Gray grand jury returns 13 more indictments

A Gray County grand jury handed up 13 indictments Monday in 223rd District Court, including three second-degree felonies, five third-degree felonies and five state jail felonies.

Tim T. Lewis, 28, was indicted for possession of marijuana. Bond on the second-degree felony was set at \$10,000.

On Dec. 13, 2006, Lewis allegedly possessed 2,000 pounds or less but more than 50 pounds of marijuana.

Lionel Ray Nash, 23, was indicted for possession of a controlled sub-

stance. Bond on the second-degree felony was set at \$10,000.

On Sept. 3, 2006, Nash allegedly possessed four grams or more but less than 200 grams of cocaine.

Jose O. Rodriguez, 53, was indicted for possession of marijuana. Bond on the second-degree felony was set at \$25,000.

On May 4, 2006, Rodriguez allegedly possessed 2,000 pounds or less but more than 50 pounds of marijuana.

Shawleen Michelle Brown, 31, was indicted for theft over \$1,500 and under \$20,000, enhanced. Bond on the third-degree felony was set at

\$5,000.

On Jan. 9, Brown allegedly unlawfully appropriated two gold rings valued at more than \$1,500 but less than \$20,000 from the owner with intent to deprive the owner of the property.

On Sept. 20, 2004, Brown was convicted in 47th District Court in Potter County of the state jail felony of possession of a controlled substance.

Forrest Gilchrist King, 25, was indicted for two counts of assaulting a public servant. Bond on each of the third-degree felonies was set at \$7,500, for total bond of \$15,000.

On March 11, King allegedly intentionally, knowingly or recklessly caused bodily injury by assaulting a Gray County deputy and a Gray County correctional officer while the two officers were attempting to restrain King.

Kam Dixon King, 34, was indicted for possession of marijuana. Bond on the third-degree felony was set at \$10,000.

On Feb. 6, Kam King allegedly possessed 50 pounds or less but more than five pounds of marijuana.

Terence Wayland Tillmon, 34, was indicted for possession of a controlled substance. Bond on the third-degree felony was set at \$5,000.

Bogus e-mail on traffic laws making rounds

The Department of Public Safety reports that a bogus e-mail concerning new traffic laws is making the rounds in cyberspace.

One of the laws that has generated the most interest is one that deals with an alleged hands-free law for cellular telephones.

"This e-mail is completely false and inaccurate," said Trooper Wayne Beighle, public information officer in Amarillo.

"I am sure there are some new traffic laws which have been passed," he said. "These will generally go into effect in September. New Laws start Sept. 1, Not in July."

Trooper Daniel Hawthorne, public information officer in Clarendon, said the e-mail cites the following laws erroneous laws

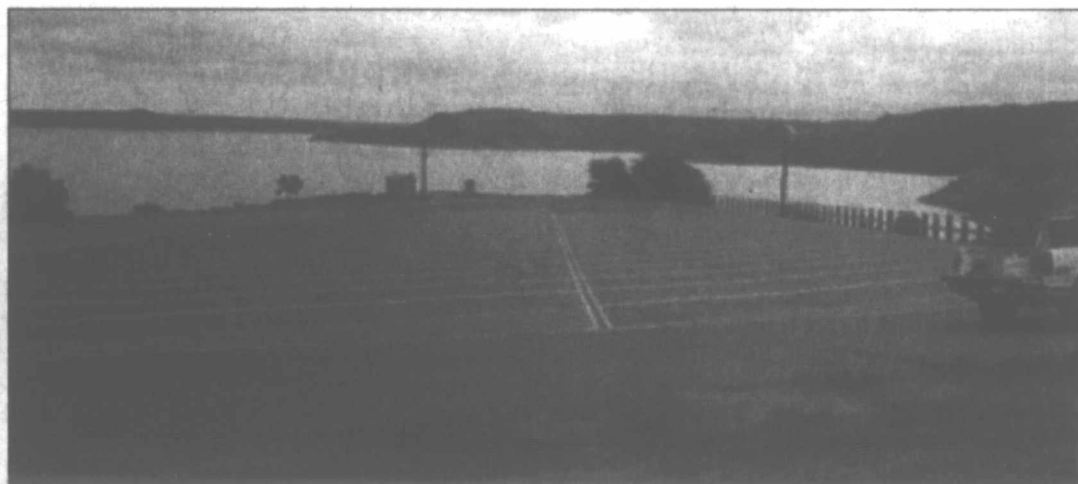

Computer error leads to wrong payments for ex-Enron workers

HOUSTON (AP) — More than 20,000 former Enron Corp. employees who finally received the first payment from a portion of millions in retirement funds lost during the company's collapse have been told they were either overpaid or underpaid because of a computer glitch.

Now some ex-workers might have to pay back money if they got too much. Last year, former Enron workers received about \$89 million, the first payment that is part of a lawsuit settlement over money they lost through Enron's employee stock ownership and 401(k) plans.

But nearly \$22 million of the initial payment was miscalculated, said Harlan Loeb, spokesman for Enron, now known as Enron Creditors Recovery Corp.

About 7,700 ex-workers were overpaid, and about 12,800 were underpaid. But they won't know their fate until the recalculation is finished.

Border Patrol agent shoots migrant in El Paso tunnel

EL PASO, Texas (AP) — A Border Patrol agent shot and wounded a migrant who was crossing illegally into the U.S. through a drainage tunnel early Tuesday, the U.S. Border Patrol said.

The agent, who was not identified, responded with his partner after a motion sensor was tripped and a group of migrants was spotted going into the tunnel, Border Patrol spokesman Doug Mosier said.

The two agents encountered a group of people in the tunnel around 12:30 a.m. One of the agents fired a shot after a migrant made a motion toward him, Mosier said. The bullet struck the migrant in the left arm, Mosier said, and he was taken to a hospital where he had surgery to remove the bullet and was expected to be sent back to Mexico after being released from the hospital, Mosier said.

The Mexican Consulate was notified about the incident. El Paso Police, the Border Patrol Sector Evidence Team, and the FBI will conduct separate investigations into the cause of the shooting, Mosier said.

Carthage soldier dies in Iraq

CARTHAGE, Texas (AP) — A 26-year-old soldier from Carthage died in Iraq last week when an improvised explosive device struck his vehicle, the U.S. Department of Defense said Tuesday.

Spc. James Lee Adair was assigned to the 1st Battalion, 28th Infantry Regiment, 4th Infantry Brigade Combat Team, 1st Infantry Division at Fort Riley, Kan.

He died Friday in Baghdad.

Adair attended Carthage schools and played football there. He and Chelsea Nation married July 15. Their first child is expected in September.

Guardsmen indicted in migrant smuggling operation

LAREDO, Texas (AP) — Three National Guard soldiers accused of running an immigrant smuggling operation have been indicted on five counts of human smuggling and one count of conspiracy to transport undocumented immigrants, the U.S. Attorney's Office said.

Federal authorities say Sgt. Julio Cesar Pacheco, Sgt. Clarence Hodge Jr. and Pfc. Jose Rodrigo Torres used cell phone text messages to coordinate transporting van loads of illegal immigrants through a border-area checkpoint.

