Conservation district to host EQIP meeting

A Program Development Group meeting will be 7 to 8 p.m. Aug. 17 at the Gray County Annex Building, 12125 E. Frederic Ave., Suite B. The meeting is open to the public.

The purpose of the meeting, sponsored by the Gray County Soil

and Water Conservation District, is to request participation and invite comments from a broad range of local agencies, organizations, businesses, and farmers and ranchers who are interested in natural resource conditions and needs.

Discussion in the Program Development Group will aid the Local Work Group, led by Manuel T. De Leon, USDA Natural

Resources Conservation Service district conservationist, to address county-based funding for the fiscal year 2007 Environmental Quality Incentives Program, De Leon said.

"The LWG will make recommendations on resource concerns to be addressed, eligible practices, cost share rates, and ranking for county-based funding," De Leon said.

"One of the guiding principles of the 2002 USDA Farm Bill is that conservation programs are locally led," De Leon said. "Through stakeholder meetings, the public is given an opportunity to help local conservation leaders set program priorities."

Dem accuses GOP of political blackmail

WASHINGTON (AP) — A failed Republican attempt to tie an estate-tax cut to the first federal minimum wage increase in nearly a decade was "political blackmail" and the result of "cynical politics," Sen. Ken Salazar, D-Colo., said Saturday.

"Working Americans deserve a raise, but congressional Republicans keep giving them political tricks," Salazar said in the Democrats' weekly radio address. "We need a new direction for America, and a new Congress that works for

our common good." The Senate on Thursday rejected, 56-42, legislation that would have cut estate taxes and raised the hourly minimum wage to \$7.25 from \$5.15 over three years.

Senators needed 60 votes to advance the bill, which passed the House last week.

Democrats, who generally supported increasing the minimum wage but opposed the cost of the bill's estate tax package, criticized Republicans for using the minimum wage to push a tax break for the wealthy.

Salazar said the bill was an example of tactics Republicans have used for the last six years.

"I came to Washington to focus on America's great challenges, but that has not been possible in the 'do-nothing Congress' we have today," he said. "Washington Republicans have done little to address the real problems facing our country. And when they have taken action, the results have made America less safe, and the middle class of America has been forgotten."

As lawmakers headed home for the August recess — many to campaign for the November elections — Salazar argued that voters need to oust the Republican-controlled Congress.

Democrats are committed to improving national security and finding solutions to "shared challenges" by reducing reliance on foreign oil, raising the minimum wage and finding a solution to the broken health care system, Salazar said.

"Together, Democrats will change the current course of America and take our great nation in a new direction of peace, hope and prosperity," he said.

MPHANDULA, Malawi (AP) — The village headman here has never heard of Madonna, the pop star. But he knows Madonna the philanthropist.

Madonna has announced plans to raise at least \$3 million for programs to support the nearly 1 million children in Malawi who have lost parents to AIDS. Mphandula's headman, who bears the same name as his village, said Thursday he was contacted last month by organizers and told some of the money will build a feeding and education center for orphans in this village, 30 miles from the capital.

"The orphanage project is about serving humanity. It will mean so much to us. We can only ask God to bless this person for her kindness," he said.

Malawi is among the poorest countries in the world, hit by years of drought and an AIDS epidemic. According to the National AIDS Commission, the HIV/AIDS pandem-

ic has left close to 1 million orphans in this southern African country.

Madonna is expected to visit in October. She joins a growing list of entertainer-activists who have focused their attention on Africa, including Bono, Angelina Jolie and George Clooney. The 47-year-old singer outlined her plans in an interview with Time magazine to be published Monday.

Most of the farmers of Mphandula, where Madonna's orphan center is planned, live in mud-and-thatch huts, wear shoes only on special occasions and rarely can afford to eat meat. The village has no electricity and only a few households have radios.

"I hear Madonna is coming here," said Michael Soko. The excited 24-year-old was the only one among 30 people interviewed in Mphandula who had heard of the Material Girl as an entertainer.

"I know her song 'Holiday,'" he said. "We used to dance to it in school."

It is important Juan Williams be heard

NPR and Fox News commentator Juan Williams is a certified liberal — so liberal some have called him the black Alan Colmes, the liberal half of Fox's Hannity and Colmes. When he writes a book, you'd expect the liberal media to fall all over each other to be the first to review his book and have him as a guest on network radio and TV.

That hasn't happened, however, because his book "Enough: The Phony Leaders, Dead-End Movements, and Culture of Failure That Are Undermining Black America — and What We Can Do About It," has crossed the boundary of what is — and what is not — permitted by the high priests of liberal

orthodoxy. For this grievous offense, he has been cast into the outer darkness reserved for conservatives and other patriotic Americans.

On my radio show the other night, Juan told me how he has been silenced by the very liberals who have always clasped him to their bosoms. When I asked him if he's been put on the "back burner" he said: "It's not the back burner, but the burner itself that has disappeared. You just don't get covered when you try to talk about what I consider to be central issues in terms of not just black America but all America. It's part of American history, it's part of the reality of the way we live, especially with increas-

ing numbers of minorities in the American population, racial politics, drop-outs in schools, the fact that people talk about what's going on with jails and all that.

"People just don't want to talk about why we are in a grievous situation even now in the 21st century with regard to race and the kind of leadership we have on race."

