"He had an MRI scan a month and a half ago and the results were good," Team Development Coordinator Pam Dalton said. "Now that treatment is over he has gained weight and got his hair back."

To help support the goals of the American Cancer Society, luminaria candles will be available to the public for a \$5 donation. The candles will be lit around 9 p.m. on Friday evening in a special ceremony during the Relay For Life event. Those who purchase candles are invited to attend.

City Manager contract negotiations under way

Pampa Mayor Lonny Robbins will begin negotiating with Interim City Manager Trevlyn Pitner today over salary and benefits and a permanent job.

Following a closed-door evaluation of Pitner's work at interim city manager during Tuesday afternoon's city commission meeting, the commission authorized Robbins to negotiate a contract with Pitner for future employment. Commissioner Robert Dixon said the contract should be completed on or before August 1.

Pitner, former Pampa Police Chief, was named interim city manager April 1, after City Manager John Horst retired.

Each commission member complimented Pitner as he resumed their open session Tuesday afternoon.

"I think you're doing a great job," Commissioner Brad Pingel told Pitner.

Commissioner Bill Allison said he'd had glowing reports from some of his constituents.

"I think you're doing a good job," said Dixon.

"I and the rest of the commission are very pleased," Mayor Robbins said.

Robbins said Pampa would become more visible in the region, nationally and internationally. He said the community needed someone who could represent Pampa well.

In other business, the commission tabled a request by Centramedia to erect a wireless tower on a city right-of-way at Chestnut and

Linda following opposition at a public hearing on the matter (See related story).

They approved an \$81,868 bid from Express Scales Services, Inc., of Canyon, for new hydraulic scales and installation at the Pampa landfill.

The commission also approved a customer service agreement with the Texas Department of Criminal Justice. Under the agreement, the TDJC will take water samples inside the Jordan and Baten Units east of Pampa and deliver them to Pampa water treatment facility. The Texas Commission on Environmental Quality is requiring the TDJC to test water from the prison units. The state will pay for the testing.

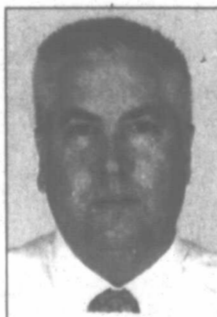
The city commission also voted to renew a lease with Centramedia for three years on part of a city-owned building at 822 E. Foster. Under the lease, the city is crediting Centramedia for \$15,000 of improvements to the building for their continued rent of \$200 per month.

The building also contains the city's business incubator.

Commissioners also passed a resolution that would suspend a Southwestern Public Service's proposed rate increase to Oct. 15 and authorize the city to join a coalition of communities to hire lawyers and consultants in the case.

Southwestern Public Service filed an application on June 12, to increase its base rates by about \$84.2 million dollars across its service area. The increased rates would be effective July 17. The base rate increase to residential customers would be about \$10.33 a month. The residential customer charge, or Service Availability Charge, would increase from \$5.10 to \$6.50 a month.

The commission also heard a report on the Freedom Museum from Andy Epps, the museum's curator.

Public hearing held on wireless tower request

Seven Pampa citizens are opposed to a wireless tower that would offer internet services to northeast Pampa. One man says it isn't a problem.

The Pampa City Commission held a public hearing Tuesday afternoon on a proposal that would allow Centramedia to put up a telephone pole with an antenna on top at Chestnut and Linda Drive that would provide northeast Pampa

with wireless internet access. "It's not much different than any telephone pole you see except it's taller," said Chris Vainrib with Centramedia.

Seven people spoke against the measure. Vainrib said that city officials suggested the intersection but added that he was open to an alternative location.

The city commission tabled the proposal until another location could be suggested.

