Blue/Gold Star mothers sought for recognition

The names of local Blue and Gold Star mothers are being sought for a recognition ceremony in conjunction with the Vietnam Veterans Memorial Wall replica coming to Pampa in November. The week-long series of events, to be hosted by the Pampa Post 1657 Veterans of Foreign Wars (VFW) will include a ceremony honoring the mothers of military personnel.

According to American Gold Star Mothers, Inc., a Gold Star mother is a term applied to mothers whose son or daughter has died in

war combat. The Blue Star mothers by placing a mothers of America, Inc. defines a Blue Star mother as a mother or stepmother who has a son or daughter currently serving in the military, or who has been honorably discharged from the

U.S. Armed Forces. Danny Martin, president of Pampa VFW, first saw the traveling memorial in Perryton and was moved by it.

"The wall is like a magnet. It draws you in and you don't want to leave it," Martin said. "It's like a Band-Aid for moms and dads and families of veterans of any war."

The memorial committee wants to honor the star

Martin feels the action would have a stronger impact if a a Blue or Gold Star mother could place the wreath on the memorial. 



"We wanted to say thank you to the community for letting us serve them for 20 years," Ford said. "We are all about the quality of life and helping people function."



Trials of motherhood require love, love, love

Today is my son's second birthday. Two ranks up there with getting my cavities filled years have come and gone, and I find myself dealing with a strange little beast known as a toddler. That's one thing I wish I had thought more about two years ago. I was so concerned with getting a new baby to sleep through the night that I forgot to think about what I would do with a small, seemingly adorable 1-year-old - and now 2-year-old who constantly tells me "No!" and runs away the precise minute I tell him to, "Come here, please."

I spent seven years teaching high school kids, and I have yet to run into the student who has given me more lessons in humility than my own flesh and blood.

Nate Bailey is an insanely energetic little boy. One nursery worker at church calls him the most "climbingest kid ever was." He climbs and jumps and possesses no fear. It's scary.

He is happiest outdoors, and aside from nap and bed times, he never stops. It's beenlike this since he began running, I mean walking, at the age of 10 months.

Nate is also quite the talker, which also began about a year ago. Lots of words, lots of things to say, but most of them rude. Like "Nate's TURN!" and "Nate's toys!" and "Stoppit!" I hear that's what toddlers like to say ... it doesn't mean I like it.

Apparently there are others similar to my crazy kid; I've read about them in James Dobson's "Strong-Willed Child" parenting book. But I must say, I never envisioned having to read it three times by the time my son turned 2. I didn't think I would have to deal with the daily onslaught of a small person repeatedly testing every inch of patience I possess. I thought that happened at 13.

Case in point: I took my little guy to the doctor this week. Taking Nate to the doctor

- with a touch of humiliation added to the mix.

It starts before we're even in the car. We

go to the garage. "Nate's Screwdriver!" he exclaims as we walk by the toolbox. My

child also has a fetish for Miranda tools. Not baby tools. Not plastic tools or Fisher-Price

Bailey tools, but the kind that could Guest kill a person. "No tools, Nate. We're Columnist

going to the doctor. Time to get in the car," I reply.

We walk to the back car door. I'm dragging him and he's yelling "Nate's tools!" 'Get in the car," I ask nicely.

"Get in the car, Nate," I repeat, thinking he could hear me over his urge for tools.

'Nate. Get in the car. Please. GET IN THE CAR!" (He acts like he's deaf. I try an alter-+ native annoyance tactic.)

"Getinthecar-getinthecar-getinthecar-get inthecar-getinthecar-getinthecar-getinthecar-getinthecar-getinthecar-getinthecar-get inthcar," I say over and over in a monotone voice until he can't stand it and gets in car. (Hey, what do you know? It worked.)

At this point, I know what many of you are thinking, "Why don't you pick him up and put him in the car?"

Tried it. That would elicit a "Nate do it!" yell from the boy. Which would most certainly escalate into what many of you actually think I should have done in the first place when he didn't do what I asked: Spank him!

Well, here's the deal. I tried that six months ago. I spanked, and spanked every single, little time he disobeyed me, or acted out in accidental or purposeful defiance - I tried to break the habit. But that got me and I who have to witness it.

