The Panhandle Ground Water Conservation District board voted to increase their funds available for irrigation equipment purchases late last year and applied for the half million dollar loan from the state water development board, but that request was delayed when the water board's January meeting was delayed because of weather.

"They got iced out," Williams said of the winter weather that descended upon the Lone Star State in January.

The loan application was approved at the water board's February meeting last week, accord-

ing to Carla Daws of the Texas Water Development Board.

Williams said the loan program has helped almost 100 farmers in the Ground Panhandle Water Conservation District buy sprinkler systems for their cropland.

"It's a significant program," Williams said.

It also means a significant savings

in water, he said. The district covers all or parts of

nine counties, including Gray, Roberts, Donley, Carson, Armstrong, Potter, Hutchinson. Hemphill and Wheeler.





### Pampan jailed on drug charges

A Pampa man remains in Gray County Jail as of press time in lieu of \$116,000 bond after a traffic stop early Saturday.

Jonathan Paul Munn, 25, was stopped at 12:30 a.m. Saturday in the 400 block of North Christy by Gray County sheriff's deputies after they noticed him driving a vehicle in that vicinity. Munn was stopped because deputies knew warrants had been issued for his arrest on probation violations for two counts of possession of a controlled substance, said GCSO Lt. Joe B. Hoard.

"He was arrested and patted down, and deputies found controlled substances and marijuana on him," Hoard said.

The controlled substances are believed to be cocaine and methamphetamine, Hoard

### The whole human race is in a decline

I hope President George Bush will not be so stupid as to allow the Israelis to push him into an attack on Iran. Based on his past performance, however, I'm not sure what he will do.

Washington today is so riddled with intellectual dishonesty, you have to take what officials say with a large dose of salt. The statement "We have no plans to attack Iran" can mean nothing more than we haven't made that decision yet or we don't have plans to attack this week, but we do intend to attack by April.

The Pentagon, by the way, probably has had contingency plans for an attack for who knows how long. That's part of its job. It probably has contingency plans to attack a lot of countries. The point is that the military cut the feet off of all Iranian of Russian missiles, but if a plans, but the decisions are made by politicians.

If we do attempt to bomb Iran's nuclear facilities, it should provide a good test of Russia's air defense system, a version of

how well it works - though not, of course, for our pilots.

Given the enormous trouble Iraq and Afghanistan are giving us, it seems to me that it would be moronic to add an enemy of 70 million people to our list of unresolved military conflicts. An attack by America will, of course, reformers. Under attack, Iranians will rally around their leaders, just as human beings have been doing for centuries.

Another strategic problem worth wor-



rying about is the Bush administration's push to build and install an anti-ballistic mis-

sile system. The administration claims it is for defense against rogue states like Iran. The Russians and probably the Chinese see it differently.

They see the anti-ballistic system as a first-strike weapon. The system would be helpless against a launch

U.S. first strike could take out many of the Russian missiles, then the ABM system could so thin the surviving missiles that American officials might well be tempted to start a nuclear war. That's why Russia is upset with plans to put components of the system in Eastern Europe.

Never forget that intelligent military planners must disregard intentions and concentrate on capabilities. Intentions can change in minutes; capabilities cannot. So, if the U.S. deploys an ABM system that provides the capability to launch a first strike, the Russian planners will have to consider that as a fact and react

Sure, to some people this may seem to be "Oh, get a life" stuff, but for advocates of open government, it's an important step.

The Texas House of Representatives has begun putting copies of bills and their proposed amendments online during floor debates, updated in real time so anyone who wants to can follow the action as it takes place in Austin. Live video of those debates has been available online since 2001, but sometimes the process is a little hard to follow if you can't see the documents under dis-

cussion.

The new system is an expansion to the World Wide Web of the computerized displays that have long been available to members sitting at their desks in the House chambers.

Under rules adopted last month, the House also will speed up online publication of record vote reports. Texans will be able to see how their representatives voted within an hour of the

Both of these services rolled out last week through links on the Texas Legislature Online Web www.capitol.state.tx.us. Initially, they're in a test phase, but they seem to be working well. Any flaws are expected to be fixed by Thursday.