This is a tragedy. It is important that Juan Williams be heard loud and clear, and that his book should have the largest readership possible. Like Bill Cosby before him, Juan has looked his fellow

blacks in the eye and told them the truth — a truth they must face if they are to overcome the obstacles that hold them back.

He deplores the incredible rate of illegitimate births among blacks — a staggering 70 percent of all black children are born out of wedlock. These children are deprived of a normal upbringing, of a family with the father present in the home.

So-called black leaders such as the Rev. Jesse Jackson and the Rev. Al Sharpton draw his scorn. Williams notes: "If you

attack anybody who is designated by the white media as a black leader you are therefore attacking black America and blaming the victim and you're not seeing the larger picture while you have real problems afoot in terms of educating black kids, in terms of watching black kids born out of wedlock into poverty in this country, in terms of watching what I consider a culture of failure where people don't call to account ... violence and sadistic rap music."

"Nobody says let's have a march against these drug dealers, let's have a march against bad schools. You never hear that kind of talk."

So Juan Williams sets out to tell the truth, writes a book about it, and he can't

get on liberal television, he can't get on ABC, NBC or CBS because they have sold out to these leaders of the black community picked by guilt-ridden white liberals. White liberals refuse to allow blacks to be individuals. They look at them only as a group. They have put them on their liberal white plantation where their hand-picked black taskmasters such as Jesse Jackson and Al Sharpton rule the roost.

As Juan Williams has learned, anybody who shines the light of truth on this sordid arrangement will be barred from speaking about it. He is learning that you cannot go against the liberal left agenda even if you are a

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Texas Thoughts

The Dallas Morning News on stopping drug errors:
Do you carry a complete list of your medications with you to every doctor and pharmacy visit?
If not, you should.
You also should talk openly with your doctors and pharmacist about your medications how to take them, what side effects and results to expect and how they might interact with your other drugs, vitamins and food.
You should do so because, according to a recent report by the Institute of Medicine, medication errors are shock-

ingly common, harming at least 1.5 million Americans every year and killing thousands.

That's unacceptable. With more than 4 billion prescriptions written every year in the U.S., Americans must be able to trust that their medications will help them, not hurt them. Fixing the problems, as the report noted, will require significant changes from many players including greater awareness by you, the patient.

The FDA must clear up confusing drug names and abbreviations. Last month, the agency finished work on standardizing drug labels, a big step forward.

Health care providers must boost efforts to move from paper to computer. Area hospitals already are laying the

foundations: Baylor Health Care System has a robotic pharmacy. Presbyterian Hospital of Plano's emergency room uses a data system that alerts staff to drug errors. And the University of Texas Southwestern Medical Center at Dallas has been rolling out electronic records at its outpatient clinics that can be accessed by patients and doctors; it debuts at its hospitals this fall.

Doctors in smaller practices, however, need help moving into the digital age.

State leaders in Austin should give special attention to a proposal unveiled the same week as the Institute of Medicine's study. A committee of

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
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Dear Abby...

MDA to kick-off annual telethon

TUCSON, Ariz. — With co-hosts, entertainers and friends at his side, incomparable comedian, actor and director Jerry Lewis will star in his 41st annual Telethon for the Muscular Dystrophy Association this Labor Day weekend.

Airing for 21 1/2 hours beginning at 9 p.m. EDT Sept. 3, the Telethon will originate from the new South Coast Hotel in Las Vegas, and will be shown on some 190 "Love Network" stations nationwide. Check local listings for stations and start times.

Lewis has dedicated this year's Telethon to Robert Ross, MDA's longtime chief executive, who died in June.

The broadcast's primary aim is raising funds for MDA's programs of research and services for children and adults with any of more than 40 neuromuscular diseases. The Telethon is expected to draw some 50 million viewers nationwide and many more worldwide, thanks to Real Networks, via MDA's Web site, www.mda.org.

Battling his own serious health problems — severe back pain, lung disease and

a recent heart attack — has, Lewis says, only deepened his commitment to help "his kids."

"I'm determined to continue the fight against muscular dystrophy and other muscle-wasting diseases, and to put an end to the diseases that Bob Ross devoted his life to conquering," Lewis said. "The Telethon is a tradition — a premier fund-raising event, a chance to inform and educate, to laugh and cry, and to have a good time."

Telethon anchor Ed McMahon will return for his 39th year. Ed was appropriately just named "greatest sidekick of all time" by Entertainment Weekly.

Telethon co-hosts include Jann Carl of "Entertainment Tonight," comedians Norm Crosby and Bob Zany, TV host Tom Bergeron and country singer Billy Gilman.

The Telethon promises a mixture of entertainment — singers, dancers, comedians, bands and novelty acts — that will appeal to many generations.

The show will break away to remote locations, including New York and Chicago, and broadcast spe-

cial concerts from the Mohegan Sun in Uncasville, Conn.

The Telethon will present MDA's cutting-edge scientific research, as well as its life-enhancing programs, such as a national network of clinics, support groups and summer camps for people with neuromuscular diseases.

Each hour, MDA "Love Network" stations will present information about local services and families they benefit. Both national and local segments will feature videotaped profiles and live interviews with individuals and families served by MDA.

Lewis said that, as always, his goal for 2006 is to surpass last year's total by one dollar.

MDA is a voluntary health agency working to defeat more than 40 neuromuscular diseases through programs of worldwide research, comprehensive services and far-reaching professional and public health education. The Association's programs are funded almost entirely by individual private contribu-

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RRC sets stats, allowables for August

AUSTIN — The Texas average rig count as of July 21, 2006 was 765, representing about 48 percent of all active land rigs in the United States. In the last 12 months, total Texas reported production was 315 million barrels of oil and 5.7 Trillion cubic feet of natural gas.

