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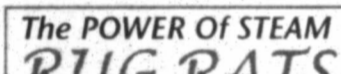
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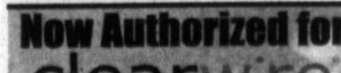
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Commissioners hear residents on proposed tax rate

A public hearing on the City of Pampa's proposed tax rate drew comments from two residents during Tuesday's city commission meeting at City Hall.

Gene Barber, who said he has lived in Pampa for the past 80 years, cautioned commissioners to take a conservative approach to spending in order to be better prepared for major expenditures which will be needed at future dates.

"Down the line, we're going to have to have a fire station and other improvements that will be a big increase," Barber said. "We'll have

to have space for that in our pocket-books.

"Be as conservative as you can. Keep up the good work, and work a little harder, too."

"Every year, it's difficult to sit here and know how to disperse funds," Mayor Lonny Robbins said after Barber's comments. "We've been so far behind in our equipment needs. We're getting to do some of that this year for the very first time in a long time."

Shirley Garrison asked for a clarification of the statement that city tax revenues will increase by 8.92 percent over the previous year's total.

"As a widow as of last year, my income is a lot less than it was," Garrison said. "Suppose my home's value has been increased by about \$20,000. That hurts."

Commissioners explained that Gray County Appraisal District determines the value of property in the county, and anyone whose property is increased in value has the option of protesting the increase within certain guidelines and time limits.

City Manager John Horst encouraged Garrison to contact the appraisal district even though the deadline for filing a protest concerning her

home's value may have passed.

The City of Pampa's proposed 69.5 cents per \$100 valuation tax rate for taxable property on the 2006 tax rolls is the same rate as has been set for the past several years, Horst said. No increase in the tax rate is being considered.

"For a home with a taxable value of \$50,000, the tax to be paid to the city will be \$340 to \$350," Horst said.

The 8.92 percent increase refers to the increase in total tax revenue the city will collect for its fiscal 2007

EDC discusses Pampa housing

Only 64 houses in Pampa are currently on the market for potential home buyers to consider, according to Sue Baker, president of the Pampa Board of Realtors, who spoke at Tuesday's meeting of the Pampa Economic Development Corporation.

Homes in the \$80,000 to \$150,000 price range are those most needed to meet demands of persons looking to buy a house in Pampa, Baker told EDC members at the 11 a.m. meeting in the Nona Payne Room of Pampa Community Building, 200 N. Ballard.

"We asked what the EDC could do to help with the shortage," said Kathy Cota, EDC secretary. "We will look at ways of

seeing if developers come into the city and also have them come and meet with us."

Incentives may be offered to builders to encourage them to build homes in Pampa, Cota said. The EDC has acquired a list of local builders, she said.

Centramedia Online Services of Pampa was chosen to build the EDC's Web site.

"We had gotten information on four other companies that build Web sites, three here and one in Amarillo, and decided on Centramedia," Cota said.

A report on the recent job recruitment fair for a national call center was given. The two-day fair attracted 201 applications

OK. Are you junior high parents ready for the safe and proper way to drop off your kids at Pampa Junior High School?

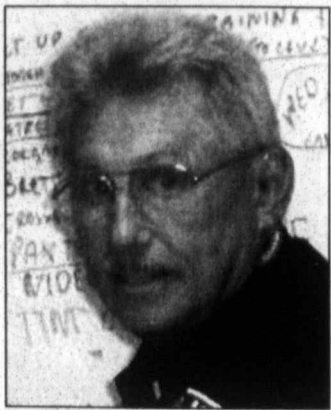
It is pretty simple, but it may take just a bit of an extra effort on your part to make sure your kids are protected.

budget compared to fiscal 2006. The increase is due to new growth within city limits, including new businesses and homes, and re-valuations of existing property by the appraisal district.

"I recommend we keep the tax rate the same as last year because our costs are increasing, such as for fuel and electricity," Horst said concerning any possible reduction in the tax rate.

"We have seen an increase in sales tax revenue, but it's been the first time since I've been mayor that we've come into the budget process without having to think about cutting staff or other negative action," Robbins said.

