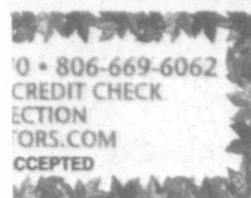

Local archeological site to be discussed Sunday

A presentation on the Texas Archeological Society's Field School held in Roberts and Ochiltree counties at the Harold Courson family ranch will be held Sunday at the White Deer Land Museum Annex in Pampa. The program will begin at 2:30. It is free and open to the public through a sponsorship by the museum and the Gray County Historical Society.

The presentation, given by Rolla Shaller, will feature artifacts and a slide program on the dig, which was held last June. Over 400

participated at the sites that were divided among a 700-year Plains Village site, a mid-1800's historic Indian encampment, a mid-late Archaic Indian site and an 1868 military site.

Shaller will focus on archeological and metal detector surveys and excavations at the Col. A.W. Evans 1868 Military Supply Depot in northern Roberts County. He will show slides to illustrate some of the activities. The Shaller program is also sponsored by the Pampa Genealogical Society and is in recognition of Texas Archeological Month.

Turbulence injures airline passengers en route to Miami

MIAMI (AP) — Paramedics at Miami International Airport treated at least six passengers who complained of bumps and bruises from turbulence Friday on an American Airlines flight from Argentina, authorities said.

At least one passenger was transferred on a stretcher, said Miami-Dade County Fire Rescue spokesman Arnold Piedrahita.

Flight 908 was making a descent into the airport before 7 a.m. when it hit severe turbulence at 30,000 feet, said Tim Smith, a spokesman for Fort Worth, Texas-based American Airlines. The "fasten seat belt" light was on.

Six people — two flight attendants and four passengers — were taken to the hospital with back and neck injuries. Their conditions were not immediately available.

"Flight attendants, at that altitude, would still be up for duty," Smith said. He could not say if the passengers were walking around the cabin or in their seats.

The Boeing 777 carrying 246 passengers and 14 crew members from Buenos Aires landed safely, Smith said.

Texas gas prices keep falling

HOUSTON (AP) — Retail gasoline prices keep plummeting across Texas as crude oil prices fall on world markets.

The weekly AAA Texas survey released Thursday finds regular-grade self-serve gasoline averaging \$3.28 per gallon statewide. That's 22 cents lower than last week and about 12 cents less than the national average.

Crude oil on the spot market has fallen from a record \$147.27 per barrel on July 11th to between \$87 and \$90 now. The global economic crisis has slashed demand, and Gulf

Bush says anxiety feeding market instability

WASHINGTON (AP) — President Bush said Friday that the government's financial rescue plan was aggressive enough and big enough to work, but would take time to fully kick in. "We can solve this crisis and we will," he said in brief remarks from the White House Rose Garden.

Bush spoke as leaders of the world's top economies gathered in Washington amid frozen credit markets, panic selling in stock markets and a looming global recession.

The president noted that major Western countries were working together in an attempt to stabilize markets and end the spreading panic, including coordinated cuts in interest rates.

"Through these efforts, the world is sending an unmistakable signal. We're in this together and we'll come through this together," Bush said.

Finance ministers and central bankers from the Group of Seven — the United States,

Japan, Britain, Germany, France Italy and Canada — were here for a weekend meeting. Bush plans to meet with the leaders on Saturday.

Bush said he understood how Americans could be concerned about their economic future. "That anxiety can feed anxiety and that can make it hard to see all that's being done to solve the problem," he said.

But despite a relentless sell-off that has seen the Dow Jones industrials plunge 20

percent in the past seven trading days, Bush said, "We are a prosperous nation with immense resources and a wide range of tools at our disposal."

The president said the new \$700 billion rescue plan that he signed into law a week ago authorizes the Treasury Department to use a variety of measures to rebuild their balance sheets including "purchasing equity of financial institutions."

It was the first time the

president has mentioned suggestions that the government buy shares of banks, although it has been mentioned by other administration officials.