Texas natural gas production represents approximately 29 percent of total U.S. natural gas demand.

The Texas Railroad Commission's estimated final production for May 2006 is 29,175,966 barrels of crude oil and 449,570,307 Mcf (thousand cubic feet) of gas well gas.

The Commission derives final production numbers by multiplying the preliminary May 2006 production totals of 27,451,981 barrels of crude oil and 374,049,677 Mcf of gas well gas by a production adjustment factor of 1.0628 for crude oil and 1.2019 for gas well gas. (These production totals do not include

casinghead gas or condensate.)

Texas natural gas storage reported by the Commission for June 2006 is 345,324,329 Mcf compared to 279,653,050 Mcf in June 2005. The July 2006 gas storage estimate is 345,368,904 Mcf.

The Texas Railroad Commission's Oil and Gas Division set initial August 2006 natural gas production allowables for pro-rated fields in the state to meet market demand of 21,612,295 (thousand cubic feet).

In setting the initial August 2006 allowables, the Commission used historical production figures from previous months, producers' demand forecasts for the coming month, and adjusted the figures based on well capability.

These initial allowables will be adjusted after actual production for August 2006 is reported.

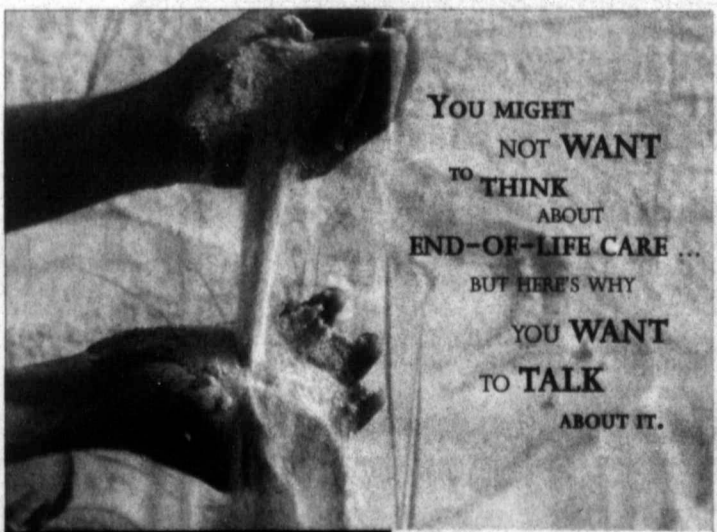

I'm being facetious. The fact is this dynamic duo spent time across the pond wrestling in some very impressive surroundings, gaining valuable experience while serving notice we have some mat talent here in Pampa.

At the beginning of July, Leal flew to Australia to compete in a tournament down under. "I'm not sure, but I think some one saw me at State and

nominated me," said Leal when asked how he earned a spot on the team, which included members from Texas, California and Montana.

If that was the case, the nominator had perfect vision.

Leal, who wrestles at the 112 pound level, went undefeated, going 3-and-0 in his individual meets, 4-and-0 in team competition.

His first place finish in the land of the Outback only further justified his amazing road to the UIL Texas State tournament earlier this year.

Maxwell flew to Holland in late July where he went up against 26 others in the 145 pound weight division and came away with a solid 7th place finish. Maxwell's performance was made even more unique in that the Holland tournament marked the first time he has ever wrestled Free Style.

Given the opportunity to visit Holland, did Maxwell manage to sneak in any sightseeing? "Not really. We did get to see the Anne Frank House," he said. The only downside, if any, to Maxwell's trip? "The food on the airplane."

The pair are expected to be among the top contributors on coach Josh Cadenhead's PHS wrestling team this year. When asked what they are looking forward to in the season ahead, each offered the same answer, "more people." The Harvester wrestling team started off with about 20 members last season, only to end with 6. By contrast, most programs will carry a roster of 30 or more all season long.

Leal said he would like to see the Harvester wrestling program get some new equipment. He added he is looking forward to watching teammates John Burns and Steven Patello, who also had remarkable seasons last year.

When asked what the strength of the Harvester wrestling program is, again, both offered the same, quick response. A simple one-word answer that often defines and measures any team. "Heart."

As a senior, Leal said he hopes to become a realtor after high school, though coaching remains a possibility.

Maxwell, a sophomore, says he also wants to coach, "maybe."

Phonak fires Landis; backup test confirms high testosterone level

PARIS (AP) — Floyd Landis was fired by his team and the Tour de France no longer considered him its champion after his second doping sample tested positive Saturday for higher-than-allowed levels of testosterone.

The second or "B" sample, "confirmed the result of an adverse analytical finding" in the "A" sample, the International Cycling Union said.

The Swiss-based team Phonak immediately severed ties with Landis and the UCI said it would ask USA Cycling to open disciplinary proceedings against him.

"Landis will be dismissed without notice for violating the teams internal Code of Ethics," Phonak said in a statement. "Landis will continue to have legal options to contest the findings. However, this will be his personal affair, and the Phonak team will no longer be involved in that."

Tour de France director Christian Prudhomme said Landis no longer was considered champion, but the decision to strip him of his title rests with the UCI.

