### Local Crimes Take Upswing

Crime took an upswing in Pampa during 1968 in four categories and stayed stable in three others, according to the annual Federal Bureau of Investigation report.

In figures compiled by Mrs. Anne Neel, police file clerk, and sent to the FBI headquarters, burglaries, theft over and under \$50, and auto theft took a jump in Pampa in 1968.

There were 168 burglaries here last year compared to 142 in 1967. Also in 1968, there were 122 thefts over \$50 reported as compared to 86 in 1967, and 296

### IRS Has Special Rules Covering Military Pay

**EDITOR'S NOTE:** It is time to think about the income tax again. This is Chapter Eleven of a series reviewing the regulations, with emphasis on taking advantage of all exclusions and deductions legally due you.

Unless they are serving in a combat zone, military personnel are as concerned as the rest of us about the effects of the surcharge on their 1968 income tax bill.

They, too, will have to make up the three-and-a-half month's lag between the April 1 effective date of the surcharge and the beginning of the increased withholding tax to cover the surcharge on July 15.

Army finance officers last fall warned the troops of the likelihood of higher tax payments due with the filing of tax returns and urged them to increase their withholding still more.

All enlisted men and warrant officers serving in combat zones are freed from both the income tax and the surcharge on all pay received while serving there. Any part of a month counts for a full month for this purpose, so arrival in a combat zone in the final days of a month exempts the full month's pay from tax.

Similarly, all pay received while hospitalized for injuries, wounds or disease sustained in such combat zone is also tax free.

Officers serving in combat zones or hospitalized as a result of such service receive a tax exemption of the first \$500 received monthly in such service.

These are among other special benefits available to military personnel.

While regular and longevity pay are taxable, subsistence, quarters and uniform allowances are exempt.

Other nontaxable military and veterans' pay includes payments equal to six months' pay to beneficiaries of servicemen who died on active duty; veterans' benefits paid by

cases were cleared last year.

the Veterans Administration to veterans and their families; disability compensation; veterans' insurance proceeds and dividends; veterans' bonuses paid by states; grants to seriously disabled veterans for homes designed for "wheel-chair living"; grants for motor vehicles for veterans who lost their sight or use of their limbs.

Filing requirements also are eased. Servicemen out of the country on the April 15 deadline have an automatic two-month extension for filing. If they are serving in Vietnam their returns are not due until 180 days after they leave that country.

The wife of a serviceman who is serving in Vietnam will have a refund speeded up on their joint return. After signing her own name on the return, she need only sign in the spot reserved for her husband's name: "Serving in Vietnam."

### Wall Street Chatter

NEW YORK (UPI)—Scheinman Timing Forecasts says correction of the "excesses" under the Johnson administration will mean "painful fiscal and monetary measures" for the country, adding that stock prices also will be affected. Thus, the company says, while the policies of the Nixon administration may be good for the country and stock market over a longer term, "it is also likely that the very same policies are likely to be bearish for the stock market for the next year or two."

Bache & Co. says the country now is awaiting some statement from the new administration on how rough it intends to be in restraining the economy. Bache adds that until investors get some "definitive statements of policy," they will see a continuation of the market's "backing and filling motion."

McDonnell & Co. says it believes the new administration is "sincere and determined to bring inflation under control," adding that the "peak of monetary restraint" is about a hand. The analyst goes on to say it feels the stock market "at or near the depths of reaction" to these restraints, and voices the belief there will be no "replay of the 1966 credit crunch and its concomitant market collapse."

