## Federal Agent Gives Self Up In Murder Case

DALLAS (UPI) — A federal narcotics agent, the object of a 24-hour statewide search for murder, surrendered by long distance Sunday.

James L. Lander called the Dallas County Sheriff's office from a pay phone in Forrester, Tex., in Ellis County about 9 p.m. Lander told deputy Tom Barker he wanted to surrender. He also told Barker to come alone or he would not turn himself in.

Barker said when he arrived at the pay phone he saw Lander, 31, put a gun to his head and pull the trigger. The gun was not loaded.

Lander was returned to Dallas County where he told authorities he drove around Ellis County all day Sunday until he stopped and saw a television appeal from his family to surrender.

A justice of the peace denied bond for Lander until officers had more time to question him.

Authorities said Lander picked up a young girl at 3 a.m. Sunday at Lake Bachman in Dallas and forced her to ride with him to Oak Cliff, a Dallas suburb, where he forced her to disrobe. But, the authorities said, the girl was not harmed.

## Judge Says UT Fully Empowered To Remove Trees

AUSTIN (UPI)—Dist. Judge James Meyers ruled today the University of Texas is fully empowered to remove trees, change the course of a creek and reroute a street to make room for expansion of memorial stadium.

The ruling made official Meyers' decision which he had announced Sunday.

A group of about 25 students spent the weekend camped around a fire near the small trickling stream in Waller Creek about 100 feet from where 21st Street runs into the football stadium. They were waiting for construction crews to arrive and resume excavation work.

However, lawyers for the protesters asked for time for them to dig up some small trees and shrubs they had planted in the area where bulldozers last week pushed over some large live oak and cypress trees.

The university agreed to let them have the rest of the day to remove the newly-planted trees. A spokesman said little work could be done at the site "since it's raining anyway."

One of the protesters said "no one's going to dig up anything" after today's ruling by Meyers.

## Pope Paul To Allow Bishops More Power

VATICAN CITY (UPI)—Pope Paul VI announced today in a speech closing the World Synod of Bishops he intends to give greater powers to bishops while making sure his own supreme authority in the Roman Catholic church is untouched.

The Pope said he accepts recommendations of the bishops for synods to be held once every two years and for bishops to be given an active role in the work of the permanent Synod Secretariat of the Vatican.

He said he also would give "utmost consideration" to the possibility of bishops writing their own agenda for future synods.

The Pope made no mention of the key proposal before the synod—a recommendation that he consult bishops before deciding questions of major importance to the church, such as the church position on birth control.

The synod voted today on 13 separate proposals for giving bishops greater authority with the Pope in the government of the church.

Synod sources said the results would be announced Tuesday.

The Pope Sunday praised the assembly, saying it was leading the church toward goals "not

# 140,000 Workers Leave Jobs At General Electric

## Nixon Pledges Hands Off

NEW YORK (UPI) — At least 140,000 workers from 13 unions walked off their jobs at General Electric Co. plants throughout the nation today in a contract dispute that could idle 90 per cent of the huge company's production capability.

The walkout against one of the nation's largest defense contractors was the first major strike faced by the Nixon administration, which has pledged hands off. President Nixon has called for price and wage restraints.

About half the 310,000-man GE work force struck against the nation's fourth largest industrial corporation when contracts expired at midnight Sunday. It was the first nationwide walkout against GE since 1946. There were no immediate plans for further negotiations.

Paul Jennings, president of the 88,500-member International Union of Electrical, Radio and Machine Workers (IUE), charged GE "has forced the strike by its failure to bargain." The United Electrical Workers (UE), which had headed the negotiations along with the IUE, called for the strike Sunday morning when negotiations collapsed. Both unions followed.

GE made one offer—a three-year contract with wage increases averaging 20 to 45 cents an hour—which the UE and IUE rejected. They demanded higher increases in a 30-month contract. GE rejected a union offer to submit the negotiations to arbitration. Federal mediators entered the talks Friday to no avail.

Not all the 130 GE plants were closed. Some 3,000 work-

# County Study Seeks To Equalize Voting Power

A proposal to give every voter in Gray County's four precincts an equal voice in the commissioners' court is under consideration by a five-man board appointed by County Judge S. R. Lenning Jr.

