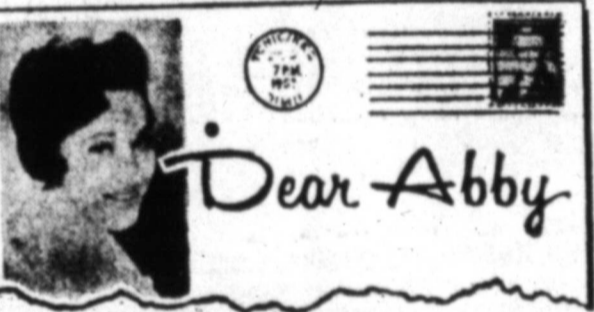
Leather and Lace Riders Perform For Area Rodeo