Since the bailout package was signed into law, the conversation about how it will be used has shifted from taxpayers buying troubled mortgages to taxpayers buying troubled banks. Or at least pieces of them.

Such a move would amount to a partial nationalization of the U.S. banking industry, a move once considered unthinkable.

The government is authorized under the law to buy "troubled assets."

Those assets include mortgages, but according to the law, they may also include

"any other financial instrument" that is "necessary to promote financial market stability ..."

It is the government's position that this authority extends to bank stocks.

"The plan we are executing is aggressive. It is the right plan. It will take time to have its full impact. It is flexible enough to adapt as the situation changes. And it is big enough to work," Bush said.

He also noted that the Federal Reserve has injected hundreds of billions into the system and with other central banks has made interest-rate cuts that should help thaw frozen credit markets and enable loans to flow again.

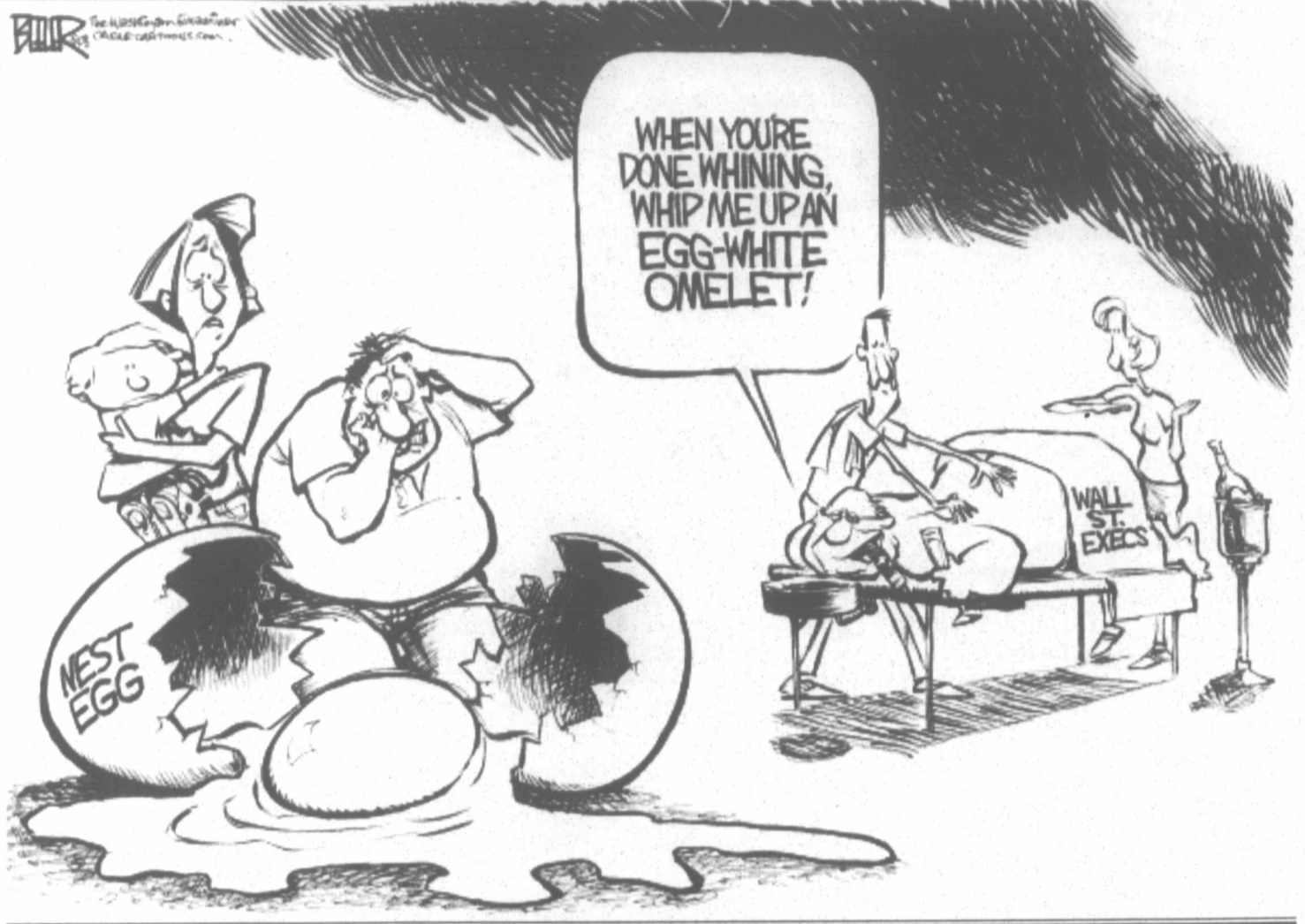

Experts say that one of the top stressors is moving. Though I've heard this before, I wish I had listened.

"Moving-shmooving. What's the big deal? I did it all the time as a kid ..." I thought to myself. It just didn't seem to be a huge thing. Pack a few boxes. Get a new house. Move in. Done.

If only! I seemed to forget that it was my mom and dad who moved us. I was just an innocent bystander.

Let's just say that I'm not completely out of my current house, haven't packed more than six boxes yet, with 10 days till "M-Day," and this is what it has resorted to at our house already:

Texas Thoughts

A sample of editorial opinion around Texas:

■ Sept. 29
Austin American-Statesman on offshore drilling:

Here's a story you didn't hear or read about over the last few weeks: Major oil spills from drilling rigs and production platforms in the Gulf of Mexico, even after thousands of them were raked by hurricanes Ike and Gustav. Damage inspections have not been completed, state officials say, so maybe something serious will be found but not yet.

Similarly, in 2005, as much damage as Katrina and Rita did on shore, there were no major spills from offshore platforms. Though numerous drilling and production platforms, as well as pipelines, were damaged, a federal study reported a total of 17,652 barrels spilled and no onshore impact.

