

Morning fire destroys tank battery, oil

A fire about 9:30 a.m. this morning on Naida Street could be seen from miles away. A tank battery, which is a group of holding tanks close to one another, caught fire and put off a lot of black smoke.

Firefighters were dispatched to the fire which was fully engulfed when they arrived. The cause of the fire may have been caused by lightning which accompanied the strong thunderstorm that came through early this morning.

According to Donny Hooper, assistant director of public works, the tanks contained approximately 200 gallons of oil.

When the owner of the tanks was contacted, he told the fire department to just let the fire burn itself out, which they did. Firefighters stayed

CRMWA allocates 1.4 billion gallons of water for Pampa

PLAINVIEW -- The Canadian River Municipal Water Authority has allocated about 1.4 billion gallons of water to Pampa for 2008.

That's a rough estimate, but the CRMWA board of directors meeting here Wednesday allocated water from Lake Meredith and their John C. Williams Well Field in Roberts County to its 11-member cities.

Presented with three options by

80,000 acre-feet to 85,000 acre-feet per year over the next four years, the board of directors selected the most conservative option. They elected to allocate 80,000 acre-feet from both Lake Meredith and the John C. Williams Well Field to be distributed among the member cities across the

Texas Panhandle and South Plains.
While the projection was based on 50,000 acre-feet of water from the well field and 30,000 acre-feet from the lake, the board gave the water authority management the flavibility.

to decide the mixture of water from the two sources depending upon the circumstances of the resources, noting that the allotments could be reassessed in the future as needed. That could alter the amount of water Pampa may draw from CRMWA.


The city of Pampa is contractually entitled to 7.163 percent of the water produced from Lake Meredith and 3.6 percent of the water produced from the well field.

A change in the mix would alter the amount of water Pampa would be allocated, but using the projected 50,000 acre-feet projected on paper at Wednesday's meeting, that would be about 2,148 acre-feet from the lake and 1,800 acre-feet from the well field, or about 3,948 acre-feet for the year. That is well in excess of projected demand.

There are 325,851 gallons in an acre-foot of water.

That may be a moot point since Pampa has never used its entire

Daycare closed with baby left inside alone

DALLAS (AP) — A woman arrived at her child's daycare center to find the building closed with her 14-month-old daughter locked inside alone, authorities said.

The Texas Department of Family and Protective Services and Dallas police are investigating how the girl was left alone for nearly two hours Tuesday night. She was asleep in a high chair and was not injured, according to state officials.

"I was so upset," said the girl's mother, Ashley Hunter. "I was never going to put my child in day care. She had only been there three weeks."

Hunter said she couldn't get past the gate blocking the driveway at L&S Early Childhood Learning Academy and called police. Rescue workers broke the door to get the girl, according to a police report.

Spokeswoman Marissa Gonzales said Family and Protective Services, which licenses child-care centers, has not determined whether it will take action against the center.

Depending on the agency's findings, sanctions might include temporarily closing the center, revoking its permit or excluding the responsible caregivers from working with children there, she

Shirley Ray, the center's owner, could not be reached for comment Wednesday.

The police report said the owners told police the last person left the facility at 6 p.m. and did not realize the child was still there.

Dallas police Sgt. Brenda Nichols said Wednesday that police hadn't decided whether to file criminal

"It appears that it was just a communication breakdown in that nobody realized that that child was still there," Nichols said.

Bush critical of lawmakers for OK'ing Armenia genocide vote

WAŞHINGTON (AP) — The Bush administration, chafing over a House committee vote to label as genocide the deaths of Armenians a century ago, said today lawmakers could better spend their time passing legislation attending to today's problems at

White House deputy press secretary Scott Stanzel reiterated the administration's disappointment with the vote by the House Foreign Affairs Committee and said it would be problematic for American efforts in the

"While the House is debating the Ottoman Empire, they are not moving forward with appropriations bills," said Stanzel. "The House has not appointed conferees, they aren't coming to the table to discuss children's health care, and they haven't permanently closed the intelligence gap that will open up when the Protect America Act

Meanwhile, the administration is trying to soothe Turkish anger over the vote. The foreign affairs panel defied warnings by President Bush with its 27-21 vote Wednesday to send the Armenian measure to

the full House for a vote. The administration will now try to pressure Democratic leaders not to schedule a vote, though it is expected

Hours before the vote, Bush and his top two Cabinet members and other senior officials made last-minute appeals to lawmakers to reject the measure.