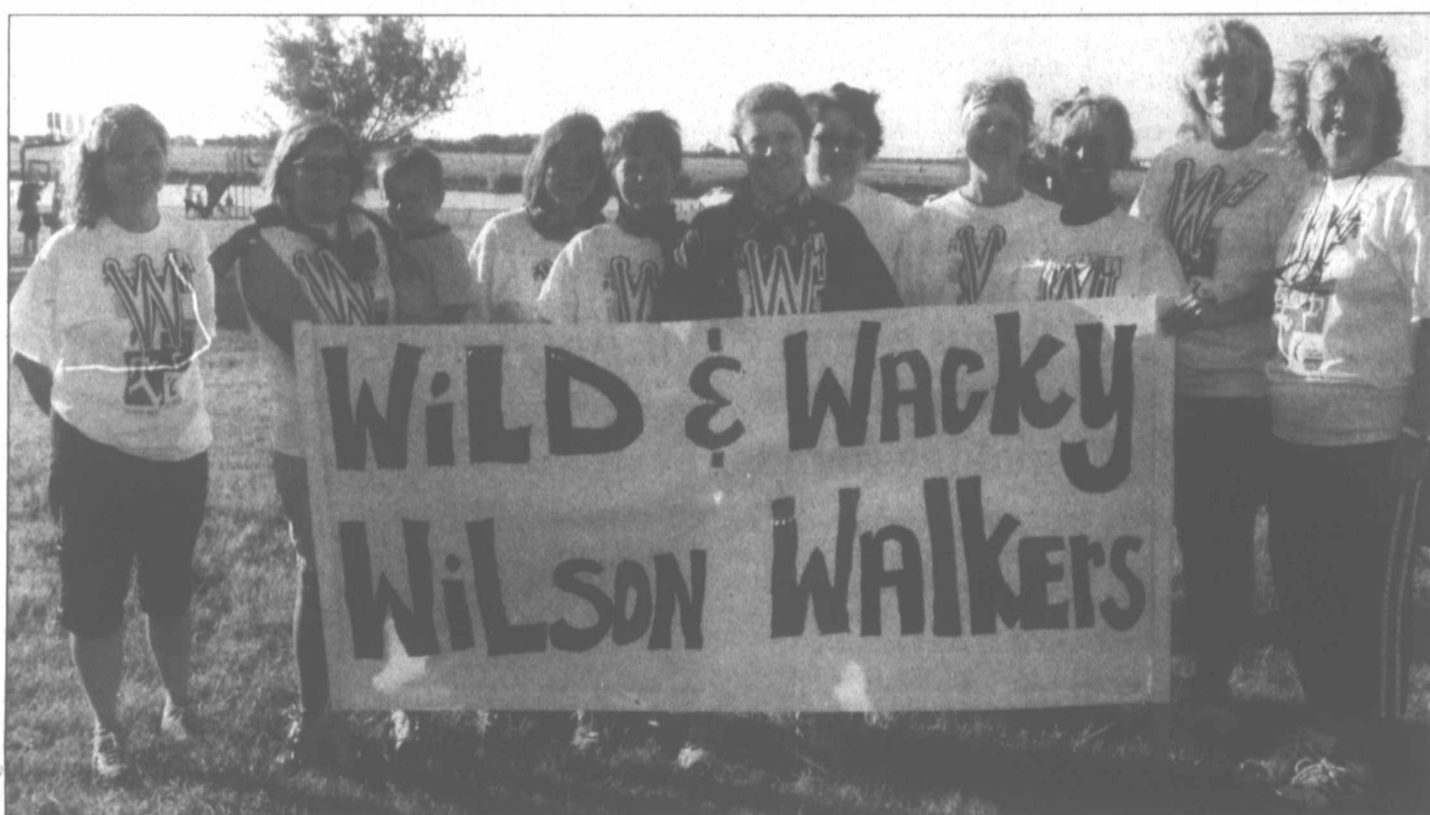

Officials: New disputes likely to delay oil bill

BAGHDAD (AP) — Sunni Arab and Kurdish politicians and a powerful Shiite party said Wednesday they had not agreed to a draft bill to regulate the country's oil industry, raising the possibility of new delays in a major piece of benchmark legislation sought for months by the United States.

It appeared unlikely parliament would begin debate on the measure Wednesday as Prime Minister Nouri al-Maliki had announced it would. A day earlier, al-Maliki said his Cabinet had approved the draft bill and was sending it to the legislature.

American officials are hoping that passage of the oil bill and companion legislation to distribute oil revenues will help rally Sunni support for the government and reduce backing for the insurgents.

But deep differences between Sunnis, Shiites and Kurds in al-Maliki's coalition have frustrated attempts to get a

draft to parliament, and despite al-Maliki's optimism they appeared still unresolved.

Only 24 of the Cabinet's 37 members were present for the vote because of boycotts by ministers from the Sunni Iraqi Accordance Front and the Shiite bloc local to anti-American cleric Muqtada al-Sadr. Both groups have separate political disputes with al-Maliki.

An Accordance Front leader warned Wednesday that no draft should be considered until the Sunnis sign on.

"Any draft law that is approved in the absence of the Iraqi Accordance Front only represents the groups that approved it," Khalaf al-Ilyan told al-Sharqiya television. "If there are some who want to cancel the voices of half of the Iraqi people then they take the responsibility."

The head of the Sadrist bloc in parliament, Nassar al-Rubaie, said, "We reject this copy of the oil and gas draft law because it left nothing of Iraq's unity."

The Kurds said they had neither seen nor approved the final text and would oppose it if it made "material and substantive changes" to an outline agreed upon during weeks of negotiations.

"We hope that the Cabinet is not approving a text with which the (Kurdish administration) disagrees because this would violate the constitutional rights of the Kurdistan region," the Kurdistan Regional Government said in a statement.

Al-Rubaie and Kurdish legislator Mahmoud Othman said parliament was unlikely to start debate on the measure Wednesday. Together, the Accordance Front, the Sadrists and the Kurdish parties hold 127 of parliament's 275 seats — not enough to defeat the measure on their own, but passage of it over such large opposition would mean a failure of the legislation's broader goal, reconciliation between the groups.

Forecasters predict wet holiday

The Fourth of July was shaping up to be another soggy day for much of Texas, with meteorologists predicting heavy rains and the possibility of flash flooding across the region.

Weeks of rain were already taking a toll on Independence Day festivities as authorities closed lakes in Central Texas and residents of North and East Texas cleaned up from Tuesday flooding.

"We're going to see one of our heavier rain days of this event," meteorologist Monte Oaks said this morning.

"Especially considering we're engaging in all of the holiday festivities. It's going to really cramp the holiday," said Oaks, a forecaster with the Austin-San Antonio office of the National Weather Service.

More showers and thunderstorms were likely today from South Texas to Austin, Dallas-Fort Worth and Houston, the National Weather Service said. No flash flooding problems were reported overnight.

On Tuesday, torrential downpours led to fast-rising water that forced the rescues of people from water-logged vehicles in Tarrant and Hunt counties.

In one case, a 70-year-old man's car

stalled in high water on a Hunt County road. After getting swept off the top of a car, he grabbed onto a tree. He was in the water about four hours before being saved by game wardens, said Richard Hill, Hunt County's emergency management coordinator.

Heavy rains flooded out cars and temporarily closed portions of Interstate 820 in Fort Worth, backing up traffic for miles during the evening rush hour. Watauga police Lt. Phillip Adams said water was reported in about eight houses there. Aerial footage from television helicopters showed waters rushing down streets, people being rescued from chest-high waters and houses looking like islands dotting the wet landscape.

Portions of the bank along Fossil Creek in Haltom City continued to crumble into the water, bringing more worries for homeowners who saw their backyards disappearing.

With more rain on the way, the Texas National Guard said it was poised to offer additional assistance, including 70 soldiers and 30 vehicles, to Wichita Falls. The Texas State Guard has set up shelters.

Heavy rainfall and runoff this week caused the failure of a section of waste-

water pipeline adjacent to Blessing Branch Creek, a tributary of Bear Creek, on the south side of Dallas-Fort Worth International Airport.

The Trinity River Authority said about 100,000 gallons of wastewater flowed into Blessing Branch. No public water supplies were threatened or contaminated.

The North Texas Municipal Water District ended more than two years of mandatory water restrictions because it said all area lakes are at capacity.

Storms are blamed for at least 11 deaths in Texas since mid-June.

President Bush declared Texas a major disaster area Friday, ordering federal aid for six counties. Officials in Parker County have asked to be added to that list.

Gov. Rick Perry declared disaster areas in 37 counties.

Boat ramps at Lake Grapevine in the Dallas area were all shut down due to high water.