"It goes without saying that for us Floyd Landis is no longer the winner of the 2006 Tour de France," Prudhomme told The Associated Press in a telephone interview. "Our determination is even stronger now to fight against doping and to defend this magnificent sport."

Prudhomme said runner-up Oscar Pereiro of Spain would be the likely new winner.

"We can't imagine a different outcome," Prudhomme said.

If stripped of the title, Landis would become the first winner in the 103-year history of cycling's premier race to lose his Tour crown

over doping allegations.

UCI lawyer Philippe Verbiest said Landis would officially remain Tour champion pending the American disciplinary process.

"Until he is found guilty or admits guilt, he will keep the yellow jersey," he said. "This is normal. You are not sanctioned before you are found guilty."

If found guilty, Landis also faces a two-year ban from the sport.

Despite the second positive test, Landis maintained his innocence.

"I have never taken any banned substance, including testosterone," he said in a statement. "I was the strongest man at the Tour de France, and that is why I am the champion."

"I will fight these charges with the same determination and intensity that I bring to my training and racing. It is now my goal to clear my name and restore what I worked so hard to achieve."

Landis' urine sample was analyzed at the Chatenay-Malabry lab outside Paris.

The results of the second test come nearly two weeks after he stood atop the winner's podium on the Champs-Elysees in the champion's yellow jersey.

Landis' positive tests set off what could now be months of appeals and arguments by the American, who says the positive finding was due to naturally high testosterone levels. He has repeatedly declared his innocence.

"It's incredibly disappointing," three-time Tour winner Greg LeMond said by phone from the starting line at the Pan Mass Challenge in Sturbridge, Mass. "I don't think he has much chance at all to try to prove his innocence."

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DALLAS COWBOYS

A week into camp, Parcells says 'things are not going well'

OXNARD, Calif. (AP) — A week into training camp, Dallas Cowboys coach Bill Parcells doesn't like what he's seen so far.

"Things are not going well," Parcells said Friday. "I'm worried about that, and a little frustrated, with things in a couple of places where we should be better than what they are. But it's the first week of the season so I have to keep that in perspective as well."

Parcells has said for several days that the defense is far ahead of the offense, starting with the line. When the blocking falters, it's more difficult for the running backs to find holes and for quarterbacks to complete passes.

The line had a new look in practice Friday afternoon, with Rob Pettiti taking over at left tackle, bumping Flozell Adams to the second team. Marc Colombo replaced Pettiti on the right side.

"That's generally where you are at this point in camp. The defense is always ahead of the offense," quarterback Drew Bledsoe said. "Obviously we've got to take steps forward, but it's not something that I'm pressing the panic button on now."

A few days ago, Parcells thought some of his position coaches were

spending too much time explaining things while they were on the field. He prefers they do that in meetings and use practices to see whether they can do it. So he added more 11-on-11 drills, when coaches can't be a security blanket.

Now he's considering adding more two-a-days.

"I'm not sure," he said. "But I know I got to make progress here."

The team has had two-a-days every other day, with Friday marking their fourth. Only five more are scheduled the remaining two-plus weeks of camp.

Parcells expects to have a better idea of where his team is after a 90-play scrimmage Saturday.

"I need to take Sunday and just kind of sit back and look at it and see where we are and what we need to do to get ready for next week," he said. "Once those games start coming, it gets to be a little different schedule so I want to make sure I take advantage of all the opportunities we have while we're here prior to that."

Players get their first day off Sunday. The preseason opener is next Saturday in Seattle, followed by another off day then the final week of camp. They leave California for good Aug.

20. "This is really the toughest time of the season in pro football," Parcells said. "The players are tired, they don't see any light at the end of the tunnel, they don't have a game, it's just not that much fun for them. So I have to take that into consideration."

"But at the same token, I just think we need to be a little more battle-hardened than we already are. I have some players that are pretty well resilient, but not all."

Extra points: Adams, who made the Pro Bowl two years ago, has looked rusty in his return from knee surgery. "He's struggling a little bit right now," Parcells said earlier Friday. Practice ended with five players who wear dreadlocks singing "I Shot The Sheriff." The crooners were Keith Davis, Skyler Green, Jamaica Rector, Marion Barber and Demetris Summers. ... The same four players who missed practice Thursday were out Friday: WR Terrell Owens (hamstring), OL Stephen Peterman (ankle), S Justin Briaault (concussion) and DE Marcus Spears (knee). Owens shook his head when asked if he'll play in the scrimmage Saturday. "It's up to the trainers," he added.

Despite second-place standing, Kenseth insecure about Chase

INDIANAPOLIS (AP) — A recent rash of mediocrity has made Matt Kenseth slightly insecure about his Chase for the championship chances.

And he's second in the standings.

"I don't think we're really locked into the Chase," he said.

Kenseth has been entrenched in NASCAR's top 10 all season, holding strong in second place the last nine weeks.

With only six races left to assure a spot in the playoff field, he can either play it safe and ease his way in or run hard and risk blowing it all. For Kenseth, the strategy is a no-brainer.

"Everybody races every week to win - that's what it's all about," he said Friday. "Every time I look at it, you get the most points for leading the most laps and winning. So that's what you try to do each week."

He'll stick to that plan in Sunday's race at Indianapolis Motor Speedway, a track that has been fairly good to Kenseth over the years. Although he's never won here, Kenseth has three top-five finishes and was second in

2003 - the same year he won his only NASCAR championship.

If this is the year Kenseth finally gets to kiss the bricks, he and his Roush Racing team will have to turn it up a notch.