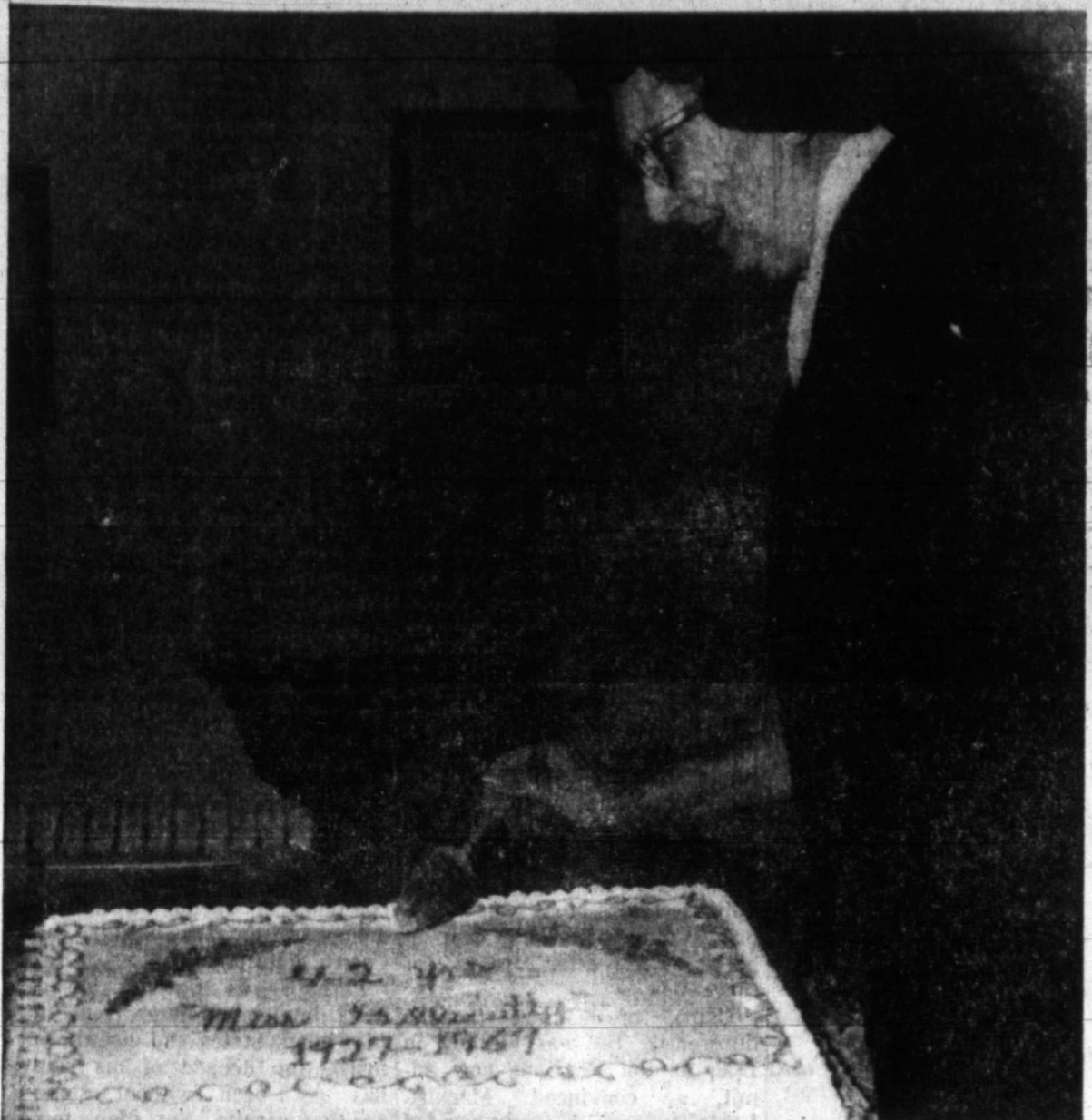

receive money allocated to them for the first quarter of fiscal 1968-69. The first quarter payment to the agencies totaled \$19,212.50.

In the financial report, prepared by outgoing treasurer R. H. Nentzel, the 1968-69 drive total of \$85,891 consisted of \$53,000 in cash and \$32,891 in pledges.

with new equipment to Horace Mann and Woodrow Wilson Elementary Schools, either by converting three inside rooms into a cafeteria dining room, or converting the courtyard into a cafeteria dining area.  
Proposed Project Two, athletic improvements, has four new items, a new field house and indoor workout area to be located on the southeast corner of present athletic field, new entrance to east stands, additional restrooms, new east side concession stand and plastic seats covers for entire stadium.

Project Two items which were considered last year were the all weather track located between existing stands, lights positioned behind the stands and a cyclone fence around all of the athletic fields.

Walden was given an additional six-year probated sentence, to run consecutively, for another burglary of the same establishment Oct. 19, 1963. One of the terms of his probation, Judge McIlhenny sternly admonished, was that he quit being a "loafer" and find immediate employment.  
Bonds were revoked for several persons who failed to answer summons for arraignment today and warrants were issued for their arrest, Dist. Atty. Guy Hardin said.  
One other case was dismissed in district court because of a mix-up. John Henry Watson, indicted by a grand jury here for driving while intoxicated, second offense, could not be tried because of double jeopardy rulings. Owing to the mix-up, he had been tried in county court for the driving while intoxicated charge.

**Injury to Baby Teeth**  
**Can Delay Permanents**  
DEAR DR. LAWRENCE: When my grandson was 16 months old, he fell in the bathtub and hit his four upper front baby teeth. They turned black and got sore. Our dentist put him to sleep and pulled them out. He's 10 now and still doesn't have any front teeth. Will he ever cut any more teeth?