Ward 1 Commissioner Brad Pingel asked about the effects of a small decrease in the tax rate.

A one-cent decrease in the city's tax rate would result in a loss of \$42,000 for the city when applied to all taxable property within the city, but would net a homeowner a savings of only \$6 on a home valued at \$60,000, said Robin Bailey, city financial director.

Five proposed ordinances earned approval on either their first or second reading at Tuesday afternoon's meeting.

Ordinance No. 1452 was approved on second and final reading, and concerns adult businesses and topless establishments. The ordinance amends zoning Ordinance No. 690 by providing for the new business

classification.

Ordinance No. 1453 was approved on second and final reading. This ordinance provides that the Code of Ordinances be amended by adding Article 4.08 Adult Businesses. The ordinance defines various types of adult businesses and also includes location requirements, viewing booth requirements, required license and fees, application and insurance, duration of license, inspections and violations, and revocation of license.

"We're not opening the door. We're trying to close the door on these types of establishments," Robbins said. "We found that the existing ordinance was not specific enough."

Ordinance No. 1455 was approved on first reading Tuesday. The ordinance requires that roofing contractors register with the city for an annual fee of \$30.

"We want this so someone can't just come into the city and do roofing and disappear, with the homeowner having no information on who to contact in case the work is faulty," said Horst. "It does not apply to doing your own work."

"Ninety-eight to 99 percent of complaints we get are on roofers," said Richard Morris, director of the city's Public Works Department. "We already have others licensed, including plumbers and electricians."

Ordinance No. 1454 was approved on second and final reading. The ordinance concerns the city's waiving of surface use of a portion of the alley behind the east side of the 1300 block of North

Hobart. A CVS Pharmacy is planned for that location.

A second ordinance concerning the proposed new pharmacy was also approved, on first reading. Ordinance No. 1456 rezones the planned location from office to retail designation.

Commissioners approved a second reading on Ordinance 1456 at a special meeting at noon today to rezone the location for the new pharmacy.

Resolution No. 06-011 was approved. The resolution authorizes the submission of a Regional Solid Waste Grants Program application by the city to Panhandle Regional Planning Commission.

The grant request will be for \$20,000 and will be used, along with \$4,200 in matching funds to be provided by the city, to purchase four 10 CY containers, which are similar to rolloff containers used at construction sites. A trailer system equipped with

a hydraulic hoist will also be purchased to transport the containers, drop them off and pick them up.

"We're looking at eventually trying to replace the loaner trucks with these trailers," Morris said.

The replacement of the loaner trucks, which are available to city residents for disposal of items too large to be placed in Dumpsters, will result in savings to the city, Morris said.

There are currently two loaner trucks in service, and annual maintenance costs for them is \$5,000 to \$6,000, he said. The replacement of the trucks with the rolloffs will also save in manpower needed to provide the service, Morris said, because only one person would be needed to move the rolloffs.

Commissioners also accepted bids of \$100 each by Steven D. Longron for tax-delinquent property at 937 Brunow and at 841-843 Gordon.

AT&T sues data brokers over info Ride

SAN ANTONIO (AP) — AT&T went to federal court Wednesday to identify 25 data brokers whom it says used fraud to get phone-calling records for about 2,500 customers without their approval.

AT&T Inc. said the unnamed data brokers pose as customers to get phone records, often for use in legal or domestic disputes.

The lawsuit was filed in U.S. district court in San Antonio by the services unit of AT&T Inc. The targets of the lawsuit were identified only as John Doe defendants.

The phone company said filing the lawsuit would give it legal standing to identify the data brokers through e-mail and Internet Protocol addresses.

Once it identifies the data brokers, AT&T said it would seek an injunction to bar them from tapping phone records and to seek damages

from the brokers, including return of any profits from selling customer information.

San Antonio-based AT&T said the data brokers could not obtain Social Security numbers, driver's license numbers or financial or credit information.

Priscilla Hill-Ardoin, chief privacy officer for AT&T, said a company investigation identified about 2,500 customers whose records may have been obtained by data brokers. The customers have been notified and access to their online accounts has been frozen, the company said.

The company said data brokers pose as the customer to get confidential information that they use to set up unauthorized online accounts, which gives them access to account information including recent calling records.

