American flags and participated in the chili cook-off and now they wanted to do something for the holidays, so I suggested this carnival. We hope that everyone comes out Saturday evening with their children."

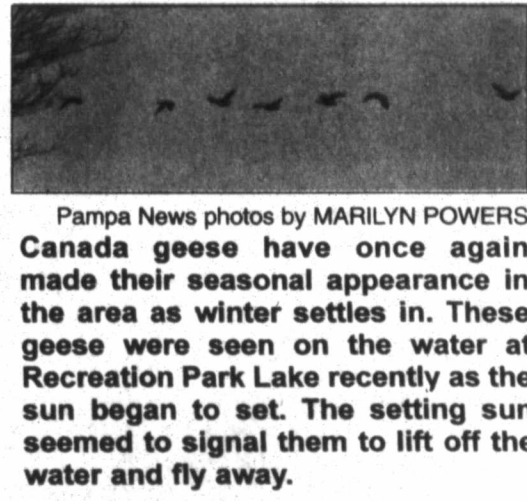
The carnival is open for children in grades pre-kindergarten through 5th grade and all children attending must be accompanied by an adult.

Twentieth Century Cotillion Club hosts tour of homes

The Twentieth Century Cotillion Study Club will host their 12th annual Christmas Tour of Homes, which will feature three local homes, from 1 to 4 p.m. Sunday as a fund-raiser which will benefit area youth.

Three homes will be featured and open for tours: The Fatheree home at 931 Christine, the Waters home at 1939 Evergreen and the Swope home at 115 Walnut in Walnut Creek Estates.

David and Natha Fatheree's home at 931 Christine was built in 1927 by David's paternal grandparents, Clyde and Laura Hobart Fatheree. The exterior is done in a Tudor style, which reflects the original Fatheree's English roots. The living room features an arts and crafts-style tile fireplace.

The kitchen still has the original built-in china cabi-

net and is painted in warm hues of reds, golds and sage. Original hardwood floors are still in the living room and bedroom, along with some leaded glass details. The home contains many antiques from the Hobart home in Vermont.

Loyd and Thelma Waters' split level home at 1939 Evergreen was built in 1958 by Jim and Norma Ward. The Waters purchased this home in 1990 and it required major renovations, since the home had deteriorated after sitting empty for a few years. Loyd and Thelma did much of the work themselves late at night.

Their home contains numerous handmade Christmas decorations that Thelma has made over the years. Loyd and Thelma also completely landscaped their backyard, which now includes a koi pond.

Rick and Leslie Swope's home at 115 Walnut, which was built in 1982, sits on two

acres in the Walnut Creek Estates, just north of Pampa. The kitchen showcases a brick archway over the cook top, granite counter tops and a tile backsplash that contains inset fruit tiles.

The master suite is done in Victorian style with a custom stencil around the ceiling. The master bedroom overlooks a newly constructed fountain feature in the courtyard. The sunroom overlooks Walnut Creek Canyon.

Tickets can be purchased

at the doors of the featured homes and are \$10, which includes the tours of all three homes.

Money raised by this event will benefit The Opportunity Plan, which is a non-profit educational loan and scholarship plan for area residents. This program provides scholarships and loans to students, and those living in the 26 counties of the Texas Panhandle are given preference of the funds. This plan has assisted more than 8,500 college students since

its inception in 1954.

The Twentieth Century Cotillion Study Club was organized the summer of 1953 and became the fifth club of its kind in Pampa. While the club has had many projects, new members were constantly searching for that one project could support on an annual basis. In 1961, Ida Ruth Price attended a Federation of Clubs meeting in Perryton and heard Buff

NASA delays launch

Fla. (AP) — NASA called off Thursday's launch of space shuttle Atlantis after detecting problems with fuel gauges in the shuttle's external tank.

Officials will try again Friday to launch the shuttle, NASA said.

Two of the four sensors in the shuttle's liquid hydrogen tank indicated that the tank was dry, even though there was fuel inside. Three sensors must be working properly to fly, NASA spokesman Paul Foerman said.

The sensors are critical to ensure that the shuttle's three main engines don't shut down too soon or too late during liftoff.

Problems with the sensors have delayed shuttle launches before, most recently in September 2006.