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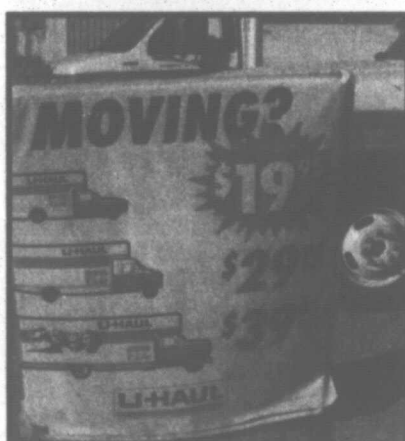

Nation's TSA specializes in airport tyranny

It's been at least five years since I've flown commercial, and for good reason: I don't wish to be arrested for questioning actions by often arrogant, rude Transportation Security Administration (TSA) workers. Two years ago, my decision was reinforced by my daughter's experience when going through airport security with her two lovebirds. Having shown her ticket and ID to security personnel, and walking toward the metal detector, they started shouting to her, "Miss, you're going to have to take them birds out of the cage."

I watched with incredulity as she approached the metal detectors. Fortunately, a TSA worker took the cages and my daughter followed without further incident. Had it been I traveling with the birds, I might have told the TSA workers something that would have gotten me arrested.

James Bovard has an article titled "Federal Attitude Policy" that appears in Freedom Daily (June 2008), a publication of the Fairfax, Va.-based Future of Freedom Foundation. According to the February 2002 Federal Register, people can be arrested if they act in a way that "might distract or inhibit a screener from effectively performing his or her duties . . . A screener encountering such a situation must turn away from his or her normal duties to deal with the disruptive individual, which may affect the screening of other individuals."

That means it is a federal offense, and a fine of up to

\$1,500, for any alleged "nonphysical interference" that makes a TSA screener "turn away" from whatever he was doing.

What's nonphysical interference is solely up to the discretion of a TSA screener since it isn't defined in the regulations. TSA agents can levy fines for a passenger disagreeing with the behavior or arrogance of a screener.

The TSA has made little effort to control screener behavior. Bovard reports that in March 2004, airline passengers filed almost 3,000 formal complaints with the federal government over the conduct of TSA screeners. Hundreds have complained about the rudeness of TSA screeners. And yet, none of these passenger complaints resulted in disciplinary measures. In fact, passengers filed four times more complaints against the TSA than against airlines.

But it's going to get worse. The TSA aims to have 500 "behavior detection officers" (BDOs) in airports by the end of this year. The job of the BDOs will be that of examining passengers for "body language and facial cues . . . for signs of bad intentions." They look for what the experts call "micro-expressions."

Fear and disgust are the key ones, he said, because they're associated with

deception. That would make me a prime candidate for scrutiny and possibly trouble because if I ever had to go through airport security procedures, I would have those "micro-expressions" of disgust and fear of arrest.

McClatchy Newspapers reported in an article, "New airport agents check for danger in fliers' facial expressions," (August 2007) that Jay Cohen, undersecretary of Homeland Security for Science and Technology,

"wants to automate passenger screening by using videocams and computers to measure and analyze heart rate, respiration, body temperature and verbal responses as well as facial micro-expressions."

Someone who wishes to hijack or destroy a plane will spend considerable time and effort to get around the TSA's attitude-detecting policies. The bulk of the people hassled by these and other TSA procedures are

law-abiding Americans who have no malicious intentions, along with a few people traveling with drugs and other contraband.

The TSA routinely confiscates about 15,000 items a day from passengers, in addition to the hassle, rudeness and arrogance. With these kind of costs imposed on the traveling public, I'd like TSA to give an account of themselves, namely just how many hijackings or bombings they have prevent-

ed, along with the evidence.

Americans have been far too compliant and that has given the TSA carte blanche to treat travelers any way they wish. I'm staying away. TSA has its rules and Williams has his, and one of mine is to avoid tyrants and idiots.

Austin American-Statesman on Democratic presidential nominee Sen. Barack Obama and revealing the truth:

Democratic presidential hopeful Barack Obama learned an important lesson from the 2004 presidential campaign: Don't be passive about false rumors.

When Democratic nominee and Vietnam War veteran John Kerry, who served with distinction in the U.S. Navy and won multiple Purple Hearts for wounds in battle, was attacked for a lack of patriotism, his campaign was slow to respond. Obama won't be so passive.