**ANSWER:** Unless the tooth buds lying above the injured teeth were damaged, the permanent teeth should have erupted according to schedule—about 6 years of age, or within "normal limits."

**DEAR DR. LAWRENCE:** Is there anything being done in dentistry to solve the problem of gums caving in after extraction of teeth, especially in the front part of the mouth?

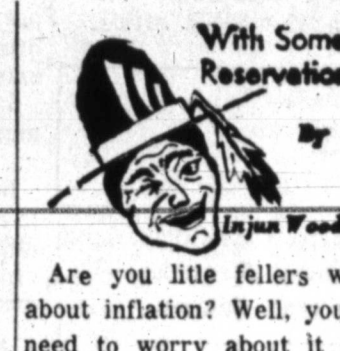

# 10 Years of Castro Enough For Cuba and Reds Alike

NEW YORK (NEA)—A grim symbolism marked the tenth anniversary of Fidel Castro's rise to power when 88 men and women fought past Cuban Communist guards in a desperate escape into the U.S. Naval base at Guantanamo.

leaders of Venezuela, Bolivia and Colombia castigated him publicly for meddling in their internal affairs. Castro, in turn, charged that a "pseudo-revolutionary Mafia" of Latin-American Reds is trying to depose him and moderate the policies of the Cuban revolution.

A decade ago this month, when this writer reached Havana after the fall of Batista's dictatorship, Castro was hailed as a liberator not only in Cuba but throughout Latin America. A majority of Cubans hoped that he would bring them freedom and a better life after years of repression.

parachutists would have long ago eliminated Castro as they are now in the process of ending the power of Alexander Dubcek in Prague. But since Cuba is, in effect, shielded by the United States, Moscow must continue to spend \$1 million dollars a day to bolster the Castro dictatorship.

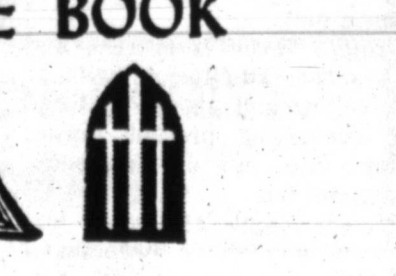
Castro, of course, thought differently. He was already in 1959, as the Russians now admit, a convinced Marxist-Leninist and a member of Moscow's secret organization of guerrillas in Latin America.

He is no longer the daring and romantic young rebel of a decade ago. Today, at 41, his paunch expanding and his beard streaked with gray, he is not even a hero to the rioting students in the United States, France or Mexico.

FORT WORTH—Each week nearly 100 million people in the United States and 40 other countries feel the impact of the worldwide broadcast ministry of the Southern Baptist Radio and Television Commission.

Commission programs range from those produced to pierce Communism's Iron and Bamboo Curtains to those designed for outlets in all 50 states in the U.S., such as JOT, a TV color cartoon series for children, which averages well over 1,000 fan letters a day.

people watched three color documentaries produced in cooperation with the National Broadcasting Company—"The Vine" (the life of Christ), "The Inheritance" (the story of the Old Testament) and "Walk Beside Me" (the life and journeys of Paul).

In fact, thousands of letters pour into the Commission's headquarters in Fort Worth each day from all over the world—even from countries in the Red Bloc where it is a crime to listen to foreign language broadcasts.

Religious programs, such as the Spanish versions of "The Eaptist Hour," draw large latin audiences in Texas, as do informative and entertaining programs, such as "ControlCentral" (the Spanish version of the commission's widely-known "MasterControl") and television's popular "The Answer" series, with dubbed-in language soundtracks.

What Southern Baptists believe, how they worship and what they plan for the future has been the subject of several television specials by the Columbia Broadcasting System.

Commission programs are produced in English, Portuguese, Russian, Polish, French, Navajo, Chinese, Japanese, Korean, Ghal and Spanish.

The American Broadcasting Company has joined the commission in widely acclaimed documentaries on the alcoholic, the elderly, and the young parent.

The scope of what the Radio-Television has accomplished in its 30 years of existence and what it hopes to accomplish through plans projected by its executive director, Paul M. Stevens, boggles the imagination.

Spanish speaking programs play a significant role in outreach to Texas's large Latin population. Most are broadcast on time bought from stations San Antonio, Harlingen and El Paso by the Baptist General Convention of Texas.

Using existing computers and predicted refinements in electronic communications, the center would be capable of feeding video taped and filmed productions into a network serving churches throughout the 11 million-member Southern Baptist denomination.

Even now the commission plays a key role in providing broadcast production and technical assistance to churches, state Baptist conventions (such as the Baptist General Convention of Texas) and denominational agencies throughout Texas and the United States.

