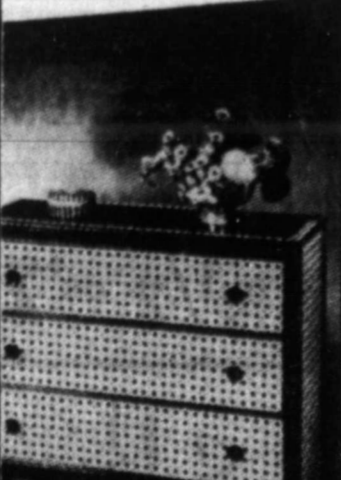

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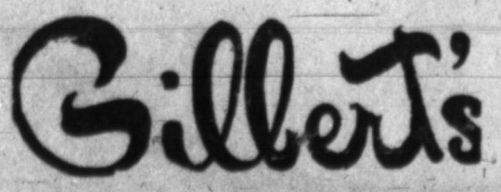

Pampa Boys Taking Painful Rabies Shots

Steven, 11, and Brian, 8, sons of the Jerry Lunsford family, are "completely safe," their doctor reports, after having been bitten by a rabid skunk April 19. The skunk, killed after the accident, was sent to Austin where it was confirmed that the animal was rabid. Shots were started for the boys immediately after receipt of the report.

A victim of such attack usually develops symptoms in about 10 days after being bitten, Lunsford says.

The Lunsford boys were among a group of First Baptist youths on an overnight hike to the Otto Mangold farm near Durham, Okla. Their father and several other adults were leaders. The youths were sleeping on a back porch with the two Lunsford boys on the perimeter of the group when they were bitten. Lunsford stunned the animal with a blow and Weldon Trice, another director, finished the job with a flashlight. Although symptoms often occur within 10 days after a bite, the period can be as long as seven months, Lunsford was told. But, the doctor reassured him, treatment is 100 per cent effective.

New Beef Packing Plant Due Plainview

The Texas Panhandle is to be the site of the world's largest beef packing plant, it was announced Wednesday at Plainview, where the business will be situated. Annual sales value will exceed \$100 million. The plant will cover 170,000 square feet of floor space.

R. E. Frye, Rock Port, Mo., the announcement at the annual meeting of the Plainview Industrial Foundation.

The plant will be constructed on a 240-acre site three miles south of Plainview, just off Interstate 27, and adjacent to a Santa Fe railway siding. The plant will have a slaughter capacity of 10,000 head per week and facilities for breaking and fabricating, Frye said.

A note of desperation is creeping into Japan's increasingly insistent demands for the return of Okinawa.

And in the U.S. State Department, over the wishes of the Pentagon, there is a growing belief the United States cannot much longer delay return of the \$1.2 billion Pacific base to the Japanese—agreement before the summer of 1970 and physical turnover in 1972.

No single other issue presses the government of Premier Eisaku Sato quite so hard. Thousands of left-wing Japanese students and labor union members gave it vivid expression when on April 28 they took to the streets in violent anti-American demonstrations marking the 17th anniversary of the Japanese peace treaty.

The Japanese observe the date as "Okinawa Day."

Less violently but with similar emotion Sato declares "it has ceased to be just a political problem. It has become a humanitarian issue. . . the longer the delay in arriving at a solution to the Okinawa question, the greater will be the difficulties that face our two countries in the political field."

Sato is scheduled to visit the United States in November and is pledged to obtain at that time a firm date for the island's return.

The life of his government depends upon his success.

For the Japanese the emotional issue is the fact of some one million citizens of Japan still living under foreign domination on Okinawa more than 20 years after the war.

For the United States the issue is more complex.

On Okinawa and other islands of the Ryukyu chain the United States maintains 124 bases, most of them on Okinawa.

There it stores nuclear weapons for emergency use in Korea, China and other Pacific areas.

