## Warren Burger Makes Proposal To State Bar

DALLAS (UPI)—Chief Justice Warren E. Burger today proposed that the organized bar undertake a massive study of the nation's penal systems.

The Chief Justice said the systems should be examined "from beginning to end—parole, probation, the prisons and related institutions, their staffs, their programs, their educational and vocational training programs, the standards and procedures for release."

The prepared speech was Burger's third at meetings related to the 92nd annual convention of the American Bar Association (ABA). He has been attending luncheons and dinners at every turn and is obviously attempting to show by his example that he does not feel judges should withdraw into a "monastic existence."

The Chief Justice has refused to participate in any televised programs, however, on the theory that speeches to an audience composed solely of attorneys would be different from those prepared for laymen.

The Chief Justice unveiled his proposal as the convention moved into high gear with the opening of the ABA Assembly in the Dallas Memorial Auditorium by President William F. Gossett of Detroit.

Gov. Preston Smith and Mayor Erik Jonsson of Dallas welcomed the delegates, who have converged 6,000 strong on this heat-bathed Texas city. Sunday the temperature hit 103 degrees.

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At conclusion of today's meeting a motion was adopted to have Norman Fritzer and Jim Stallings, co-chairmen of the Retail Trade Committee, appear at tomorrow's City Council session and voice committee opposition to the one-cent sales tax.

City Manager Charles Hill told about 30 members of the Chamber of Commerce Retail Trade Committee, in a briefing held today in the Starlight Room at Coronado Inn "Pampa has major problems that need to be solved and solved immediately."

Hill said it would be necessary to either raise the property tax or adopt the sales tax.

In explaining the city's financial problem to the committee, Hill said, "One of two things must be done. People will (See CRISIS, Page 2)

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## Mysterious Hollywood Murders Baffle Police

LOS ANGELES (UPI)—Authorities widened their search today for someone "involved in a personal way" with starlet Sharon Tate and four other persons brutally murdered in the aftermath of a party at a rambling Bel Air estate.

Even as police pressed their search for one, two or possibly three killers, a couple in the Silverlake district 15 miles away were found stabbed in a double murder strikingly similar in several respects to the slayings of Miss Tate and her friends Saturday.

In both cases words were scrawled in blood in the homes. In the Tate murder, the word "pigs" was written in blood on the front door. In the Silverlake slayings, the words "death to pigs" were left in blood on the refrigerator door in the kitchen.

The man at Silverlake had the word "war" carved on his chest.

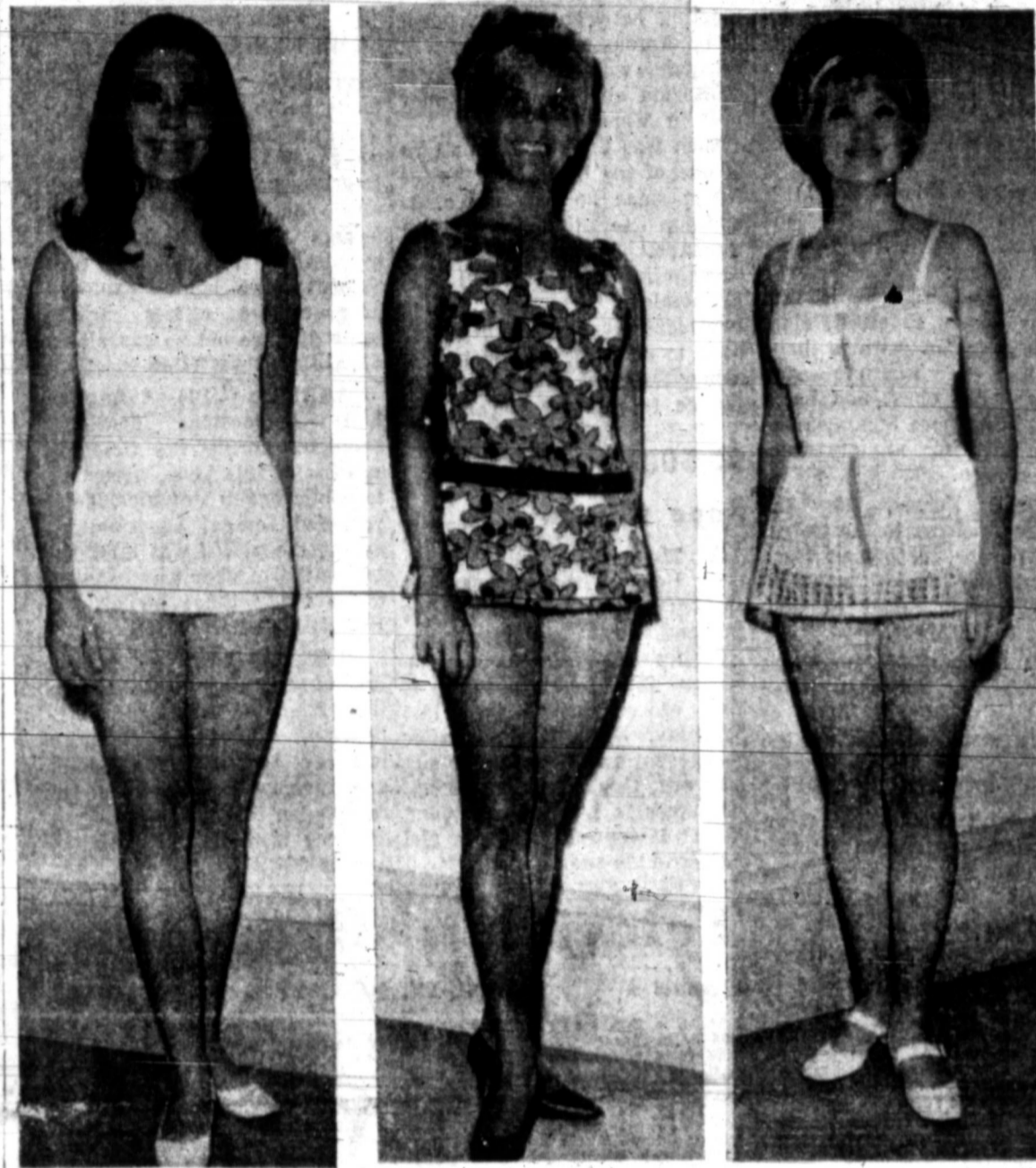
Police assigned to the Tate case were seeking a second suspect today for questioning, but said as many as three persons could be involved in the bizarre murders.