Although he's been decent most of the year - with two victories and 11 top-10 finishes - Kenseth has been in a mini-slump of late with just one top-10 in the past six races.

"I'm happy when we're consistently in the top five. I'm not happy when we're consistently 14th like we were the last couple of weeks," he said. "We have had a few weeks where we've been off and made some mistakes, and got taken out of a race, and just didn't really run that good at Pocono."

He currently trails leader Jimmie Johnson by 97 points.

But he knows that could change with a slip of the steering wheel or a broken car part, and points to Dale Earnhardt's recent free-fall as evidence that no one is safe. Earnhardt plummeted from third to 11th in the standings with consecutive last-place finishes.

Astros 8, D'backs 7 Rangers 7, Angels 3

PHOENIX (AP) — Houston starter Roy Oswalt gave up 12 hits. Closer Brad Lidge couldn't finish the ninth inning. The Astros left 15 runners on base.

And Houston still found a way to win a game it hopes will provide an emotional lift as it tries to defend its NL pennant.

Mike Lamb and Willy Taveras hit back-to-back home runs in the ninth inning to lead the Astros past the Arizona Diamondbacks 8-7 Friday night.

"It's one of those games where it's really important to win for our own morale, I guess," Lamb said. "It's tough to lose those games, especially when we're fighting for a playoff spot."

The victory left the third-place Astros 6 1/2 games out in the NL Central, and four back in the wild-card race.

It was a crushing loss for the Diamondbacks, who missed a chance to move into a tie with San Diego atop the NL West.

"That's real tough," Conor Jackson said. "It's a

long game. Coming back from a double-dipper yesterday in Chicago and flying back, I think we were a little worn out today, but that's no excuse."

Chad Tracy tied a career high with four hits for Arizona. The Diamondbacks had 16 hits but couldn't overcome 10 walks by their pitchers, which tied a season high. Starter Miguel Batista issued seven walks.

"Maybe the worst I've ever done," Batista said.

The Astros liked their chances with Oswalt, who had owned the Diamondbacks. In his first five career starts against Arizona, he was 5-0 with a 0.95 ERA, the lowest ERA by any active pitcher against an opponent with a minimum of five starts.

In his last start, Oswalt beat the Diamondbacks on July 29, limiting them to one run in eight innings.

Oswalt's mastery vanished quickly Friday night. Every Arizona position player except Eric Byrnes had a hit by the third inning.

ANAHEIM, Calif. (AP) — Mark DeRosa's versatility has allowed the Texas Rangers to keep his bat in the lineup on a regular basis and enhance their chances of dethroning the Los Angeles Angels as AL West champs.

DeRosa hit his third career grand slam Friday night and the Rangers took over second place in the AL West from the Angels with a 7-3 victory. The 31-year-old utilityman, playing in his fourth full season, is the only player in the majors this season to start at six different positions. Three players did it last year, including the Angels' Chone Figgins.

"DeRosa is extremely valuable to this team, to have a guy play as many positions as he does," Rangers center fielder Gary Matthews said. "He can realistically play anywhere on the field except catcher and pitcher. And if you give him a little time, he might be able to add catcher to the list."

"Not only do we need to get his bat into the lineup,

but he gives us the opportunity to still keep certain people in the lineup because we can plug DeRo in at other positions."

Mark Teixeira, whose 12th-inning home run Thursday night gave the Rangers a 7-6 victory in the series opener, was walked his first three times up by John Lackey (10-7). The third one came in the fifth, preceding a single by Hank Blalock that loaded the bases with one out. DeRosa then drove a 2-1 pitch into the lower seats in the left field corner, giving Texas a 7-2 lead.

"We know how good Lackey is and how productive he's been this year. And to be able to catch him on an off night, it's big for us," DeRosa said. "I knew he was scuffling with his command a little bit and his pitch count was up, but he's also capable of putting you away at any time. I was just looking for something up that I could lift and put in the outfield. I was able to catch it clean and I got lucky."

A&M-Commerce seeks permission to contact Bomar

OKLAHOMA CITY (AP) — Texas A&M-Commerce has asked Oklahoma for permission to contact ousted quarterback Rhett Bomar to discuss his possible transfer to the school.

Commerce officials confirmed Friday that they're interested in having the former Sooners starter play for the Division II school.

Coach Bob Stoops dismissed Bomar and offensive lineman J.D. Quinn from the team on Wednesday for breaking NCAA rules by accepting compensation beyond the actual hours they

worked at a Norman car dealership. In response to media inquiries, A&M-Commerce released a statement from Jim Johnson, director of athletics.

"First and foremost, like the University of Oklahoma, Texas A&M University-Commerce is an NCAA member institution firmly committed to following all NCAA rules and legislation," Johnson said.

"We are firmly committed to ensuring that we diligently educate our coaches, student-athletes and boosters on those rules."

"That said, we have sent a request,

per NCAA legislation, to the University of Oklahoma asking permission to contact Rhett Bomar and to discuss the possibility of his transfer to A&M-Commerce.

"Until the release is returned to us, we have no further comment at this time regarding Bomar."

Bomar, of Grand Prairie, Texas, set an Oklahoma freshman record with 2,018 passing yards last season after taking over as the starter in Week 2.

An attempt to contact Bomar on Friday night was unsuccessful.

