Neighborhood watch program for county

Gray County Sheriff Don Copeland is initiating a Neighborhood Watch type program around the county.

Copeland joined 10 other Texas Panhandle Sheriffs, the Texas Cattle Feeders Association, Texas and Southwest Cattle Raisers Association, Texas Wheat Producers and West Texas University announcing the formation of the system known as Agro Guard.

"The Agro Guard program is a community policing effort," Randall County Sheriff Joel Richardson said. "It's much like the Neighborhood Watch program. It was started in Ford County, Kan., and took off from there to where most of the State of Kansas has adopted the program as well

as New Mexico."

Kenneth Chambers, a field inspector with the Texas and Southwest Cattle Raisers, says that from what he's heard, the program has been successful in lowering the crime rate in rural areas where it's been tried.

While Richardson stressed the importance of the program concerning agri-terrorism, others said they thought it would help battle crime in rural areas.

Potter County Sheriff Mike Shumate said the program will help control the theft of anhydrous ammonia and methamphetamine labs.

"That's the big problem," Shumate said. "It's probably a bigger local problem than the terrorism issue."

He says vandalism is also a problem in the Potter

Rollover in Carson County takes life of Pampan

A Pampa man died Saturday afternoon after his vehicle rolled three times near Skellytown.

Joseph Alan Barker, 24, was eastbound on Highway 152 5.5 miles west of Skellytown at 4:45 p.m. Saturday in a 1993 Toyota 4Runner when the vehicle went off the road to

the right, according to Trooper Wayne Beighle, public information officer for the Texas Department of

Public Safety's Amarillo office. "He overcorrected, causing the vehicle to roll three times," Beighle said. "He was partially ejected from the vehicle."

Barker died at the scene approximately one hour after the accident.

He was pronounced dead by Carson County Justice of the Peace Brandie Hefner of White Deer.

"He was wearing a seat belt, but sometimes in these rollovers, you get partially ejected from the vehicle, and that's what happened in his case," Beighle said.

Graveside services were scheduled for 10 a.m. today at Fairview

Barker was born April I, 1981 in Enid, Okla. He had been a Pampa resident for the past two years.

Survivors include his mother and father, stepmother, one sister, three stepsisters, a grandmother and grandfather.

Two instances of assault with knives reported

A knife was the weapon of choice in two separate incidents over the weekend in which the victims reported alleged aggravated assault with a deadly weapon, according to Pampa Police Department reports.

The first incident was reported at 5:07 p.m. Friday. The 19-year-old victim received a cut to the throat after reportedly unintentionally

swerving into the path of oncoming traffic in the vicinity of the intersection of Crawford and Varnon streets. The victim was confronted by another driver who had been traveling on the opposite side of the street.

The victim received a cut to the throat when the other driver allegedly threatened the victim with a knife. The victim drove to his home to report the incident, but refused medical treatment.

Kenneth Wayne Adkism, 50, of Pampa was arrested and booked into Gray County Jail by PPD at 6:50 p.m. on a charge of aggravated assault with a deadly weapon, in connection with the incident.

The second event involving a knife was reported at 6:13 p.m. Saturday. The 20-year-old suspect allegedly entered the home of the 19-year-old victim uninvited in order to retrieve a cell phone.

An argument over the whereabouts of the phone ensued, and the suspect allegedly threatened the victim with a knife before leaving the residence, according to police reports. No injuries were reported.

No charges have been filed in connection with the incident, and no arrests have been made. The case has been turned over to the police department's criminal investigation division for further investigation.



"The other issue we face is the equipment thefts," Shumate said. "That's always a big problem.'

He says a lot of equipment is stolen from farms, ranches and construction sites and taken to Mexico to be sold.

"It's an ongoing issue," Shumate said. He says it's of particular concern to places in Amarillo that rent equipment.

"Someone rents a piece of equipment, takes it to their property to use it and it's stolen and taken to Mexico," Shumate said. "You never see it again. It's just another issue that we have to confront and, unfortunately, once it's over there, it's gone.'