In this case, no news is good news, and it undermines Democratic arguments against opening more of the American coasts to offshore drilling for oil and natural gas and particularly natural gas, the cleanest of fossil fuels.

But what really cut down Democratic opposition to more offshore drilling was the shocking rise this year in gasoline prices to \$4 a gallon and a Republican campaign in favor of removing a long-standing ban on drilling off much of the American coasts.

Just a few weeks ago, the Republicans in Congress, and the party's presidential candidate, Sen. John McCain, were getting a lot of attention and public support for their pro-drilling campaign. Even the Democratic candidate, Sen. Barack Obama, had to soften his opposition to offshore drilling.

Finally, last week, House Democrats threw in the towel and agreed to let the drilling ban lapse.

The removal of the ban may prove temporary. If voters in November install a new Congress with a big Democratic majority and a Democratic president, a new ban may follow.

There's another, more important reason the GOP drilling victory likely will be forgotten: It was oversold in the first place.

Even if no new ban is imposed, it will be years before drilling begins and

years after that before new oil and gas wells begin producing. And while new production will be helpful, it will not substantially reduce prices or American dependence on imported oil.

The U.S. Department of the Interior, led by a Republican appointee, said it could begin offering leases in some federal waters in the Atlantic no sooner than 2011, three years from now. By then maybe the worldwide shortage in offshore drilling rigs will be overcome, but even if it is, it will take another several years of exploring, drilling and (assuming oil and gas are found) setting up ways to get the oil and gas safely on shore.

So while the GOP can claim a political victory on the drilling ban, it will be years if ever before that victory actually does anything for the American people.

As we said, offshore drilling has proven to be safe, and the industry has a heavy obligation to keep up that record and the government to enforce environmental and safety regulations.

But let's not kid ourselves that more drilling will solve our energy problems.