Hillary's howl over opponent's 'clean' ad

With Sen. Hillary Clinton's 10-to-1 edge in campaign funding, her complaints about an ad from opponent John Spencer reminds one of an elephant howling in pain after having his toe stepped on by a flea. In fact, the Spencer ad, which castigated her record on terrorism, was a clean blow.

In the ad, Spencer criticizes Hillary for voting against the Patriot Act and opposing the National Security Agency policy of wiretapping conversations between Americans and foreigners without first getting a warrant from the Foreign Intelligence Surveillance Court. That characterization is fair and accurate on both issues.

Clinton, along with nearly

every other member of Congress, voted for the Patriot Act right after 9/11. But when the act came up for renewal at the end of last year, she refused to vote to end a Democratic filibuster that killed the chance to extend the legislation. Instead, she backed a compromise to put the issue over until January.

After the Democrats had demonstrated their muscle by showing that they could hold off cloture on the anti-terrorist legislation, the administration and its allies realized they'd have to compromise, and agreed to changes watering down the act. Thus, Hillary joined almost everyone else in eventually voting for renewal, after she'd succeeded in weakening its protections.

The NSA wiretaps? She's criticized them from the start, insisting that the administration should have to go to the foreign-intelligence court for approval before tapping any phone.

Spencer opens his ad with a picture of the Brooklyn Bridge and says, correctly, that if Clinton had her way on to the Patriot Act and the wiretaps, it would have opened the way for an al Qaeda strike to demolish the bridge.

The plot to blow up the bridge was uncovered in an NSA wiretap that could not have been preceded by a warrant. Federal investiga-

tors had no idea what they were looking for when it was discovered or where to look in the first place.

The NSA trolls through millions of phone calls and asks its sophisticated computers to discern patterns that might be suspicious. Apparently, the words "Brooklyn Bridge" (which must not translate

well into Arabic) surfaced in one call, and that was enough to alert Police Commissioner Ray Kelly to flood the bridge with cops. (The alert was required by the Patriot Act, which mandates the sharing of such information, formerly limit-

ed by bureaucratic jealousy and concern about compromising sources.)

Then the NSA intercepted a call saying that the bridge was "too hot," obviously from the terrorist. Finally, by interrogating a prisoner in Pakistan (an interrogation allowed by the Patriot Act without an attorney present), the authorities got the name of the plotter and arrested him. Chillingly, the terrorist had full plans for the bridge in his apartment and had correctly identified a spot on the bridge where a well-planted explosive would cause its collapse.

So what's wrong with Spencer's ad? Hillary does oppose the NSA's "warrantless wiretaps." She did vote against the Patriot Act in December of 2005. And but

for the Patriot Act and wiretaps, the Brooklyn Bridge would have been blown up.

Clinton criticizes Spencer for showing Osama bin Laden's picture in the ad next to hers. If she doesn't like that, perhaps she should think twice before voting to unilaterally disarm us in the War on Terror.

On Aug. 23, 1927, Italian-born anarchists Nicola Sacco and Bartolomeo Vanzetti were executed in Boston for the murders of two men during a 1920 robbery. (Sacco and Vanzetti were vindicated in 1977 by Massachusetts Gov. Michael S. Dukakis.)

On this date:

In 1754, France's King Louis XVI was born at Versailles.

In 1775, Britain's King George III proclaimed the American colonies in a state of "open and avowed rebellion."

In 1914, Japan declared war against Germany in World War I.

In 1926, silent film star Rudolph Valentino died in New York at age 31.

In 1939, Nazi Germany and the Soviet Union signed a non-aggression treaty in Moscow.

In 1944, Romanian prime minister Ion

Antonescu was dismissed by King Michael, paving the way for Romania to abandon the Axis in favor of the Allies.

In 1960, Broadway librettist Oscar Hammerstein II died in Doylestown, Pa.

In 1972, the Republican national convention, meeting in Miami Beach, Fla., nominated Vice President Spiro T. Agnew for a second term.

In 1982, Lebanon's parliament elected Christian militia leader Bashir Gemayel president. (However, Gemayel was assassinated some three weeks later.)