"Its passage would do great harm to our relations with a key ally in NATO and in the global war on terror," Bush said.

Turkey's President Abdullah Gul criticized the decision to move the measure toward a vote in the House.

"Unfortunately, some politicians in the United States have once again sacrificed important matters to petty domestic politics despite all calls to commonsense," said Gul; according to the state-run news agency Anatolia. "This unacceptable decision by the committee, like its predecessors, has no validity or respectability for the Turkish nation.

In London today, visiting Defense Secretary Robert Gates told reporters the measure will damage U.S.-Turkish relations at a time when U.S. forces in Iraq are relying heavily on Turkish permission to use their airspace for U.S. air cargo flights.

Databases not so hard to understand, learn

Let's dive into a brand new subject, shall we? The topic dujour is "databases." Now, before you run screaming into the night, give me a chance. I know this subject can get really technical really quick, but I will be taking it step-by-step. Anyone can learn to create and use databases. Trust me!

In the business world, the three main applications you run into are the Word Processor, the Spreadsheet Program, and the Database Manager. Most people use the Microsoft Office Suite of software, so the word processor is simply called, 'Word," the Spreadsheet Program is called, "Excel" and the Database Manager is called "Access."

Microsoft Word is the easiest to learn, followed by Excel, and finally, in a very

distant third, Access. Why is that? Why are databases so difficult to learn? The main reason may, lie in all the new lingo you have to learn BEFORE you use the program. Hopefully,

this next series of columns to search quickly through the will ease you into the database genre without too much grief. So, if you're ready, let's go!

A database is simply a collection of information, organized in such a way as to make it easy to search and retrieve individual items quickly. For instance, the phone book could be catego-

rized as a database. It Eric is a collection of **Spellmann** names, Columnist addresses and phone numbers, sorted

alphabetically. You manually search this database, by flipping pages until you find the exact number you need. A computerized database is exactly the same, except it handles the chore of actually "searching" for the one piece of data you are looking for. And believe me, the computer is much faster than you

In order for the computer

data, the data must be organized. In the example of the phone book, each name must be tied to an address and a phone number. In addition, the names must be sorted alphabetically. If they weren't, you would have to scan EVERY name to find your match. And that would take a LONG time. To sum it

up, databases do two things: 1) They link information together (name, address, phone num-

ber), and 2) they sort it to allow easy searching. Is it making sense, yet? Great! (I assumed positive response.) Let's learn more lingo ...

A database is a collection of tables. A table is a collection of records. And a record is a collection of fields. I know, I know, that was a bit much to swallow. Let me break it down. The phone

book is a good example of a table. Each person's entry in that table is a record. Each person's record is made up of three fields - name, address and phone number. Earlier, I mentioned that a database is a collection of

Sometimes, as is the case with the phone book, a database has only one table. We call that database a "flat file." It is the simplest of structures and is very easy to create. However, it lacks efficiency, and can even lead to serious, space-wasting repetition. As an example, let's say you were setting up a database to track your baseball cards. It would probably include the following fields: player name, stats, team, home stadium, uniform colors, mascot, and

So, for all of your Texas Rangers cards, you would have to enter the same team name, home stadium, uniform colors, and mascot

El Paso Times on preventive medical measures for pets:

Parvovirus is always, or should be, a concern for dog owners.

