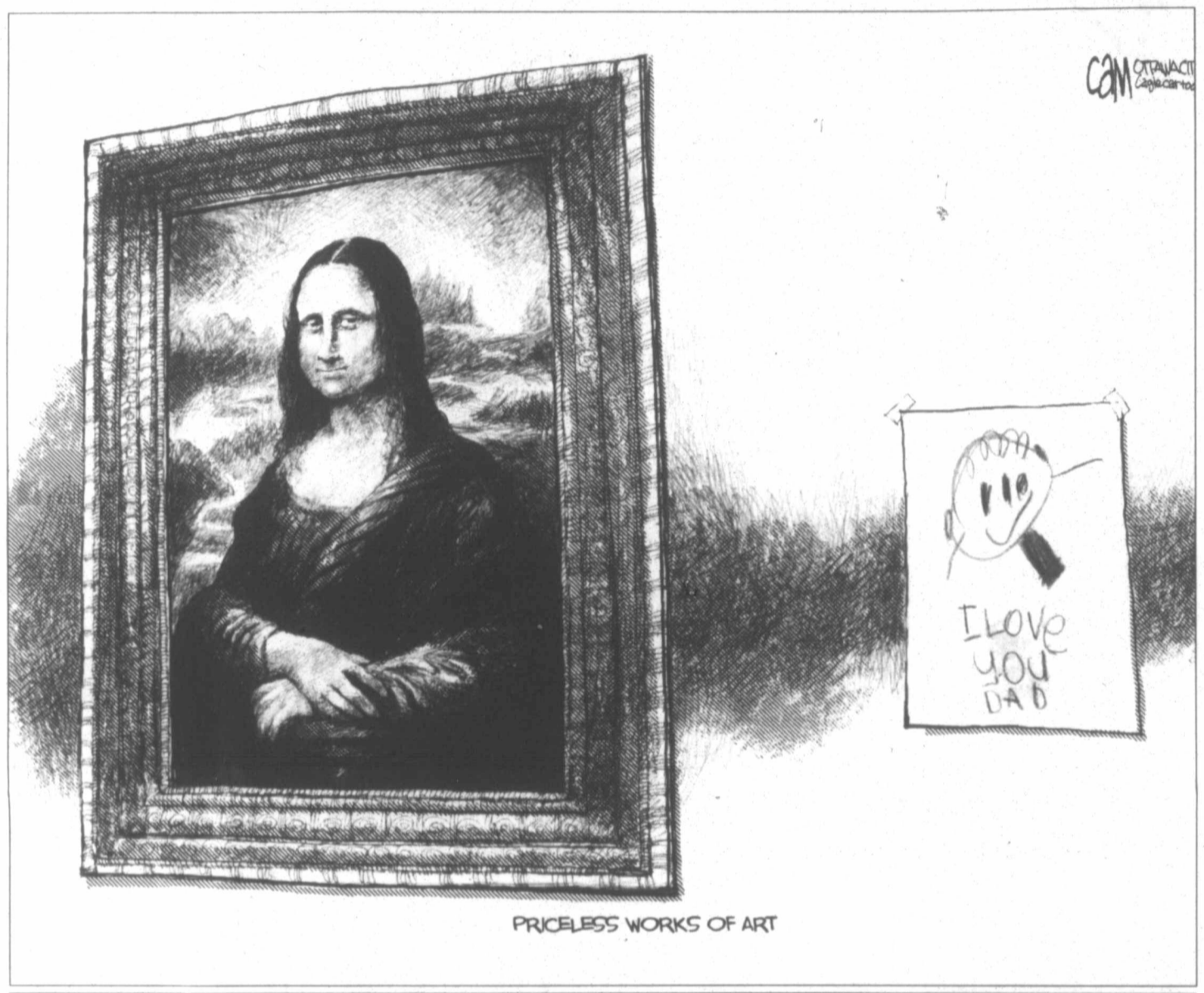

When the earth is reduced to ashes, the last perceptible messages may be competitive advertising screams, such as dish vs. cable. There'll be similar squabbles between airlines, electric companies, beverages of all descriptions — and much more horn-locking.

In the meantime, as competitive ads ratchet down like jaws of life stuck in reverse, look for the media to be fueled by high-octane advertising feuds.

Ironic, isn't it, that the National Basketball Association's championship finals will be center stage for more advertising howls. All games — as few as four or as many as seven — will be played in American Airlines venues — the AA Arena in Miami and AA Center in Dallas. It could be called an "All-American event," except for an ad bound to get air time — that Southwest is

"the official airline of the NBA ..."

The Dallas Morning News on immigration reform progress:

If you haven't been watching the news closely, it would be easy to think that nothing much has happened since Washington's contentious fight over immigration back in May. But several important moments last week gave us hope and confidence about comprehensive reform winning out.

For starters, President Bush continues to push in the right direction. It's a subject he's clearly at home with, one he has studied and wholeheartedly understands.

Last week, Mr. Bush demonstrated this compassion and understanding, visiting a Border Patrol training academy in Artesia, N.M., where he promised to add 6,000 agents to the overall force in the next two years, bringing the total to nearly 18,000.

But Mr. Bush also made clear in Artesia that security alone won't solve the problem.

We agree with Mr. Bush on both points. As a Dallas Morning News story pointed out last week, more agents will not necessarily equal more apprehensions. In 2004, agents made nearly 1.2 million arrests, which mirrored the record in 1987, when the size of the force was one-third of what it is today.