Ten years ago: President Clinton imposed limits on peddling cigarettes to children as he unveiled Food and Drug Administration regulations declaring nicotine an addictive drug. The same day, a jury in Indianapolis found cigarette companies were not responsible for the lung cancer death of a 52-year-old lawyer who began smoking at age 5.

Five years ago: California Congressman Gary Condit, interviewed by Connie Chung on ABC, denied any involvement in the disappearance of Chandra Levy.

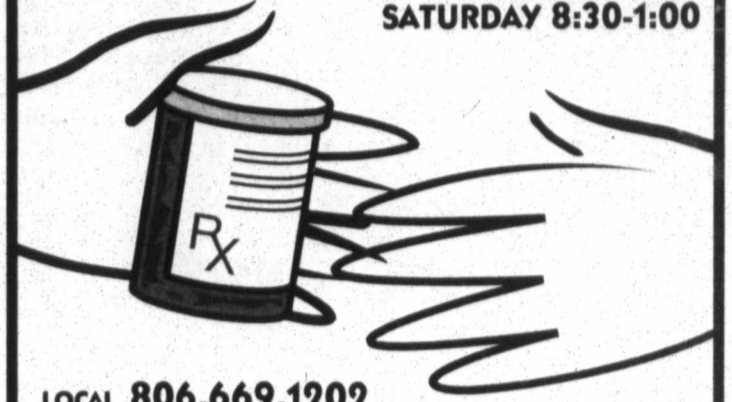

Gatlin receives 8-year doping ban

(AP) - Justin Gatlin chose to cooperate with the U.S. Anti-Doping Agency, a move that could help the sprinter's reputation but still imperils his eligibility for the Beijing Olympics.

USADA handed down an eight-year ban to Gatlin on Tuesday, the result of an agreement in which Gatlin accepts his positive tests for testosterone or other steroids but retains his right to appeal to an arbitration panel.

Despite the proactive stance and upcoming appeal by a runner who has championed the cause of drug-free competition, Gatlin's Olympic hopes are in jeopardy.

Even if his suspension were reduced to two years — a possibility if arbitrators agree with his arguments — it wouldn't be in time for the 2008 Olympic Trials.

"We're shooting for

something way less than two years," said Gatlin's attorney, Cameron Myler. "The goal is to have him back on the track as soon as possible."

World Anti-Doping Agency code calls for second-time offenders to receive a lifetime ban.

The eight-year penalty was handed down because Gatlin's first positive drug test, five years ago, was deemed an honest mistake and because he promised to cooperate with other investigations being conducted by doping authorities.

It was a small compromise by USADA, considering Gatlin is 24 and would be too old to compete when the ban is over.

The Olympic and world champion will also lose the world record he tied in May when he ran the 100 meters in 9.77 seconds.

U.S. looking to fine-tune as exit rounds approach

SAPPORO, Japan (AP) - The U.S. team won its first three FIBA world championships games by an average of 20.3 points.

The Americans hadn't trailed after halftime, and took a double-digit lead into the final quarter of each game.

But after cruising past Slovenia 114-95 on Tuesday night, the Americans said they still haven't peaked.

It's probably a good thing, too.

Because the competition promises to improve when

the tournament moves to the knockout stage this weekend.

The victory over Slovenia guaranteed the U.S. a berth in the second round.

"We just want to fine-tune all parts of our game," captain Dwyane Wade said.

"Offensively, we want to be a little more crisp. We want to continue to have a killer mentality. We were on the verge of beating this team by 30 or 40, but we kind of let them back in the game."

And when he appeals for a lesser penalty - some time in the next six months - he cannot argue the test was faulty.

"To his credit, it's recognition that the science is reliable," USADA general counsel Travis Tygart told The Associated Press. "Instead of wasting a bunch of resources attempting to create smoke where there's not any, he's acknowledging the accuracy of the positive test, and in exchange for his agreement to cooperate, we've recognized the nature of his first offense."

The first offense occurred while Gatlin was in college. He stopped taking medicine to treat attention-deficit disorder a few days before competition, but it didn't clear his system.

He received a two-year ban for that test, which was reduced by a year because of the "exceptional circumstances" of the offense.