But local veterinarians are warning that with seasonal temperature changes and wetter weather probable, dog owners - especially those with puppies should be aware that the disease could

become more of a concern. According to an American Veterinary Medical Association Web page, canine parvovirus (which cannot be spread to humans) attacks the gastrointestinal tract and can also cause

heart damage in young or unborn pup-

Fortunately, there is a vaccination available to help protect your dog against parvo. Be sure to ask your veterinarian about a vaccination program for your pet.

But you can play an important role in protecting your companion, too.

Because the virus is spread largely by the dog ingesting the virus that is present in the feces of an infected canine, practicing good hygiene is vital. Some steps to remember:

Keep cages and pet carriers clean. Clean up droppings as soon and as often as possible.

Dogs love to sniff "messages" left by their peers. Don't allow this because they could be sniffing the droppings of

an infected dog.

- You can be the "carrier" and infect your dog if you carry the virus in on your shoes or clothing.

Watch for symptoms of parvo, including, according to the AVMA, lethargy; loss of appetite; fever; vomiting; and severe, often bloody, diarrhea. If any of these symptoms show up, take your dog to the veterinarian immediate-

Parvovirus can cause your companion a lot of suffering and possibly a cruel death. Do all you can to prevent



each time for each record! What a pain! Enter, the relational database. Listen up, folks. This is where it really gets good. To prevent having to type the team information over and over, I could split up the data into two tables, players and teams. The players table would contain the following fields: Player name, team name, stats and year. The team table would contain the team name, home stadium, uniform colors and mascot. Did you notice that the two tables had one field in common? That's right, the "team name."

By linking those two fields together, we link the tables. That way, we only have to enter the team information once, but can link it to multiple player records. In the future, when you enter a new Texas Ranger player, all you have to type is the team name (Texas Rangers), and your computer can pull up the relevant team information from the other table.

As you probably guessed, this saves you a lot typing. It also increases your data entry accuracy. (Could you type those uniform colors flawlessly 20-plus times?) Yeah, me neither. Relational databases are extremely efficient, but only if you apply some forethought BEFORE you start building them. As an example, perhaps you ought to split the player name field into two fields, first name and last name. That way, you can easily sort by the last name for your

Also, if you notice many of the records contain repeating information, consider putting that repetitive data into its own table. By the way, the process of spreading your data amongst multiple relational tables is called "normalizing the data." Remember that the next time you are at a party and want to impress your friends ...

I know that's a lot of information to digest, so I'll stop for now. But join me next week as I show you how to create your first database in Microsoft Access. I'll see you in Cyberspace!

As you read this article today, the folks at the High Plains Epilepsy Association would like to encourage you to think about some of the things each of us take for granted.

Most of you got up this morning, got dressed and then drove yourself to work. Driving a car is something most of us take for granted.

The ability to operate a car gives us some sense of control over our lives. Imagine that one day you woke up and lost that control. That is exactly what happened to one of the association's clients.

Martin was a truck driver. He loved driving. He and his wife had only been married for a few years, and they had just had a baby. One day while Martin was working, he had

He was not seriously injured, but because of the accident he began having seizures. Because he was having seizures, he lost his driver's license. Without a driver's license, he could no longer drive a truck.

The seizures continued. He saw a neurologist, and he took his medication, but sometimes with epilepsy the first medication is not always effective.

The doctor tried other medications and combinations of medications. The process of trying to determine what medication will work best can sometimes take years.

Martin's wife felt that this was more than she bargained for. Martin was having 30 to 40 seizures a month. He was not able to work, and she did not feel she could take care of him and their son. She left and took their son with her to another state.

Martin moved in with his parents. After a few months, his parents asked him to leave. The severity of his seizures frightened them, and they did not want the responsibility of caring for him.

With winter fast approaching, Martin found himself homeless. Not only was he homeless, he had no way to pay for his medication or doctor's visits. HPEA was able to assist Martin by purchasing his medication and paying for his doctor's visits. The social worker for HPEA networked with other United Way agencies to obtain food, clothing and temporary shelter for Martin.