Mark Krikorian, executive director

of the Center for Immigration Studies, which favors reduced immigration, agrees. We've "focused on border enforcement to the exclusion of all the other vital aspects of immigration control," he told The News. "If a car has four wheels and you inflate one wheel and let the others go flat, that's not going to get you anywhere."

Another encouraging moment last week came during the final debate in Mexico's presidential elections July 2. Increased security is not enough when Mexicans can't find opportunities at home and we fail to enforce sanctions against employers who hire them here.

So we were glad to hear Mexico's presidential candidates address the

# The Bridge receives Fowlston grant

AMARILLO — The Bridge Child Advocacy Center in Amarillo recently received a grant in the amount of \$50,000 from the C.J. & Syble Fowlston Charitable Trust to help establish satellite facilities in Pampa, Hereford and Dumas.

To date, a total of \$203,200 has been raised, the Bridge reports, out of a projected \$629,600 necessary to make the expansion a reality. Thus far, the project has received funding from a number of sources including the M.K. Brown Foundation, the Inez B. & H.E.

McCarley Foundation and the David & Nona S. Payne Foundation, Inc.

The Bridge coordinates the investigation, prosecution and intervention efforts involved in child sexual and physical abuse cases, providing vital services such as forensic interviews, medical assessments, team meetings and victims' services.

Last year, The Bridge served more than 1,400 children who were sexually and/or physically abused. Officials with The Bridge are concerned about the number of child abuse cases in the

rural Texas Panhandle, which they find to be increasing.

The proposed satellite facilities would make the same caliber of service available to child victims outside the Amarillo area as within the city. The center proposes to partner with local chapters of CASA to form children alliance centers.

It's the same case for "Floyd's Faithful Class" in Dallas. It was named years ago to honor longtime teacher, the late Bob Floyd. At the time, it was an "over 50" age group. The 200 members cling to the name, as well as the class, and most of them now are over 70.

"After the opening prayer, we hear about the 'fall of the week,'" said member Russell Dilday. He figures they get their exercise falling and getting up — not budging ...

## RRC posts oil, gas stats

AUSTIN — The Texas Railroad Commission issued a total of 1,452 original drilling permits in April 2006 compared to 1,339 in April 2005.

The April total included 1,223 permits to drill new oil and gas wells, 69 to re-enter existing well bores, and 160 for re-completions. Permits issued in April 2006 included 285 oil, 368 gas, 735 oil and gas, 54 injection, zero service and 10 other permits.

Texas preliminary March 2006 crude oil production averaged 899,826 barrels daily, down from the 914,661 barrels daily average of March 2005.

The preliminary Texas crude oil production figure for March 2006 is 28,162,680 barrels, a decrease from 28,354,130 barrels reported during March 2005.

In April 2006, operators reported 281 oil,

676 gas, 33 injection and one other completion compared to 308 oil, 369 gas, 21 injection and six other completions during April 2005.

Total well completions for 2006 year to date are 4,390, up from 3,193 recorded during the same period in 2005.

Operators reported 232 holes plugged and zero dry holes in April 2006 compared to 606 holes plugged and 132 dry holes in April 2005.

Texas oil and gas wells produced 434,821,678 Mcf (thousand cubic feet) of gas based upon preliminary production figures for March 2006, down from the March 2005 preliminary gas production total of 440,596,902 Mcf.

Texas production in March 2006 came from 134,522 oil and 70,694 gas wells.

## Panhandle Deer Appreciation Day in offing

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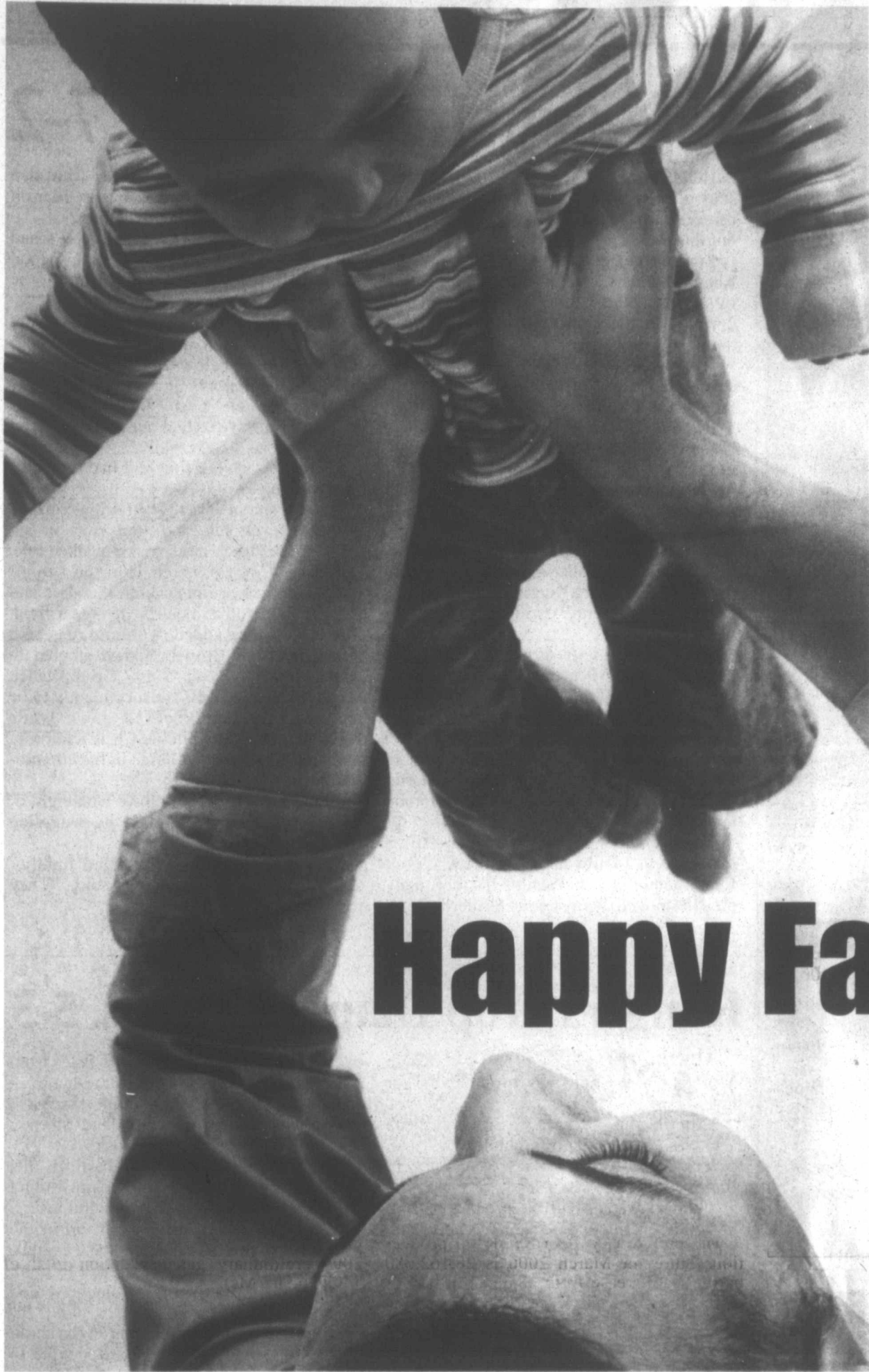