Seriously, if he's not afraid to stand on the dog, or walk on top of the backs of the couch before jumping onto the end table, I can tell you he doesn't really care about getting spanked.

> And I can spank as hard as the next mom. I even have a canister full of spatulas. Not so effective. Occasionally, yes. All day, every day? No.

I remember in the "good old days" one spanking from my dad cured me for at least a month, and here our less-than-2-year old barely cries

when I whoop him. Again, adding to my dismay with this whole motherhood deal. So then I started doing some research on

the "Time Out" thing. It used to be called standing in the corner, back in my day. Either way - I tried that. It worked well for a while, even though I had to physically restrain him there. Until recently. Now he puts himself in "time out" when he gets mad. He just marches to the corner and stands there without me saying a word. Man, there goes another mom-tactic.

Which leads me to our time at the doctor's office. It almost always begins and ends with tantrums. Yelling, screaming, hitting. (Him, not me.) Over stupid things like, "Let's go sit down, Nate'

"No!" he yells as he throws the waiting room table book across the waiting room, missing that really sick-looking woman's head by inches.

"Nathanael Bailey?" the nurse says, opening the pearly gates to let us in to the actual doctor's office. Now his behavior will get worse, but it will just be the doctor, nurse

He crawls up on the bed covered with sanitary paper and proceeds to mangle it to pieces while wiggling all over the place. I pull the stockpile out of my purse.

"Nate, you want stickers?" My distraction techniques are not effective today. He throws the stickers.

"We don't throw things!" I bark.

I get out some snack food; he turns his head away, followed by more wiggling and desperate pleas to steal the medical equipment off the wall. He climbs onto the doctor's rolling chair and spins around, climbs down, and heads for the door - yelping when I block him from getting out.

He wiggles his way through the exam, whining and ignoring my silent cries for him to please be quiet and be still! Maybe he feels the small office walls are closing in on him. I don't know what it is, but it's exhausting, and it's the same every time we're there. I'm losing my mind, and it's not even lunchtime yet!

The doctor diagnoses and leaves. Nate runs out after him. I quickly divert the child, and we finally get back into the car.

"Hold you?" he asks gently, holding my neck and hugging me before I can get him into the car seat.

Oh, happy day! My baby has resurfaced! He loves me! And he's not screaming or yelling or writhing on the ground!

"Mommy hold you," I say back, hugging him and conforming to his baby language without even thinking about it.

My son's going to be a leader some day, I repeatedly tell myself on days like these, somehow trying to reassure myself as to how this fierce independence, never-ending energy and strong personality are going to play out.

But today, he's still my baby.

OPEC countries afraid of high oil prices

Oil replaced coal as fuel for trains because it was cheaper than coal. No solution to the problem of importing so much foreign oil will work if it's based on a substitute fuel more expensive than oil.

Saudi Arabia was poor, very poor, before the discovery of oil. It and the other desert oil kingdoms and sheikdoms have no desire to be poor again. They would like to see a more moderate price for oil high enough to be profitable but low enough not to

alarm consumers.

Other factors involved are speculators, the decline of the value of the U.S. dollar (a big factor), an increase in demand from countries like China and India, and jitters caused by politicians' war talk. Economics is just human psychology at work in the pursuit of wealth. Greed and fear are the drivers. Neither the greed nor the fear is necessarily based on a rational assessment of the situation. Humans are, at best, rational only in short spurts. George Soros, the financier some conservatives love to hate, says you can never

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

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



Golden Ring Toss - Edger gold; Harold Reseck, Norton, silver; and Sherry Begert, bronze.





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Harvard reclaims top spot in latest US News list

Harvard University is the country's oldest, wealthiest and most selective university. Now it's back on top of the U.S. News & World Report college rankings, claiming sole possession of the No. 1 spot for the first time in 12 years.

Princeton slips to No. 2, ending eight straight years of at least sharing the top ranking. The latest edition hits newsstands Monday, but was to be published Friday on the magazine's Web site.

Yale follows at No. 3, and MIT and Stanford tie for fourth. The University of California, Berkeley is the highest-ranked public university, at No. 21 overall. In a separate list for liberal arts colleges, Amherst moves up one spot to tie Williams, its rival just up the road in Massachusetts, for the top spot.