Inventor of 'the clear' sentenced

SAN FRANCISCO (AP) — The chemist who created "the clear," a previously undetectable steroid, was sentenced Friday to three months in prison and three months' home confinement for his role in the BALCO drug scandal.

Patrick Arnold was the last of five defendants convicted of steroid-distribution charges connected to the Bay Area Laboratory Co-Operative, a nutritional supplement company federal authorities exposed as a steroid distribution ring for top athletes.

"The behavior reflected here is destructive and damaging to Arnold, damaging to the community and damaging to the nation as a whole," U.S. District Court Judge Susan Illston said. Arnold was ordered to report to prison by Sept. 19.

"I'm very regretful for what I've done and especially since what it has precipitated in sports and society," Arnold said outside court. "I do believe there should be a level playing field, and that this whole thing needs to be addressed."

Federal prosecutors declined to comment.

Arnold created the steroid in his Illinois

laboratory. But he and his BALCO co-conspirators were tripped up when track coach Trevor Graham anonymously mailed a syringe containing the performance-enhancing drug to the U.S. Anti-Doping Agency in June 2003.

With "the clear" in hand, scientists were able to create a test to detect it.

Arnold was snared after federal agents raided his Champaign, Ill., lab last year.

The scientist is best known for introducing the steroid precursor androstenedione to the United States. Nicknamed "andro," the chemical came to public attention in 1998 when St. Louis Cardinals slugger Mark McGwire said he used it when he broke baseball's single-season home run record.

In April, Arnold pleaded guilty in federal court to one count of conspiracy to distribute steroids.

He was indicted in November on a charge of conspiring with BALCO founder Victor Conte to distribute tetrahydrogestrone, also known as "the clear," a powerful steroid that helped athletes add muscle mass and recover quickly from intense workouts.

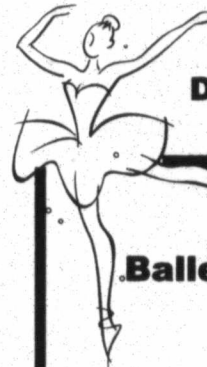

Dijon-Wine Steak Kabobs with Mushroom Wild Rice

The delicious shiitake mushroom originated in Japan and Korea. Today they are grown in many regions of the United States.

Total preparation and cooking time:
30 minutes

Marinating time: 6 hours or overnight

- 1 pound boneless beef round tip steak, cut 1 inch thick
- 1/2 small red onion, cut into 3/4-inch wedges
- 1 small yellow summer squash, cut lengthwise in half then crosswise into 1-inch slices
- 1 small red or green bell pepper, cut into 1-inch pieces

Marinade:

- 2 tablespoons water
- 2 tablespoons red wine vinegar
- 2 tablespoons coarse-grain Dijon-style mustard
- 2 cloves garlic, minced
- 2 teaspoons vegetable oil
- 1/2 teaspoon coarse ground black pepper

Mushroom Wild Rice:

- 2 teaspoons vegetable oil
- 2 cups thinly sliced assorted wild mushrooms (oyster, cremini and shiitake)
- 1 6-ounce package long grain and wild rice blend

1. Cut beef steak into 1 1/4-inch pieces. Combine marinade ingredients in small bowl. Place beef and marinade in food-safe plastic bag; turn to coat. Close bag securely and marinate in refrigerator 6 hours or as long as overnight, turning occasionally.
2. Soak eight 9-inch bamboo skewers in water 10 minutes; drain. Remove beef from marinade; discard marinade. Alternately thread beef, onion, squash and bell pepper pieces evenly onto skewers. Place kabobs on grid over medium, ash-covered coals. Grill uncovered, 8 to 10 minutes for medium-rare to medium doneness, turning occasionally.

A reception was held following the ceremony at the Old Pampa Hardware building which included a dinner and dance.

