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
## Local church celebrates global milestone

The Pampa Church of the Nazarene will hold special services this weekend commemorating the 100th anniversary of the denomination and the 78th anniversary of the local church.

"We are inviting the community to come and join us in worship and celebrate our 100th anniversary," said Rev. Jimmve Cole, pastor. The church is located at 500 North West Street (the corner of North West and Buckley Streets). The October 5 special service will begin at 10:30 a.m.





According to the Los Angeles Times, finance officials, regular Joes and leftist intellectuals within Europe have condemned the perceived breakdown of America's capitalistic sys-

French intellectuals have been gloating about it. They are making "gleeful allusions to the stock market crash of 1929." They are expressing nostalgia for "the good old days when bankers jumped out of windows." They are criticizing government plans to bail out U.S. corporate giants who otherwise loathe government.

But they have entirely misunderstood the cause of the problem. America's capitalistic systems didn't fail. Our government did.

You see, the money-lending business used to be rigid in America. Bankers used to apply draconian measures: They demanded that applicants have jobs, decent credit histories and enough dough to make a down pay-

But some in our government felt such requirements were unfair. Some 31 years ago, they passed the Community Reinvestment bocharged that law during the Clinton years. It requires lenders to extend loans to folks who would not otherwise qualify.

In meantime, another government entity – the Federal Columnist Reserve pumped

easy money into the economy. Pretty soon, any old fool could get a loan

And as every old fool did get a loan, the loans were packaged and happily sold to quasi-government organizations, such as Fannie Mae and Freddie Mac. The role of Fan and Fred is to buy up loans from lenders so the lenders can then lend more money to other home buyers.

But Fan and Fred started buying some loan packages that included "subprime" loans because they paid higher returns. The higher returns allowed Fan and Fred to show higher profits (on paper, anyhow). The higher profits allowed the government cronies who ran Fan and Fred to give themselves multimillion-dollar

So long as the housing bubble was expanding - and Fan and Fred regulators was happy. Folks invested in Fan and Fred, because, as quasi-government organizations, everybody figured the government would bail them

out if they ever went belly up.

Fan and Fred did go belly up and taxpayers were forced to bail them

But the financial mess the government helped create is now so widespread, the only way to head off an even greater mess is more government intervention - the borrowing of lots more taxpayer dough to keep the massive house of cards from collaps-

Our government is just getting warmed up.

Negative economic news is benefiting the Democrat candidate. The more people panic about the financial markets, the more voters for reasons that make no sense to me – think Obama's ideas will lead to better economic conditions.

But his ideas will lead to more government meddling. He's promised to raise a variety of taxes, such as the capital gains tax, even though his increases will hurt investment and damage

He's promising billions in new spending to fund all kinds of new programs, which will divert even more money from the private sector to the government sector - and further slow the econDE

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He's promising to apply similar government philosophies - the same commandand-control meddling that has perverted our financial systems and led to the crisis we are in - to "fix" health care, the environment and a host of other challenges.

So, my French intellectual friends, don't gloat over the demise of America's capitalistic system. It is our government system that did most of the failing. And government failure always begets more government.

Which ought to make you happy. Where government intervention is concerned, America is becoming more like France every day.

If we keep it up, our economy will soon be as anemic as France's. We'll soon have lots more unemployed folks sitting around cafes complaining about the failure of American capitalism.

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
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### Texas Thoughts

A sample of editorial opinion around Texas:

■ Sept. 22 Fort Worth Star-Telegram on the big bailout plan:

Rather than letting U.S. financial markets continue dying the death of a thousand cuts, the Bush administration is proposing a sweeping, broad-based plan under which the federal government would buy up troubled home mortgages and other bad debt from struggling lenders.

Treasury Secretary Henry Paulson, a leader in developing the plan, said the cost of the extensive government intervention would likely run in the "hundreds of billions." President Bush acknowledged that it would put "a significant amount of taxpayers' money on the line," but "the risk of not acting would be far higher."

In general, we like the broad-based approach of dealing comprehensively with what is being called the nation's worst financial crisis in decades. The economic trauma potentially could drag on much longer, and inflict considerably greater pain, if the government were to keep dealing with the crisis on a piecemeal basis.

