terrorists from crosing Appointed by Gov. Rick Perry, McCraw, 52, is a former FBI intelligence expert who oversees state and local police resources that have
been deployed to been deployed to make
Texas safer and help the U.S. Border Patrol. I talked to him recently by telephone from his offices in Austin: Q: What is it you are sup-
posed to be doing? posed to be doing? A: The focus, as the gov-
ernor has laid out, is deterrence and prevention. This started in 2005 as part of a five-year strategic plan that identified that our most significant threat, the porous border, didn't constitute just border, didn t constitute just
a national security threat but was a public safety threat as well. There has been an escalation over the years. About a decade ago, the
drug-trafficking organiza drug-trafficking organiza-
tions that pretty much domi nated the cocaine and marijuana business have really evolved into extremely powerful and ruthless organized crime groups. The fact is, they control the northern
Mexico border. This affects places like Pittsburgh. In
fact, the governor has anged fact, the governor has argued that what's on the Texas border and the southwest border affects the rest of the nation. Mexican drug-traffic organi-
zations now dominate the zations now dominate the
lucrative U.S. drug market, also the human smuggling market, which is the national security side of things.

A: First of all, what we are
not dealing with is immigranot dealing with is immigra-
tion policy. The position the governor is that until we secure the border, immigration policy reforms, though
very well-intentioned very well-intentioned, wil
not be effective in the not be effective in the long
run or even the short run. It's been said that, well, if you are able to address the demand for immigrant labor, that you've in fact increased the security of the border.
Well, you really haven't. If you decrease the demand for labor, criminals and terrorists will still come through an insecure border. They're not motivated by jobs. What the governor wants to focus
on are terrorists and crimion are terrorists and crimi-

University of Pennsylvania's New Bolton Center. The mood swing came a day after chief surgeon Dean Richardson delivered the grim news that Barbaro had laminitis,

removed Wednesday and that chances of survival were poor.
Barbaro's prognosis went from guarded
os stable Friday, with Richardson saying the 3 -year-old colt's vital signs, including hear

Enos said Hoskins also bought Bonds a $\$ 350,000$ Bentley Rolls Royce, which she said Bonds paid $\$ 150,000$ in gift taxes. "The guy without Barry didn't have penny," Enos said. Hoskins recently has surfaced as another key government witness in the investigation of Bonds. He was a boyhood friend who went into business with the baseball star, selling such memorabilia as signed jerseys, bats and baseball cards. The two and baseball cards. 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## Some 'senior moments' could be more

CHICAGO (AP) - A study found that in a disturbing number of cases, embarrass-
ing "senior moments" such as forgetting a recent conversation or drawing a blank on be a sign of Alzheimer's after all.
Chicago scientists reached that conclusion after autop sies on the brains of 134 olde people who had appeared to
be mentally normal, apart from some subtle forgetfulness.
Occasional forgetfulness is often written off as a norma part of growing old and nothin most cases, that is probably true.
But the scientists found to their surprise that the brains of more than one-third of the participants were riddled with waxy protein clumps and
other signs of degeneration that are hallmarks of Alzheimer's disease. The study "questions the acceptability of minor episod-
ic memory loss in older adults
as normal," said Dr. Carol Lippa, director of the memory
disorders program at Drexel University College of Medicine in Philadelphia. had no part in the study.

nal. Dallas, Anderson, a Alzheimer's scientist at the which funded the research, called the results "very plausible and hopeful." Anderson noted that scientists are trying in pinpoint the earliest poise