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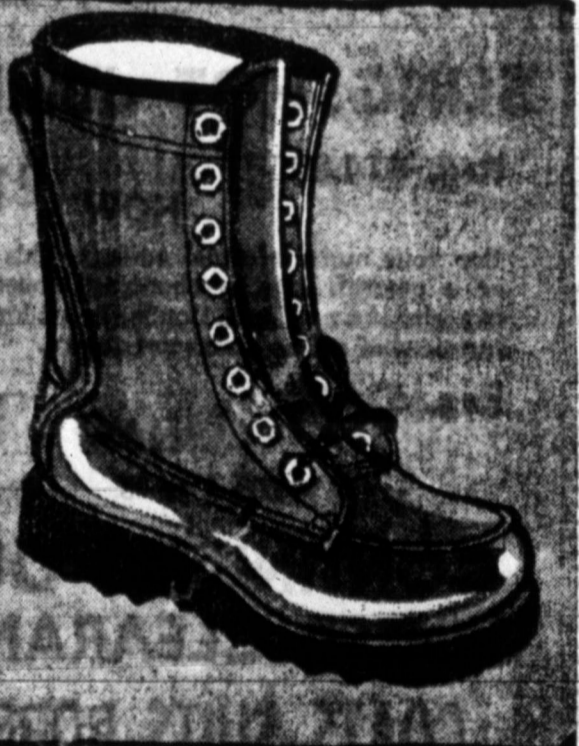
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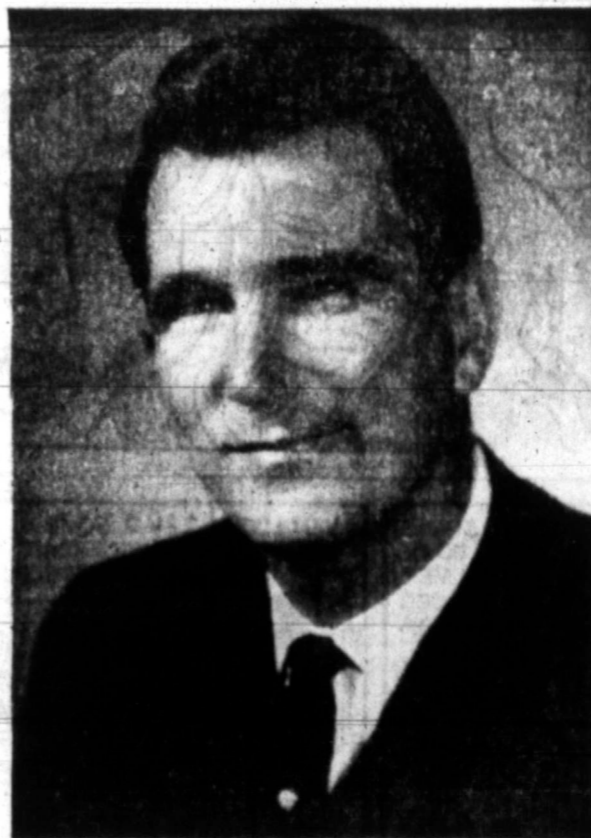