Because of your generosity to the United Way, Martin is a success story. He is living in a small apartment. He is still not able to work, but he hopes to be able to one day when his seizures are under control.

Martin is currently have about 10- to 12seizures a month. He is working with his neurologist to find the right combination of medication for him. As winter approaches again, his is appreciative that he will not have to worry about a roof over his head or something warm to eat.



Under the current Texas Family Code, Chapter 6, Section 6.206: "A marriage is void if a party is a current or former stepchild or stepparent of the other party." Therefore, under current Texas law, "Smitten" and his stepmother could not achieve a legally binding marriage. 

In the #1 and #2 boys singles spots, Jack Ware and Kevin Frels won their matches against Brandon Montgomery and Sean McElwain, respectively.


Ware defeated Montgomery 1-6, 6-1 (10-6) Frels defeated McElwain 7-5, 3-6 (10-8).

American cyclist Floyd Landis will appeal doping ruling in last-chance bid to keep Tour de France title

Floyd Landis has one more chance to regain his 2006 Tour de France title. Like almost every other campaign he has waged in this long struggle, he'll be starting from behind.

The American cyclist decided Wednesday to try to regain his championship at the Court of Arbitration for Sport — the top court for sports — hoping arbitrators there will reverse an earlier decision to ban him for two years and strip him of his title for using performance-enhancing drugs.

"I hope that the arbitrators of the case will fairly address the facts showing that the French laboratory made mistakes, which resulted in a false positive," Landis said. "Although the process of proving my innocence has been difficult for me and my family, I will not stop trying to prove my innocence."

The CAS confirmed Thursday that it had received Landis' appeal. The American rider requests the

CAS to annul the AAA decision," the court said in a brief statement.

Landis will, once again, be an underdog in this case, just as he was when he went into the first arbitration hearing, and when he began his sensational

comeback during Stage 17 of last year's race. The appeal surely will cost hundreds of thousands of dollars, though probably not millions, because much of the evidence already has been established and heard.

Travis Tygart, the CEO for the U.S. Anti-Doping Agency, said he couldn't guess on the cost of the appeal until he had seen some of the legal filings in the A three-person CAS panel, appointed

from a pool of international arbitrators, is expected to begin the hearing within three to six months. The same parties USADA attorneys and the Landis camp, led by attorney Maurice Suh will present their cases in what is expected to be a closed hearing in Lausanne, Switzerland, after which the CAS arbitrators will issue a final deci-

Last month, a panel sponsored by the American Arbitration Association ruled against Landis, upholding the results of a test that showed he used synthetic testosterone to fuel his spectacular comeback Tour victory. That decision meant Landis had to forfeit his title and is subject to a two-year ban, retroactive to Jan. 30.

A ceremony is scheduled Monday in

Madrid, where Landis' yellow jersey will be awarded to second-place finisher Oscar Pereiro. The International Cycling Union declared Pereiro the winner a day after last month's ruling.

If Landis loses his final appeal, he'll remain the first person in the 105-year history of the Tour to lose the title because of a doping offense.

The arbitrators ruled against Landis even though they found numerous problems with procedures followed at the French lab that analyzed his urine.

"Properly applied, the recording of substantial errors without rebuttal from USADA should have resulted in Floyd being vindicated," Suh said. "So, once you get to this point, it's difficult to take too much comfort from their statements."

In a news release on the Floyd Fairness Fund Web site, Landis said: "Knowing that the accusations against me are simply wrong, and having risked all my energy and resources including those of my family, friends and supporters - to show clearly that I won the 2006 Tour de France fair and square, I will continue to fight for what I know is right."

Ochoa faces challenging field; Wie healthy again



We will then turn off the seat belt sign." Without a sound, all went as requested. I noticed the sergeant saluting the casket as it was brought off the plane. His action made me realize that I am proud to be an American. So here's a public "Thank you" to our military men and women for what you do so we can live the way we do."
