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School board PISD teachers to receive 3 percent raise

The official budget for the 2008-2009 school year was adopted at Thursday's school board meeting which included a three percent raise on mid-point for all employ-

"If we're going to expect more out of our teachers, we need to provide them with adequate compensation," Board Member Mark McVay said.

McVay also said that teachers in Pampa are currently making \$5,000 less than those in Amarillo as compared to \$2,000 less in 2002 and 2003. However, according to Superintendent Barry Haenisch, Pampa's competition in attracting staff lies with towns like Dumas and Borger.

"Even if we paid the same as teachers in Amarillo, they're going to attract more positions because there's more to do there," Haenisch

The board also reinstated a help our girls." cheerleading program at Pampa Junior High School. According to Susan Baker, who led the effort in getting the program back in the school, there hasn't been a cheerleading squad at the junior high since 1983.

"There are no try-outs. If you want to wear the skirt, if you want to cheer on the sidelines and come to practice, then you're on the team," Baker said. "This is just something we felt would really

Baker said the team would be comprised of eighth graders only and would meet twice a week. They will not be traveling out of town, but instead will cheer at PJHS home games.

The girls involved will be responsible for a one-time cost of \$175 for their equipment and uniforms which would be theirs to keep. Each member was required to get three of their teachers' signa-

Early 31st District judge shot

Anne Davidson has a photograph but very little more, and it took her five years to confirm the identity of one of the people in the

Davidson, who is the curator of the White Deer Land Museum, said she doesn't have much in the way of personal items belonging to 31st District Judge Frank P. Greever. What she does have is a copy of a photograph taken of Greever and an unidentified gentleman in what is assumed to be Greever's chambers at the Gray County

Courthouse in Lefors.

Lefors was the county seat of Gray County until 1928.

Greever was shot as he stepped on to the porch of the Thut Hotel in Lefors in 1915.

"The man (who) killed him was A.E. Humes," Davidson said. "That caused some really bitter stuff down there in Lefors."

Greever's photograph hangs in a special Law Enforcement Room exhibit at the White Deer Land Museum along with Otis Hendrix, a Constable who was shot in a gun battle in Pampa in 1939. They are the only two law enforcement officials to be killed on duty in the county.

According to a story at the time in The McLean News, Judge Greever, 52, had just adjourned court shortly before noon on Friday, April 2, 1915, and walked with Henry Thut to the hotel for dinner.

As he reached the steps of the hotel, Humes, estimated to be 55, stepped out the hotel door. The judge recognized him, spoke

to him and extended his hand. Instead of taking the judge's hand, according to the newspaper account, Hume pulled a .38-caliber revolver and shot Greever in

the shoulder. The newspaper account reported that the judge yelled, "Don't shoot," and turned and fled toward the automobile shed southeast of the hotel. Hume followed, firing four more shots. The last round went through Greever's

the first shot and came outside with a shotgun, but the two men had left the hotel porch and moved to the corral.

As Greever fell, Hume turned the pistol on himself, but he had fired all the bullets in the gun. The newspaper said Hume retreated to a nearby shed, reloaded and shot himself through the brain.

George and Henry Thut carried Greever into the hotel and summoned medical help, but Greever died of his wounds about 9:30 p.m.

Hume was from Oklahoma and the newspaper speculated that he had come to Lefors for the purpose of killing the

judge. Before he died, the judge said Hume had appeared before him in Canadian.

"As far as we know," Davidson said, "he's the only judge that we know (who) got killed during the time and for 50 years afterward." Davidson said Hume appar-

ently had gone through a bitter divorce action in Greever's court.

"It was over child custody," she said.

Davidson said that the judge had ordered Hume to stay away from his former wife and their child.

The Sunday afternoon following the shooting, there were services for Judge Greever in Miami before his casket was shipped to Gainesville, apparently his family home, for burial.

The paper reported that a special train traveled from Canadian to Miami for the

Lone Star Park top trainer faces hearing

AUSTIN (AP) — Steve Asmussen, the top trainer at Lone Star Park, is facing a possible suspension after one of his winning horses tested positive for a banned drug.

Timber Tick, which won a race on May 10, tested posi-

tive for hydroxylidocaine, a metabolite of the local anesthetic lidocaine, the Texas Racing Commission said. Asmussen has exercised his right to have a split specimen tested at a commission-approved laboratory.

Texas racing rules state that a horse may not have any level of prohibited drugs in their body on race day, with a few exceptions.