Luke 6:31

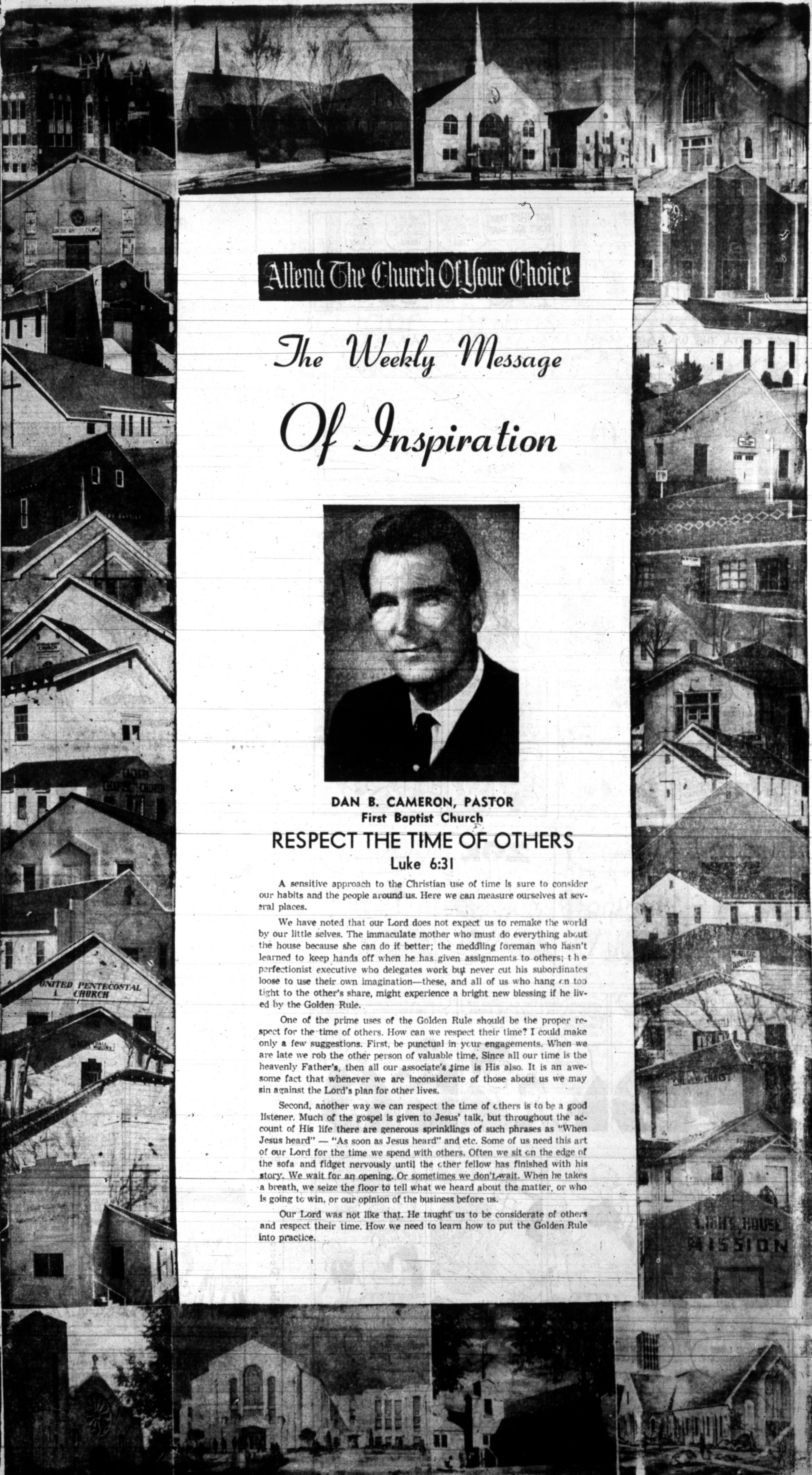
A sensitive approach to the Christian use of time is sure to consider our habits and the people around us. Here we can measure ourselves at several places.

We have noted that our Lord does not expect us to remake the world by our little selves. The immaculate mother who must do everything about the house because she can do it better; the meddling foreman who hasn't learned to keep hands off when he has given assignments to others; the perfectionist executive who delegates work but never cut his subordinates loose to use their own imagination—these, and all of us who hang on too tight to the other's share, might experience a bright new blessing if he lived by the Golden Rule.