Jim Campbell, Ray Thompson, Harold Comer, all of Pampa; Fred Blackwell of Lefors and Jim Allison of McLean have been investigating proposals to equitably distribute voting strength and spending power.

Judge Lenning said the proposals would be presented at a public hearing at 10 a.m. Wednesday in the country courtroom.

"We'd like to have any interested person attend and voice their opinions of the proposals," Lenning said.

The over-population of Precinct Two and the ratio of money spent per registered voter has long been a simmering problem in commissioners' court.

One solution expected to be offered by the five-man board will be decreasing the size of Precinct Two and dividing the population up among the other three commissioners.

The current boundary lines have been in effect since February, 1945.

Judge Lenning said he was of the opinion population should be the only criteria for determining boundaries of commissioners' precincts.

"As far as I am concerned," Lenning said, "it is clear from a 1968 U.S. Supreme Court mandate, equalization of voter strength is necessary."

Currently Precinct Two has 11,906 of the county's 13,790 registered voters. Precinct One has 666 registered voters.

# FBI Agent Urges Law Officers To Cooperate

"Cooperation between law enforcement officers and cooperation between officers and the public is a must in solving crime," said Federal Bureau of Investigation agent Thomas O'Malley Monday in his opening statement to more than 25 officers from throughout the Texas Panhandle.

O'Malley made his statements at the beginning of a two-week training school for law officers being held in the Palm Room at city hall.

"Cooperation is the backbone of law enforcement. Without it there would be few crimes solved. After all we are only as good as our information," O'Malley told the group.

O'Malley is one of several top law officers who will be in Pampa the next two weeks to help conduct the school, which upon taking a test at the end will give those passing 48 hours toward certification as law officers.

After O'Malley's talk, a color film on the officer and the citizen was shown. The film showed several different problems between the officer and citizen and the best method to take in solving the problems.

O'Malley was to talk later in the morning on jurisdiction of federal agencies and how they could help local officers if help is asked for.

In the afternoon session, those attending were to hear a talk from Bill Patterson, Lubbock, a secret service agent, who would talk on jurisdiction.

## Hospital Construction Moves Into Basement

Construction is well under way at Highland General Hospital with the flooring and walls almost completed for the new wing, according to Wes Langham, administrator.

Ground-breaking ceremonies held Aug. 22, kicked off the \$1.2 million expansion and remodeling program which began Aug. 27, under the direction of Reed-Strickland Construction Co., Amarillo.

"Workers are endeavoring to complete the shell of the new wing before weather prohibits outside work," Langham said.

He further stated, "last week's weather slowed workers down on the outside and it's beginning to look prohibitive for this week, so workers have moved into the basement and are knocking walls in for new facilities there."

The new wing will include new administrative offices, with a five-bed emergency room suite, X-ray department, physical therapy department, laboratory, doctors lounge and library, and a medical records room. Other work on the first floor of the hospital will include the remodeling of the nurses' station with a new doctors' reporting area and a circular drive in front of the hospital which will enable ambulances to have easier access to the emergency room.

## National Union Wins All Assembly Seats In Lisbon

LISBON (UPI)—Official returns showed today the ruling National Union won all 130 national assembly seats in Sunday's election, crushing the first serious bid by the Portuguese leftist opposition in 43 years.

The outcome of the voting strengthened the position of Premier Marcelo Caetano in the rightwing union and opened the way for him to introduce promised social and economic reforms in Portugal.

About 1.8 million of continental Portugal's 9.5 million people were eligible to vote and 500,000 out of 12 million in the overseas possessions. The National Union won about 85 per cent of the vote.

### Television In Review

HOLLYWOOD (UPI) — It's the year of the dirty old man in movie.

And about time, too. There are more of them than clean young men star ring in major film roles in 1969.

Three outstanding candidates for best actor laurels in the Academy Award race are John Wayne (True Grit), Anthony Quinn (The Secret of Santa Vittoria) and Lee Marvin (Paint Your Wagon).

None of the trio will ever see 45 again. Neither will their masculinity be challenged.