In an e-mailed statement, Harvard Faculty of Arts and Sciences spokesman Robert Mitchell said that "it is always

nice to be recognized in this way. However, our admissions officers always tell prospective students that they should select a college or university that best suits their needs, not by its position in a ranking.

The ranking formula takes account of factors such as SAT scores, peer reputation, selectivity and alumni giving.

So how did Harvard edge past its Ivy League rival? A comparison of last year's numbers points to one category where it moved ahead of Princeton - average class size. Harvard reports the percentage of students in classes under 20 students rose from 69 percent to 75 percent since last year's report, while the percentage in classes bigger than 50 fell from 13 percent to 9 percent.

Asked whether Harvard had made a particular effort to reduce class sizes, Mitchell said: "We have worked and will continue to work very hard to enhance the academic experience for undergraduate students." Since 2000, he said, Harvard has added 86 freshman seminars (which have fewer than 12 students), and more than 100 tenure-track faculty,

while its student body size has stayed about the same.

While U.S. News' often-criticized but closely followed traditional rankings typically get most of the most attention, they rarely change much from year to year. So the magazine has been adding new lists to keep things interesting. Debuting this year are rankings identifying "Up and


Comers" - innovative institutions that college officials identify as poised to move up in the rankings in the coming years. Topping that list are George Mason University in Virginia, Clemson in South Carolina, the University of Southern California and Arizona State.

"One of the criticisms of the rankings is that they move very slowly, it takes a long time for schools to improve," said Brian Kelly, the magazine's editor. "They may be doing things today that aren't going to be reflected for five years in the rankings. We wanted to find a way to illuminate some schools that are doing some really interesting thing."

Also new this year are rankings based on a survey of high school guidance counselors, a group that has often criticized the magazine's mathematical formula.

The survey was sent to counselors at about 1,600 high schools, and about one-quarter responded. Respondents put many of the same schools at the very top of the list, with Harvard, MIT, Princeton and Yale tying for first in their survey. But a number of schools do better in the counselors' survey than in the traditional rankings. For instance, Cornell

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

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HS: Doctors can refuse to provide abortions

WASHINGTON (AP) — had complained that earlier the 1970s. In some cases, The Bush administration on Thursday proposed stronger job protections for doctors and other health care workers who refuse to participate in abortions because of religious or moral objections.

Services Secretary Michael Leavitt said that health care professionals should not retaliation from face employers or from medical societies because they object to abortion.

"Freedom of conscience is not to be surrendered upon issuance of a medical degree," said Leavitt. "This nation was built on a foundation of free speech. The first principle of free speech is protected conscience."

The proposed rule, which applies to institutions receiving government money, would require as many as 584,000 employers ranging from major hospitals to doctors' offices and nursing homes to certify in writing that they are complying with several federal laws that protect the conscience rights of health care workers. Violations could lead to a loss of government funding and legal action to recoup federal money already paid.

Abortion foes called it a victory for the First Amendment, but abortion rights supporters said they feared the rule could stretch the definition of abortion to include birth control, and served notice that they intend to challenge the administration.

"Women's ability to manage their own health care is at risk of being compromised by politics and ideology," Cecile Richards, president of the Planned Parenthood Federation of America, said in a statement.

Abortion rights groups

drafts contained vague language that might block access to birth control, and they said the latest version has not addressed all of their concerns.

The rule "fails to give Health and Human assurances that current laws about abortion will not be stretched to cover birth control," said Nancy Keenan, president of NARAL Pro-Choice America.

But Tony Perkins, president of the conservative Family Research Council, said it upholds basic constitutional freedoms.

"This proposal ensures that doctors and other medical personnel will retain the constitutional right to listen to their own conscience when it comes to performing or participating in an abortion," Perkins said. "These regulations will ensure that pro-life medical personnel will not be forced to engage in the unconscionable killing of innocent human life."

Leavitt said the regulation was intended to protect practitioners who have moral objections to abortion and sterilization, and would not interfere with patients' ability to get birth control or any legal medical procedure.

"Nothing in the new regulation in any way changes a patient's right to any legal procedure," he said, noting that a patient could go to another provider.

"This regulation is not about contraception," Leavitt added. "It's about abortion and conscience. It is very closely focused on abortion and physician's conscience."

The 42-page rule seeks to set up a system for enforcing conscience protections in three separate federal laws, the earliest of which dates to