The scurrilous attack on Kerry, largely funded by Houston homebuilder Bob Perry, a Republican Party sugar daddy, was outlandish. A group called Swift Boat Veterans for Truth posted the ads, coining a new term for dirty politics — swiftboating.

Obama's campaign has had to fight swiftboating all year, regularly fielding wild rumors about his heritage, his patriotism and his religion. In most instances, the campaign staff fired back

quickly to a targeted audience.

But after the dustup last week over comments attributed to his wife, Michelle, the Obama campaign took to the Internet with a vengeance and a new Web site. Michelle Obama was accused of using a derogatory term for white people, which she and her husband roundly denied when it was reported and deny again on the Web site.

The name of the Web site, fightthesmears.com, says it all clearly and concisely. Obama's camp will respond to smears instantly and forcefully. It will not be easily swiftboated, not be passive about rumors no matter how bizarre, not be caught unaware of the destructive potential of false statements.

It's an unfortunate reality of modern politics that the most absurd charges assume a life of their own on the Internet. Anyone can post any nutty thing, and it spreads like a virus. This is the new gutter politics, and it can be effective.

Obama's camp is smart to fight back aggressively. The Web site already answers not only the smear against Michelle, but disproves several others. Obama's birth certificate is posted to counter that he's not an American; his Christian upbringing is explored to

prove he's not a Muslim; a video of him leading the Pledge of Allegiance in the Senate gives lie to the smear that he refuses to say the pledge.

Also, to counter the attacks on him using partial quotes (or entirely fabricated ones) from his books, the full texts are offered. This is an effective strategy to refute the smears, innuendos and outright lies that have accompanied Obama's successful campaign.

Obama and Republican presidential aspirant John McCain have spoken of rejecting smear campaigns this political season and raising the political debates to a new level. At this point, that looks more like hope than fact.

Even if they both take the high road, nothing will prevent hatemongers from spreading poison. Nothing will prevent radio personalities from repeating false, hateful smears, giving them another life. Nothing will prevent anonymous bloggers from posting pure fiction under the guise of political truths.

But Democrats have learned from the swiftboating of Kerry that they can and must fight back. Fightthesmears.com is an excellent tool for turning lies and smears back on their perpetrators and revealing the truth. URL: <http://www.statesman.com>

Chestnut, objected to the telephone pole because she thought it would be an eyesore to the neighborhood and it would be too close to Austin Elementary School.

Matt Street, 2101 Chestnut, objected because he thought it would be a safety hazard. He said that 18 years ago a small boy was hit by a motorist and killed at the intersection. He said there were trees and bushes on the corner that blocked a driver's view. Street said 16 years ago when he and his wife moved to their house where they live now, he cut down four trees and dig out six large bushes.

In an emotional plea, his wife, Janie Street, recalled the death of the little boy.

"Little kids don't watch for cars," she said, "but cars have got to be able to see little boys and little girls on bicycles. You cannot obstruct the view at that corner."

John Haesle, 2111 Chestnut, said he thought the phone pole would be an eyesore and that there should be a better location.

Chris Keller, 501 Linda Drive, echoed the others concerns about the tower being an eyesore and a safety hazard.

"It's something I don't want to see go up in that area," Keller said.

Betty Garrett, 1722

Chestnut, said she, too, thought there should be a better location.

"I would be opposed to it because my daughters went to this park to play and have lunch and there's more traffic now than there was then," Garrett said. "I just think it could be put in a better location."

Betty Hink, 1717 Chestnut, said she opposed the tower because it was near a public park used by children.

"I am very much opposed to the erection of a radio tower in a residential area," Hink said.

"I can't see that there's any big deal out of it," said Walt Bailey, 2115 Chestnut. "I see no problem."

Bailey said if it would solve the problem, Centramedia could put the tower on his property.

"Centramedia is not opposed to putting it in a different location," Vainrib said.

He said it does not have to be on that corner.

Vainrib said the tower would be a telephone pole wireless base station would be about 65 feet tall that would provide wireless internet service to the company's customers in northeast Pampa. He said the equipment on the pole would be above street light level and that he was open to other locations, but he said they needed something

in that general area.

He said they had about 50 customers in that area.