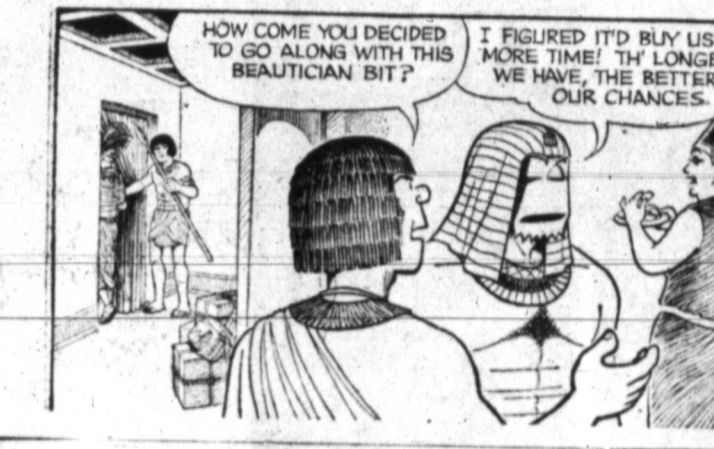
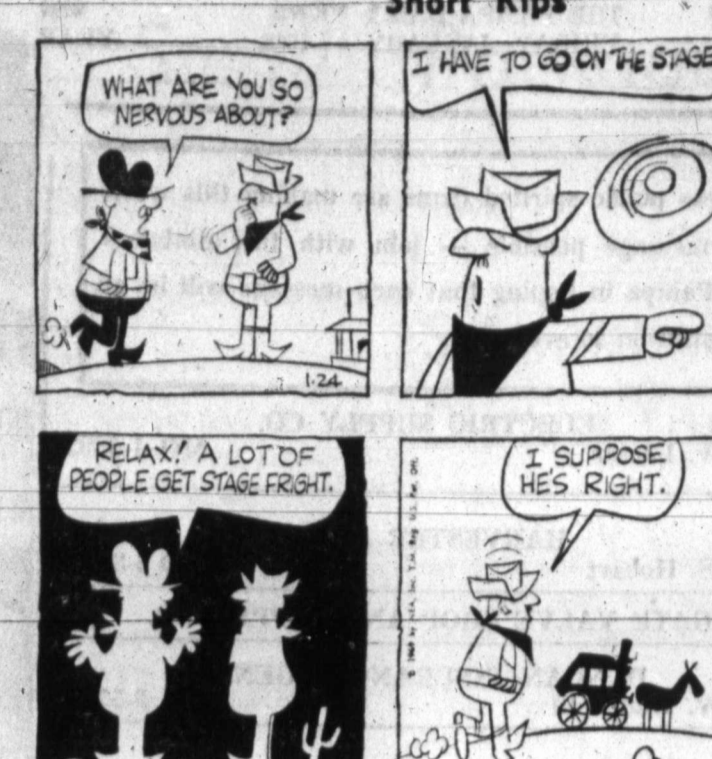
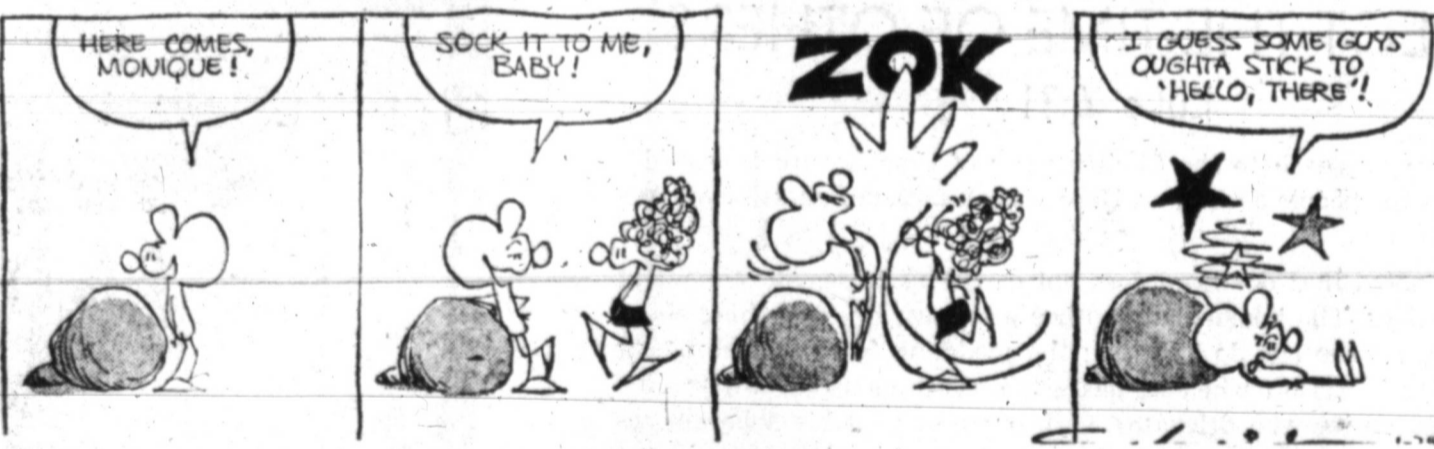
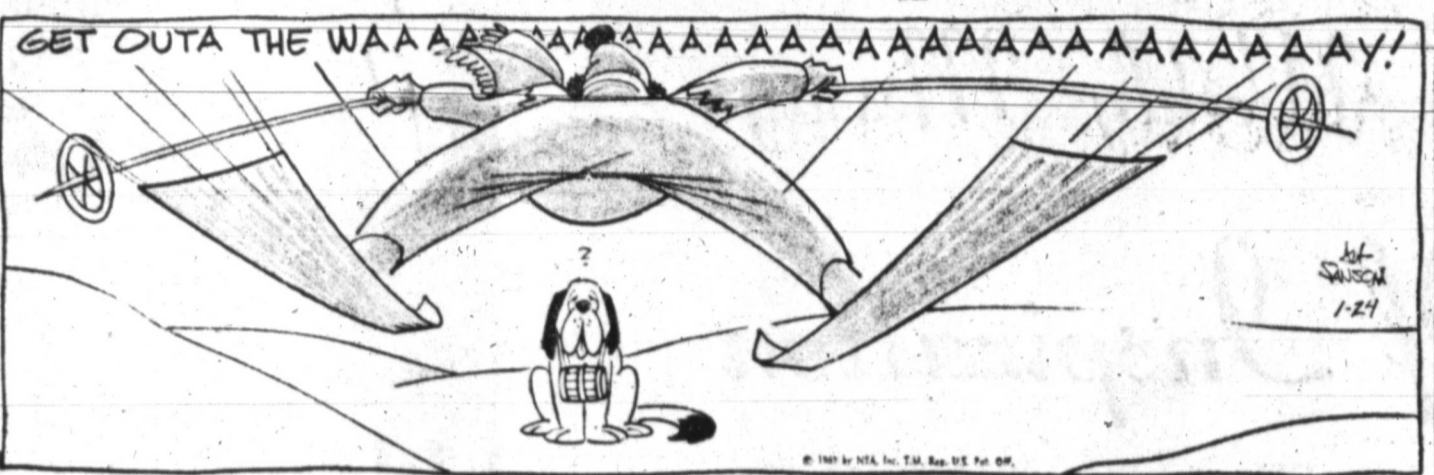
One of the prime uses of the Golden Rule should be the proper respect for the time of others. How can we respect their time? I could make only a few suggestions. First, be punctual in your engagements. When we are late we rob the other person of valuable time. Since all our time is the heavenly Father's, then all our associate's time is His also. It is an awesome fact that whenever we are inconsiderate of those about us we may sin against the Lord's plan for other lives.

