## DST has new changes this year

Daylight-saving time begins at 2 a.m.
Sunday so don't forget to "spring forward" Sunday so don't forget to "spring forward"
an hour. This event is happening one month an hour. This event is happening one month
earlier than usual this year due to the Energy earlier than usual this year due to the Energy
Policy Act of 2005 signed by President Policy Act of 2005 signed by President
George W. Bush.
The act changed the dates for daylightsaving time in the United States beginning
in 2007 to conserve energy. It will now in 2007 to conserve energy. It will now
begin on the second Sunday in March and begin on the second Sunday in March and
end on the first Sunday in end on the first Sunday in November,
Studies done by the U.S. Department Studies done by the U.S. Department of
Transportation show that daylight-saving Transportation show that daylight-saving
time trims the entire country's electricity usage by a small but significant amount, about one percent each day, due to less elec tricity being used for lighting and appliances in the evening when the sun stays up longer.
Acco
According to several studies, this time change also has a public health benefit. by close to one percent by having more day by close to one percent by having more day-
light hours. It also prevents crimes since
people do more errands and chores in day-
light rather than darkness, when more crime usually occurs.
Most people in the United States like this change that allows them to do more outside activities, but there are a few that oppose it.
People with sleep disorders find this tranPeople with sleep disorders find this tran-
sition difficalt. Some believe that severe sition difficalt. Some believe that severe
automobile accidents increase and work productivity decreases as people adjust to the time change. Protests are also put forth by those who wake at dawn or whose schedules are tied to sunrise, such as farmers. Benjamin Franklin, while a minister to France, first suggested the idea of daylight-
saving time in an essay titled "An Economical Project for Diminishing the Cost of Light," which was first published in 1784. More than 100 years passed before it was suggested again by Englishman
William Willett in 1907 , William Willett in 1907, when he wrote a
pamphlet called "The Waste of Daylight." pamphlet called "The Waste of Daylight."

TYC employee suspected of withholding information

Associated Press Writer AUSTIN (AP) - A Texas Youth Commission employee was suspended with pay Friday after allegations surraced that he redacted information in
documents related to an investigation of a West Texas State School caught in he middle of an expanding sex abuse scandal and alleged cover-up.
Ray Worsham, the TYC youth care investigator, had participated in an
internal investigation into allegations the school in Pyote.
"There were allegations that he had done some unauthorized redacting of
documents," said TYC spokesman Jim documents," said TYC spokesman Jim Hurley. "I can't comment on the legality of what was done, but ethically it's wrong. No state e eployee should ev