DEAR ABBY: I have been a poll worker for years. I would appreciate it if you would print this important advice to voters: Before Election Day, voters should check the sample ballot they receive in the mail for their precinct number and the location of their polling place. Polling places can change for a variety of reasons. Often several voting precincts are housed in one location. If a person goes to the wrong location -- perhaps because they have voted there before -- it can take considerable time and effort to direct the person correctly. Nearly all these problems would be avoided if people read the information on the sample ballot and brought it with them on Election Day. Also, the voting booth is not the place to review and make decisions about the candidates and issues. This should be done in advance (another reason for the sample ballot). The booth is for one purpose: to mark your ballot. It is inconsiderate to occupy the space for an extended period of time, especially near closing time. Poll workers have an extremely long day, arriving an hour before polls open, and often working for hours more after the polls close. A prepared voter makes a great contribution to making the election process a positive one for all concerned. -- CALIFORNIA POLL WORKER

DEAR POLL WORKER: Thank you for writing. Because the turnout for this year's national election is sure to be one for the record books, your message is a timely one. Now, allow me to share one of my own: There is usually a shortage of people willing to volunteer as poll workers. For those interested in serving, your county registrar of voters, local election board or its equivalent is the place to sign up. The number is listed in the "Government" section of your local phone book. I was a poll worker years ago, and found the experience was both interesting and fun -- and also a great way to meet practically every other single per-

son in the precinct.

DEAR ABBY: My husband, "Nick," and I have been married five years. Two years ago, his 18-year-old son molested my 7-year-old daughter. It tore our family apart and we are going through a divorce. Nick is an alcoholic and an enabler. He paid all his son's bills and even sent him money when he was in jail. My problem is, I still love my husband. Mistakes lead to heartbreak at Homecoming

The loss to Plainview was a tough one for the Harvesters.

"The crowd was absolutely great and our kids played extremely hard and as emotional as we have all year, but we just made too many mistakes." Head Coach Andy Cavalier said. "We played better than we have all year across the board, from defending the run to running the ball, from believing in each other to holding ourselves responsible for making plays."

Cavalier was brief when it came to his reflection on the

offensive effort.

"We continued to be able to run the ball effectively and generally move the ball well in all of our schemes," the coach said. "We absolutely have to do a better job of protecting the ball and executing without the penalties."

He views on the defensive effort were more far-ranging.

"We stopped the run better than we have all year and really limited Plainview in everything they tried to do," Cavalier said. "We need to start creating turnovers again as we did in the first few weeks of the season and again limit the penalties."

The coach said the

defense has done a really good job of containing the run in the last few games.

"Against Plainview Madison (Wilson) had one of those games where he could have been named the player of the week for all three facets of the game. Madison played with a level of passion and effort that was fun to watch," Cavalier said.

Also singled out for com-

Against Plainview Michael had a very diverse role where he played anything to a defensive end to a secondary pass coverage role. He was an impact player all night and his effort level was excellent."

Cavalier said the great thing about this part of our season is that everyone begins district play with a fresh start. He pointed out that our district seems to be very competitive and we will have an opportunity to

win every game if we play well.

Randall started the year with two losses and have rebounded to win their last three.

"They run the ball very well and have several deep threat type, big play guys. 'Pacman' won't be punished by Cowboys for Scuffle

IRVING, Texas (AP) — When the Dallas Cowboys acquired Adam "Pacman" Jones, team owner Jerry Jones knew there was little leeway to avoid trouble because of the cornerback's past.

The Cowboys owner just never expected Adam Jones to get into a scuffle at an upscale downtown Dallas hotel with one of the bodyguards provided by the team.

"Candidly, it never occurred to any of us that he might have an incident that would be anywhere close to being public with an individual that was sitting there to keep that from happening," Jerry Jones said Thursday.

The Cowboys don't plan to discipline Adam Jones for the incident that occurred late Tuesday night after he attended a private party. Police were called, but no charges were filed after the scuffle that Jerry Jones said was the result of some back-and-forth banter between the player and his bodyguard that got out of hand.

"These guys were joking, were kidding, having fun. It crossed over into more than that, and it ended quickly," Jerry Jones said. "This was a personal thing and it was resolved in a personal manner."

While the Cowboys expect Adam Jones to start Sunday's games at Arizona, the NFL was conducting its own investigation and it was not clear if the league would take punitive action against the player.