"The nature of Gatlin's first offense for use of his medication puts this violation in a unique category," USADA chief executive officer Terry Madden said.

Gatlin has said he didn't know how steroids got into his system this time.

One of his attorneys, John Collins, said Gatlin would spell out his case at the arbitration hearing. He wouldn't discuss strategy.

"The last time this happened, he went to the panel and explained he neither cheated nor intended to cheat," said Collins, who helped get that first ban reduced.

"This time, we'll explain the full stack of circumstances and everything around it and, hopefully, we'll get a similar result."

He said the circumstances "indicate he deserves something far less than eight years, if anything."

Collins wouldn't confirm the argument would be based on claims by Gatlin's coach, Trevor Graham, who has contended Gatlin tested positive after a vengeful massage therapist used testosterone cream on the runner without his knowledge.

Graham has been involved with at least a half-dozen athletes who've received drug suspensions and has been barred from U.S. Olympic Committee

training sites.

The leader of USA Track and Field called Gatlin's case "a setback for our sport."

"While we are glad Justin has taken responsibility for his positive test and will cooperate in USADA's anti-doping efforts, we are sorely disappointed in him," USATF chief executive officer Craig Masback said in a statement.

USOC chairman Peter Ueberroth, meanwhile, said the penalty can be a positive.

"Since becoming an elite-level athlete, Justin has talked about the importance of eradicating doping in sport," Ueberroth said. "By acknowledging his doping positive and agreeing to work with USADA, Justin now has an opportunity to put those words into action. He can play a meaningful role in solving a problem that is reaching a crisis level in American sport."

USADA looks at this as a significant compromise.

The policing organization has a history of offering leniency to those who help in its fight against doping.

Though the agency doesn't name names, Gatlin could possibly help USADA by providing information on Graham, who has denied any direct involvement with performance-enhancing drugs.

"He accepted liability," Tygart said. "He agreed not to raise technical arguments or frivolous defenses. He has an opportunity to go to a panel of arbitrators and argue exceptional circumstances."

In this case, the exceptional circumstances could be that he was sabotaged, or has no idea how the steroids entered his system.

And if that defense doesn't work, Gatlin's willingness to cooperate could also be viewed in a positive light.

Graham's attorney, Joe Zeszotarski, released a statement supporting Gatlin.

"As Trevor has stated publicly, he completely supports Justin Gatlin and Justin's cooperation with USADA and efforts to get reinstated," Zeszotarski said.

"Trevor knows he has done nothing wrong in his relationship with Justin or any of his athletes, and only wants the truth to come out."

The U.S. led by as many as 29 points before the Slovenians pulled to within 11 in the final minutes.

The outcome was never in doubt, but Slovenia's rally exposed holes in the American defense.

The U.S., which has forced 64 turnovers in three games, has played superb defense at times.

But it hasn't maintained a high level through 40 minutes.

In the opener, the U.S. allowed Puerto Rico to shoot 54 percent from the floor. On Tuesday night, the Americans limited Slovenia to two 3-pointers in the first half, but later gave up several wide-open looks.

"Sometimes there's slippage, and that's something we're trying to work on and trying to get better," assistant coach Jim Boeheim said.

"We're giving up (95 points per game), but we're playing good defense. Because we're scoring so much, teams are going to score points too. We're actually playing, in stretches, really good defense."

Against Slovenia, the U.S. made a big leap in another area: long-range shooting.

The Americans made 50 percent (10-of-20) from beyond the 3-point arc against Slovenia after shooting 33 percent against Puerto Rico and 30 percent against China.

"We haven't shot the ball the way we know we can, so that's a positive for us," Wade said.

"Once they're falling, our strength, of course, is penetrating and also pressuring the ball. Once our 3s are falling, we're a pretty good team. We're a darned good team."

Still, Wade said he thought the U.S. took a small step backward from its second game, a 121-90 rout of China and Yao Ming on Sunday night.

"I think today we played in waves," said Wade, who leads the Americans with 19.7 points per game. "I think when we were playing good defensively today, we looked great."

"But we also looked average. This is only our third real game, besides exhibitions, together. We've still got games to get better."