Over in the Senate, business is still done by distributing pieces of paper.

Anyone who is interested can watch online, but (for floor amendments especially) they can't read the words that lawmakers are arguing about. Vote results are reported in the Senate

Journal, usually online later in the day. No newspaper is going to argue against the value of words on paper, but spreading those words instantly by the Internet is an excellent advancement in technology and open government. Secretary of the Senate Patsy Spaw says that her side of the Capitol expects to work on delivering online displays of floor documents during the 2009 legislative session.

When it comes to how government works, more information to those who are governed is always good - and sooner is better.



### Stocks manage to stabilize, indexes trade in narrow range

NEW YORK (AP) — Wall Street managed to stabilize itself today, although investors remained nervous about mortgage defaults, a strengthening yen and tumbling stock mar-

The major indexes fluctuated as investors tried to size up where the market was headed, and as traders swooped in to take advantage of stocks left severely depressed by last week's big decline.

"Probably it's better to save any judgment on this market today until the last half hour," said Philip S. Dow, managing director of equity strategy at RBC Dain Rauscher in Minneapolis, noting that little has changed in terms of economic fundamentals, but that the market is still very volatile.

tomers with poor credit ratings were one of the many factors behind Wall Street's selloff. Those worries were rekindled Monday when HSBC Holdings PLC, Europe's largest bank, said its 2006 earnings rose 5 percent but that it suffered \$10.6 billion on losses on bad loans from its U.S. subprime mortgage operations.

Meanwhile, a rising yen added to concerns about an an erosion in the yen carry trade, which refers to the process of borrowing the low-yielding yen to acquire assets in other currencies with greater yields. A slowdown could hurt liquidity worldwide. By late morning, the U.S. dollar fell to 116.09 yen, up from its earlier lows near 115 but still well below its level less than a week ago above 120.

The Institute for Supply Management's index on the services sector gave investors little to cheer

lower than analysts' expected reading of 57.5 and January's reading of 59.0. Still, a reading above 50 indicates expansion, suggesting that U.S. service industries are still growing, albeit at a modest pace.

In late morning trading, the Dow Jones industrial average was up 56.56, or 0.47 percent, at 12,170.55, having fallen 75 in earlier trading.

Broader stock indicators were modestly higher. The \$tandard & Poor's 500 index was up 2.79, or 0.20 percent, at 1,389.96, and the Nasdaq composite index rose 2.12, or 0.09 percent, to 2,370.12.

Bonds were little changed, with the yield on the benchmark 10-year Treasury note at 4.50 percent, the same as late Friday. The dollar was higher against other major currencies except for the yen. Gold, though traditionally a safe-haven investment, continued to slide.

Oil prices dropped sharply, losing

\$1.29 to trade at \$60.35 a barrel on the New York Mercentile Exchange due to concerns about the world economy.

Investors appeared to have been somewhat consoled by comments attributed to U.S. Treasury Secretary Henry Paulson by Japan's finance minister, Koji Omi. Neither Omi nor Paulson, who began a three-nation Asian tour in Tokyo today, were concerned by the swings in regional stock markets, Omi told reporters in Tokyo. Both men contend the market mechanism was functioning well, Omi said.

Still, Asian and European stocks left U.S. investors nervous. The Nikkei fell for the fifth straight session to close down 3.3 percent, Hong Kong's Hang Seng index fell 4 percent and the Shanghai Composite Index, which has proven volatile in recent weeks, fell 1.6 percent.

accordingly. It is an exceedingly dangerous ploy by the president, not to mention an enormously expensive one.

As for Iraq, keep in mind the ABCs of guerrilla warfare. If we do, in fact, deploy all those additional troops to Baghdad (and that's not yet a certainty), the guerrillas will go to ground and simply wait us out or shift their attacks to other parts of the country. That's how it's always been when irregular forces are confronted by superior conventional power. Our own George Washington learned that lesson and became a master of retreating to prevent the British from destroying his army and the revolution.