The NFL's investigation comes only six weeks after commissioner Roger Goodell fully reinstated Jones from a

17-month suspension, including the entire 2007 season, that followed a series of off-field problems. Without being specific, Goodell said Thursday in a radio interview that Jones knew was expected of him.

"I don't think there's any misunderstanding about the position that Adam has put himself in with respect to all of his behavior," Goodell said on ESPN Radio. "I have been very clear with him on how his behavior cannot reflect poorly on himself, the team, or the NFL. There were certain things that I expected of him. I think he clearly understands that."

Goodell and Jerry Jones both expressed disappointment about what had happened.

Adam Jones, who has started all five games for Dallas, wasn't in the locker room Thursday when it was open to media members. Later on the practice field, Jones seemed at ease joking with secondary coach Dave Campo and teammates during the 25 minutes reporters were allowed to watch.

Dallas police responded to a disturbance about 11 p.m. Tuesday at The Joule hotel. Police said the incident was over by the time they arrived and that some hotel employees reported overhearing a scuffle in the men's restroom in the lobby. A small glass item on the vanity in the restroom was damaged.

Jones and his bodyguard, Tommy Jones, said everything was OK, and both were driven from the hotel by an acquaintance, police said. The body-

guard told police he didn't want to press charges and the hotel described the damage as minimal.

Jerry Jones said alcohol was served at the party, but witnesses said player's "conduct should not be interpreted as over drinking."

The Cowboys owner said he didn't know when the NFL would conclude its investigation, but knew league officials "view it very seriously. Very seriously. I know firsthand they do because the commissioner was counting on me and he certainly is counting on me to really manage this."

Goodell visited the Cowboys after practice Wednesday, a scheduled stop after speaking to business leaders in San Antonio earlier that day. Jerry Jones knew then that there had been a disagreement between Adam Jones and his bodyguard, but didn't know the extent of the melee until after the commissioner had left.

Jones called the incident an "aberration" and said Tommy Jones remained part of the team-provided security detail that is with the player at all times, including his home in the small rural community of Prosper north of Dallas.

The owner had recently reiterated his desire for Adam Jones to maintain a low profile off the field.

"Out where he lives where they have cows and cattle, if it happened out there, we wouldn't be having this conversation," Jerry Jones said.

Adam Jones was arrested six times and involved in 12 incidents requiring police intervention from the time the

Tennessee Titans drafted him in the first round in 2005 and sent him to Dallas in April to complete a long-discussed trade.

"Before he joined the Cowboys, he built up a reservoir of doubt," Jerry Jones said. "He had created with his actions no benefit of the doubt."

Nose tackle Tank Johnson, who brought his own checkered past to Dallas, said the incident was overblown and that it wouldn't distract the team.

"This is not that big of a deal," Johnson said. "Nobody's in jail, nobody's in trouble, nobody's hurt. We're all here ready to practice, ready to work."

An empty locker separates the cubicles of Jones and Johnson, who missed the first eight games last season while serving an NFL suspension for a series of off-field problems. Johnson doesn't think Goodell will take any punitive

action against the cornerback. Tennessee got a fourth-round pick in the April draft, and a sixth-rounder next year for Jones. The Cowboys could get back a fifth-rounder in 2009 if Jones is punished again.