The Americans are adjusting to coach Mike Krzyzewski's decision to divide the squad into two five-man units, with each playing about half of every quarter.

The rotation allows the U.S. to force an up-tempo game aimed at tiring the opponents.

"I don't know how much coach is going to keep it that way, but I like it," Wade said. "It gives us a chance to know that we're only going to be out there for five minutes, so go very hard. It's two different teams you see. It's helped us out tremendously."

It worked against Slovenia, whose starters matched the U.S. basket-for-basket early in the game. The U.S. built its lead against the bench.

"We've been able to play 10 guys, and I think that will help us in the long run in terms of wearing people down," Boeheim said.

Of course, the competition will improve dramatically in the knockout stage, which tips off this weekend in Saitama, outside Tokyo. That's why the U.S. doesn't want to be satisfied with three wins over mediocre opponents, even though there are plenty of reasons for optimism.

"We don't want to look through things with tinted glasses, but we've got a good feeling with this group," assistant coach Mike D'Antoni said.

"They want it. Now, having said that, it's still not going to be easy. The world's good. But they've done everything we've asked and more. It's really exciting right now."

No T.O. means more time for other receivers

SHREVEPORT, La. (AP) - Here's a juicy bit of news: Not having Terrell Owens the last few weeks actually has been a good thing for the Dallas Cowboys.

Don't get the wrong idea. The Cowboys definitely would've rather had their new lead receiver on the field, both to work with the

rest of the offense and to cut down on the chatter generated by his lingering hamstring problem.

But his absence has forced more balls to be thrown to the unproven players fighting for backup jobs, and that's helped coaches sort through one of the team's biggest concerns

of the preseason.

Undrafted rookie Sam Hurd and returning practice squad member Jamaica Rector seem to have taken the most advantage.

After showing enough in practice last week to earn playing time with starting quarterback Drew Bledsoe, both fit in well with the first-teamers in a 30-7 victory over the New Orleans Saints on Monday night.

Hurd caught three passes for 30 yards, including a 13-yard touchdown that he had to fight off a defensive back to grab. Rector had three catches for 32 yards, all on that same scoring drive, including a 5-yarder on third-and-4 from the 23 that he made despite his defender being flagged for pass interference.

"I'm excited about the way they have played," Cowboys owner Jerry Jones said. "It makes me feel good about me not breaking my neck to find another receiver."

Owens missed much of training camp because of a

hamstring injury that may require further evaluation this week. Patrick Crayton, the projected No. 3 receiver, also has been out with an injury. Players were off Tuesday, with practices resuming today at team headquarters.

It's uncertain whether Owens will join the club then or for the next preseason game, Saturday night at home against San Francisco. Coach Bill Parcells was in no mood to discuss T.O. after the Saints game.

"I'm tired of talking about it, I really am," Parcells said. "Let's talk about the guys who were here and played."

Terry Glenn was the most spectacular, providing a one-handed touchdown catch around his defender's head that should remind everyone Owens won't be Dallas' only game-breaking threat. He finished with 71 yards on four catches, showing no signs of problems with blisters that caused him to miss some time in training camp.

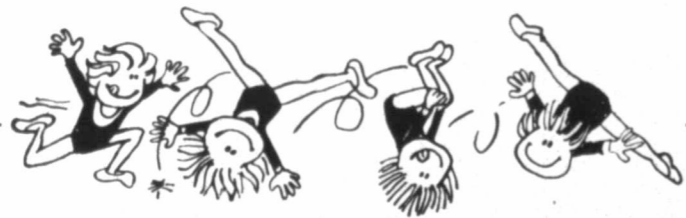
Nieve goes on DL

The Astros called up right-handed reliever Chris Sampson from Triple-A Round Rock, expecting him to arrive for the final game of the series on Wednesday afternoon. Sampson was optioned to the minors on Aug. 2.

Nieve strained his right elbow during his relief appearance Saturday at Milwaukee and hasn't pitched since. The Astros were hoping he would recover in less than two weeks, but needed immediate help in their bullpen.

Nieve went 3-3 with a 3.98 ERA in 11 starts and 17 relief appearances.