Lakes LBJ, Marble Falls, Inks and Travis will be closed for recreational boating through the holiday, Lower Colorado River Authority officials said Tuesday. Recreational boating is being permitted on Lake Buchanan.

School board meet scheduled

Construction projects will be the main focus of a special board meeting called by the Pampa Independent School District for 5 p.m. Thursday at Carver, 321 W. Albert.

The board will review the projects, possibly grant designated residents access to construction sites and possibly approve an amendment to the construction project budget.

Also on the agenda, is the discussion of the 2007-2008 PISD goals and possible action regarding tree removal at Pampa High School.

Arrest made in Austin beating death

AUSTIN (AP) — Police said the arrest of a 20-year-old man in connection with the beating death of a house painter was expected to be the first of several arrests in the case.

Kurtiss Colvin was arrested Tuesday on a charge of manslaughter stemming from the June 19 death of David Rivas Morales, Austin police said. Morales died of blunt-force trauma to the head after being attacked while trying to protect a driver who had struck and injured a toddler.

Colvin was being held in the Travis County Jail on felony charges of manslaughter and theft and a misdemeanor charge of assault, police said. His bond was set at \$215,000.

Police Sgt. Hector Reveles said witnesses told investigators that Colvin, a former high school track star and Golden Gloves boxer, hit Morales at least once and took his wallet after he was incapacitated.

A jail official said records available Tuesday night did not list an attorney for Colvin.

Morales, 40, had just been dropped off at an East Austin apartment complex when the driver who had given him a ride struck a 2-year-old boy, according to police.

The driver got out of the car to check on the child and was confronted by several people. When they attacked the driver, Morales tried to intervene and was attacked as well.

The toddler, Michael Hosea Jr., was not seriously hurt.

"The investigation is definitely far from over," Reveles said. "We have talked to a lot of people. And we believe there are several more people that are involved."

Police decided to charge Colvin with manslaughter rather than murder because it would probably be difficult to prove that he intended to kill Morales, Reveles said.

Don't trust the libs' version of free speech ...

When my father Ronald Reagan said one of his mottoes was "trust but verify," he was talking about dealing with the Soviet Union. If he was talking about present-day Washington, I think he'd simply say, "Don't trust — ever."

He'd have good reason. Some of the people running things today would steal the pennies off a dead man's eyes, and then claim they needed it to make everybody's life better.

Look at the current furor over the (fortunately) now-dead Comprehensive Immigration Reform bill, sold so deceptively it would shock the worst snake-oil salesman.

Last year's attempt to enact a similar bill failed, so

the powers-that-be decided to make another try of imposing this ill-begotten piece of legislation on the nation. Under the leadership of the feckless Sen. Harry Reid, the supporters got together and tossed out all the Senate's time-honored procedures by crafting the bill not in committee but in secret, behind closed doors, and then sought to ram their 800-page bill down the throats of their fellow senators before any of them had a chance to study it.

Standing on the floor of the Senate, Sen. Jim Bunning, R-Ky., said: "Here we go again. Three weeks ago a significant majority of the Senate rejected this flawed immigration bill and the flawed process that lead

to it. But now it is back. It just won't go away.

"One of the key reasons the bill failed the first time around was the flawed process, or the lack of process, that led to the bill. In the Senate, an idea normally takes months if not years to become a bill and pass. But instead of letting the bill develop through a deliberative process, a few Senators wrote the bill in secret. They held no committee hearings. There was no committee report. In fact, Senators did not even see the actual bill until several days into the

debate."

Bunning, a storied member of the Baseball Hall of Fame, threw a strike across the plate when he noted that "the Majority Leader is taking an unprecedented step to shut off the rights of Senators to debate and amend a bill. That is not the Senate."

The bill died, but not because the powers-that-be wanted it to, but because the vast majority of Americans wanted it dead. They had the good sense not to trust the powerful forces behind it, and they prevailed because trustworthy men such as Jim Bunning stood

with them.

We'll need men like Jim Bunning to stop the liberals now running the Congress from depriving us of our freedom of speech.

Left-wingers in the Congress such as California's Sen. Diane Feinstein and Massachusetts Sen. John Kerry want to put a muzzle on conservative talk radio. They are upset by the fact that millions of Americans listen to people like Rush Limbaugh, Mike Savage, Laura Ingraham and me. Like the immigration bill backers, they want to shut off all debate, this time for good.

Because only a tiny handful of Americans listen to liberal talk radio, Kerry and company claim they want to

level the playing field by imposing a rule that will make it impossible for talk radio to survive. Should their so-called "fairness doctrine" be revived, radio station owners would be so restricted they would not be able to program conservative talk radio and keep their licenses.

"Lafayette, we are here!"

In 1939, baseball's "Iron Horse," Lou Gehrig, said farewell to his fans at New York's Yankee Stadium.

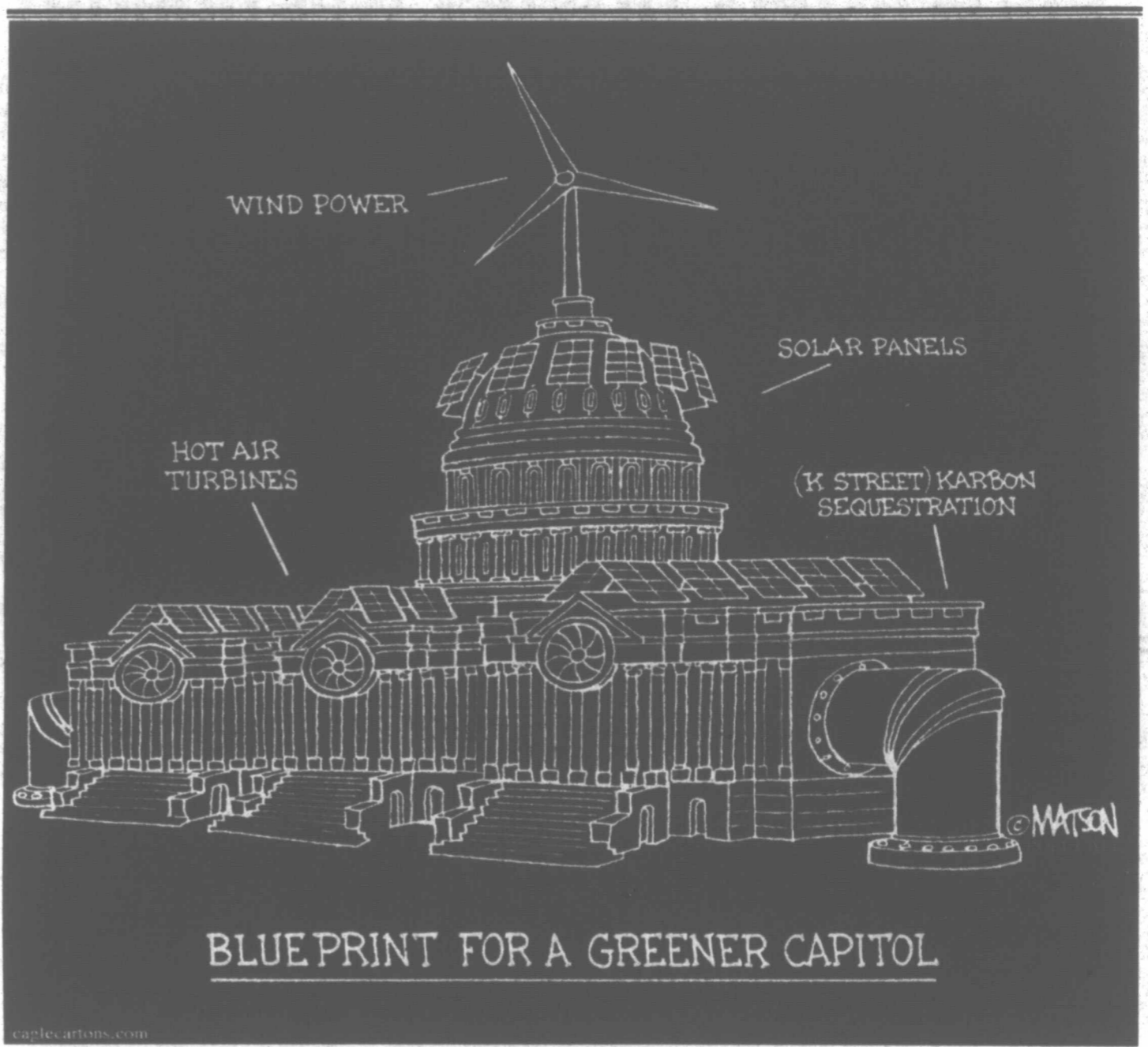
In 1966, President Lyndon Johnson signed the Freedom of Information Act, which went into effect the following year.