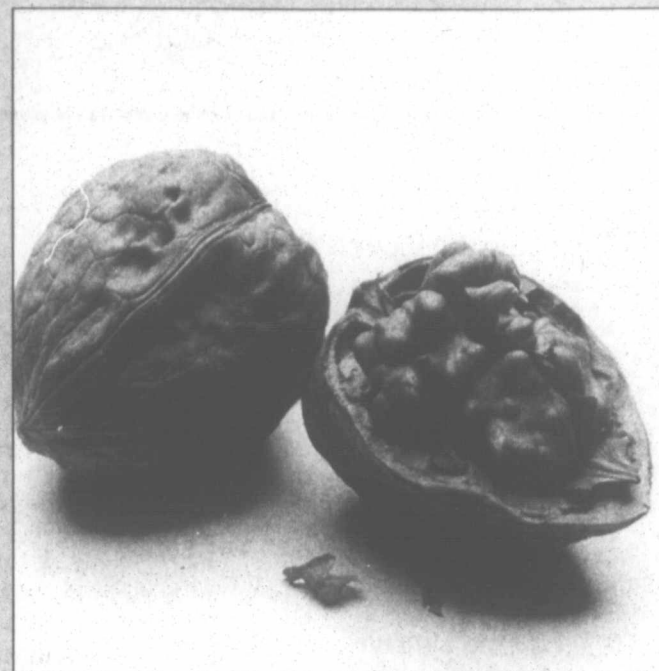

Walnut genetic secrets targeted in new research

The rich taste and smooth texture of walnuts make this versatile tree nut an American favorite.

Now, Agricultural Research Service (ARS) scientists and their University of California-Davis colleagues have embarked upon a four-year study to uncover new clues to this venerable tree's little-known genetic makeup.

The researchers want to develop what are known as "genetic markers" that would help tree breeders pinpoint prized walnut seedlings. These sought-after trees would boast about a half-dozen traits valued highly by those who grow — and those who eat — walnuts.

The traits range from the plumpness of the kernel to the time of year the tree comes into leaf, a feature useful for avoiding frost damage and some diseases.

The tell-tale markers that ARS geneticist Mallikarjuna Aradhya and colleagues are creating are known as "SNPs," short for "single nucleotide polymorphisms." Ideally, walnut breeders would be able to use these markers to identify superstars while

the trees of interest are still very young. That's a time-saving advantage when breeding English walnut. This popular tree takes several years to begin bearing marketable nuts — a long wait for breeders anxious to determine which candidate trees are the best.

According to Aradhya, the collaboration will also yield several different kinds of genetic maps. In all, the venture is expected to provide the most comprehensive picture ever offered of walnut's mostly mysterious genetics.

More than 600 trees are being grown especially for the research, which is sponsored by the Walnut Marketing Board, the university, and ARS, a scientific research agency of the U.S. Department of Agriculture.

The markers will be invaluable for profiling the genetic makeup of the more than 1,600 walnut trees in the nation's official walnut collection in Davis, Calif. Aradhya is the geneticist for this collection of wild and domesticated walnuts, officially known as the ARS National Clonal Germplasm Repository for Tree Fruit and Nut Crops and Grapes.

Economy: August trade deficit falls to \$59.1B

WASHINGTON (AP) — The U.S. trade deficit edged down slightly in August, reflecting a drop in foreign oil from record levels. But the politically sensitive deficit with China increased as imports from that country hit an all-time high.

The Commerce Department said Friday the trade deficit declined by 3.5 percent in August to \$59.1 billion. The deficit is expected to shrink even further in coming months as a severe economic slump in the U.S. depresses demand for oil and other imported goods.

America's foreign oil bill declined to \$43.7 billion in August, down a record \$7.3 billion from the all-time high of \$51 billion in July. The drop reflected both lower shipments and oil prices.

The big decline in oil lowered total imports to \$223.9 billion, the second highest level on record but down by 2.4 percent from the all-time high set in July.

U.S. exports totaled \$164.7 billion, also the second highest level on record, but down 2 percent from the July record. Exports have been the standout performer this year keeping economic growth positive.

However, that could be about to change. A growing number of economists believe the renewed turbulence on Wall Street virtually guarantees the U.S. will fall into a recession this year. With the turmoil spreading to other countries, there is a growing worry about a global downturn.

The spreading economic malaise has put a damper on oil prices which surged to record highs in July but since then have fallen dramatically. Oil currently is currently trading around \$83 a barrel, far below the record of \$147 set in mid-July.