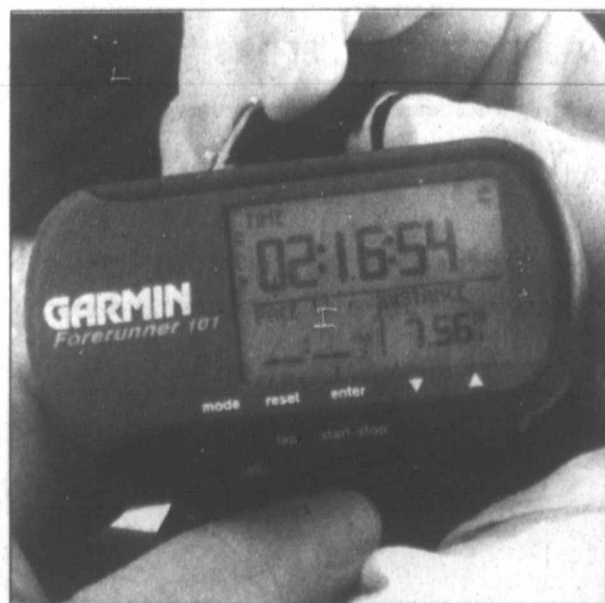

## KC crushes Astros, 7-2

HOUSTON (AP) — Scott Elarton's first start against the team where he began his career wasn't perfect — though it did start out that way.

Elarton pitched five perfect innings and Reggie Sanders had two RBIs and scored twice to lead the Kansas City Royals to a 7-2 win over the Houston Astros on Friday night.

It's just Kansas City's second win in seven games and breaks a four-game winning streak for the recently surging Astros.

Elarton (2-8) retired the first 16 batters before giving up four hits and two runs in the sixth.

He didn't allow a hit until a ground ball by Adam Everett rolled just by the glove of diving shortstop Angel Berroa for a single with one out in the sixth.

Willy Taveras followed with a pinch-hit double before Craig Biggio's line drive two RBI single to center field got the Astros within 4-2.

Mike Lamb singled to load the bases, but he was picked off at first by catcher John Buck. Elarton pitched out of further trouble by striking Chris Burke out to end the inning.

Elarton won 17 games for Houston in 2000 and was the Astros opening day starter in 2001 before being traded to Colorado later that year while on the disabled list.

"It's been a long time but there are still a lot of people I know here and I have a lot of fond memories," he said. "It's definitely nice to do well against your former team."

Royals manager Buddy Bell, who also played for the Astros, was happy Elarton had this performance against Houston.

"He pitched great," Bell said. "He's had so many good times and has so many good friends still here, it was nice for him to be able to get one here."

The Royals really aren't picky about where they get their wins. The latest makes them 30 games below .500 with the worst record in the majors.

"It's definitely been difficult for us," Elarton said. "We've had our struggles. You name it we've done it badly."

Elarton struck out four and had no walks in six innings.

Astros starter Wandy Rodriguez (8-4) allowed seven hits and four runs in six innings. He struck out five and walked one.

Kansas City answered Houston's mini-rally with a three-run seventh. Sanders had an RBI single on a line drive to center field. The Royals then added two more runs on a single by Emil Brown. Brown singled to center field to send Mark Grudzielanek home. Brown took off for second only to be chased down and knocked down while being tagged out by pitcher Chris Sampson. Sanders slowly trotted home in the commotion.

Could the Astros, who have won eight of their last 10, have overlooked the struggling Royals?

"We certainly didn't take them lightly," Astros manager Phil Garner said. "They just outplayed us."

## Rangers drop Diamondbacks, 5-3

ARLINGTON, Texas (AP) — Kevin Millwood was inducing groundballs for outs.

Major league ERA leader Brandon Webb also was getting a lot of grounders as usual, except those by the Texas Rangers kept finding holes for hits.

Taking advantage of the grounders from both sides, Millwood pitched into the eighth inning to win his fifth straight decision in the Rangers' 5-3 victory over the Arizona Diamondbacks on Friday night.