The name of the unidentified suspect came up during police questioning of William E. Garretson, 19, a caretaker at the home who lived in a guest house. He was the only person alive when detectives arrived at the scene Saturday.

Garretson underwent an hour-long polygraph test Sunday. Although police said they were not "entirely satisfied" with his answers, a spokesman said "if we can get some physical evidence checked out, we will probably release him today."

Police had not established a motive for the intruder or intruders who apparently cut the telephone lines into the home sometime after 10 p.m. Friday, then murdered the five victims.

The slayings were in the Silverlake district of Los Angeles, about 15 miles from the Bel Air area, at a one-story, rambling ranch home isolated on a hilltop.

Defense attorneys called their first witness Saturday after the state rested its case but called for a recess until today because the psychiatrists were not in town. Today marks the seventh day of testimony.

The state is seeking the death penalty for Durbin, also charged with murder in the death of White's picnic date, Keitha Morris, 19, of White Deer, Tex. White, 21, of Corpus Christi, was found slain north of Austin Jan. 8. Miss Morris' body was discovered in Burnet County, where Durbin will stand trial for her murder later this year.

Dist. Judge Tom Blackwell rejected a defense motion for an instructed verdict of innocent Saturday. The defense was expected to try to prove Durbin, 22, of Dallas and a UT drop-

out, was insane at the time of the slayings.

One of Saturday's witnesses, Travis County Deputy Sheriff Fred Hite, said Durbin was still denying the slayings when he went with Hite into a small interrogation room at the Department of Public Safety headquarters.

Hite said he "pieced together" a hypothesis about the way White and the pretty coed were killed and told Durbin the account as a "story."

"The law officer recounted for the jury what he had told Durbin that night. Although Hite said he has not seen or heard Durbin's written or oral confessions, the account he gave was remarkably similar."

"The story that you told the defendant is almost verbatim what he said in the confession," defense attorney Frank Maloney said to Hite. "Before you told the boy this, had he told you this?"

"No sir, I theorized it," Hite answered. He later said "no" when Maloney asked if Durbin told the deputy "anything at all to think this was what had happened."

## 41 Americans Killed, 170 Injured In Battle

SAIGON (UPI)—North Vietnamese and Viet Cong troops are massing for an offensive between Saigon and the Cambodian border, informed U.S. military sources said today. Communists attacks shattered a lull in ground fighting and brought the highest U.S. casualties in two months.

New fighting killed 41 Americans and wounded 170 others in battles that included a North Vietnamese assault on two Marine camps near the Demilitarized Zone (DMZ) Sunday.

Allied troops killed 126 Communist soldiers at a loss of 25 Americans including 19 Marines killed in a battle with North Vietnamese infantrymen who hurled hand grenades as they attacked just south of the Demilitarized Zone (DMZ) Sunday.

The North Vietnam assault near the 500-foot high promontory known as The Rockpile was the heaviest Communist ground attack near the DMZ since Feb. 25 when 36 Marines were killed in assaults on two artillery bases.