"Without that location," Vainrib said, "there's some question as to whether or not we're going to be able to maintain service to those customers."

The written proposal states that the pole will rise about 57 feet above ground with a nine-foot antenna atop it. The proposal states that the pole would be 36 inches in diameter, but Vainrib said it would be 36 inches in circumference.

Centramedia will compensate the city for use of the right-of-way, but as part of that compensation, the company will also mount a security camera on the pole to monitor the park. Vainrib said Centramedia would

also provide free to the city an internet connection to the camera. He said that the city could also put a street light on the pole if they wished.

City Manager Trevlyn Pitner said the city already has security cameras in other areas of town and this one would become part of that network.

Vainrib said the tower would replace one that is now on the side of an ex-employee's house at 2217 Dogwood. He also noted that they were 120 days past the date they needed to move the tower.

Pitner said that the height of the pole required a public hearing before the commission could approve Centramedia's proposal.

Imus said Tuesday: "What people should be outraged about is that they arrest blacks for no reason. I mean, there's no reason to arrest this kid six times."

During a conversation Monday about the arrests of Jones, Imus asked, "What color is he?"

Told by a sports announcer that Jones is "African-American," Imus responded: "There you go. Now we know."

Dear Abby...

DEAR ABBY: I'm writing in response to "The In-Laws in New Jersey" (April 26), who think their daughter-in-law is rude for speaking a foreign language to her parents and children in front of them. I'm disappointed you didn't point out the opportunity Carmella has to enrich the lives of her husband's parents. The United States is one of the only first-world nations that does not require its children to learn more than one language, which has left many people feeling that anyone not speaking English is being "rude." Bilingual people can tell you that the pattern of speaking with family in the native language is deeply ingrained and is not easily broken. It isn't intended to exclude others. The in-laws are not out of line to ask Carmella to translate what she's saying, but they could use it as a chance to be a part of their grandchildren's language development. I come from a bilingual family. My husband is monolingual. We're aware that not speaking English can make him feel isolated, so we do our best to translate to keep him in the loop. This approach has enabled him to start learning the language -- and he's coming along nicely. Multilingualism is an asset to society -- not a flaw. -- **BILINGUAL AND PROUD, ALEXANDRIA, VA.**

DEAR BILINGUAL: Thank you for the input. The "In-laws" had let Carmella know the private conversations made them uncomfortable, and I felt a little more sensitivity to their feelings was in order. However, the responses that have poured in offer varied perspectives. Read on for a sample:

DEAR ABBY: I doubt Carmella was speaking the foreign language to be rude. She may not even realize she's doing it. When you have spoken one language to your parents all your life, switching to another is awkward and unnatural. I speak Taiwanese to my parents, but English to all my friends. Your brain automatically

changes languages without you even thinking about it. Carmella's in-laws should know she probably isn't doing it to exclude them, but is only doing something that is second nature. -- **WAN-JEN IN UTAH**

DEAR ABBY: I am a white, English-speaking, middle-aged woman living in a multiethnic, multi-language community. I can tell you firsthand that learning a few words in another language goes a long way toward community and family harmony. May I suggest the New Jersey in-laws show some polite interest and ask Carmella for help with basic greetings and courtesy terms such as "please," "thank you" and "How are you?" Perhaps they could also learn "I love you" in her language to share with their grandchildren. -- **JANET IN IDAHO**

DEAR ABBY: I am French, married to an Englishman who does not speak French. For the last 10 years, I have spoken only French to my children. When others are present, I always let them know I am not being impolite or trying to keep them out of the conversation. My kids are perfectly bilingual now, and in order to achieve such a goal you must be consistent. To me, preserving the richness of two cultures is more important than offending someone. But children should know they can translate for other people in the room when appropriate. -- **SIMONE IN CALIFORNIA**

DEAR ABBY: Having the ability to speak some English doesn't mean someone is always comfortable doing it at length or can express what they truly mean. Some colloquialisms, jokes and terms of endearment do not translate. If the in-laws accept that it's not all about them, they will soon realize that "family" can cross language barriers. -- **HAPPY THE WAY THINGS ARE**