Today in History

Today is Thursday, Dec. 6, the 340th day of 2007. There are 25 days left in the year.

Today's Highlight in History:

Fifty years ago, on Dec. 6, 1957, America's first attempt at putting a satellite into orbit failed as Vanguard TV3 rose only about four feet off a Cape Canaveral launch pad before crashing back down and exploding.

On this date:

In 1790, Congress moved to Philadelphia from New York.

In 1889, Jefferson Davis, the first and only president of the Confederate States of America, died in New Orleans.

In 1907, the worst mining disaster in U.S. history occurred as 362 men and boys died in a coal mine explosion in Monongah, W.Va.

In 1917, some 2,000 people died when an explosives-laden French cargo ship collided with a Norwegian vessel at the harbor in Halifax, Nova Scotia, setting off a blast that devastated the city.

In 1921, British and Irish representatives

signed a treaty in London providing for creation of an Irish Free State a year later on the same date.

In 1947, Everglades National Park in Florida was dedicated by President Truman.

In 1957, AFL-CIO members voted to expel the International Brotherhood of Teamsters. (The Teamsters were readmitted in 1987, but disaffiliated themselves from the AFL-CIO in 2005.)

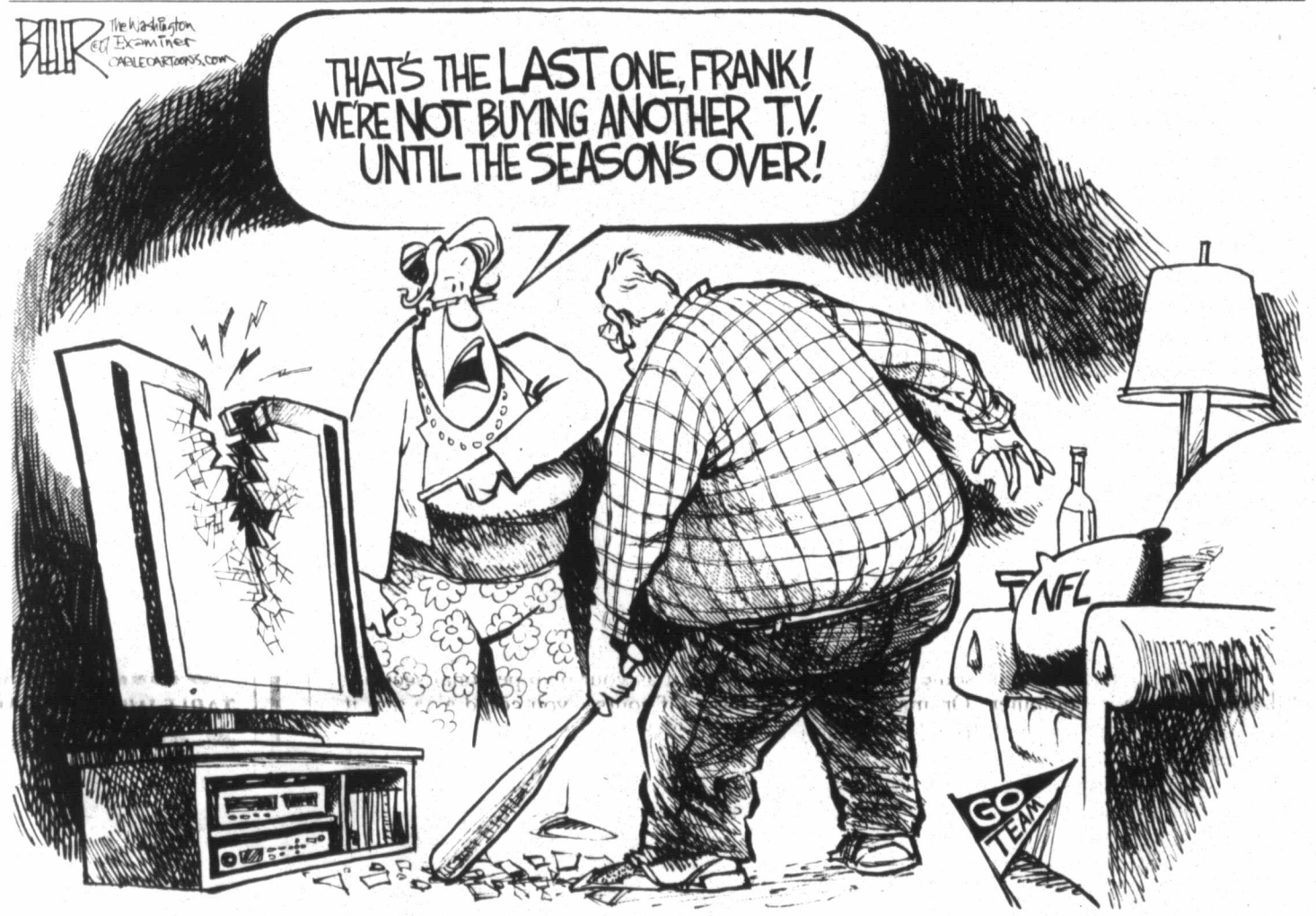
In 1973, House Minority Leader Gerald R. Ford was sworn in as vice president, succeeding Spiro T. Agnew.