Naturally, American officials will trumpet a great triumph and proclaim that the light at the end of the tunnel radiates from a glorious liberal democratic future for Iraq. That will be a load of horse apples. Iraq is so impoverished, so riddled by corruption and incompetence, so full of vicious sectarian strife, that the best the Iraqi people can hope for is a benign dictator.

Unfortunately, Middle East produces oil, dates, olives and pistachio nuts in abundance, but has so far been mighty short of benign dictators. Well, we've been awfully short on smart leaders. Maybe the whole human race is in

### Man says he dismembered wife

PETOSKEY, Mich. (AP) — A man authorities tracked down in the snow of a wilderness area confessed to killing and dismembering his wife, and described the "horrific" details surrounding her death, a sheriff said today.

Stephen Grant was recovering from hypothermia at a hospital today, a day after he was captured by authorities who pursued him to northern Michigan after he fled his home near Detroit.

Grant has been cooperating with investigators and telling them in detail how Tara Lynn Grant was killed and dismembered and where her remains were dumped, Macomb County Sheriff Mark Hackel said at a news conference today.

"He gave a very lengthy confession, laying out exactly what took place," Hackel said.

A female torso was discovered Friday in the garage Grant's home Washington Township, 30 miles north of Detroit. The torso, and other body parts found in a nearby park, were believed to be those of Tara Grant, a businesswoman and mother of two who disappeared last month.

"It's very horrific. What he had done to her was one of those things that I think people can only imagine by watching a movie or televi-

sion or actually seeing and reading about in some kind of a novel," Hackel said.

Tara Grant, 34, was last was seen alive Feb. 9. Her husband reported her missing five days later. Police say the couple had recently argued over her frequent business trips abroad, and Hackel said there was a confrontation between Stephen and Tara Grant at their home.

County Medical Examiner Daniel Spitz told the Detroit Free Press that preliminary autopsy results showed the woman likely died of strangulation before her body was dismembered. He said he would release official findings today.

The Grants' two children, a 6-year-old girl and a 4year-old boy, were staying with relatives.



# Dear Abby...

**DEAR ABBY:** As someone who has been dealing with diabetes for most of my life, I've made a point to have regular medical checkups to keep a close watch on my cholesterol, blood pressure and glucose levels. For a long time, I thought I was doing everything I could to stay healthy. What I didn't realize until I attended a free screening offered by the National Kidney Foundation was that diabetes is one of the leading causes of chronic kidney disease. This screening, called "KEEP" for Kidney Early Evaluation Program, is designed to detect kidney disease in the early stages in people like me who have diabetes and other health problems that put us at risk. I knew I had diabetes. But KEEP identified my chronic kidney disease, and I have since been taking measures to keep it under control. I have also learned that doctors do not routinely screen for kidney function. Twenty million Americans -- that's one in every nine adults -- have chronic kidney disease, and 20 million MORE Americans remain at risk. I'm writing to you, Abby, to ask you to let your readers know that if they suspect they have high blood pressure, diabetes or a family history of kidney disease, they, too, could be at risk. March 8 is World Kidney Day -- and it is the day the National Kidney Foundation is offering free KEEP screenings in 30 cities around the United States. World Kidney Day is not a "holiday." It's a time to find out your family's history, assess whether you might be at risk and get checked out. Hopefully, it is also a day people can celebrate the idea of enjoying long, healthier lives for themselves and those they love ... for KEEPS! -- ALMA McBRIDE, MERRITT ISLAND, FLA.

DEAR ALMA: Thank you for your helpful and informative letter. I, for one, was unaware that high blood pressure and diabetes -- in addition to a family history -could make people more vulnerable to kidney disease. She comes home and does Todd's laundry, cooks for him, cleans up after him and pays for everything. They have sex all the time, and it often wakes me up or keeps me awake at night. I am paying over \$1,000 a month, and I have reached the end of my rope. I don't know how to address it. Please help me. - TEARING MY HAIR **OUT IN ILLINOIS** 

**DEAR TEARING MY HAIR OUT:** It is time to inform your roommate that the situation has become intolerable, if you haven't already found the courage to do so. Your landlord might also want to weigh in on the discussion. I don't know what kind of lease you and Ally have, but it's time you read it closely. Many leases have clauses that restrict the number of days (and nights!) that "guests" may remain on the premises.







