Johnson's Impossible Dreams Seem To Come True In Final Hours

WASHINGTON (UPI)-"We ow have taken another long, forward step toward peace," said President Johnson. These were words of an man driving hard toward impossible dreams, and drive he would until the final hour of his presidency.

But after months of frustration and discord in the country, the often reviled President has seen one dreamed-of blessing after another come true. have been outpourings of the The historic Apollo 8 flight to the moon and back in the dying days of his administration was a source of tremendous refreshment for Johnson, For he was the one President John F. Kennedy asked to head up the space program when the decision was made to go for the moon in the 1960s.

All this week, in all kinds of receptions and gatherings, there deepest sentimentality and feeling, with shedding of tears on

the part of the many who gathered around him.

There were his poignant returns to his beloved Congress -his alma mater-to deliver his State of th eUnion message and to go to a reception Thursday. Almost up to the very minute when he leaves office he has worked at achieving progress in ending the Vietnam -War-the biggest burden he has had to carry during his presidency.

Early Thursday morning the

word he had been waiting for came. Scretary of State Dean Rusk awakened him to say that the negotiators in Paris had agreed on the size and shape of their table so that substantiative peace talks can now start. When Johnson read his

prepared statement at the White House later in the morning, he was visibly pleased. And at a State Department reception for Rusk late in the day, he said "we now

have taken another long forward step toward peace." Johnson called the Paris developments the answer to "our prayers for many days

and many night. Johnson said he questioned my judgement' in deciding not to run for reelection because "if we were to ever get to the peace table". he knew he better get out of_ the way?"

"I knew my friends and my

foes would say that everything I said was political" if he had been running for reelection, Johnson said in the nostalgic Senate farewell party.

The Senators feted Johnson, his wife Lady Bird, their daughter Luci Nugent and her son, Lynn, at a Capitol meeting

"I spent many of my most pleasant years in the Senate working with you," Johnson said. As President, he said

many this will wipe out the credit completely.) The next reduction is a portion of earned multiplied by the reduced income tax (after retirement income beyond certain amounts. For retirees less than 62 it is the earned income in excess

For those between 62 and 72 there is no reduction for the first \$1,200 of earned income. For amounts between \$1,200 and \$1,700 the reduction is 50 per cent of the excess over \$1,200. And if the earned income is more than \$1,700 the excess over \$1,450 is used to reduce the maximum amount of retirement income to be subjected to the 15 per

cent credit. Where husband and wife are each 65 or older and one is qualified for the credit, they may compute their credit on a maximum limitation of \$2,286 instead of the \$1,524 permitted on separate returns or where only one spouse is 65.

To be eligible for the credit you must have had earned income of at least \$600 in each of any 10 years before 1968. A widow or widower qualifies if the deceased spouse earned more than \$600 in each of any

10 years before death. The rules are admittedly complex, but since the savings can be substantial, retirees should carefully consider the retirement credit.



Aftermath Of Feud: An Easing Of Tensions

By LEE MUELLER NEW YORK (NEA) Strange, it seems only last month that Gardner Dickinson wiped off his sand wedge, stuffed it into his bag and settled down for a long, unpleasant chat with the Professional Golfers Association.

Now it's that time again. After the customary month layoff, the professional golf tour again is beginning to stir in California - out where the sun is warm and the land is conducive to pitch-and-run shots. To the surprise of many, it is still called the PGA tour.

Dickinson, it seems, was president of a now-dissolved organization called the American Professional Golfers Association which wanted, among ot her things, nothing to do with the PGA.

The group, composed largely of the pro 'tour's main attractions, said it wanted to and was capable of running its own show. The PGA, it said, was more hinderance than help.

The PGA, meanwhile, said the APG was an ingrate, collectively speaking, of course.

Time and several bitter words have passed, however, and at last - nay, at LONG last the PGA and the touring professionals have settled their differences. It only took 30

Exactly where victory lies in a debatable question, and a testy one. The players have one more member than the PGA on the tour's policy board, which is what they wanted. The PGA still has its name and con-

siderable power on the tour. which is what it wanted.

The end result is that the 1969 tour is little different from its predecessors. On the surrace, the only noticeable change is the annual increase in prize money. Last year it was \$5 million. This year the expected ifgure is \$6 million.

Underneath, however, is another story. The tensions that welled out of the dispute have eased. Nearly everyone involved is relieved.

"I feel as if a Mack truck moved off my head," said Dickinson, preparing for California.

"We did some giving and the PGA did some giving. That's the way to settle an argument, isn't it? And I'm sure as far as the golfing public is concerned, we've got to be better off not fighting."

In the heat of the APG-PGA battle, there was considerable mention of greed. Several newspapers expressed total impatience with the entire uproar. "All they're doing is hurting golf," a New York columnist wrote.

Whether the feud hurt golf remains a moot point. The real point, as far as the PGA and players are concerned, is that it's over and both are relatively satisfied. Dickinson, for one, does not anticipate a return bout.

"I don't see how the dispute could be renewed." he said, "unless some terrible people are elected to the board. Personally, I do not think we have any terrible people. . . I know

there won't be anybody on our side to rock the boat."

So, the pro tour, 1969, is rolling. From California, it moves eastward in February to Arizona and then to Florida and North Carolina before settling in Augusta, Ga., for the Masters in April.

The magic that draws thousands to golf courses each year was still intact at last observation. This year, Robert De Vicenzo might win the Masters: Lee Elder might beat Jack Nicklaus: Arnold Palmer might win a big one; Lee Trevino might, well, he might do anything.

It is improbable, though, that the new tour will offer either the high adventure or soppy melodrama of 1968. But it can




charge was made by Marc H. Tanenbaum, director of interreligious affairs for the American Jewish