In 1982, 11 soldiers and six civilians were killed when an Irish National Liberation Army bomb exploded at a pub in Ballykelly, Northern Ireland.

In 1989, 14 women were shot to death at the University of Montreal's school of engineering by a man who then took his own life.

Ten years ago: At least 69 people were killed when a Russian military cargo plane crashed in the Siberian city of Irkutsk seconds after takeoff.

Five years ago: President Bush pushed Treasury Secretary Paul O'Neill and economic adviser Larry Lindsey from their jobs in a Cabinet shake-up. Actress Winona Ryder was sentenced to community service as part of a probationary term for stealing more than \$5,500 worth of merchandise from a Saks Fifth Avenue store in Beverly Hills, Calif. Ten Palestinians, including two U.N. employees, were killed when Israeli forces poured into a Gaza Strip refugee camp, searching for a fugitive militant.



Extras sometimes makes life little easier

Whenever a new version of Windows is released, you typically receive some "extra" programs that make your life a little easier. You can find these programs by clicking on start, programs, accessories. However, not all accessories are completed in time to make the release date. Instead of throwing them away, Microsoft releases them throughout the year and calls them "PowerToys."

These little programs are incredibly useful and incredibly free. If you look around, you'll find two versions of PowerToys — one set for Windows 95 and another for Windows XP. For those of you with Windows 98, ME or 2000, I've heard that the Windows 95 set will work, however Microsoft claims otherwise. For the purposes of this review, I'll cover the XP PowerToys. You can find

by searching on "Powertoys" at Microsoft.com. Supposedly, a set of powertoys for Vista is in the works, but I believe it when I see it. Following are some of my favorites:

Alt-Tab Replacement: Many of you know that holding down the ALT key while tapping the TAB key will quickly switch between open windows. However, if you have multiple windows open, the standard "icon-only" display can be vague. This PowerToy will enhance the experience by displaying a thumbnail of the window.

Open Command Window Here: Ah, the days of DOS. Those of us that used computers back in the eighties

and early nineties, remember that infamous C-prompt. Every now and then, I find a task can be handled much quicker by performing it in a DOS window.

However, whenever you open up a command window, the system always drops you in a pre-designated directory. With this PowerToy, you can right-click on a folder and choose "Open Command Window Here."

Tweak UI: Bill Gates doesn't trust you. He doesn't give you easy access to EVERY adjustable setting in Windows. In fact, he put most of the dangerous settings in something cryptic, called the "Registry." Making changes in the registry is very delicate work (think brain surgery) and requires some forethought. Thankfully, some Microsoft programmers have made access to some of the more tame settings available via their PowerToy, Tweak UI. I especially like the "User Auto-Login" feature.

Power Calculator: The calculator that comes with Windows, while useful, is not "amazing." If you grew up with one of those monster HP machines, you'll appreciate this PowerToy. The Power Calculator can graph and evaluate functions, as well as perform a number of useful conversions. Think of it as the Windows calculator on steroids.