Shumate said having extra eyes watch-

ing should help. The more the public is involved in law enforcement, the more effective we are," he said. "We're limited in the number of people, the number of eyes we have. If we can expand that with this program, we're much better off."

"The side benefit of this Agro Guard program," Richardson said, "is that we will begin to get information on our thefts. It'll help with just general law enforcement."

Copeland, who has held a tight rein on meth labs around Pampa to the point of driving many of them off into neighboring counties, said he doesn't have any problems in Gray County, but he wants to prevent new ones from cropping up.

"We don't have any actual problems," Copeland said. "We just want to prevent any problems. We hope the farmers and ranchers and feedyards and everybody will get on board."



What worries me is that in the past, cults sprang up which demanded their followers abandon their friends and families, turn over all their worldly goods to the group and be totally obedient to whatever the leaders decreed, even to the point of mass suicide.

Remember the Heaven's Gate group, who combined Christianity and a belief in UFOs and aliens from other planets, and waited for a comet to signal their departure from this earth? How

about Jim Jones, who established the Peoples Temple and led his followers to Guyana, where they established a commune and subsequently committed mass suicide?

I have a prediction of my own to make. I think we will see cults like these spring up again to destroy some individuals and families, just so that a few savvy, brainwashing leaders can gain power and wealth.

Be concerned about current events. But don't let that concern drive out common sense, values and beliefs.

After all, false prophets are a part of the "end times," too.

Today is Tuesday, July 25, the 206th day of 2006. There are 159 days left in the year.

Today's Highlight in History:

Fifty years ago, on July 25, 1956, the Italian liner Andrea Doria collided with the Swedish passenger ship Stockholm off the New England coast late at night and began sinking; at least 51 people died as a result of the impact. (The Andrea Doria sank the following day, some 11 hours after the crash.) On this date:

In 1866, Ulysses S. Grant was named General of the Army, the first officer to hold the rank.

In 1868, Congress passed an act creating the Wyoming. Territory.

In 1946, the United States detonated an atomic bomb Bikini Atoll in the Pacific in the first underwater test of the device.

In 1952, Puerto Rico became a selfgoverning commonwealth of the United States.

In 1963, the United States, the Soviet Union and Britain initialed a treaty in Moscow prohibiting the testing of nuclear weapons in the atmosphere, in space or underwater.

In 1978, Louise Joy Brown, the first "test tube baby," was born in Oldham, England; she'd been conceived through the technique of in-vitro fertilization. In 1986, movie director Vincente Minnelli, known for such

musicals as "Gigi," "An American in Paris" and "Meet Me in St. Louis," died in Los Angeles. In 1994, Israeli Prime Minister Yitzhak Rabin and Jordan's King Hussein signed a declaration at the White House ending

their countries' 46-year-old formal state of war. In 2000, a New York-bound Air France Concorde crashed outside Paris shortly after takeoff, killing all 109 people on

board and four people on the ground; it was the first-ever crash of the supersonic jet. Ten years ago: Divers searching the wreckage of TWA Flight 800 off Long Island, N.Y., recovered the flight data

and cockpit voice recorders. Five years ago: Three masked men gunned down Phoolan Devi, India's onetime "Bandit Queen," killing the outlawturned-legislator who was idolized by the poor as a champion of the lower castes.

How environmentalists influence gas prices

"Proven" oil reserves, oil that's economically and technologically recoverable, are estimated to be more than 1.1 trillion barrels. That's enough oil, at current usage rates, to fuel the world's economy for 38 according years, Leonardo Maugeri, vice president for the Italian energy company ENI. Mr. Maugeri provides a wealth of information about energy "Two Cheers for Expensive Oil," published Foreign Affairs (March/April 2006) and reprinted on the same date in Current.