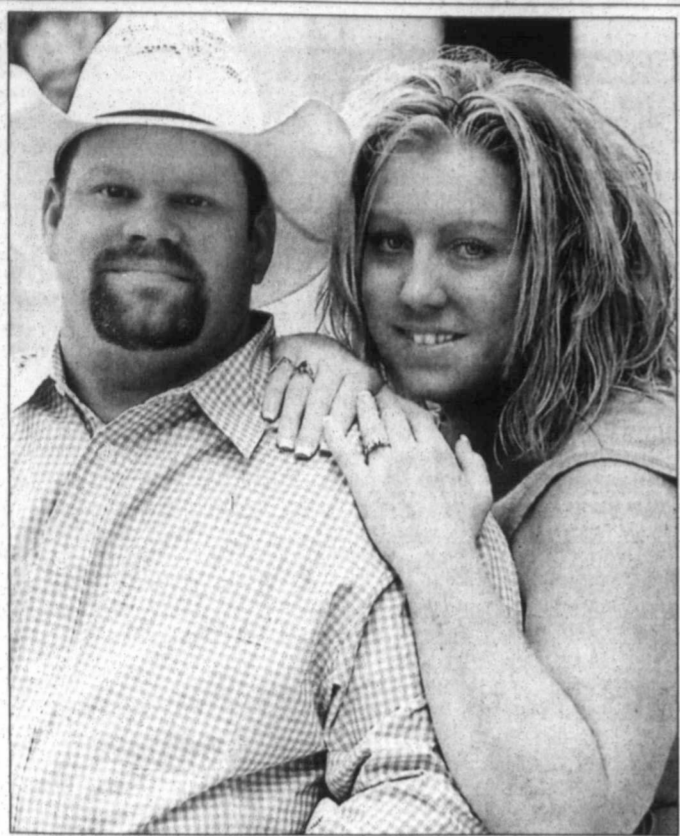

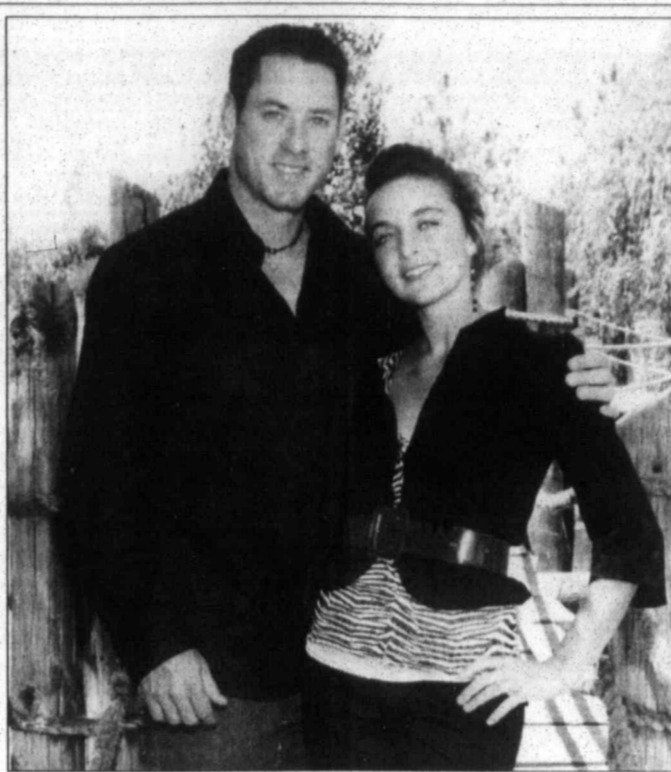

"Even though the initial May 15 enrollment deadline has passed, there is still time for many low-income Texans to sign up for a Medicare prescription drug plan," said Angela Garcia, League of United Latin American Citizen board member and past LULAC national vice president for the elderly. "The extended enrollment period is an opportunity to ensure that those who are most in need get help with their prescription drug costs."

Texans who may be eligible but have yet to apply for the Medicare prescription drug benefit's low-income subsidy don't have to wait until Nov. 15 through Dec. 31 (when the next open-enrollment period begins) to join a plan. They can apply