Image Resizer: Digital cameras are great. I love the amount of detail these

Odessa American on a ruling on gun laws:

The U.S. Supreme Court, which has sidestepped the issue for 68 years and in many ways sidestepped the central issue back in 1939, when it last decided a gun-rights case has finally put itself in a position to rule on whether the Second Amendment protects an individual right, a collective right, or an individual right conditioned by membership in a state-approved organization.

To be sure, the high court could sidestep the issue again, but its difficult to

believe it accepted the case with that intention.

The case in question is District of Columbia v. Heller, which challenged the District of Columbia sweeping 1976 ban on mere possession of handguns. The D.C. law bars registration of pistols not registered before Sept. 24, 1976, bars carrying an unlicensed pistol, and requires that any gun kept in the home be disassembled or bound by a trigger lock. It was challenged by five D.C. residents with no criminal records who wanted to keep guns in their homes for self-protection.

The federal appeals court for the District ruled, in a tightly reasoned opinion, that the Second Amendment "A well-regulated militia being necessary to the security of a free state, the

right of the people to keep and bear arms shall not be infringed." clearly protects an individual right that is not contingent on membership in a state militia. While the mention of a militia has been used by gun control advocates to argue that only militia members have the right, every other amendment of the Bill of Rights protects an individual right, and the founders commonly used "right of the people" to refer to individual rights. To contend otherwise for the Second Amendment, the court argued, is to ignore the clear meaning of the language and the known attitude of those who wrote the amendment.

While some scholars have argued otherwise and some federal courts have

devices can capture. However, with that level of detail comes large picture files. Depending on how you set your resolution and picture size, these files can be over a megabyte in size. E-mailing these monsters can be a nightmare. Enter, the Image Resizer PowerToy. By right-clicking on a picture, you can create a much smaller copy of the image, suitable for e-mailing. This method is much quicker and easier than loading up PhotoShop or another image editor.

CD Slide Show Generator: Speaking of digital cameras, once you have a few hundred of these digital images, you'll probably want to store them somewhere else besides your computer. Or maybe you want to share them with friends. If someone sends you a CD packed with images, you can use this PowerToy to create a virtual Slide Show.

Virtual Desktop Manager: Do you believe in bigger desktops? What if you could have four desktops? Well, you can with this PowerToy. Virtual Desktop

Manager allows one computer to effectively have up to four distinct desktops. If you like to have multiple windows open simultaneously, this PowerToy is for you. You have to see it to appreciate it.

Taskbar Magnifier: If you have a vision-impaired friend, pay attention. This PowerToy uses the taskbar to magnify an area of the screen around your pointer. I also know some PhotoShop experts that use this tool for quick image zooms. Personally, I haven't used it much, but for those who need it, I've heard it's indispensable.

Webcam Timershot: Is someone using your computer when you're not around? Find out with this PowerToy. If you have a Web cam hooked up to your system, you can use this program to automatically snap shots at specified time intervals and store them in a designated location. Think of it as your own personal security camera. Of course, you could also aim it at your fish tank and have the shots uploaded to your web site for the world to see ...

As time goes on, I'm sure Microsoft will release new PowerToys, so check their site occasionally for updates. I'll see you in Cyberspace!

agreed, the most persuasive modern scholarship persuasive even to legal scholars like Alan Dershowitz and Laurence Tribe, who are sympathetic to more gun control as a policy holds that the Second Amendment clearly protects an individual right. It would be pleasing and proper if the Supreme Court were to uphold that common-sense interpretation.

Such a ruling would not necessarily eliminate all gun control laws few scholars view all the right in the Bill of Rights as absolute, though we might wish they did but would clearly ban outright prohibition of legal ownership. It would tell advocates of the most onerous forms of gun control that they must repeal the Second Amendment before getting their way.

To be sure, the court could rule that since the District of Columbia is a federal enclave, not a state, the ruling does not apply to states and their laws.