There are an additional 2 trillion barrels of "recoverable" reserves. Mr. Maugeri says these oil reserves will probably meet the "proven" standard in a few years as technological improvement and increased sub-soil knowledge come online. Estimates of recoverable oil don't include the huge deposits of "unconventional" oil such as Canadian tar sands and U.S. shale oil, plus there are vast areas of our planet yet to be fully explored.

For decades, alarmists have claimed we're running out of oil. In 1919, the U.S. Geological Survey predicted

that world oil production today's investments yield would peak in nine years. During the 1970s, the Club of Rome report, "The Limits to Growth," said that, assuming no rise in consumption, all known oil reserves would be entirely consumed in just 31 years.

There are several factors that explain today's high

prices. There has Walter been a huge Williams surge in demand for Columnist oil as a result of rapid economic

growth in China and India, as well as in the United States. Another factor is the under-exploration. Maugeri says Saudi Arabia has 260 billion barrels of proven reserves, accounting for 25 percent of the world's total, but only one-third of the oil known to lie below its surface.

Russia's reserves are three times its proven reserves of 50 billion barrels. While high prices are beginning to stimulate investments in oil exploration, they've lagged for several decades out of fear of oil gluts and low prices. It's going to be 2010 before fruit.

A substantial increase in oil production alone cannot ease today's high prices because of weak refining capacity. Not a single refinery has been built in the United States for 30 years. Improvements to existing refineries failed to keep up

with growing demand and tougher environmental regulations. We're the world's

only industrialized country with a net deficit in refining capacity that comes to 20 percent of domestic demand. That makes us highly vulnerable to disasters like last year's hurricanes. Exacerbating weak refining capacity are regulations whereby gasoline produced for one state may not be sold in another. There are 18 mandated different types of gasoline sold in the United States.

The long-term outlook for oil is good. There's an increase in oil-drilling technology and exploration. Oil as a source of energy has been in decline. In 1980, oil was 45 percent of energy

consumption; today, it's 34 percent, yielding ground to natural gas, coal and nuclear energy. Recently, the House of Representatives passed "The Deep Ocean Energy Resources Act of 2006' which was sent to the Senate.

Offshore oil exploration has been banned since 1982, despite Department of the Interior estimates that suggest the presence of 19 billion barrels of oil and 84 trillion cubic feet of natural The House of Representatives also passed "Refinery Permit Process Schedule Act of 2006." Should these measures become law, our energy capacity will be enhanced significantly.

America stands alone in the world as the only nation that has placed a substantial amount of its domestic oil and natural gas potential offlimits. That reflects the awesome control that radical environmentalists have over Congress. With high fuel prices, Americans might be ready to put an end to that control.

DEAR DAUGHTER: When people start talking about ending their lives, that's the time to see they get medical and psychological attention. But only when she's ready to admit she has a problem. (They're in the phone book.)

She has several men friends, some from past relationships, that she still sees casually. She insists on spending weekends alone with them, either at their home or at her summer house in the country. I feel this is inappropriate for someone in a serious relationship. She says I "don't trust her." and we cannot have a relationship unless I get over this attitude. Is she right? Am I being unreasonable? --CONFUSED IN FLORIDA

DEAR CONFUSED: Not in my opinion. And I wonder how this "wonderful woman" would feel if the shoe was on the other foot. While I see nothing wrong with old friends -- and even people who were once romantic -- sharing a meal together once in a while, I draw the line at weekends alone together. But then again, I'm not in favor of "open" relationships, either. My advice to you is to rethink making this relationship permanent.

The slumping two-time AL MVP had two hits, scored the go-ahead run and was errorfree in the field in the New York Yankees' 6-2 victory over the Rangers on Monday

"He had good at-bats, he hit good pitch-

es. He had a good night," manager Joe Torre said. "Now the key is just to put something together. And it doesn't have to be hits. The quality of the at-bats is something he's looking to have right now."