"Kevin had to pitch like he did to keep us in it," manager Buck Showalter said. "He was sharp. ... We were wondering there for a while, obviously (Webb) is a sinker-ball pitcher, but Kevin got a lot of groundballs too."

Millwood (8-3) pitched 7 1-3 innings, not allowing a run until the eighth. He got 11 groundball outs with four strikeouts and two walks.

Texas grabbed a 3-0 lead in the first with five hits, three of them infield singles — one by Mark DeRosa driving in a run — along with a groundball hit through the left side of the infield. Brad Wilkerson then had a two-run double, a soft liner to left that short-hopped and got by Luis Gonzalez after he lost it in the sun.

"They had very few hard hit balls. Brandon just didn't have much luck," manager Bob Melvin said.

"There's nothing anybody could do. They were hitting them soft, and they had some fast guys," Webb said. "Then there's the sun ball to Gonzo. He couldn't see it."

Webb (8-2) allowed five runs and 10 hits

over 5 2-3 innings, pushing his ERA from 2.06 to 2.37 — still the best in the majors — and losing his second straight start. He struck out six with no walks and threw a season-high 116 pitches (79 strikes).

Wilkerson went 3-for-4, with all his hits coming off Webb. Wilkerson's team-leading 13th home run came in the sixth inning.

"You've got to try to get him up in the zone. He's going to make a mistake eventually," Wilkerson said. "We wanted to jump on him early. After the first inning he settled down."

After Wilkerson's solo homer in the sixth, Rod Barajas had a two-out RBI double to chase Webb.

Webb came into the game leading the majors with 180 groundball outs, and added to that total with five in the next six outs after two strikeouts to escape the first. After Wilkerson's leadoff single and stolen base in the fourth, Webb struck out the side.

Millwood retired the first eight batters he faced, seven of them grounders — five handled by rookie second baseman Ian Kinsler. When the Diamondbacks had two on in the fourth, the right-hander got out of the jam with another grounder to Kinsler.

"I got the infielders and outfielders a lot of work," Millwood said. "I was trying to make pitches and trying to get them to hit the ball at our guys. And they made the plays. ... Ian's going to be tired."

The Diamondbacks had only three singles until Orlando Hudson led off the eighth with a double. Craig Counsell and Gonzalez then had RBI singles, the latter on Millwood's 100th and last pitch.

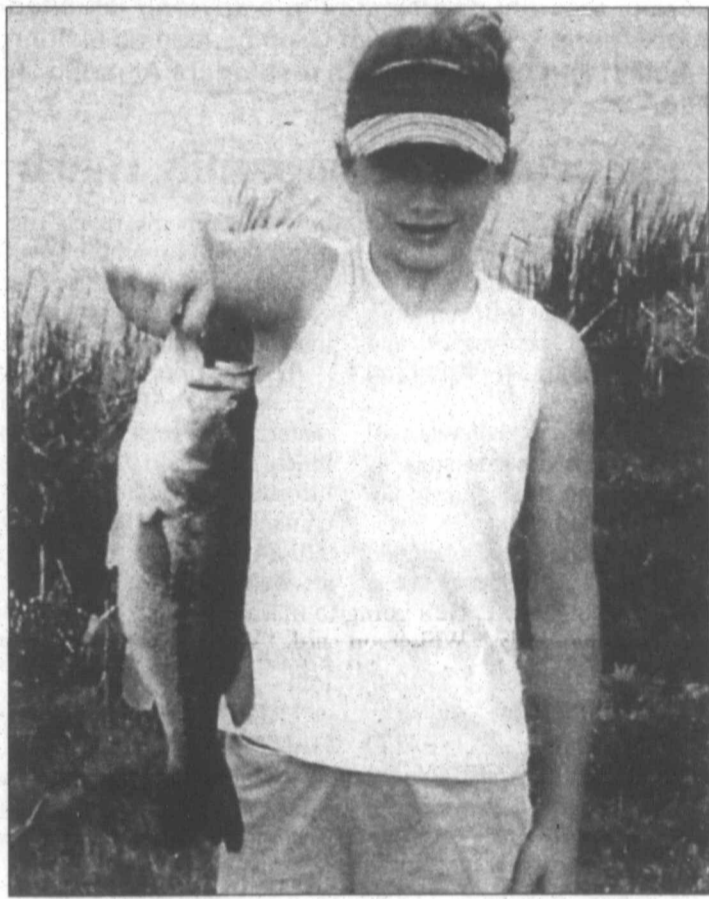

## Game 4 foul under review

The Mavericks expect to have their sixth man available.

"I don't know if it's a suspension, I don't have any control over that," Dallas coach Avery Johnson said. "That's not our job. But I don't think it's a suspension."

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## TDA announces Onager Miticide exemption for corn

AUSTIN — The Texas Department of Agriculture has been granted approval by the U.S. Environmental Protection Agency to issue a Section 18 specific exemption allowing the use of hexythiazox (Onager Miticide) on field corn in Texas to control the Banks grass mite (*Oligonychus pratensis*) and the two-spotted spider mite (*Tetranychus urticae* Koch).

Onager Miticide, manufactured by the Gowan Company, may be applied following all directions, restrictions and precautions on the EPA registered product label, as well as restrictions within the exemption notice. The exemption will be effective June 1, 2006, and will expire Aug. 31, 2006.

Applications will be made only by certified applicators, by licensed applicators or by persons under the direct supervision of licensed applicators.