The declines in oil support the view of economists that the trade deficit will show further improvements in coming months, reflecting a

WHEREAS, the Board of Trustees of White Deer Independent School District (the "District") held a special meeting on August 25, 2008, and that said meeting was open to the public, and public notice of the time, place and purpose of said meeting was given, all as required by the Texas Government Code, Chapter 551, and;

WHEREAS, the District deems it advisable to call the special bond election hereinafter ordered; and,

WHEREAS, it is hereby officially found and determined at said meeting that (1) it is in the public interest that the special bond election hereinafter ordered should be conducted jointly with both Carson and Gray Counties (the "Election"); (2) the hereinafter called election meets the requirements for a joint election under section 271.001, et seq., of the Texas Election Code; and, (3) it is in the public interest for the District to hold the hereinafter called election on November 4, 2008, a uniform election date established by section 41.001(a) of the Texas Election Code; and,

WHEREAS, the District has, by Resolution dated August 25, 2008, entered into contracts for joint election services with Carson and Gray Counties, respectively (collectively, the "Joint Election Agreements");

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT ORDERED BY THE BOARD OF TRUSTEES OF THE DISTRICT:

1. The statements contained in the preamble of this Order are true and correct and adopted as findings of fact and operative provisions hereof. The District shall hold a special bond election in the District between the hours of 7:00 a.m. and 7:00 p.m. on November 4, 2008 (the "Election"). Such Election is to be conducted with both Carson and Gray Counties, as provided by Chapter 271, et seq., of the Texas Election Code and the Joint Election Agreements. Said Election shall occur at the designated polling places, and be conducted by the election officers hereby appointed to hold said Election, and as set out in Exhibit "A" attached hereto and made a part hereof for all intents and purposes.

2. Each Presiding Judge shall appoint not less than two (2) but no more than five (5) qualified election clerks to serve and assist in conducting the Election; provided that if any Presiding Judge actually serves as expected, the Alternate Presiding Judge shall be one of such clerks.

3. Early voting shall be conducted according to the Joint Election Agreements. The early voting shall be conducted at the Early Voting Locations specified in Exhibit "B," attached hereto and made a part hereof for all intents and purposes, during the period early voting is required or permitted by law, being October 20, 2008 through October 31, 2008, excluding Saturdays, Sundays or legal state holidays, when there shall be no early voting by personal appearance. The hours designated for early voting by personal appearance shall be as specified on Exhibit "B," and the Early Voting Locations shall at all times remain open during such hours for early voting by personal appearance.

4. The Early Voting Clerk for the Election shall be Wendy Ruthardt. Celeste Bichsel shall be the Deputy Early Voting Clerk for early voting conducted in Carson County, Texas, and Linda Lewis shall be the Deputy Early Voting Clerk for early voting conducted in Gray County, Texas.

5. Applications for early voting by mail shall be sent to Wendy Ruthardt, Early Voting Clerk, White Deer Independent School District, P O Box 517, White Deer, TX 79097-0517. Application for ballot by mail must be received no later than the close of business on October 28, 2008.

6. An early ballot board for Gray County and an early ballot board for Carson County shall be created to process early voting results of the Joint Election. Celeste Bichsel shall be the Presiding Judge of the Carson County early ballot board, and Linda Lewis shall be the Presiding Judge of the Gray County early ballot board. Each county's Presiding Judge shall appoint at least two (2) other members to serve on each board.

7. All qualified electors of and residing in the District shall be entitled to vote at the election.

8. At the Election, the following PROPOSITION shall be submitted in accordance with law:

PROPOSITION

Shall the Board of Trustees of White Deer Independent School District be authorized to issue bonds of the District, in one or more series, in the aggregate principal amount of \$2,315,000 for the construction, renovation and equipment of school buildings in the District, the purchase of sites for school buildings and the purchase of new school buses for the District, with the bonds to mature, bear interest, and be issued and sold in accordance with the law at the time of issuance; and shall the Board of Trustees be authorized to levy and pledge, and cause to be assessed and collected, annual ad valorem taxes, on all taxable property in the District, sufficient, without limit as to rate or amount, to pay the principal of and interest on the bonds?

11. A substantial copy of this order delivered to the Election Judge(s) and Alternate Election Judge(s) within the time required by law shall be proper notice as required under Texas Election Code, and the President of the Board of Trustees shall cause this order and all other necessary notices to be posted and delivered to the Election Judges and any Alternates stated herein, as may be required by law.

