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# Student's reading skills target of new program at PISD

It is Kathy Carter's job to know the importance of reading skills for students.

"Reading effects every subject," Carter explained. "Having good reading skills can help all content areas."

Carter, director of secondary programs for the Pampa Independent School District (PISD), has worked for the past four years trying to make

sure that these skills improve for Pampa students. This vear will mark the beginning of a new effort for reading

level intervention using the "Read180" program.


Read180 has launched to help students who are two or more reading grade levels below their current grade level increase their reading proficiency levels. The program, which has been used for over six years and now is being used in over 6,000 schools, will be for 7th to 12th grade students, and will have about about 20 students in each class. Read180 uses software and a 90 minute course block to help students who struggle with reading learn reading skills using alternative methods.

Carter decided to propose Read180 to the school board after noticing a severe need to raise reading levels for new Texas Assessment of Knowledge and Skills (TAKS) test requirements. TAKS, which is the Texas state-wide accountability tests created in part of the No Child Left Behind Act (NCLB), requires students to pass the test at the reading level they are in to move on to the next grade. TAKS created new requirements for eighth graders this year. They must

pass the Reading and Math TAKS in order to continue to high school.

Carter, who is in charge of reading intervention programs, noticed failing students and decided the intervention program PISD had in place wasn't doing enough. She began to look into Read180.

"We decided to use this program based on the feedback from other schools who



demographic as us," Carter made us feel like this is the best thing for our students.

Read180 will count as a regular English credit for the 120-140 students who are enrolled. In the program, the students will learn though whole-group discussion, small-group discussion, Read180 computer software, and audio books. The software and curriculum features of a variety of elements like text captioning, language support, multicultural content, and a individually set pace-program to help students from a variety of backgrounds improve their reading level.

According to Carter, there are many intervention based programs in elementary schools, but not in high

schools. Carter explained the reason that students start having trouble with reading after they have actually learned to read: " Students have trouble reading when they go from learning how to read, to using reading to learn. Non-fiction reading at grade level becomes the most difficult."

The low reading levels

are not the fault of the teachers, but more of the system.

"Teachers may know their content area, but they don't always know how to teach people to read," Carter continued. "Teachers can be excellent with instructions, but extra intervention is needed."

Read 180 is geared for delayed and failing readers, said. "That information English Language Learners (ELL), students with disabilities, and special educa-

tion students. Initiating Read 180 into Pampa Junior High and High School has been a long process. Carter spent the last four years examining the program and has been working for the past year-and-a-half to determine how feasible it would be to bring this program to Pampa. Now, after finding teachers who will commit to the fidelity and strict model of the program, Read180 is the second reading intervention in Pampa

Carter has high, but realistic hopes for the future of the Read180 program in Pampa schools.

schools, along with Read-

"I suspect there will always be students reading below grade level," she noted. "My hope is that as time goes by, fewer students will need Read180. This is definitely a program we will keep and commit too because we will always have students who struggle with reading."




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

Society says stay-at-home moms. I mistakenly believed the widespread myth myself. But now I know better. The mother who does the best job is the one who knows there is a fine line between putting family first and recognizing that a mom's needs

must also be met before she can do just that.

So statements by the last of the Christian knights and the first of the 20th-century warriors (Sherman was ahead of his time) illustrate the ambivalence that war causes. It is, especially seen from a distance or through the sanitized lenses of America's lap-dog television networks, an exciting adventure. It is the ultimate sport – the animal kingdom's most ferocious predators locked in a struggle to the death. Brave young men risking all to fight for their country – or so they've been told, though the real reasons are usually quite different. It is a natural

impulse to cheer for our side. But as much as I love Lee and despise Sherman, Sherman was right. The glory of war is all moonshine. It is pure hell. That's why the American networks censor, without even being told, the ugly images of war. That was the case when they decided not to air the pictures of dead Americans that Iraqi television made available and that were broadcast globally by Al-Jazeera, the independent Arab television network.

That was the wrong decision. It is not the job of journalists to protect the sensitivities of people or to participate in American propaganda. Those ugly pictures of young Americans, their faces

mutilated by bullets and shrapnel, are the true face of war. That's what war is death, mutilation and destruction. Why hide from Americans what they wanted? The polls say 70 percent or more support war. Well, you should be willing to look at what you support all of it, not just a censored, prettified version of it.

Yes, indeed, it is horribly hard on families who lose loved ones or see them taken into captivity by an enemy that we know is both dangerous and often brutal. That's why I actively discouraged all three of my children from joining the military, even though I served in the Army.

Politicians start wars, and I no longer trust American politicians to do the right thing. In fact, I'm 95 percent certain that a majority of them will do the wrong thing. They waste precious American lives and think they can get away with it by uttering that awful cliché "our heart goes out to ..." What the hell does that mean? Whether your heart goes out or stays in isn't going to the ease the pain of loss, restore life or heal the mutilated. After you've sent young people to war, it's too late to be sorry when they get killed.

In these Orwellian times, governments and corpora-

As the Bush administration's leading advocate for privatizing roads and highways — and funding new highways with tolls — Peters wants to know how much landing and departure time slots at the nation's airports are worth on the open market. So she's pushing an experiment, and those who use Newark Liberty International Airport are the guinea pigs. Using chronic congestion and flight delays as a pretext, she wants to start auctioning flight slots to the highest bidder next

It is one of the most harebrained ideas to have come out of Washington in the past seven years, as ideological purity and political spin have all too

often trumped sound reasoning and proven results. Rather than targeting the underlying problem — insufficient capacity — the Peters plan attempts to fix the nation's overcrowded airways by pricing passengers out of the market. Granting takeoff and departure rights to whoever is willing to pay the most means higher operating costs for financially strapped airlines. And that translates into ticket price hikes estimated at 12 percent. ...

If the Newark experiment goes through, the lame-duck Bush administration intends to auction 70 to 80 slots at each of the three area airports before it leaves office in January. Increased airfares - add them to the list of Bush administration legacies.



Still at large are Edward Salas, who was convicted of murder for the 2005 shooting death of a 10-year-old boy, and Larry McClendon, who faces charges of murder and aggravated robbery.

Authorities say they believe that McClendon may be traveling with another escaped inmate, Michael England.