Second, another way we can respect the time of others is to be a good listener. Much of the gospel is given to Jesus' talk, but throughout the account of His life there are generous sprinklings of such phrases as "When Jesus heard" — "As soon as Jesus heard" and etc. Some of us need this art of our Lord for the time we spend with others. Often we sit on the edge of the sofa and fidget nervously until the other fellow has finished with his story. We wait for an opening. Or sometimes we don't wait. ## Alcindor, Bruins to Travel To Midwest, Meet Northwestern

UCLA's brilliant basketball team, figured the biggest cinch in sports since the Baltimore Colts, invades Chicago again tonight.

It looks like the only thing that can stop the Bruins is another snowstorm.

Two years ago when coach John Wooden's Bruins went to Chicago for a weekend doubleheader, the area was hit by one of the worst snowstorms in memory. The storm made travel so difficult that UCLA's Friday night game had to be

postponed until Sunday afternoon—and UCLA beat Loyola of Illinois 120-82. The Bruins had taken Loyola 82-67 Saturday night.

Only snow flurries are predicted for this weekend in Chicago when the Bruins play Northwestern tonight and Loyola Saturday night. Marquette meets Loyola in tonight's first game of the Chicago Stadium doubleheader while Notre Dame meets Illinois in the first contest on Saturday night. The Bruins, already 12-0 this season and favored to go on and

win an unprecedented third straight national crown, seem to be worried more about the weather than about their opponents this weekend.

Alcindor is averaging 25.3 points while Curtis Rowe is hitting 14.7, John Vallely 12.9 and Sidney Wicks 8.3.

The most revealing statistic on the team is the 5.8 scoring average by Lynn Shackelford. He and Alcindor are the only two players who've started the past three years for the Bruins. And outside shooting is his forte. But while he still starts,

his laying time has been cut because of the presence of Rowe and Wicks—who are both outscoring him—at forwards. It shows the depth on the Bruin team.

Thursday night was a light schedule in collegiate basketball with fourth-ranked Davidson the only top power in action. The Wildcats turned back Princeton 71-54 as Mike O'Neill scored 22. "Our past appearances in Chicago in late January have us fearing the weather almost as much as our opponents," coach John Wooden admitted.

## Rain Plays Havoc With Crosby Meet

PEBBLE BEACH, Calif. (UPI)—They try again today to play the first round of the \$150,000 Bing Crosby National Pro-Am and if the rain washes it out a second time, there is a strong possibility the whole tourney may go down the drain as did the very first Crosby clambake way back in 1937.

A steady drizzle greeted the early starters Thursday and by the time the late starters had reached the first tee the weather had deteriorated into a near storm. Weeklong rains last week and earlier this week had left the three Crosby courses—Pebble Beach, Cypress Point and Spyglass Hill—in less than ideal condition to begin with and the added rain made them only that much worse off.

Jack Tuthill, PGA tournament chairman, indicated that if another day is lost in the Crosby he will order the whole thing off. That's because most of the pros competing here are scheduled to play next Tuesday and Wednesday in the Andy Williams Pro-Am at San Diego.

Tuthill would be put in that position because each player here has one whack at each of the three courses before the cut is made. Thus, if only two rounds get in then it will be fair to make a payoff at 36 holes, as was done last week in the Kaiser International at Napa, Calif., because Spyglass Hill is considered a far tougher course than Pebble Beach and Cypress Point.