The case is scheduled to be heard in March and is likely to be decided by the

end of June. However it is decided, it should serve to clarify an important clause in the Constitution whose interpretation has been hotly disputed, which was supposed to be the idea behind having a Supreme Court in the first place. URL: <http://www.oaoa.com>

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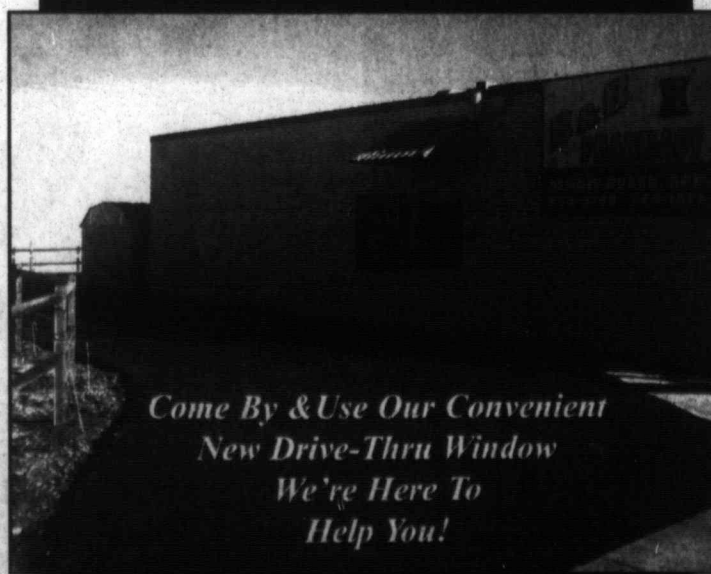
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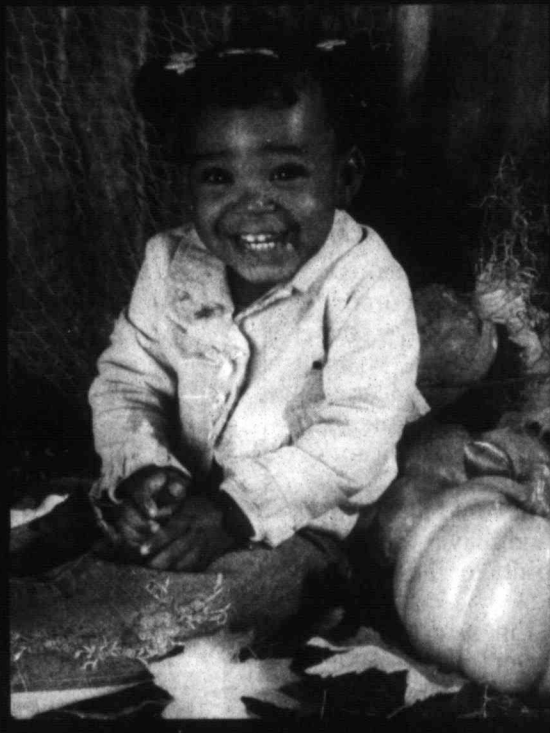

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Mall shooting: Gunman hints at shooting in note

OMAHA, Neb. (AP) — Less than an hour before he killed eight people and himself in a mall shooting spree, a troubled teenage gunman called the woman who had taken him in to tell her about a suicide note — but she said Thursday she never thought he would hurt anyone but himself.

Debora Maruca-Kovac told CBS's "The Early Show" she found the note

would involve so many other families."

Hawkins carried out his shooting spree from the third floor of the Westroads Mall, the bullets from his rifle cutting through the sound of Christmas music as he terrorized shoppers and employees.

The shooting came after a series of troubling events in his life: He had split with his girlfriend and lost his job. He had a criminal record and had left or been kicked out of his parents' house.

Police Chief Thomas Warren said the shooting appeared to be random and that the dead included five females and four males, including the gunman.

Investigators plan to examine text messages sent between Hawkins and his girlfriend, as well as his computer's hard drive for any Internet communications that could explain how he plotted the shootings, Warren told CNN.

The names of the victims were not released, but officials planned to provide more details in a news conference Thursday morning. Churches in the area were setting up vigils to pray for survivors and remember the dead.

Hawkins moved from his family's home about a year ago. Maruca-Kovac and her husband, whose sons were friends with Hawkins, welcomed him into their home and tried to help him.

The last remaining football team in district 3-4A has ended their playoff run, and the All-District Honorees have been officially announced.

From Pampa, two defensive players have been recognized as first-team players, five have been recognized as second-team players and seven have been recognized as honorable mentions.

Senior defensive tackle Ryne Malone and senior secondary member Josh Humphrey were recognized as a part of the first-team defensive team.