Military sources reported the heaviest North Vietnamese troop movements in several months in the DMZ which separates North and South Vietnam.

Eight Marines were wounded in the assault by the green-clad North Vietnamese troops, 17 of whom were killed.

After the ground fighting, American artillery traded salvos with Communist mortar squads firing from the DMZ.

To the south of the DMZ, the U.S. 101st Airborne Division lost five killed and nine wounded in two battles with North Vietnamese troops near the Laotian border and 30 miles southwest of Hue. Twelve Communists were killed.

Troops of the U.S. 11th Armored Cavalry Regiment united with South Vietnamese infantrymen and killed 31 Communist troops two miles east of the Cambodian border and 65 miles northwest of Saigon. The Allied troops called in the help of helicopter gunships firing rockets and machine guns. Five Americans were wounded.

U.S. spokesmen said it was the most Americans killed in a day's fighting since late June and the most Marine casualties in more than five months.

Co. Wilbur Simlik said the two Marine units attacked had been moved where they were to try to block infiltration routes expected to be used by the estimated 600 North Vietnamese troops believed in the six-mile-wide DMZ.

Gen. Creighton W. Abrams, U.S. commander in Vietnam, flew to Dong Ha near the DMZ today to confer on the attack by elements of North Vietnam's

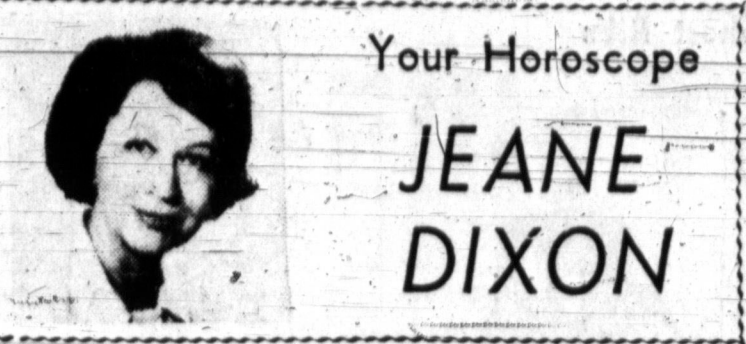

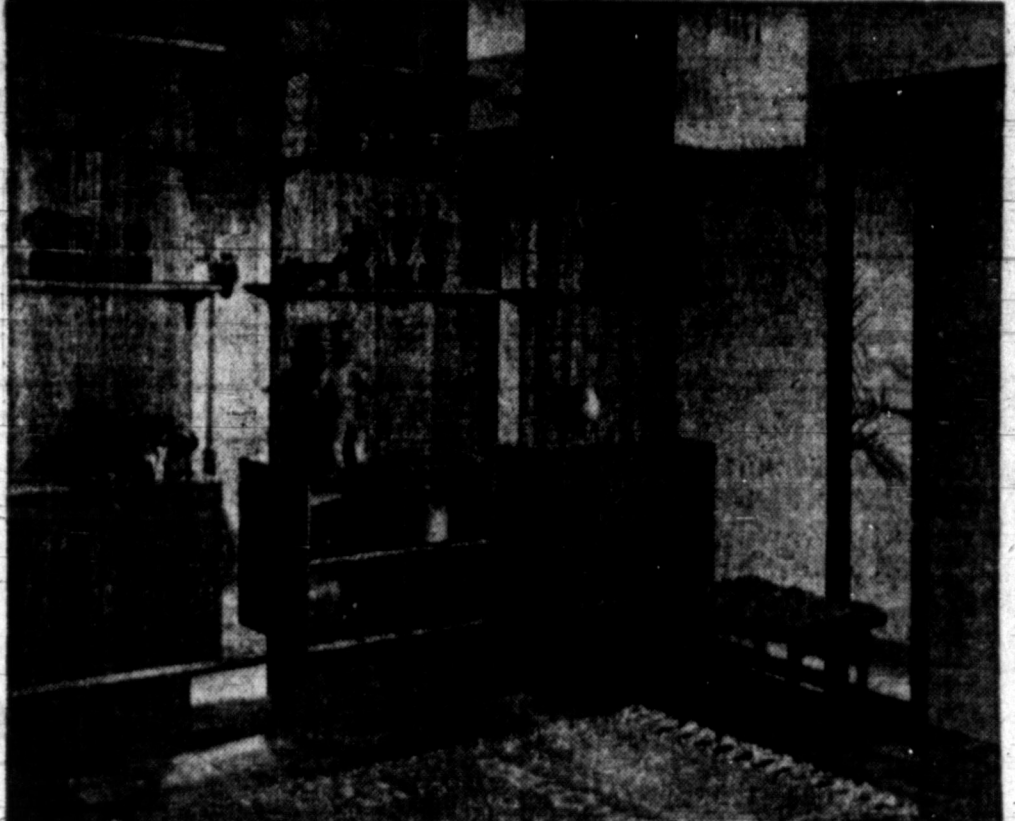

## Display Chic Collections In Their Own Home



**ALTERNATING PANELS** of mirror and teakwood enrich and enlarge an entry hall designed by Albert Hebert, A.I.D., who used wall paneling with its own movable shelves and cabinets to display his collection of pre-Columbian sculpture. The floor-to-ceiling paneling is easily installed on existing walls and was devised in Denmark by Paul Cadovius with a unique system of angled holes and matching dowels which support the shelves and cabinets almost invisibly. The mirror panels between the teak give a floating effect to the wall and widen the narrow area.

"Collecting" things, from pennies to precious gems, seems instinctive to human nature. Whether the collection is kept under the bed in boxes or in the bank vault, satisfaction comes from acquiring and then looking for more.

But the great pleasure really comes from showing them off — to yourself, to your family and to your friends.

Whatever form your prized possessions take — be they personal treasures of past times and places, or a particular category such as Waterford glass or Sevres porcelain — your collection can be either a dust-catching eye-sore, or it can be a dramatic element in your decorating scheme. It all depends how you display it.

Cario cabinets, etageres, vitrines, breakfast and china closets have been part of the furniture scene for many centuries.

Individual wall-hung brackets serve well for vases or porcelain pieces, too. Fine crystal can be shown to advantage if it is backed by mirrors and sidelighted for effect, for example.

The important thing to remember is that a collection functions most effectively as a decorative asset if it is related in some way to the rest of the room.

If your decor is not formal enough to accommodate the more traditional furniture often used for collections, there have been other more recent developments.