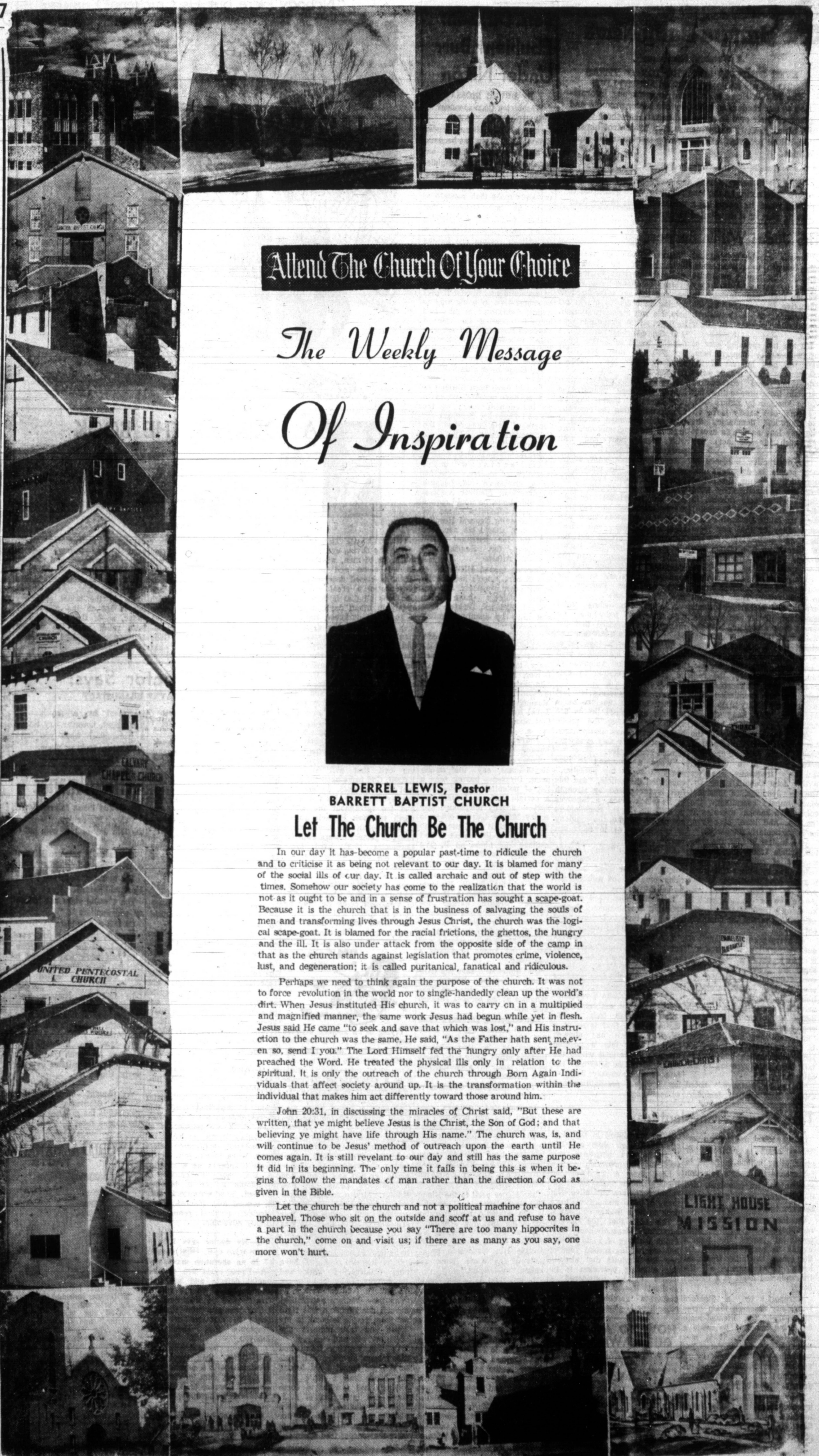
Let The Church Be The Church

Dear Friends:
Because of the alarming increase in the traffic of obscene materials, I am devoting this newsletter to a review of my efforts in Congress to fight pornography. The following is taken primarily from my remarks on the floor of the House of Representatives as recorded in the Congressional Record, Apr. 28, 1969.

PORNOGRAPHY:
The United States Post Office Department estimates that more than \$500 million worth of obscene material is sold to young people through the mail each year. J. Edgar Hoover, the Director of the FBI, warned more than a year ago: "The publication and sale of obscene material is big business in America today. It is impossible to estimate the amount of harm to impressionable teenagers and to assess the volume of sex crimes attributable to pornography, but its influence is extensive." FBI statistics show that sexual violence is increasing at an alarming pace, and Mr. Hoover states that pornography in all its forms is a major cause of sex crimes, aberrations and perversions.

A factor complicating the legislative attempts to deal with the increasing flow of pornography has been the uncertainty in the law caused by the U.S. Supreme Court decisions in the area of anti-obscenity legislation. State legislatures don't know, and the U.S. Supreme Court has not stated with certainty what legislative regulations will be upheld.

Since obscenity is not protected by the first amendment of the Constitution and since Congress has a responsibility to protect the public interest, I believe there are compelling reasons for Congress to take the initiative and deal with the problem. It is for these reasons that I introduced a bill on Monday, Apr. 28, 1969, to suppress traffic in obscene, particularly pornographic material that is sent to young people through the mail.

The bill I introduced makes

it a Federal crime to disseminate through interstate commerce or the mails obscene matter to minors under the age of eighteen. Moreover, to protect families my bill prohibits the unsolicited mailing of obscene material to people with minor children living with them. Presently, adults are protected under the pandering advertisement statute (39 USC 4009). Under this statute, adult patrons decide for themselves what they consider is sexually offensive publications, and legal orders are issued directing the mailer to remove the complaining patron's name from the company's mailing list.

To enforce its provisions, my bill provides a penalty much higher than in similar bills introduced by other Congressmen. A penalty of not less than \$1000 nor more than \$5000 AND imprisonment for not less than one year nor more than five years is provided for the first offense. For each additional offense, the penalty is not less than \$3000 nor more than \$20,000 AND imprisonment for not less than three years nor more than ten years.

My bill would further bar Federal courts from hearing appeals of local jury findings on obscenity cases. Thus, under this provision, if a movie, a theatrical production, or publication were found obscene by a jury under local law, no appeal could be taken to the Federal courts. This provision still retains the right of appeal on questions of law to protect "due process." Moreover, the Congress is clearly within its constitutional powers in so limiting the appellate jurisdiction. Senator Everett Dirksen recently introduced a senate bill containing a similar measure to bar such Federal court appeals.

I am hopeful that committee action can soon be taken on this proposal so that the youth can be protected from the ever-increasing traffic in obscene materials in this country.