Onager Miticide may be applied in specific Texas counties including: Carson, Gray, Hemphill, Hutchinson, Roberts and Wheeler.

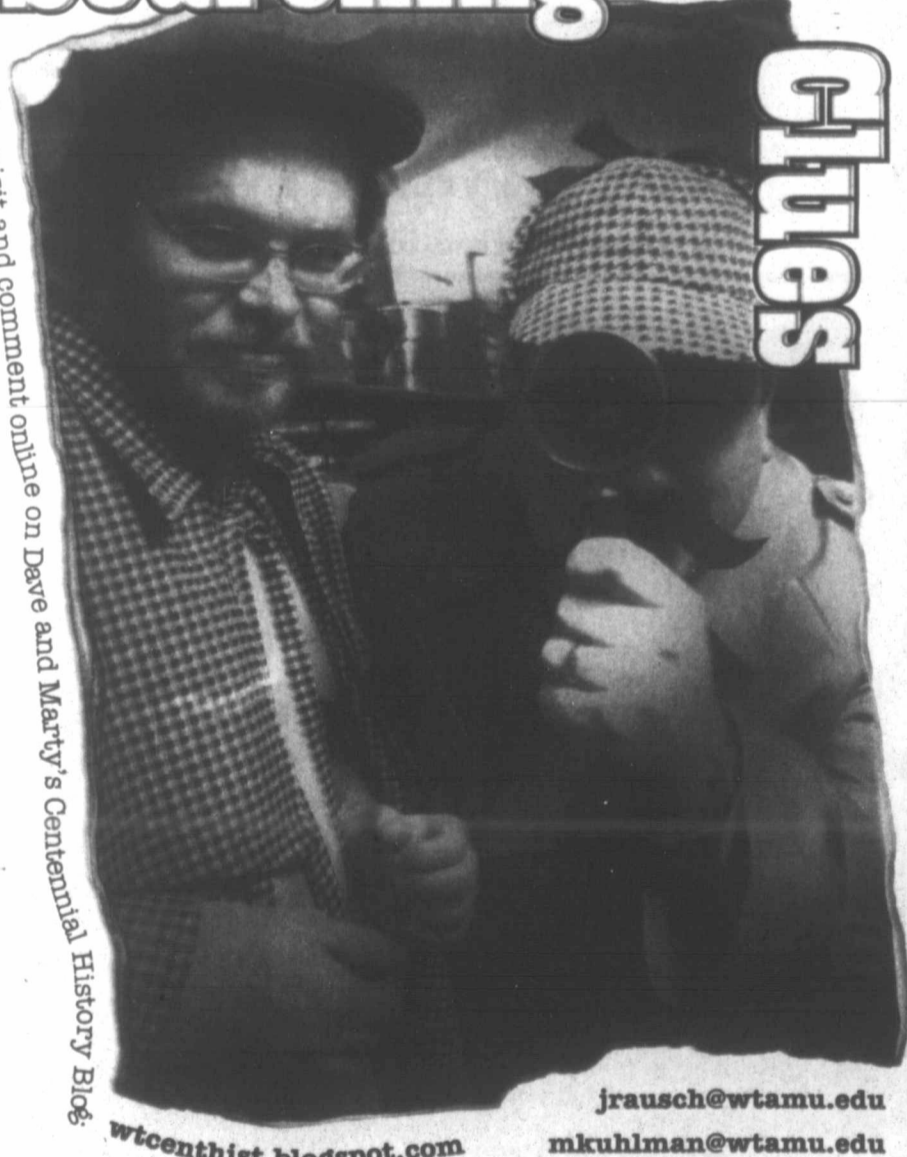

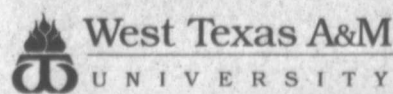

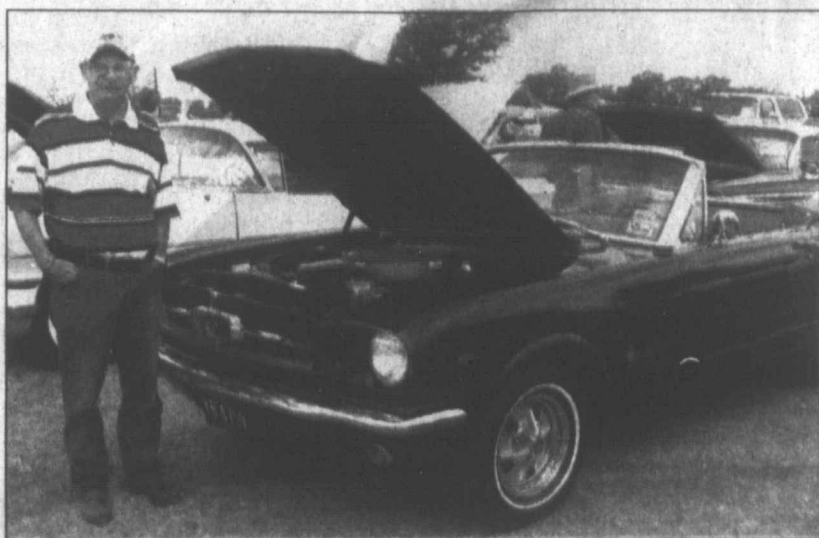
The award is given based upon the following criteria: Grade point average, student achievements, and academic and extracurricular activities.