In 1976, Israeli commandos raided Entebbe airport in Uganda, rescuing almost all of the passengers and crew of an Air France jetliner seized by pro-Palestinian hijackers.

In 1987, Klaus Barbie, the former Gestapo chief known as the "Butcher of Lyon," was convicted by a French court of crimes against humanity and sentenced to life in prison (he died in September 1991).

Ten years ago: NASA's Pathfinder spacecraft landed on Mars, inaugurating a new era in the search for life on the Red Planet. CBS newsman Charles Kuralt died in New York at age 62.

Five years ago: A gunman opened fire at Israel's El Al airline ticket counter at Los Angeles International Airport; three people were killed, including the gunman. Benjamin O. Davis Jr., leader of the famed all-black Tuskegee Airmen during World War II and the first black general in the Air Force, died in Washington at age 89. Winnifred Quick Van Tongerlo, who survived the Titanic sinking, died in East Lansing, Mich., at age 98.

Coin collecting often attracts scam artists

For centuries, gold has been one of the world's most popular investments. Long considered an investor's "safe haven," gold offers consumers diverse investment opportunities, including: traditional purchases of bullion gold bars or coins; electronic trades in gold futures; and investments in gold mining companies.

The glitter of gold, however, often attracts scam artists who simply want to separate investors from their money. As with all investments, consumers considering gold and gold coins should study the market carefully to avoid falling victim to high-pressure sales tactics.

Many consumers, particu-

larly senior citizens, have been deceived into using their life's savings and other assets to buy coins priced at least three times their fair market value. The Office of the Attorney General has received complaints from consumers who spent thousands of dollars each to purchase "rare" gold coins that sellers claimed would double or triple in value in a very short time.

According to the Federal Trade Commission, the value of bullion coins is determined primarily by their gold or silver content,

rather than by rarity or condition. Bullion coins are bought and sold worldwide at prices that change daily, depending on world markets.

Fraudulent sellers often overprice their bullion coins or mislead consumers into purchasing imitation metals cre-

ated by fraudulent "mints." Aspiring gold and rare coin investors should carefully evaluate any investment claims. Knowledgeable coin collectors, known as numismatists, often research coins and

dealers for some time before buying even a single coin. Investment gains in the gold and rare coin market are often the result of careful scrutiny of a coin's quality, rarity, market availability and price.

Always compare grade and value with other dealers before making a selection. Investors should also review the seller's refund policy and be sure to get all other terms of sale in writing. Consumers may contact the Attorney General or the Better Business Bureau before making a purchase to find out if there are complaints against a particular seller.

Texas Thoughts

Houston Chronicle on effective recycling of plastic:

Far out to sea, between Japan and North America, a beast-like mass twice the size of Texas slowly roams and grows. This is the Eastern Garbage Patch and is likely the world's largest trash dump, according to The Los Angeles Times.

About 90 percent of this vast body of debris is plastic.

It's one of the most graphic signs that this light, cheap, apparently disposable staple of modern life never goes away.

Belatedly, leaders in several states though not Texas are addressing the consequences.

The environmental onslaught of plastic has hugely increased in just a decade. That's the time in which bottled water, once considered a mere New Age quirk, became omnipresent in U.S. life.

Each year, Americans now consume more than 9 billion gallons of water indistinguishable in quality from fil-

tered tapwater in plastic bottles. Most of the containers are made of polyethylene terephthalate, a petroleum product. It takes the equivalent of 18 million barrels of crude oil to create the plastic used in a year's worth of these bottles.

The plastic can take hundreds of years to degrade in dark, dense landfills, and in the ocean, even longer. The consequences now litter the globe, from Houston sidewalks to the high seas, where each year an estimated 1 million birds alone (not mentioning other aquatic creatures) die from eating

FOURTH OF JULY

The Fourth of July was the date that our forefathers signed the Declaration of Independence by the Continental Congress in Philadelphia in 1776. Americans just celebrated this event for centuries on their own. But in 1941, Congress finally established the Fourth of July (Independence Day) as a legal holiday. Now many have said that the Congress actually approved it on July 2, or August 2, the date they really did sign the document. So why the 4th? That was the day the final draft of the Declaration was finished for the



August 2nd signing. They approved the entire idea on July 2, with a rough outline. But on July 4 they actually had their finished draft after a lot of discussion and ratified it. And it takes a while for everyone to get it signed, so that was done on August 2.

It was John Adams who wrote his wife and said that the event should be celebrated with pomp and circumstance, parades, shows, games and other stuff.

The first official 4th of July party was in 1777 in Philadelphia. Warships along the docks fired a 13-gun salute in honor of the 13 states. The soldiers who were in the area, paraded through the streets.

By 1788, the 4th of July celebration also commemorated the U.S. Constitution as well, which was recently approved by 10 out of the 13 states. That year was the first 4th of July parade, with horse-drawn floats, one of which was a huge eagle carrying the Justices of the US Supreme Court.

In 1790, the nation's capitol moved from Philadelphia to Washington, D.C. President Thomas Jefferson celebrated the 4th of July by opening the White House to guests. This custom continued under other presidents as well, until the British burnt the White House in 1814.

Other memorable 4th of July was one held in 1865 on the battlefield at Gettysburg; at the end of the Civil War with a procession of black slaves parading through the streets of Richmond, Virginia in 1866; and a Bi-centennial celebration in New York City on July 4, 1976.

Thomas Jefferson, who wrote the Declaration of Independence died on July 4, 1826 at noon in his home in Virginia. The day he died was the 50th anniversary of the document's signing. Ironically, John Adams of Massachusetts who supported the Declaration of Independence and is also the father of President John Quincy Adams died just a few hours later on the say day, July 4, 1826.