The prospects of a comprehensive rescue plan sent the beleaguered U.S. stock market on a sharp upward swing the past two days. Nevertheless, we're not ready to say "yea" or "nay" to the administration's proposal because few specifics were provided Friday. Paulson was expected to work through the weekend with congressional leaders from both parties to hammer out details. He said he hopes Congress can adopt legislation by next week to create the program.

Some observers say it could resemble the Resolution Trust Corp., a federal entity created in 1989 to buy up distressed properties in the wake of a farranging crisis involving savings and loan institutions.

The plan announced by Paulson and Bush has been described as potentially the largest government bailout in U.S. history and part of the most massive

federal intervention in financial mar-

kets since the Great Depression. The federal government already has taken over troubled mortgage giants Fannie Mae and Freddie Mac and insurance titan AIG. In addition, the Federal Reserve is taking a variety of actions to pump more money into the markets. This calamity could have been largely avoided with effective financial regulation and responsible mortgage lending practices, but that's now water under the bridge.

It's crucial that trust and confidence be restored in the markets of the world's largest and most-powerful economy. As Paulson said on Friday, "The financial security of all Americans ... depends on our ability to restore our financial institutions to a sound footing.'

We'll know considerably more about the Bush administration plan in the next several days.

### Money sent home by Mexicans in US drops 12 percent

MEXICO CITY (AP) -Mexicans living in the U.S. sent home 12 percent less money in August, the largest drop on record since the Bank of Mexico began tracking remittances 12 years ago, the central bank reported on Wednesday.

Remittances began dropping early this year, economically stranding many small towns and neighborhoods that live off the stipends. The Bank of Mexico said remittances will likely continue to fall in the coming months because of the "difficult problems the U.S. economy faces."

The bank said remittances in August dropped 12 percent to US\$1.9 billion. That compares to US\$2.2 billion in August 2007.

Migrants living in the

U.S. have sent home US\$15.5 billion in the first eight months of this year, 4 percent less than the same period the year before.

A slowing U.S. economy and stepped up immigration enforcement by the U.S. government, including record deportations and increased border security, are behind the drop.

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Meals on Wheels celebrates thirty years of service to the Pampa Community on October 9th. This wonderful organization of service delivered its first meals to 45 of Pampa's home-bound residents on October 9th, 1978. At the time, the meals were prepared at the Leisure Lodge Nursing Home, Now known as Coronado Healthcare Center. However, within two years Meals on Wheels had outgrown their space and were offered a room for an office and the use of the kitchen at the First United Methodist Church. This temporary situation continued for 24 years. In June of 2004, Meals on Wheels moved into their newly purchased and remolded home at 302 E. Foster. We presently serve approximately 135 to 150 meals Monday through Friday to the home-bound in our community. The criteria to receive our meals is to be 55 years of age, or older, with medical problems. Anyone younger than 55 who needs the meals can submit a letter from their doctor or from the Social Security Office confirming their need and disability. It takes a minimum of 15 volunteers daily to assist in the kitchen and deliver the meals. We are very fortunate that in spite of the high gas prices, our volunteers continue to serve in whatever capacity they are needed.

We have twelve board members: Sherry McCavit, President, Jana Vinson, Vice President, Linda Holt, Secretary, Raymond Barrett, Treasurer and Members at Large are Donna Reynolds, Sharon Haynes, Tom Burns, Lynn Allison, Joan Gray Soria, Judy Sutton, John Palmitier, and Donna Brauchi.

We have six paid workers: Jeane Autry, Executive Director, Cindy Flaharity, Head Cook, Doris Stevens, Food Inventory Clerk, Donna Miller, Patron Coordinator, Becky Watson, Volunteer Coordinator, and Amy Devers, Assistant Cook.

We will celebrate our thirty years of serving the Pampa community with a Volunteer Coordinator Luncheon on October 9th. We urge anyone who has ever volunteered for Meals On Wheels to attend our luncheon which will be held at the M.K. Brown Heritage Room. Our special entertainment will be Country-Western singer Ed Montana. Please R.S.V.P. by calling 669-1007 by October 6th.