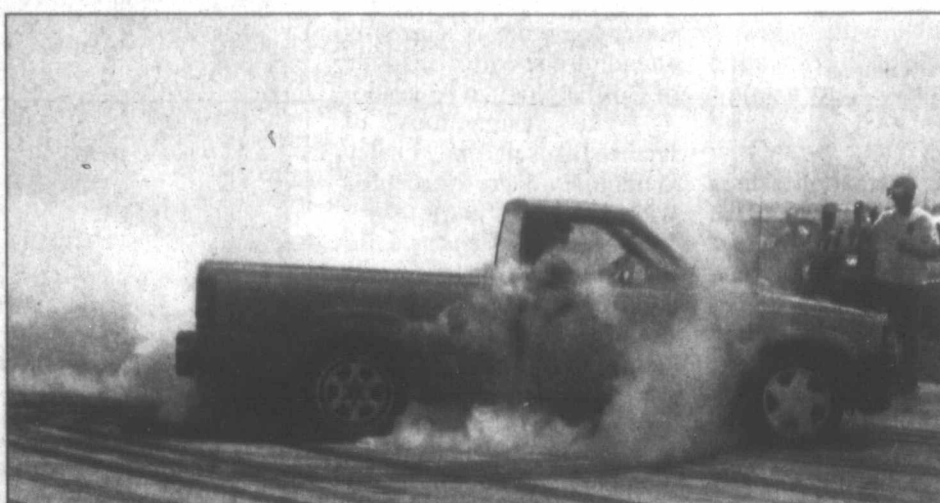

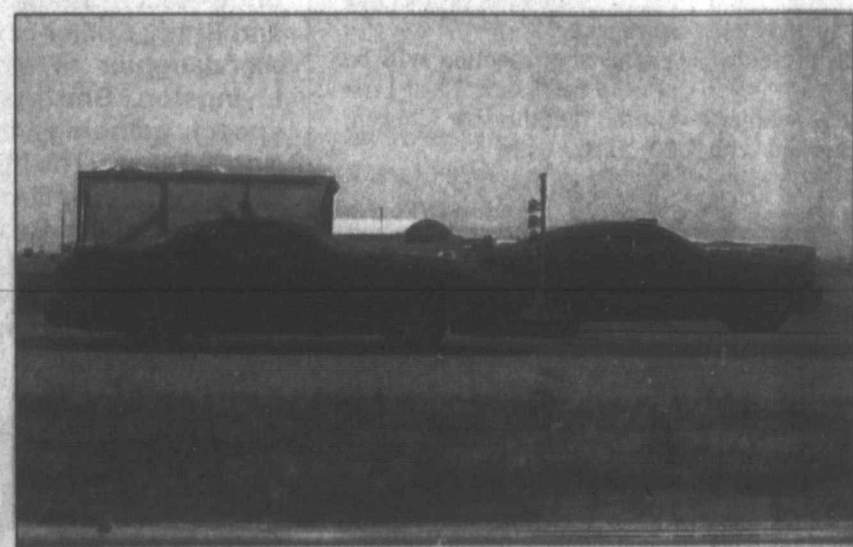

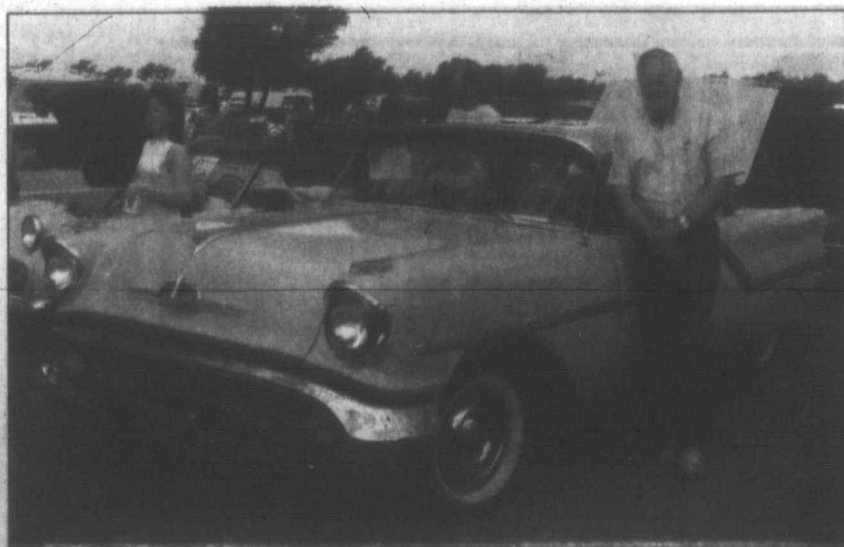

And if you have any reason to believe they would turn a blind eye to it, you should share your concerns with Child Protective Services.