Lustily booed by the fans of his former team - the one that gave him the record \$252 million contract - Rodriguez snapped an 0-for-11 streak with a single in the fourth and then scored the go-ahead run.

"I liked the seventh better," Rodriguez said, referring to his RBI double. "I've been feeling better. I've was swinging a little too hard in Toronto, trying to do too much. It was nice to contribute to win."

Rodriguez finished 2-for-5. He has only six hits his last 32 at-bats, and on Saturday he struck out four times in a game for the first time since 1995.

Johnson threw 101 pitches, allowing two runs and seven hits with two walks. The 42year-old threw 129 pitches in his last start Wednesday, when he struck out a seasonhigh 11 in a loss to Seattle.

"Tonight was the residual of that game. My slider wasn't as effective," Johnson said. "I gave up too many hits. ... It's a game I'm glad is over. Getting through today was the biggest thing."

There have been more than 5,700 major league games since Johnson's perfect game for Arizona against Atlanta on May 18, 2004. Millwood threw his no-hitter for Philadelphia against San Francisco on April 27, 2003.

Big 12 notes: Leach will miss AstroTurf; Baylor coach surprised by early picks

KANSAS CITY, Mo. (AP) — Texas Tech finally got rid of its AstroTurf, a playing surface most athletes don't miss given its hard unwelcoming surface. But coach Mike Leach looked on the old surface, on which the Red Raiders had played since 1970, with nostalgia.

"I'll kind of miss it, honestly," Leach said Monday during the Big 12 Conference's annual football media days. "At the time, nobody else had it. The guys would come out and kick in disgust. Oregon State, the Indianapolis Colts, and Texas Tech - that was a cool little club to be in."

But it became difficult to find anyone to repair the outdated surface as other schools graduated to the accommodating FieldTurf, which feels more like real grass.

"It was fun having a unique deal that no one else had. It's like keeping up with the Joneses," Leach said. "If one school goes out and buys a boat, you have to buy a boat too."

RANKLED BY RANK-INGS: Baylor coach Guy Morriss was none too happy that the Bears were picked to finish last in the Big 12 South in preseason media

Baylor's 5-6 record last year included two overtime losses, and Morriss has been installing a new spread offense that's becoming more common around the Big 12.

"I don't think we'll end up in the cellar," Morriss said. Kansas State coach Ron Prince waved of the assessment of his team, too. The Wildcats were picked to fin-

ish last in the North

Division.

"We let the pickers pick and the players play," said Prince, 36, who became one of the youngest coaches in NCAA Division I-A when he took over last fall for the

retired Bill Snyder. Prince's coaching staff is also younger, and wide receiver Jordy Nelson said he had more conversations with Prince in four months than he had with Snyder in a

"They know what we're like as kids," Nelson said of the new coaching staff. "They bring more energy to the field."

Leach doesn't find any great

secret in Texas Tech's improvement on defense. In fact, the transition was pretty simple to him.

"Everybody got a year older," Leach said, and the freshmen who started playing for him three yeas ago have grown up.

In 2003, Texas Tech led the NCAA in passing and total offense, but its defensive numbers were dismal: 453.4 yards and 34 points per game. "We've definitely come a

long way from that," said offensive guard Manny Ramirez. "My freshman year, it was the offensive show at Tech.'

Now that players are fully integrated into the defensive scheme, it looks much better, said senior linebacker Keyunta Dawson.

"As a freshman, you're just out there like, 'I don't NO MYSTERY: Mike know what to do," Dawson

Landis well taught on art of winning

"I kept fighting, never stopped believing," Landis said, shortly after he received the yellow jersey on the podium.

He plans soon to have replacement surgery on an arthritic right hip, but hopes to be back next year - when Armstrong also hopes he'll be racing for Discovery.

"He's a damn good rider," Armstrong said. "We would take Floyd back.'

Landis regained the lead from Oscar Pereiro of Spain with a strong performance in Saturday's time trial and ended up 57 seconds ahead of Pereiro in the overall standings.