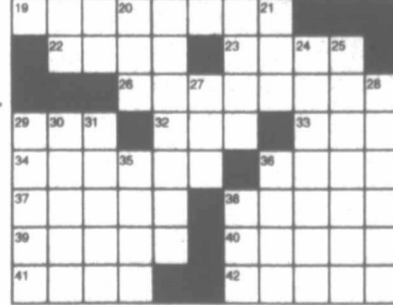

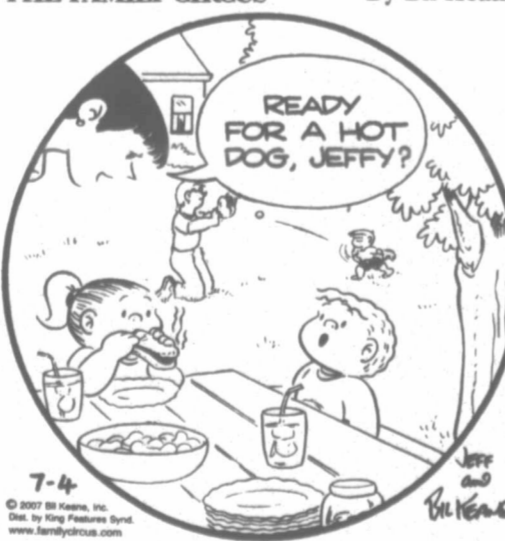

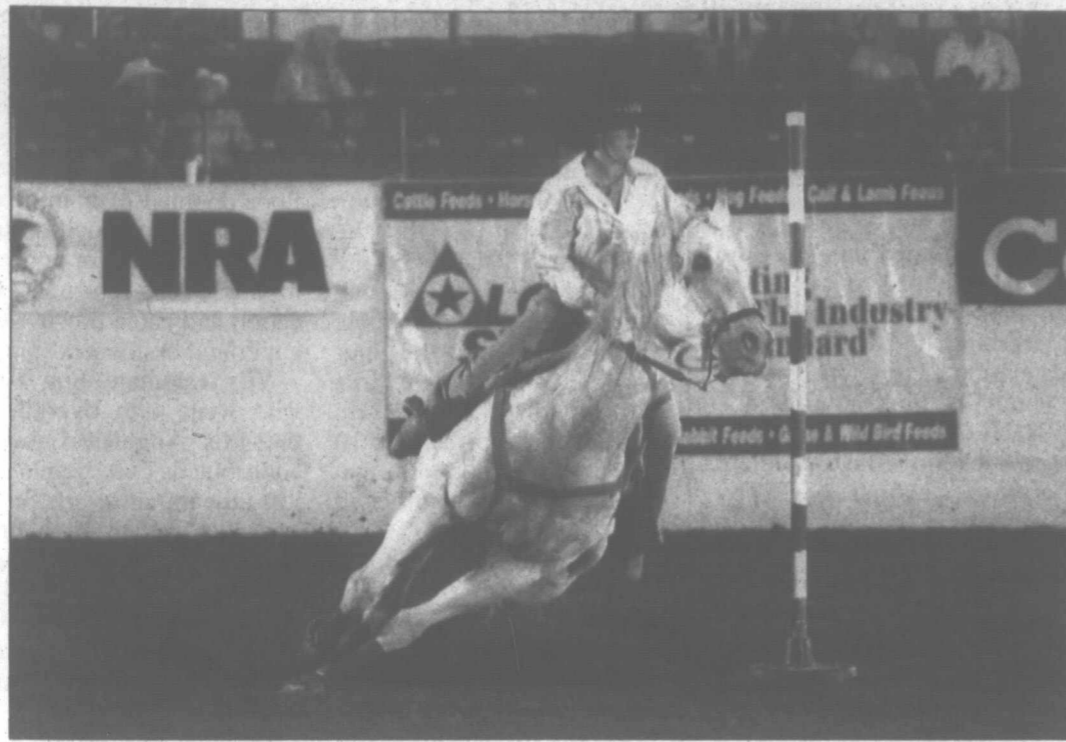

This was Jones' third year to compete statewide. In addition to pole bending and barrel racing, she also com-

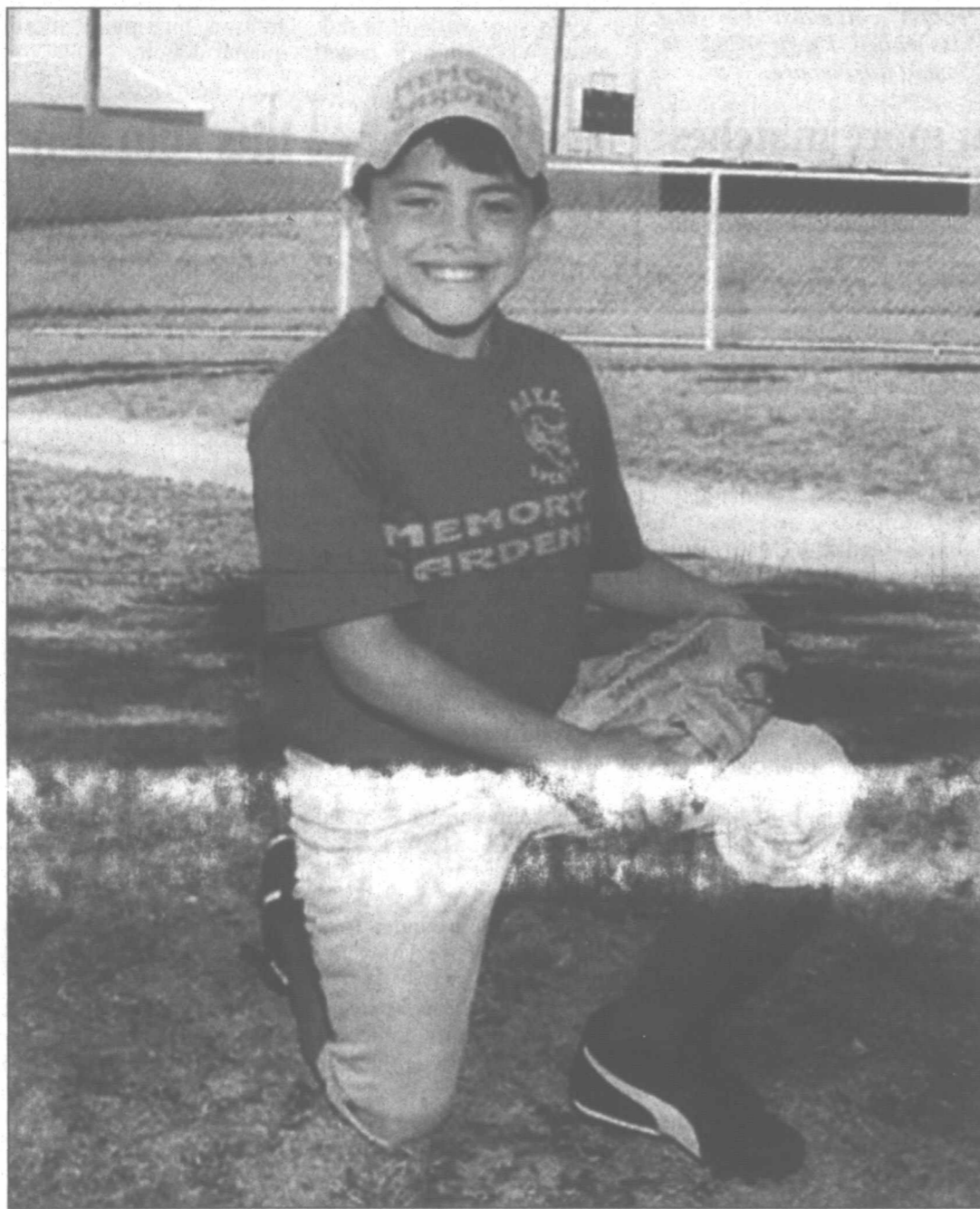
petes in breakaway roping.

Nadal finally reaches fourth round at Wimbledon in 3-day long match

WIMBLEDON, England (AP) — Rafael Nadal celebrated like he won the Wimbledon title Wednesday, falling to his knees in relief after finally beating Robin Soderling 6-4, 6-4, 6-7 (7), 4-6, 7-5 in a rain-interrupted third-round match that finished four days after they first stepped on court.

The 2006 Wimbledon runner-up finally won on his sixth match point, the final five coming two days after the first.

The match was scheduled to begin Saturday, but the players were pulled off the court during the warmup because of rain. After the traditional middle Sunday off at the All England Club, the match started Monday.

That's when Nadal held a match point in the third-set tiebreaker, but he eventually lost that set and the next one. Play was suspended for the day with Nadal leading 2-0 in the fifth set.

On Tuesday, they returned to the court but played for only 20 minutes until the rain again halted play for the day.

Resuming at 4-4 in the fifth set Wednesday, Nadal held serve in the 11th game — saving one break point — and then sat down during the changeover as it began to drizzle. While the chair

umpire waited to see if the rain would stop, Nadal sat nervously shaking his left leg.

Play continued moments later, and Soderling was able to save four more match points before he sent a backhand long.

The Swede challenged the call as Nadal ran to the net, but the "Hawk-Eye" replay technology showed the ball was out.