"Ryne was selected as a defensive tackle where he had 77 tackles and 9 sacks," Cavalier said, "Ryne also was our short yardage fullback where he had 2 touchdowns this year. Ryne is not the typical mold of a defensive tackle, but he utilized his quickness and strength to dominate most offensive linemen he faced. At 5'10" and 160 pounds Ryne was usually much smaller than our opponents offensive line-man he was matched up against,

yet because of his quickness off the ball he was a defensive force for us."

"Josh was selected as a member of the secondary where he had 45 tackles and 3 interceptions," Cavalier said, "As the year went on Josh became one of the most consistent players in our secondary. 2 Texas A&M football players arrested in home-invasion case

COLLEGE STATION, Texas (AP) — Texas A&M indefinitely suspended two football players today after their arrests a day earlier on felony robbery and drug counts.

Yemi Babalola, 21, of Bryan was charged with two aggravated robbery counts and one of misdemeanor marijuana possession, according to a College Station police statement. Brandon Joiner, 18, of Killeen was charged with three drug possession counts, one of them a felony.

Babalola was free Thursday on bonds totaling \$52,000, according to records at the Brazos County Jail. Joiner remained in the county jail with bond set at \$16,000, records show. Information on attorneys for the players wasn't immediately available.

A spokeswoman for the Brazos

County district attorney's office said today an arraignment had not been set.

A&M athletic director Bill Byrne said he and interim coach Gary Darnell discussed the matter Wednesday night and determined both players would be suspended "until cleared of any wrongdoing."

"From information we have at this time, it is obvious this is a very serious situation," Byrne said in a statement. "The Texas A&M Athletics Department will cooperate completely with any investigation into this matter to gather all of the facts."

According to the police statement, one resident suffered minor injuries in the alleged Nov. 29 home invasion at the Callaway Villas Apartments. The investigation led to searches of both suspects' homes Wednesday, and drugs

and other evidence were found, according to the statement.

Babalola, a junior offensive lineman, played in nine games this season, including six starts. Joiner, a freshman defensive end from Killeen, took a red-shirt season and didn't play.

Texas A&M (7-5) plays Penn State (8-4) on Dec. 29 in the Alamo Bowl in San Antonio.

Darnell, the team's defensive coordinator, was named interim coach following Dennis Franchione's resignation last month immediately after the team's win over rival Texas.

Mike Sherman, an assistant head coach with the NFL's Houston Texans, was named head coach three days after Franchione's resignation, but Darnell will lead the team Aggies in the bowl game.

Basketball player overcomes hearing loss

BAYTOWN, Texas (AP) — Lee junior Darius Cooper wants to fit in, but must work harder at it.

The 6-foot-3 forward competes for playing time on the junior varsity much like any other member of the Gander basketball team. What separates Cooper from his teammates is that he is deaf, a gap that basketball has helped bridge.

"I want to be a good person and I don't want people to feel sorry for me," Cooper signed through his interpreter Jenni Dodson. "I can hear moderately in the right ear but very little in my left ear. I grew up deaf but have practiced on my speech and now consider myself hard of hearing."

Cooper has been deaf since he was born. At the age

of 5 he began to work on his speech, a program that all deaf students begin once they start school. Cooper used to wear hearing aids that helped. The attention that came with the hearing aids didn't help his confidence.

"People would say 'Oh, look at his hearing aids,'" Cooper said. "It made me feel strange so I took them

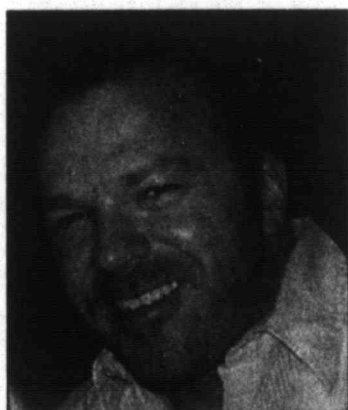
off and I don't wear them anymore."

Cooper's ability to hear — although limited — combined with his ability to read lips has helped compensate. In the fast paced action of basketball that is not enough and the team calls plays with hand signals to help the 16-year old.