12. In all respects the Election shall be conducted in accordance with the Texas Election Code and any other applicable state or federal law. 2. Cada Juez presidente nombrará no menos de dos (2) ni más de cinco (5) secretarios electorales cualificados para servir y ayudar en la celebración de las elecciones, siempre que el Juez presidente ejerza sus funciones como tal, el Juez suplente será uno de dichos secretarios.

3. La votación adelantada se realizará de acuerdo con los Acuerdos de elecciones conjuntas. La votación adelantada se llevará a cabo en los centros electorales para la votación adelantada para todos los fines y propósitos, durante el periodo requerido o permitido por la ley para la votación adelantada, siendo dicho periodo desde el 20 de octubre de 2008 hasta el 31 de octubre de 2008, excepto sábados, domingos y días festivos estatales, en los cuales no tendrá lugar la votación adelantada en persona. El horario establecido para la votación adelantada en persona se especifica en el Anexo "B," y los centros electorales para la votación adelantada permanecerán abiertos durante dicho horario para la votación adelantada en persona.

4. La Secretaria para la votación adelantada para estas elecciones será Wendy Ruthardt. Celeste Bichsel será la Secretaria adjunta para la votación adelantada en el Condado de Carson, Texas y Linda Lewis será la Secretaria adjunta para la votación adelantada en el Condado de Gray, Texas.

5. Las solicitudes para la votación adelantada por correo se enviarán a Wendy Ruthardt, Early Voting Clerk, White Deer Independent School District, P O Box 517, White Deer, TX 79097-0517. Las solicitudes de boleta por correo deberán recibirse en fecha no posterior al cierre del horario comercial del día 28 de octubre de 2008.

6. Se ha creado un consejo de boleta en el Condado de Gray y un consejo para procesar los resultados de la votación adelantada y Celeste Bichsel ha sido nombrada Juez presidente de dicho consejo en el Condado de Gray. El Juez presidente de cada Condado nombrará al menos dos (2) miembros más para servir en el consejo.

7. Todos los electores cualificados que residen en el Distrito, tendrán derecho a votar en las elecciones.

8. En las elecciones, se presentará la siguiente PROPOSICIÓN de acuerdo con la ley:

9. 10. Una copia fiel de esta Orden, en inglés y en español, servirá como Aviso apropiado de las elecciones (EL "Aviso"), y el Presidente del Consejo de administración hará que dicho Aviso se publique en un periódico del Distrito o, si no se publicara periódico alguno en el Distrito, en un periódico de circulación general en el Distrito, al menos una vez, en fecha no anterior a 30 días ni posterior a 10 días antes del día fijado para las elecciones. Además, en fecha no posterior a 21 días antes del día fijado para las elecciones, el Presidente del Consejo de administración hará que se coloque el Aviso, en inglés y en español, en el tablero de anuncios utilizado para la colocación de avisos de las reuniones del Consejo de administración y en cualquier otro lugar o lugares, y mediante cualquier otro método que el Distrito considere apropiado o sea requerido por la ley.

11. Se entregará una copia fiel de esta orden al Juez o jueces electoral(es) y al Juez o jueces electoral(es) suplente(s) en el plazo establecido por la ley, y dicha copia servirá de aviso apropiado según lo exige el Código electoral de Texas, y el Presidente del Consejo de administración hará que esta orden y todos los demás avisos necesarios se anuncien y entreguen al Juez o jueces electorales y suplentes mencionados en este documento como la ley así lo requiera.

12. En todos los respectos, las elecciones celebrarán de conformidad con el Código electoral de Texas y cualquier ley estatal o federal aplicable. En cada uno de los centros electorales el día de las elecciones y en cada uno de los centros electorales para la votación anticipada se utilizará al menos una (1) máquina de votación electrónica, que haya sido certificada por el Secretario de Estado de Texas para su uso en las elecciones en Texas, como sistema accesible de votación.