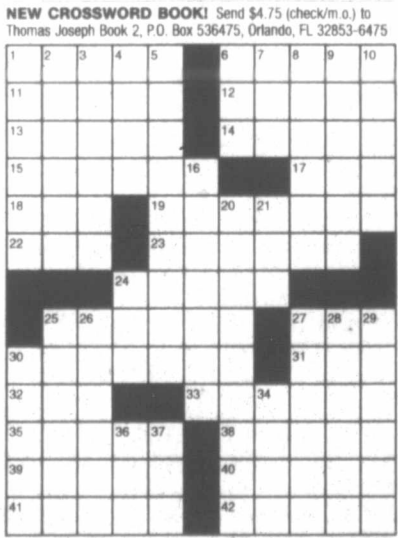

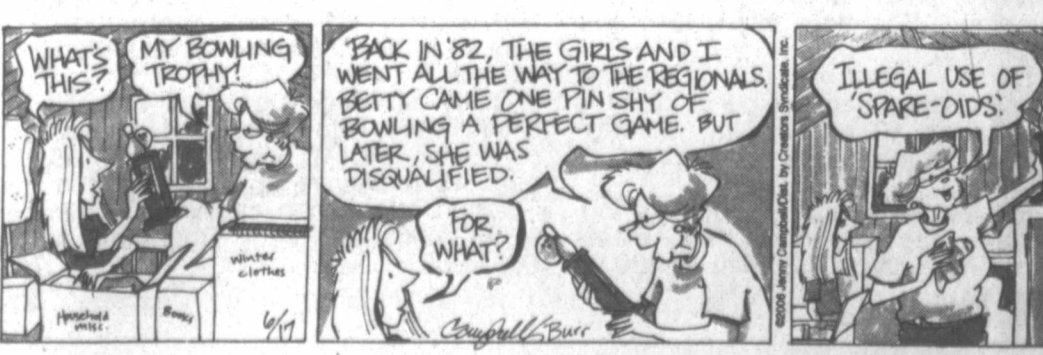

# Woman's identity stolen by dozens of suspected illegals

DUBLIN, Calif. (AP) — Audra Schmierer's Social Security number really gets around. It has been used by at least 81 people in 17 states, most of them probably illegal immigrants trying to get work.

The federal government took years to discover the number was being used illegally, but authorities took little action even then. "They knew what was happening but wouldn't do anything," said Schmierer, 33, a housewife in this affluent San Francisco suburb. "One name, one number, why can't they just match it up?"

Her case is an example of an increasingly common problem: Many thieves are able to steal personal information because employers do not have to verify Social Security numbers or other documents submitted by job seek-

ers. The situation has long drawn fire from anti-illegal immigration groups, but Congress has only recently moved to fix it. Both the House and Senate have passed immigration-reform bills that call for employers to verify Social Security numbers in a national database.

Homeland Security officials have taken it a step further, calling on Congress to allow the Social Security Administration to share information with immigration-enforcement agents at work sites.

Under current law, if the Social Security Administration or the Internal Revenue Service find multiple people using the same Social Security number, the agencies send letters informing employers of possible errors.

The IRS fines employers \$50 for each duplicate number, a punishment that companies often dismiss as just another cost of doing business.

"Sending letters is the limit to what can be done," Social Security spokesman Lowell Kepke said. "We expect that will be able to fix any records that are incorrect."

The information on mismatched names is seldom shared with law enforcement agencies.

Schmierer realized she had a problem in February 2005, when she got a statement from the IRS saying she owed \$15,813 in back taxes — even though she had not worked since her son was born in 2000.

Perhaps even more surprising, the taxes were due from jobs in

Texas. Schmierer called the IRS and learned that numerous people were using her Social Security number. Officials said the erroneous balances would be eliminated, but the agency would have to correct the problem again in future years.

"They told me they couldn't do anything else," Schmierer said. IRS officials declined to talk about Schmierer's case, citing privacy laws.

Schmierer has done a little investigating of her own, combing through tax bills sent to her for names and locations of employers who hired people using her number.

She has also obtained more than 200 W-2 and 1099 tax forms that contained her Social Security

number but different names. Schmierer provided copies of the records to The Associated Press.

People used her Social Security number from Florida to Washington state, at construction sites, fast-food restaurants and even major high-tech companies. Some opened bank accounts using the number.

Most of the people worked multiple jobs in the same year, though some remained at the same company for several years. The top wage earner made \$39,465, but most reported income of less than \$15,000.

Though impossible to verify in every case, information gleaned from criminal investigations, tax documents and other sources suggested that most of the users were probably illegal immigrants.

## Mining company sued for not cooperating

CHARLESTON, W.Va. (AP) — The U.S. Mine Safety and Health Administration filed a lawsuit Friday accusing a mining company of not cooperating in its investigation into a mine fire that killed two workers earlier this year.

The lawsuit alleges Aracoma Coal Co., a subsidiary of Massey Energy Co., is deliberately withholding documents and has failed to turn over other documents and evidence, including emergency air packs used by miners who escaped the fire.

The mine safety agency wants a court order requiring Massey and Aracoma to cooperate. The accident is also the subject of a criminal investi-

gation by the U.S. Attorney's Office in Charleston.

The Jan. 19 fire at the Aracoma Alma No. 1 Mine started along a belt-line more than two miles inside the Logan County mine. Investigators have not said what caused the fire, but they have issued more than 100 violations against the mine since the investigation began.

Don I. Bragg, 33, and Ellery Elvis Hatfield, 47, died after they were separated from their crew.

"This is the first time MSHA has been faced with a broad refusal by a mine operator to provide relevant documents in an investigation and, subsequently, the first time that this kind of

civil action against a mine operator has been necessary," David Dye, MSHA's acting administrator, said in a news release.

Richmond, Va.-based Massey, the nation's fourth largest coal company in revenue, could not immediately be reached for comment.

The company's lawyer has said in correspondence included with the lawsuit that some material, including documents required by federal law, can't be found or never existed. Other documents are purposely being withheld, according to an e-mail sent by Massey attorney Mark Heath to the leader of the federal investigation on March 24.

## House rejects Iraq withdrawal, forcing parties to go on record

WASHINGTON (AP) — The House on Friday rejected a timetable for pulling U.S. forces out of Iraq after a ferociously partisan debate, forcing lawmakers in both parties to go on record on a major issue in re-election campaigns nationwide.

A day after the Senate took the same position against troop withdrawal, the GOP-led House voted 256-153 to approve a nonbinding resolution that says an "arbitrary date for the withdrawal or redeployment" of American forces is not in the national interest.