Nadal, a three-time French Open champion, then dropped to his knees and later threw his wristbands into the crowd. He'll next play No. 14 Mikhail Youzhny.

No. 4 Novak Djokovic also reached the fourth round in a match that took three days and No. 3 Andy Roddick advanced to the quarterfinals in an encounter that took two days.

Djokovic beat Nicolas Kiefer 7-6 (4), 6-7 (6), 6-2, 7-6 (5), and will play 2002 champion Lleyton Hewitt in the fourth round. Roddick defeated Paul-Henri Mathieu 6-2, 7-5, 7-6 (6). He saved three set points in the tiebreaker, winning the final five points to advance.

No. 2 Maria Sharapova and Venus Williams were to resume their fourth-round match after playing only three points Tuesday. Serena

Williams, who overcame a calf strain to reach the quarterfinals, was scheduled to play top-ranked Justine Henin.

Even by Wimbledon standards, there's been a lot of rain this year at the All England Club.

The fickle English weather caused stoppages and postponements on seven of the tournament's first eight days.

And the constant starting and stopping didn't do much to help defending champion Amelie Mauresmo — she lost in the fourth round Tuesday to 18-year-old Nicole Pietrangeli 7-6 (6), 4-6, 6-1.

"She was in a much better rhythm throughout the whole match than I was," two-time major champion said. "Definitely the interruption didn't help."

Play on Centre Court and Court No. 1 started two hours earlier than usual Tuesday — because of the backlog of matches. Only seven singles matches were completed in between six rain delays.

Besides Mauresmo, No. 3 Jelena Jankovic was upset, playing through four rain delays and losing to No. 18 Marion Bartoli of France 3-6, 7-5, 6-3.

Brad Wilkerson hits three HRs to lift Rangers past Angels

ARLINGTON, Texas (AP) — Brad Wilkerson is on a roll, and so are the Texas Rangers.

Wilkerson had three homers and six RBIs, both career highs, to help the Rangers beat the Los Angeles Angels 8-3 on Tuesday night.

Wilkerson had a three-run shot in the fourth, connected with the bases empty in the sixth, and added a two-run homer in the seventh for his 13th of the season to become the first AL player with a three-homer game this season.

"It's one of those nights," Wilkerson said after the Rangers won for the ninth time in their past 13 games. "You don't plan on doing it. I was hitting pretty much everything. I'm having a lot of fun. You don't expect to do that. I got pitches I could drive. I just got them in the air to right field."

Wilkerson also had a three-run homer on Monday night against Boston, hit a three-run homer against Detroit last week, and has 15

RBIs in his past seven games.

"He's been saving us with RBIs and clutch hits," Rangers manager Ron Washington said. "He's a professional hitter."

Alfonso Soriano of the Chicago Cubs and Carlos Lee of the Houston Astros have three-homer games in the NL.

Rangers starter Kevin Millwood (5-7) gave up two runs and five hits in eight innings, striking out four with no walks in his longest outing of the season.

Millwood was in command from the second through the sixth, retiring 13 in a row before Vladimir Guerrero's leadoff double in the seventh.

"We're finally pitching the way we're capable of," Millwood said. "The first two months we stunk. Right now, everyone is starting to catch their stride."

The Angels had won six of the first seven meetings with Texas this season by a total of 42-22.

Los Angeles has lost five

of its past seven overall, but manager Mike Scioscia said he isn't concerned.

"We've been playing at a high level for so long that you're going to hit a few bumps in the road," he said.

Los Angeles took the lead in the second on Howie Kendrick's two-run single.

Angels starter Ervin Santana (5-9) had a career-high 11 strikeouts in 5 1-3 innings, but left trailing 4-2 after throwing 111 pitches. Santana allowed five runs and seven hits, walking two.

One of his strikeouts proved costly as Marlon Byrd reached first on a wild pitch after going down swinging to lead off the fourth. Frank Catalanotto singled and both runners advanced on Gerald Laird's sacrifice bunt.

Wilkerson followed with his first homer of the game to give the Rangers a 3-2 lead.

Wilkerson added a solo shot in the sixth. The Rangers added another run in the inning when catcher Jose Molina's pickoff throw

to third hit Texas runner Desi Relaford for the Angels' third error of the game. Relaford scored when the ball rolled into left field.

Scioscia has tried to get Santana to be more aggressive, and the right-hander did throw more strikes.

"I don't know what's going on," Santana said. "I tried to be aggressive. I felt good. I made two mistakes (to Wilkerson), that was it, a changeup over the middle and a backdoor curveball."

In the seventh, Catalanotto's sacrifice fly and Wilkerson's two-run homer off Chris Bootcheck extended the Rangers' lead to 8-2.

The last Ranger with three homers in a game was Mark Teixeira on July 13, 2006, at Baltimore. Wilkerson became the 14th Texas player with a three-homer game.

Guerrero scored on a Frank Francisco wild pitch in the ninth inning for the game's final run.

Wilkerson's previous career highs were two homers and four RBIs.

Bonds hits No. 751

Barry Bonds moved a step closer to catching Hank Aaron in the city where Hammerin' Hank tied Babe Ruth's previous home run mark.

Swinging at the first three pitches he saw, Bonds connected on his third try for homer No. 751 on Tuesday night. He moved four shy of Aaron's record following the San Francisco Giants' 7-3 loss to the Cincinnati Reds.

Aaron's record-book homer on opening day 1974 landed at Riverfront Stadium, which has since been demolished.

Aaron's record soon will be, too.

"I'm playing pretty good for an old guy," the 42-year-old Bonds said. "I just wish we were playing better as a team."

So do the Reds, who have the major leagues' worst record and its newest manager.

Brandon Phillips' grand slam gave Pete Mackanin a victory in his debut as Cincinnati's interim manager. Mackanin was promoted from advance scout after Jerry Narron was fired on Sunday night.

"It doesn't matter who the manager is," Phillips said. "It just feels good to get a win."

Bonds' homer on his third swing of the game drew loud and prolonged boos from the crowd of 37,299, a reminder that fans outside of San Francisco view his record chase through the prism of baseball's steroid scandal.

Like it or not, he's closing in.

"Yeah, it's a little closer," Bonds said. "Can I feel it? No. I can feel 751 right now. I can't feel 755. I can feel 751 — feels good."

Mrs. A-Rod's curious fashion statement

Nobody got too bent out of shape over the tank top Cynthia Rodriguez wore to Yankee Stadium the other day, which might yet turn out to be a good thing.

The only reported casualty, in fact, was the notion that ballplayers' wives were content being seen and not heard, and that was languishing on life support already.

Being a celebrity is apparently easier than ever and if you want a measure of how low the bar has dipped, try this:

A half-century or so ago, Yankee superstar Joe DiMaggio wound up playing second fiddle to his wife now and then, but she was Marilyn Monroe. On Monday, current Yankee superstar Alex Rodriguez woke up to find his wife on the front page of the New York Post for no other reason than the two-word obscenity — first word begins with "F," second word is "You" — printed on the back of her shirt. The newspaper blurred the offending word, but helpfully topped the photo with the headline, "F-Rod."

There's no way to be sure whether Cynthia Rodriguez intended the message for anyone in particular, everyone close enough Sunday to decipher the Old English let-

tering squarely between her shoulder blades, or no one at all. She's apparently not the first person to model that particular clothing line, but it's doubtful the statement she had in mind was limited to fashion.

Cynthia Rodriguez was sitting in the players' family section at the time, with the couple's 2-year-old daughter and a friend in tow. She had to know all those people snapping pictures weren't working on the Rodriguez family album and certainly not anybody from the Post, which two months ago published a picture of her husband and a woman at a Toronto hotel under a similarly pithy headline: "Stray-Rod."

Baseball wives aren't the only ones causing their spouses headaches, of course, though it turns out there's a tradition that reaches much farther back than Anna Benson. Coincidentally, one of the best wives' tales ever in sports also involves — who else? — the Yankees.