**Fashion Math**  
 There's a new subject that fashionable coeds will be taking up this fall: Fashion Math, or add and subtract. Mini-scholars will assemble their wardrobes by adding together little separates, which can all be linked and unlinked to everything else. AMARILLO — Richard Ellis took another step Sunday toward establishing himself as the man to beat in the Top O' Texas golf tournament.

Ellis rallied on the final 18 holes Sunday to win the Southwest Invitational golf championship by one stroke over Steve LeCrone of Amarillo.

By United Press International O. J. Simpson is anxious to pursue his goal to become the golden boy of professional football now that he has compromised his salary differences with the Buffalo Bills.

The two-time All-America from USC ended his holdout by accepting a four-year contract estimated at \$80,000 a year. While the talented halfback didn't get what he was asking for, he still enters pro football as the highest priced rookie since the merger of the two leagues.

Simpson expects to return to the Bills training camp at Niagara Falls, N.Y., Tuesday and Coach John Rauch said there was a good chance O.J. will play Friday night when the Bills face the Detroit Lions in an exhibition game in the Motor City.

Keys Lone Holdout The signing of Simpson and rookies Ron Sellers of Florida State and Ted Kwiatk of Penn State were the major off-field developments the past weekend.

Leroy Keyes of Purdue is the only first-round draft choice still unsigned. Keyes is a holdout with the Philadelphia Eagles.

Of the dozen exhibition games played the past weekend, seven were interleague contests between the AFL and the NFL.

The AFL won three of the seven with Kansas City, Buffalo and San Diego accounting for the triumphs.

The powerful Chiefs, winning their second outing of the preseason campaign, rolled over the Detroit Lions, 38-13, with quarterback Len Dawson, who played only the first half, throwing a pair of TD passes, both to Frank Pitts.

Veterans John Hadl and Keith Sneelin led a 70-yard third-quarter touchdown drive in San Diego's 10-7 triumph over the NFL New Orleans Saints.

Buffalo, evening its record at 1-1, got the AFL its first win of the season at the expense of an NFL club when the Bills upset the Washington Redskins, 21-17, Friday night.

Chicago, St. Louis, Minnesota and Baltimore upheld the prestige of the NFL with Saturday triumphs against AFL teams.

Baltimore displayed a potent offense in beating the Oakland Raiders, 34-30, while St. Louis mustered just enough scoring to trip the New York Jets, 13-6. Minnesota had little trouble disposing of Denver, 26-6, and Chicago edged Miami, 16-10.

In a pair of Sunday games Boston downed Cincinnati, 21-13, and Cleveland tripped the San Francisco Forty-Niners, 24-19.

In other games the past weekend Atlanta blanked Philadelphia, 13-0. Green Bay edged the Giants, 22-21, and Los Angeles trimmed Dallas, 24-17.

They didn't need as many containers as closures because some glass containers — notably returnable beer and soft drink bottles — "go to market" many times in the course of a year, according to the Glass Container Manufacturers Institute.

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