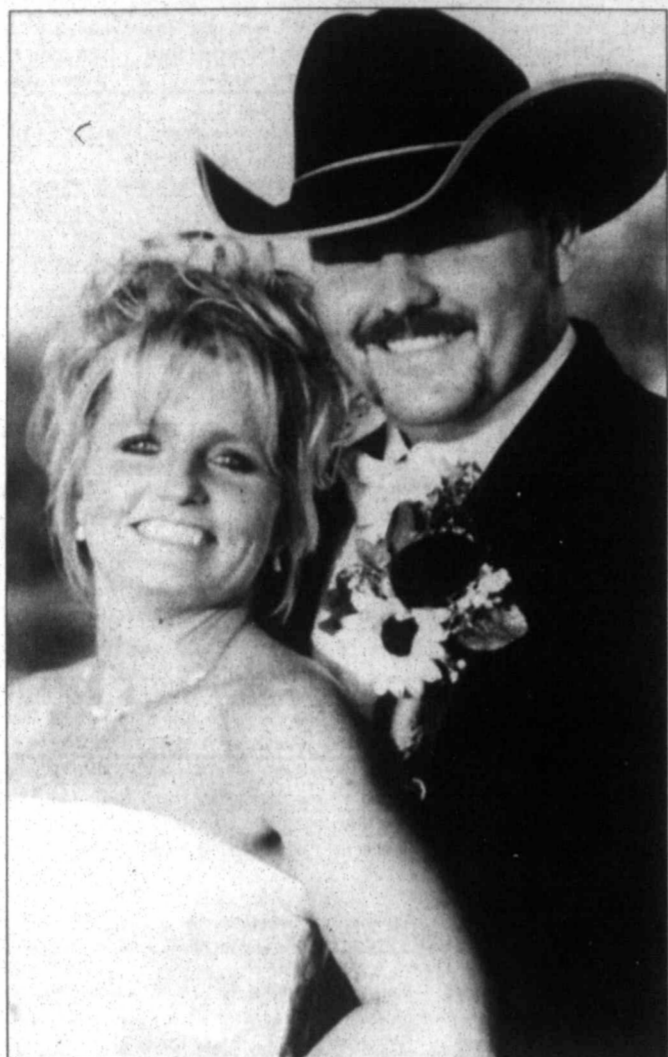

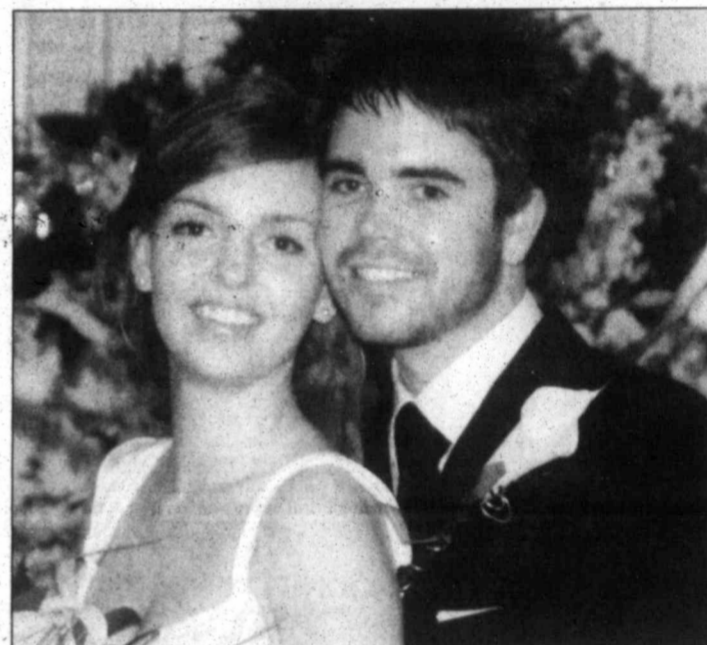

now for the low-income subsidy and receive extra help paying for the coverage.

"If a senior qualifies for the extra assistance, they are offered a special enroll-

ment opportunity and coverage can begin right away," Garcia said. "Most importantly, Texas seniors who qualify for the low-income subsidy will not be subject to a late-enrollment penalty."

Beneficiaries who wish to find out if they qualify for the low-income subsidy can get assistance by going to a local Social Security Administration office, by calling 1-800-772-1213 or by going online at www.ssa.gov/prescriptionhelp.

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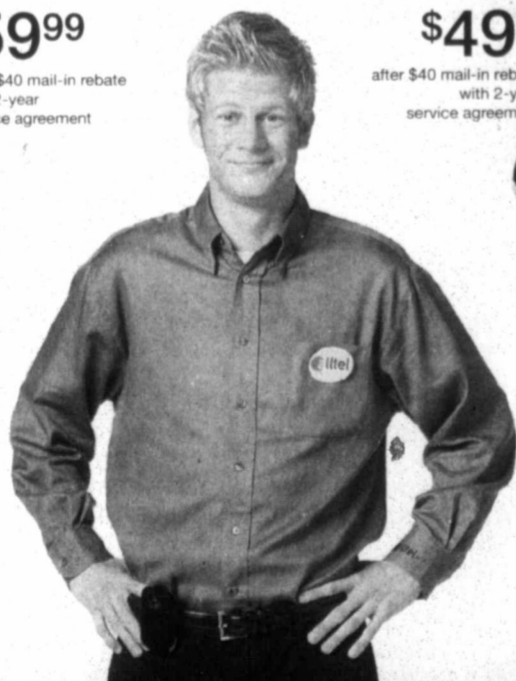

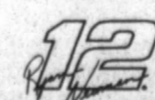

Peanuts, pine trees and sweet Georgia peaches may be future fuel sources

TIFTON, Ga. (AP) — Part-time farmer Jimmy Griner hopes his ever-so-fragrant, crystal-clear, 180-proof moonshine can help solve the nation's energy problems. Griner arrived at the Georgia Bioenergy Conference this week carrying of quart of the stuff in a Mason jar. He's licensed to make 10,000 gallons a year of the high-octane elixir that's distilled from fermented Georgia-grown wheat.

Sponsored by the University of Georgia, the three-day conference attracted about 500 farmers, scientists, engineers and politicians. Speakers from across the nation and at least one foreign country, Brazil, discussed the future of global energy supplies, the economics of biofuels, energy legislation and Georgia products that could be converted into fuels.

Gov. Sonny Perdue said promoting alternative fuels is "a significant step" toward important goals.

"First, we are ensuring long-term fuel stability, and reducing our dependence on foreign sources of oil," he said. "If we can grow our own fuel, why would we purchase it from dictators, or from countries who have pledged support for terrorist regimes?"

"These initiatives add value to our farmers' crops," he added. "They will generate renewed interest and increased demand in agriculture."

Perdue said Georgia already has a few bioenergy companies that produced more than 3 million gallons of ethanol and biodiesel last year, most of it shipped out of state.

Plans are under way to build a \$132 million plant in Camilla, about 175 miles south of Atlanta, that would produce 100 million gallons of ethanol a year from corn. Another company is considering a

\$150 million to \$200 million plant in south Georgia that would make 50 million gallons of ethanol annually from the cellulose in wood.

Perdue said the state has supported alternative fuels by providing nearly \$1 million to fund a biorefinery at the University of Georgia in Athens and research at Georgia Tech to convert pine cellulose to ethanol.

In addition, the state is working on a comprehensive energy strategy that should be completed by December, and Georgians will eventually have a "roadmap" of affordable, reliable and environmentally responsible energy sources, he said.

With almost 25 million of Georgia's 37 million acres covered with forests, there's a big push to produce ethanol from pine trees. But experts say the technology for doing it on a commercial scale is still years away.

The state already generates 18 million dry tons of waste wood each year, including limbs and tree tops, Georgia Forestry Commission director Ken Stewart said. The amount of ethanol available from the waste wood alone — 80 gallons per ton — would be enough to replace 18 percent of the gasoline and diesel fuels consumed in the state each year, he said.

After his speech, the governor toured an outdoor display of tractors and trucks powered by ethanol made from Georgia-grown peaches, wheat and pine trees and others powered by biodiesel made from chicken fat, peanuts, cotton seeds and soybeans.

Standing beside a large sedan powered by a blend of gasoline and his white lightning, Griner greeted the governor, unscrewed the lid and gave the governor a whiff.