Pitchers Mike Kekich and Fritz Peterson and their wives went on a double-date during the 1972 offseason and got along so swimmingly that they joked about swapping spouses. At spring training the following year, they announced they had

done just that — trading kids, houses and even the family dogs.

Looking at the distractions he knew were already lurking on the horizon, Yankee general manager Lee MacPhail tried to lighten the mood by remarking, "We may have to call off Family Day."

Current GM Brian Cashman hasn't considered that option, though he did speak to Rodriguez and his wife and acknowledged that team policy prohibits profane language on clothing and banners at Yankee Stadium. But as one fan told the Post, "It was noted by police and security. They were aware of it. I guess they didn't know what to do. I guess you don't kick A-Rod's wife out of the game."

Maybe not, and maybe the fact that it didn't kick up more of a ruckus is a good thing.

Plenty of athletes' wives have already demonstrated how dangerous a little attention can be. Anybody remember how Kurt Warner's wife, Brenda, lobbied endlessly during radio interviews a few years back to get her husband traded from the Rams? Or how Benson, wife of pitcher Kris Benson and a former Penthouse model, famously threatened to sleep with the

entire Mets team — plus the manager and batboy — if she caught her husband cheating?

Well, no sooner did the Mets ship Mr. and Mrs. Benson to Baltimore than she complained, "We would never, ever have signed with New York if they had said they were going to trade us."

Us?

Excuse me, Anna.

More likely, the Mets did it to be rid of you. And right about now, the last thing the Yankees need is a similar distraction. They're barely within shouting distance of American League East-leading Boston, there aren't enough happy campers in the clubhouse to sing even one stanza of "Kumbaya," and her husband wasn't the most popular guy in there to begin with.

A-Rod, on the other hand, seems unfazed by any of the craziness breaking out all around him. The same afternoon that his wife made the front page, he was named AL player of the month, the second time that's happened this season.

Who says love ain't grand?

Mavs defeat China, Yi in summer league action

DALLAS (AP) — Yi Jianlian's first taste of NBA competition did not go smoothly, as he scored 11 points for the Chinese national team in a 105-100 loss to the Dallas Mavericks' summer league team Tuesday night.

Yi, selected with the sixth overall pick by the Milwaukee Bucks in the NBA draft, had just one point in the second half. He shot 3-for-9 from the floor while committing three turnovers in 31 minutes. He did have a team-leading 10 rebounds, along with two assists and two blocked shots.

"Just the second game from missing three months," Yi said, noting that he just rejoined the national team. "I think we'll get there."

Reportedly unhappy with the prospect of playing in a city with a small Asian population, Yi still refuses to discuss his NBA future.

Two days after an uninspiring 15-point effort against the U.S. under-19 national team, Yi showed flashes of brilliance but also struggled at times in an inconsistent showing.

"It's very difficult to talk about Yi," China's coach Jonas Kazlauskas said.

"Three months, he was by himself without team and without coaches. He needs seven, eight games to catch up with us."

The crowd at SMU's Moody Coliseum went quiet early in the second quarter when Yi sank to the floor doubled over in pain, holding his stomach. After remaining down for about a minute, Yi returned to action and came down with a rebound on the next play.

Yi's teammate, Sun Yue, who went 40th overall to the Los Angeles Lakers, contributed two points in just nine minutes.

Dallas fans got their first chance to cheer draft acquisitions Nick Fazekas (34th overall) and Reyshawn Terry (44th). Fazekas scored 14 points in 30 minutes.

Former Maverick and five-year NBA veteran Wang ZhiZhi scored 28 points for China, including 10 in the third quarter.

Pops Mensah-Bonsu, who played 12 games with the Mavs last season, led Dallas with 24 points, including the game-tying dunk with 2:50 remaining that completed a comeback from a nine-point fourth-quarter deficit.

Rain keeps coming at Wimbledon, suspending even more matches

WIMBLEDON, England (AP) — Even by Wimbledon standards, there's been a lot of rain this year at the All England Club.

The fickle English weather caused stoppages and postponements on seven of the tournament's eight days.

And the constant starting and stopping didn't do much to help defending champion Amelie Mauresmo — she lost in the fourth round Tuesday to 18-year-old Nicole Pietrangeli 7-6 (6), 4-6, 6-1.

"She was in a much better rhythm throughout the whole match than I was," the two-time major champion said. "Definitely those interruptions don't help."

On Wednesday, 2006 runner-up Rafael Nadal and Robin Soderling were scheduled to head back on to the court to complete a third-round match that was supposed to be played last Saturday. The second seed, who had a match point Monday in the third set, played for a total of 20 minutes in the fifth set Tuesday to get to 4-4.

Also, No. 2 Maria Sharapova and Venus Williams were to resume their fourth-round match after playing only three points Tuesday, and No. 3 Andy Roddick was to finish his fourth-round match against Paul-Henri Mathieu. No. 4 Novak Djokovic was also to finish his suspended third-round match against Nicolas Pietrangeli.

Serena Williams, who overcame a calf strain to reach the quarterfinals, was scheduled to play top-ranked Justine Henin.

Play on Centre Court and Court No. 1 started two hours earlier than usual Tuesday — because of the backlog of matches. Only seven singles matches were completed in between six rain delays.

Organizers said they were 177 matches behind schedule, including 13 in singles — eight in the men's draw and five for the women.

Besides Mauresmo, No. 3 Jelena Jankovic was upset, playing through four rain delays and losing to No. 18 Marion Bartoli of France 3-

6, 7-5, 6-3. "There is no reason for me to lose this match," Jankovic said. "But in these circumstances anything can happen."

Bartoli will next face No. 31 Michaella Krajicek in the first Grand Slam quarterfinal for both players.

In the third round of the men's draw, 2002 Wimbledon champion Lleyton Hewitt beat Guillermo Canas 6-4, 3-6, 6-3, 6-4, and Nikolay Davydenko advanced by defeating Gael Monfils 6-3, 7-5, 6-3.

"That's the longest and toughest rain-delayed match I've ever had to put up with," said Hewitt, who was originally scheduled to play Canas on Saturday.

Juan Carlos Ferrero, the 2003 French Open champion, reached the Wimbledon quarterfinals for the first time by beating Janko Tipsarevic 7-5, 6-3, 7-6 (5) and will next face four-time defending champion Roger Federer, who has not played since Friday.

"It was very important to

win because the rain was coming again," Ferrero said, "so I tried to finish in three sets."

Mauresmo had 14 double-faults and 37 unforced errors against Pietrangeli, who reached the quarterfinals for the first time at the All England Club.

"I don't know how many (double faults) I had today, but definitely too many," fourth-seeded Mauresmo said. "I don't know if it was her or me."

Play was twice delayed early in the match, each time for about 20 minutes. The third delay came when Mauresmo was about to serve for the second set, and lasted nearly an hour.

"It was kind of tiring," Pietrangeli said of the rain delays. "You walk all those stairs up to the locker room and back. It's pretty much a long walk."

Vaidisova will play No. 6 Ana Ivanovic in the quarterfinals. The French Open runner-up held on to beat Nadia Petrova 6-1, 2-6, 6-4 in a match interrupted by rain four times.

Hunter Pence hits solo shot to lead Astros to 5-4 win

HOUSTON (AP) — Hunter Pence hit a solo shot off Jose Mesa on the first pitch of the 13th inning and the Astros took advantage of a questionable umpire's call to beat the Philadelphia Phillies 5-4 on Tuesday night.

The rookie center fielder's drive was the third walk-off homer for the Astros in six days. Carlos Lee and Mark Loretta ended games with homers against Colorado last Thursday and Friday.

"If you keep expecting to beat the other team's closer, that's not going to happen very often," said Craig Biggio, who went 2-for-5 with an RBI single. "But you take it whenever you get it."

Pence hammered the first pitch from Mesa (0-1) off the left-field facade. He sprinted around the bases as fireworks exploded. The excitable 24-year-old is hitting .563 with two homers in his last three games.