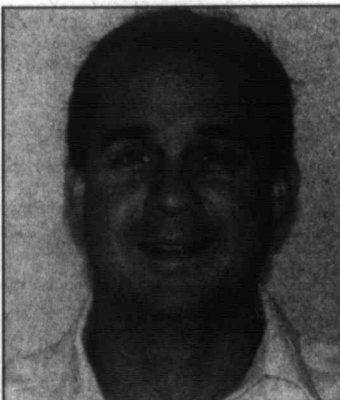

coaches to give him this honor," Cavalier said. "His awareness on the field coupled with his quickness to the ball combined to make John Luke an excellent player for us this year."

Senior running back Shavious Kelley, junior receiver Heath Skinner and senior offensive tackle Garrett Eggleston were selected to the second-team offensive team.

Kelley had 89 carries for 504 yards rushing with 4 rushing touchdowns and 44 catches for 344 yards receiving with 3 receiving touchdowns.

"Before Shavious was injured in the Randall game, which made his effective-

ness in our last 2 games extremely limited, he was a player that we centered a lot of our offense around," Cavalier said. "Rather it was as a field stretcher or as the primary ball carrier, Shavious had an impact on all of our games."

Skinner had 55 catches for 699 yards and 7 touchdowns on the season, and was one of the key players, according to Cavalier.

"Heath was generally our deep threat, but as the year went on proved he was capable of catching any type of route thrown his way," Cavalier said. "Time after time in tough situations Heath came up with a big play right when we needed it."

"Garrett, at his tackle position, was usually in an one on one match up with our opponents' defensive

ends," Cavalier said. "He also was one of the first blockers out on the perimeter in many of the screens that we ran. His speed and agility is very good for an offensive tackle, which allowed him to win the majority of the match ups he was in."

Selected to the honorable mention All-District defensive team were senior secondary member Adam Estrada, junior linebacker Ryan Funderburg, and junior linebacker Madison Wilson.

"Adam, who ended the year with 65 tackles and 2 interceptions, was a player that was all over the field and relentless in his pursuit of the ball," Cavalier said. "Ryan ended the year with 102 tackles and was as solid of a player as we had on our team. Madison had 67 tackles and 2 sacks defensively as well as several key carries

and catches on the offensive side."

All-District offensive team honorable mentions were senior offensive guard Colden Fortenberry, senior center Nick Dudley, senior receiver Wayne Parker, and junior quarterback Casey Trimble.

"Colden and Nick were playing side by side all year and were anchors on our offensive

line," Cavalier said. "Usually outmatched as far as size they regularly won the match ups they were in. Nick was a vocal organizer for us and really was what made our offensive line go.

Colden is as competitive of a kid as I have coached and this was constantly on display watching him battle in the trenches."

"Wayne ended the year with 35 catches for 404 yards and 1 touchdown and was an extremely reliable set of hands for us," Cavalier said. "Casey ended the year with 195 completions on 343 attempts for 2097 yards

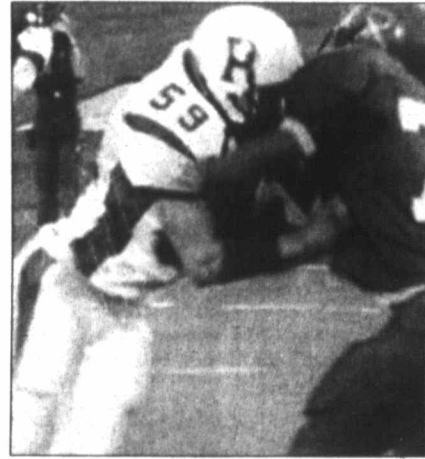
with 14 touchdowns versus 10 interceptions. As we were in the first year of a new offensive system, Casey did a wonderful job of executing our scheme. The work Casey put in well

before the season started allowed him to understand everyone's assignment and be a field general for us."

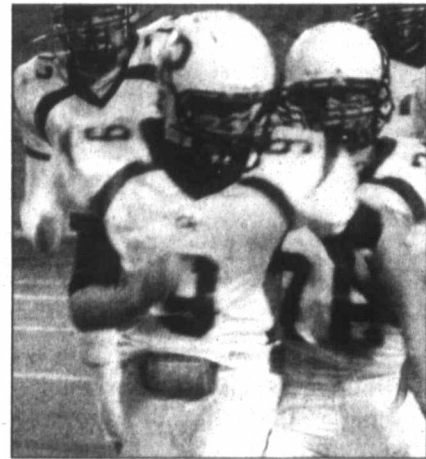
Five of this year's 14 All-District honorees from Pampa were juniors, and the other nine have watched their high school football career come to an end.