Despite the daylong rain Thursday, galleries of surprising numbers trudged the soggy fairways in the wake of favorites and before play was finally called off with about a third of the field still out, Billy Casper, Harry Toscano and Mac McLendon had tied for the lead with two under par 70s. Casper played Cypress Point while the other two bagged their sub-par rounds at Pebble. The best round of the day at Spyglass was 71, turned in by John Stevens and Lee Elder.

Of course, all those scores were wiped out, along with 748 by Arnold Palmer and U.S. Open champ Lee Trevino. Jack Nicklaus and Masters champ Bob Gouby were still out when play was called.

## Track Stars in Dome Pampa Tries Plainview in District Action

HOUSTON (UPI)—The first track meet ever held in the Astrodome opens tonight, and as usual with this city's plastic-roofed, plastic-grassed show-case, everything will be first class.

There will be 1,367 athletes on hand for the two-day show and a fistful of world indoor records are forecast.

One world record is assured. Since the 120-yard high hurdles has never been run indoors before, whatever mark the winner turns in tonight will serve as the world standard.

The Astrodome track is a fifth of a mile around, leading some coaches to believe a host of running records will fall.

Olympic high hurdles champion Willie Davenport will be on hand for that event. Davenport

has a final exam at Southern University in Baton Rouge at 4 p.m. today, but meet officials will have a private plane standing by to whisk him to the Astrodome for his event.

Another Olympic champion, Bob Seagren, will be going after a new indoor record in the pole vault.

Seagren, who vaulted into the night to win the gold medal at Mexico City, holds the current indoor record of 17-4 1-4 set a year ago.

"You couldn't find a better indoor track in the United States," said University of Houston track coach John Morriss. "Louisville 220-yard track is the closest to it."

Another world record could come in the distance-medley relay.

The present record is 9:44.6, held by Kansas State, and Kansas State is one of the 50 college and university teams entered.

All of the Olympians will be competing in a special "invitation" division. Among them are former

Olympic gold medal winner Ralph Boston, who had to settle for a bronze medal this year in the log jump at Mexico City.

Lennox Miller, another U.S. Olympian, will battle Kentucky's Jim Green for the 100-yard dash and 60-yard dash titles.

Seagren will also receive the U.S. Track and Field Federation's athlete of the year award tonight. It is the first year the USTFF has given such an award.

## NAIA Track, Field Meet Runs Tonight

KANSAS CITY, Mo. (UPI)—A possible world record, an Olympic gold medal winner and an experienced field for the open mile run are among the top attractions for the fourth annual NAIA Indoor Track and Field Championships which open here tonight in Kansas City's Municipal Auditorium.

The two-day event will also feature several Olympians and a tight three-way scramble for the team championship.

The meet gets under way at 7 p.m. (CST) with the 60-yard dash preliminaries. The world record could come Saturday night in the mile relay which is also expected to be a key race in the battle between the defending team champion Pra-

irie View A&M (Tex.), Eastern Michigan and Arkansas A&M.N. Only one final event will be held tonight—the long jump. It will feature Jerry Procter of Redlands (Calif.), who set an NAIA indoor mark of 25-2 here last year as a freshman.

The Olympic contingent is headed by Vince Matthews of Johnson C. Smith (N.C.), who ran the opening leg of the United States' gold medal winning 1,600-meter relay team last summer. Matthews is entered in the 440-yard dash.

Bronze medal winner Larry Young of nearby Sibley, Mo., the only American to ever win an Olympic walking medal, will be back to defend his title in the open mile walk.

The Cannes Film Festival Award-winning film "David and Lisa" will be shown in the fellowship hall at 2:30 p.m. and 7 p.m. During the 7 p.m. showing, there will be a nursery provided and a film show for grades 1-8 in the auditorium. Time magazine called the movie "the finest American film of 1962." Based on a case history written with distinction by Dr. Theodore Isaac Rubin, "David and Lisa" was made in suburban Philadelphia by a script-writer (Eleanor Perry) director (Frank Perry), and a leading lady (Margolin) who had never made a motion picture before. The film was universally acclaimed as one of the finest contributions to the art. David, portrayed by Keir Dullea, is a rather-intelligent lad who shows no emotion except through his intense fear of being touched. Brought to a psychiatric institution by his mother, who is closely connected with his problems, David considers himself superior to his classmates and even to the psychiatrist (Howard Da Silva). Eventually he becomes interested in another patient, Lisa, and is successful in relating to her. The change in the two youngsters as they seek and accept help from one another is told convincingly and warmly. Immediately after the 7 p.m. showing, Dr. Louis Fairchild, chief psychologist at the Killgore Center, will comment on the film as a psychologist.