### Survivors of bus wreck in Georgia return to Ohio in mourning

TOLEDO, Ohio (AP) — Jon Betts stepped off a charter flight wearing the same baseball cap that his son wore when he died.

Betts returned home to Ohio on Sunday, two days after a bus crash in Georgia claimed the lives of his son, three of his Bluffton University baseball teammates and two others.

Since the accident, Betts said, he has spent a lot of time telling the players who came away with only minor injuries that "it was OK that they survived."

About 30 people walked off the flight - one player limping, another with his

arm in a sling — and greeted those waiting on the tarmac at Toledo Express Airport with hugs. A hearse drove to the back of the plane to transport two players' bod-

"He died doing what he loved and who he enjoyed being with," Jon Betts said of his son, David, a sophomore. "That's all that is important to us."

Also killed in Friday's crash were sophomore outfielder Tyler Williams of Lima; Scott Harmon, a freshman from Lima; and Cody Holp, a freshman from Arcanum. The driver and his wife, Jerome and Jean

Niemeyer, also died. The team from the

Mennonite-affiliated university was traveling to its annual spring training in Florida when the charter bus crashed before daybreak. The bus was carrying 35 student-athletes, coaches and bus drivers. The 1,200-student school will be closed this week for spring break.

Investigators said the driver apparently mistook an exit ramp for a regular lane, and the bus crashed into a barrier at a T-shaped intersection and plummeted off the overpass onto the highway

On Sunday, investigators

interviewed two players and a coach who were recovering from injuries.

One player said they had seen nothing unusual up until the time of the accident, and the driver was not talking on a cell phone or radio, said Kitty Higgins.

There are tire marks at the scene, but they do not suggest the driver slammed on his brakes, Higgins said. The bus showed no mechanical problems.

Georgia transportation officials said Sunday they had no immediate plans to close or add safety signs to the highway exit ramp where the bus crashed.

The state Department of Transportation wants to see recommendations from the NTSB before adding any new safety devices such as signs or stoplights to the Interstate ramp, spokesman David Spear said.

"We won't wait until their final published report. If during the course of their conversations it might make this better, we're going to act on it," he said.

There are two "Prepare to Stop" signs on the ramp, which exits off the left lane, and the same words are painted on the ramp itself, Spear said. The NTSB has

said that the accident site has had numerous crashes and can be difficult for drivers to navigate.

Fred Hanscom, director of independent consulting Transportation group Research Corp., said the ramp could have larger signs, a stoplight at the top or pavement grooves that make a noise to warn drivers to slow down.

"The fact that this ramp went almost parallel with the main line (of the interstate) was a confusing factor," Hanscom said. "Drivers normally expect ramps to go to the right and not the left."

## **Bloody Hansbrough leads** North Carolina past Duke

CHAPEL HILL, N.C. (AP) — Nothing like an airborne elbow and a bloody nose to inject even more energy into one of college basketball's most intense rivalries.

The always-ferocious Duke-North Carolina series found a new poster boy — Tyler Hansbrough, who left this game against the Blue Devils with 26 points, 17 rebounds and one bloodied face.

The eighth-ranked Tar Heels beat No. 14 Duke 86-72 on Sunday, but clearly the lasting memory of the game is that of the bloodstained star nickof his relentless intensity.

"It's not like a prize fight where you ask what the other guy looked like," North Carolina coach Roy Williams said. "He looked pretty bad."

In other Top 25 games, it was: No. 5 Florida 85, Kentucky 72; Creighton 67, No. 11 Southern Illinois 61; No. 16 Louisville 86, Seton Hall 71; and Clemson 75, No. 21 Virginia Tech 74.

The victory helped North Carolina (25-6, 11-5 Atlantic Coast Conference) clinch the No. 1 seed in the league tournament, and gave the Tar Heels their first regular-season sweep of the Blue Devils in 11 years.