Taylor Busse - 2nd Team Defense



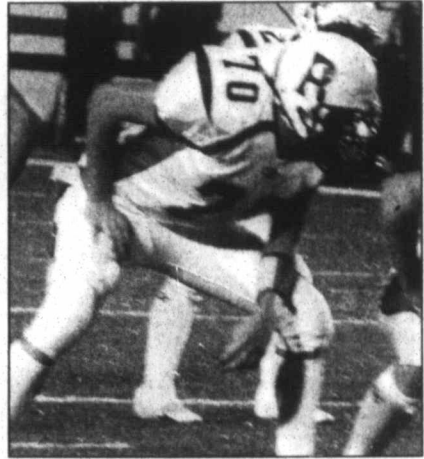
John Luke Covalt - 2nd Team Defense

Tebow, McFadden, Brennan, Daniel are Heisman finalists

NEW YORK (AP) — A Heisman Trophy race that once seemed so muddled has been dwindled to four contenders and even has a favorite.

Florida quarterback Tim Tebow, trying to become the first sophomore to win the Heisman Trophy, has emerged as a front-runner among the finalists who will be in New York on Saturday night vying for the award given to the top player in college football.

Arkansas running back Darren McFadden, the runner-up for last year's Heisman, Missouri quarterback Chase Daniel and Hawaii quarterback Colt Brennan were the other finalists selected Wednesday.

"I think it's a good race," Brennan said at a news conference in Honolulu. "I think any-

body can win it."

The Heisman race took a while to develop this season and seemed wide open until the last month when Tebow, McFadden and Daniel emerged as front-runners.

Since the first Heisman was given to Chicago's Jay Berwanger in 1935, all 70 players who have won college football's most prestigious award have been juniors or seniors.

Tebow has a good shot to break that trend. After helping the Gators win a national championship last season as a freshman, 235-pound dual-threat quarterback ran for 838 yards and a Southeastern Conference-record 22 touchdowns in his first year as a starter.

Manu Ginobili scores season-high 37 in Spurs' 97-95 win over Mavs

SAN ANTONIO (AP) — San Antonio Spurs' reserve Manu Ginobili is talented enough to be part of just about any starting lineup in the NBA.

And as the defending NBA champions found out Monday, that includes them.

Ginobili scored a season-high 37 points in the Spurs' 97-95 win over the Dallas Mavericks in his first start of the season.

Ginobili was a game-time decision and played despite still recovering from a bruised finger he got Sunday against Portland.

"I woke up feeling pretty good. ... After I saw I could dribble and shoot pretty well, I had no doubt in my mind that I was going to try and help the guys," Ginobili said.

The starting lineup change came because

Tim Duncan was out with a sprained right ankle he sustained on Sunday.

"They're still a good team without Duncan," said Jason Terry, who had 20 points for the Mavericks. "They have good solid veterans, and give credit to Ginobili. ... He was the hot man, and everything we threw at him he took advantage of."

Tony Parker added 23 points for the Spurs, who lost almost all of an 11-point lead in the fourth quarter.

Josh Howard led the Mavericks with 22 points and nine rebounds and Dirk Nowitzki had 15 points and nine rebounds.

The Spurs won their fourth game in a row and remained unbeaten at home as they made up for a 105-92 November loss to the Mavericks.

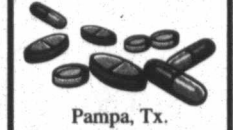

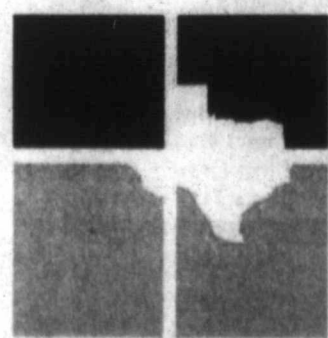