"My swing feels good, but I wouldn't say I'm locked in," said Pence, leading all rookies with a .345 average. "I'm just going up there, trying to put a good swing on the ball."

The game probably should've never come to that. The Phillies took a 4-3 lead to the ninth, but the Astros loaded the bases with one out against closer Antonio Alfonseca.

Lee hit a grounder to shortstop Jimmy Rollins, who flipped to Chase Utley to start a potential game-ending double play.

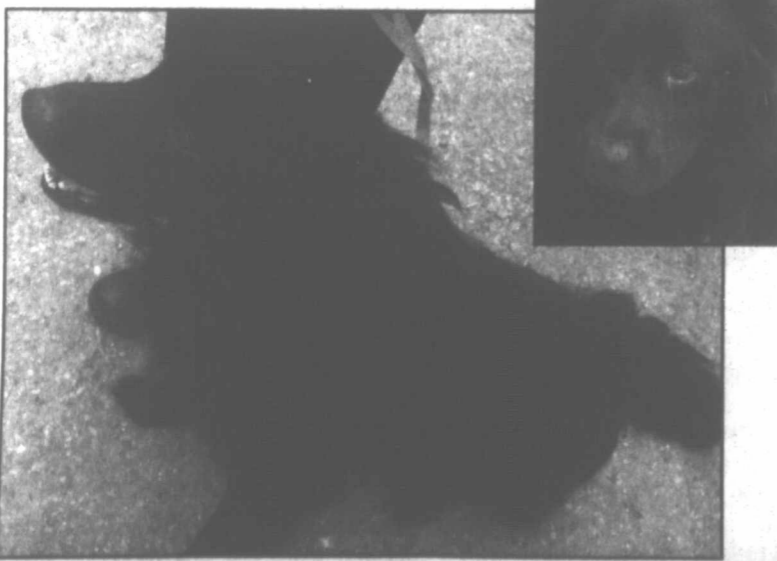

Phillies manager Charlie Manuel ran out to protest, to no avail.

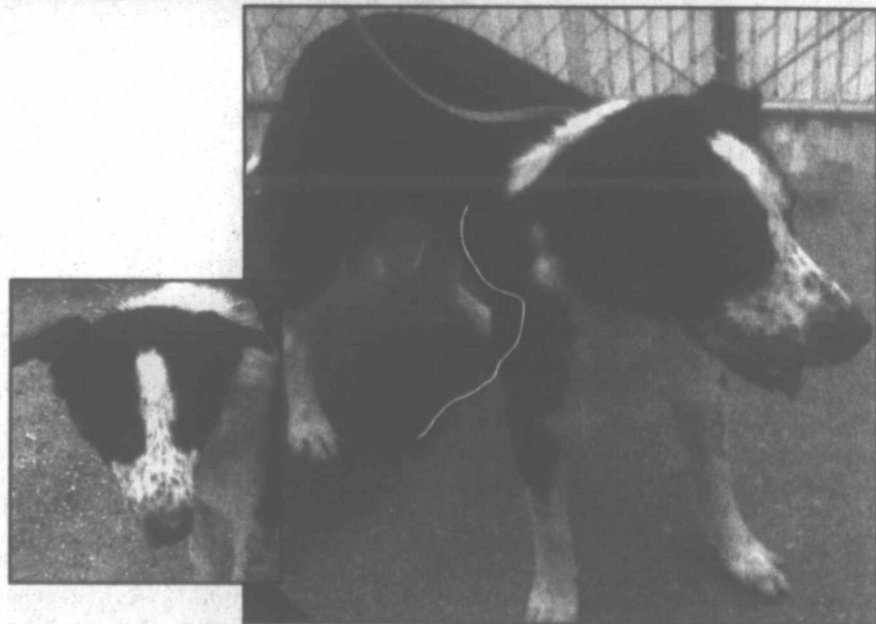

Investors should also check the grade of the purchased coins with an independent certification service. Fraudulent sellers often inflate the grade of the coins they sell, thereby inflating the price. A third-party grading service can help investors determine the quality and value of coins.

Be wary of high-pressure sales pitches where sellers insist on an immediate decision or promise high rates of return. These tactics are commonly used by con artists to coerce investors into making uninformed purchases.

Before making any investment, especially a sizable one, consumers should consult a trusted individual, such as a financial adviser or other professional who can provide a realistic outlook on various investment options and their expected rate of return. There are also several nonprofit coin dealer associations, such as the American Numismatic Association, that offer tips on selecting a reputable seller who adheres to the association's ethics and arbitration guidelines.

Finally, all consumers should be cautious when providing financial information, including credit card numbers, to salespersons, particularly over the tele-

phone.

Investing in gold and rare coins is much like any other consumer purchase: if it sounds too good to be true, it usually is. When investors take time to study the market and acquire coins with selected quality and proven rarity from reputable dealers, all that glitters may indeed turn out to be gold.

POINTS TO REMEMBER: Investing in Gold and Rare Coins

- Consult an investment professional to discuss market trends and return rate expectations.

- Evaluate investment claims carefully and be cautious of high pressure sales pitches or promises of rapidly rising values.

- Compare grade and value with other dealers and get the seller's return policy in writing.

- Check the grade of purchased coins through an independent certification service.

Woman uses baby powder, lotion, socks to escape

LAS CRUCES, N.M. (AP) — A woman tried to escape from jail guards using baby powder, cocoa butter and lots of socks, deputies said.

Anita Rachel Thomas, 20, was able to wriggle out of leg irons because she was wearing six pairs of socks, authorities said.

She used cocoa butter as a

lubricant to slide the leg irons and handcuffs from around her ankles and wrists, officials said.

Thomas, freed from restraints in a jail transport van outside Las Cruces Magistrate Court on Tuesday, threw baby powder at an officer, pushed him out of the way and tried to run past him, Dona Ana County

sheriff's officers said.

She made it about two feet past the officer when he grabbed her, they said.

She struggled, but stopped when his partner drew his pistol and demanded she show him both her hands, authorities said.

She then was put back in leg irons and handcuffs.

or entwining themselves in plastic trash created continents away. Invisibly, the chemicals plastics leave in the environment are linked to hormonal disorders in animals and humans.

Unlike some environmental crises, there are few recognizable villains in the world's plastics overload. Plastics, after all, have revolutionized food safety and given rise to countless time- and money-saving inventions.

It's encouraging, then, to see leaders at the retail, city and state levels show ways to use and discard plastic more reasonably.

Chez Panisse, the path-breaking sustainable cuisine restaurant in Berkeley, Calif., now offers filtered tap water and has dropped bottled still water from its menu. While the phenomenon is too rare to be a trend, cutting-edge restaurants across the country are doing the same.

At the city level, San Francisco is the first municipality to take a step commonplace in other countries: It has outlawed nonbiodegradable plastic shopping bags in large retail outlets. The measure is part of a visionary "zero waste plan" that would

ensure recycling for every product by 2020.

And this month, Oregon the first state in the country to introduce a bottle-deposit bill became the third state after Maine and California to update its bottle-disposal laws. Oregon's law now covers plastic water containers.

Though it's a seemingly small addition, the implications are immense. In 2007, Oregonians will sip from and discard 170 million single-serving water bottles.

With a 5 cent deposit attached to them, the containers will go back to beverage distributors, who have incentive to find buyers for the scrap plastic.

Happily, entire industries have sprung up around plastic bottle scrap, using it for carpets, fleece clothing, mattresses and sleeping bags.

The only thing that could have improved Oregon's bill would have been to hike the deposit to 10 cents. That's the deposit fee in Michigan, which has an extraordinary 97 percent bottle return rate.

Modest in themselves, these individual, city and state measures, in little time, are shifting consumers' behavior toward the flimsy bags and clear containers made to be forgotten. Texas, which contributes mightily to plastics pollution on sea and land, ought to be among the leaders in reducing it.