"Achieving victory is our only option," declared House Majority Leader John Boehner, R-Ohio, casting Democrats as defeatists who want to retreat in the face of terrorist threats. "We must not shy away."

"Stay the course" is not a strategy, it's a slogan," answered House Democratic leader Nancy Pelosi as she called for a new direction in a war she labeled "a grotesque mistake."

"It's time to face the facts," Pelosi said.

Angling for political advantage, House Republicans engineered the debate and vote, four and one-half months before midterm elections that will decide who runs Congress — and as polls show voters favoring Democrats to replace Republicans as the controlling party.

Those same polls show the public increasingly frustrated with the war as the death toll and price tag continue to rise. Voters could hold it against incumbent candidates, regardless of political party, come November.

Republicans across Capitol Hill are sensitive to those political realities.

GOP leaders in both the House and Senate sought to put lawmakers of both parties, and particularly Democrats, on record on the conflict, and looked to draw attention to deep Democratic divisions on the war.

Senate Republicans succeeded in doing that Thursday. In a maneuver Democrats assailed as a political stunt, GOP leaders brought up legislation calling for withdrawing combat troops by year's end and quickly dismissed it on a 93-6 vote. Six Democrats were in the minority.

It was the House Republicans' turn a day later.

They scheduled a vote on their symbolic resolution that also praises U.S. troops and labels the Iraq war part of

the larger global fight against terrorism.

Democrats denounced the GOP-orchestrated debate and vote as a politically motivated charade, and most, including Pelosi, voted against the measure. They said that supporting it would have the effect of affirming Bush's "failed policy" in Iraq.

Still, 42 Democrats broke ranks and joined with all but three Republicans to support the resolution. Two Republicans and three Democrats declined to take a position by voting present.

Balking carried a risk for Democrats, particularly when they see an opportunity to win back control of Congress from the GOP, because Republicans were expected to use Democratic "no" votes to claim that their opponents don't support U.S. troops.

Sure enough, within two hours of the House vote, the Republican Senate campaign committee circulated news releases that said Rep. Harold Ford Jr., a Democrat running for an open Senate seat in Tennessee, and Rep. Sherrod Brown, a Democrat challenging Sen. Mike DeWine in Ohio, voted to "cut and run" from Iraq.

Lawmakers were mindful of the political implications of the votes throughout the debate that ran more than 12 hours over two days.

In floor speeches, several GOP incumbents who face tough challenges from Democrats in November tried to strike a balance. They carefully criticized the resolution that their leaders had written, calling it weak and incomplete, but then reluctantly voted in favor of it.

"The American people are looking to us to answer their questions on how much progress is being made, what are the Iraqis themselves willing to do to fight for their freedom and when will our men and women come home," Rep. Jim Gerlach, R-Pa., said.

Rep. Vic Snyder, D-Ark., agreed, saying: "We should be having a debate and a discussion on how we will prevail, not just that we want to prevail."

Republicans and Democrats alike explained the decision, as each side saw it, that confronts voters.

"The choice for the American people is clear; don't run in the face of danger, victory will be our exit strategy," Rep. Mike Conaway, R-Texas, said.

Countered Rep. John Murtha, D-Pa.: "It's not a matter of stay the course. It's a matter of change direction."

## Weather, lack of moisture hamper Texas cotton crop

LUBBOCK (AP) — Billy Tiller's 5,000 acres of cotton are parched, thanks to triple-digit temperatures and one of the state's driest springs ever.

Even after two straight years of bumper crops in the nation's top cotton-producing state, many cotton farmers like Tiller are worried about the future.

"I've never seen anything like it," said Tiller, who has been farming since 1982 on the South Plains, the world's largest contiguous cotton patch. "Until we get a good general rain, we're in serious trouble."

Hot, dry conditions have prevailed across much of Texas.

Rains through April gave most of the state a reprieve from serious drought but since May 1, most areas have been "bone dry," said National Weather Service meteorologist Victor Murphy.

Statewide, the rainfall average through May was 8.48 inches, or 2.46 inches behind the normal average, which makes the period the 21st driest in 112 years.

Also, Texas is experiencing the second-warmest January-through-May period since 1895, with a statewide average 4 degrees above the normal average.

"It's really been a double whammy with heat plus dryness," with the heat being more significant," Murphy said.

In Lubbock, temperatures have climbed to 95 degrees or above on 21 days since producers began planting May

1. Normal highs in May are 83 degrees. June's normal highs are 90 degrees, weather service meteorologist Ron McQueen said.

Cotton plants need soil moisture for seeds to germinate and the hot, dry conditions are pulling moisture from the soil quickly.

Tiller said he thinks he will lose at least half of his cotton, a dryland variety that depends entirely on rainfall. He planted between May 5 and 12 in Bula, an area that has had less rain this year than Lubbock, two counties over. Typically, after a month, cotton plants would be about 6 inches tall, he said.

"It's maybe an inch or 2 tall," Tiller said.

Shawn Wade, spokesman for the Plains Cotton Growers, which serves a 41-county region, said other farmers are in danger as well.

"We can't get the plants growing, can't get a stand going to move the crop forward at all," Wade said. "It's pretty bad."

The tough conditions follow back-to-back record crops in Texas. The state produced 8.5 million bales of the fluffy white fiber last year, besting the 2004 record harvest of 7.8 million bales by 9 percent.

Some producers might replant other crops or try again with cotton, Tiller said. But it's not an easy decision to make — seed costs are up and the cost of diesel fuel is up. Fertilizer is up, too, a direct increase from the price of natural gas.

Producers have to plant their cotton by certain dates if they want to file crop loss insurance claims.