Nor, to anyone's knowledge, have they identified themselves as neurotics as has Dustin Hoffman who is under 45 and somewhat smaller than life when compared to the unholy Wayne-Quinn-Marvin genre.

In all three of their performances this year, the big men are whiskey-swilling ne'er-dowells whose single redeeming trait is that they are men for whom romance is only incidental and females a plague.

But in this nit-picking society of ours, let us examine their characterizations as have critics and parlor psychiatrists.

John Wayne as Rooster Cogburn, Quinn as Bombolini and Marvin as Ben Rumson avoid the cliché of the hairy-chested man's man who'd rather fight than breathe.

Inside each of the rough-hewn characters they play like sensitive men especially attuned to their times and surroundings.

Each is essentially a comedy portrayal, but the actors have reached deeper to pump life into the men they play—Wayne, a ruthless Italian clown; Marvin, a footloose gold miner.

Unlike too many of today's young performers, they do not wear their emotions glued to their foreheads.

## Killing Isn't Enough For 'Zodiac'

SAN FRANCISCO (UPI)—For "Zodiac," killing isn't enough. Police are convinced the psychotic slayer who identifies himself with the astrological sign for the heavens has killed five times in recent months.

But the murderer isn't satisfied with the slayings. He also craves notoriety. He tells newspapers to print his message on page one. He demands a famed attorney's appearance on a television show. He threatens to kill again.

"Zodiac," whoever he may be, has succeeded in terrorizing 2.5 million residents of the San Francisco Bay area and turning baffled detectives to the television screen and comic pages in efforts to identify him.

Police "wanted" posters show the killer as a nondescript man—middle-aged, stocky, with receding brown hair cut short and hornrimmed glasses set firmly on his nose.

Psychologist William F. Baker describes him as a "nobody" whose boundless ego glories in his anonymous notoriety. Baker feels the "Zodiac" is a sexually impotent woman-hater who kills to get even with his mother.

Police Captain Martin Lee of San Francisco fears he may strike again, whatever his underlying motivations.

The killer struck first last Dec. 20 in a lover's lane near Vallejo, about 30 miles north-east of here. He shot Etty Lou Jensen, 16, and her boyfriend, David Farady, 17, to death with a .22 caliber pistol.

His next victim was Darlene Ferrin, 22, who was shot to death July 5 with a 9 mm pistol in another lover's lane near Vallejo. Her companion, Michael Mageau, 19, was critically wounded.

Police did not connect the two incidents until August, when the first of Zodiac's coded messages were sent to San Francisco and Vallejo newspapers with a demand they be given front page coverage.

When the crude cipher was broken, the notes said the writer had committed all three slayings and killing people were "more fun than killing animals."

Zodiac struck against Sept. 27, attacking a young couple picnicking on Lake Berryessa in Napa County, about 20 miles north of Vallejo.

Cecilia Ann Shepard, 22, was killed in a frenzied knifing by a man wearing a hood marked with the sign of the Zodiac. Her boyfriend, Bryan Hartnell 21, was stabbed a dozen times but recovered.

After the attack, the slayer wrote the dates of the Vallejo killings on the door of Hartnell's car, signing them

with the crossed circle symbol of the Zodiac.

The latest slaying took place Oct. 11, when Paul Stine, 29, a cab driver, was shot with a 9mm pistol and robbed in an expensive residential section of San Francisco.

The killer mailed a piece of Stine's bloodstained shirt to local newspapers along with another message, beginning: "This is the Zodiac speaking."

The message accompanying the cloth ripped from Stine's bloody shirt contained a chilling

warning: "School children are nice targets. I think I shall wipe out a school bus some morning. Just shoot out the front tires and then pick off the kiddies as they come bouncing out."

Oakland police dispatches received a call last Tuesday night from a man identifying himself as Zodiac. He asked police to have either F. Lee Bailey or Melvin Belli, both well-known attorneys, appear on an early morning television talk show so he could arrange

to surrender. Belli appeared and, with host Jim Dunbar, spent two hours in a bizarre conversation with someone who said he was Zodiac. The caller pleaded for help, complained of headaches and cried out "I've got to kill."

"I need help," the caller said. "I'm sick. I don't want to go to the gas chamber."

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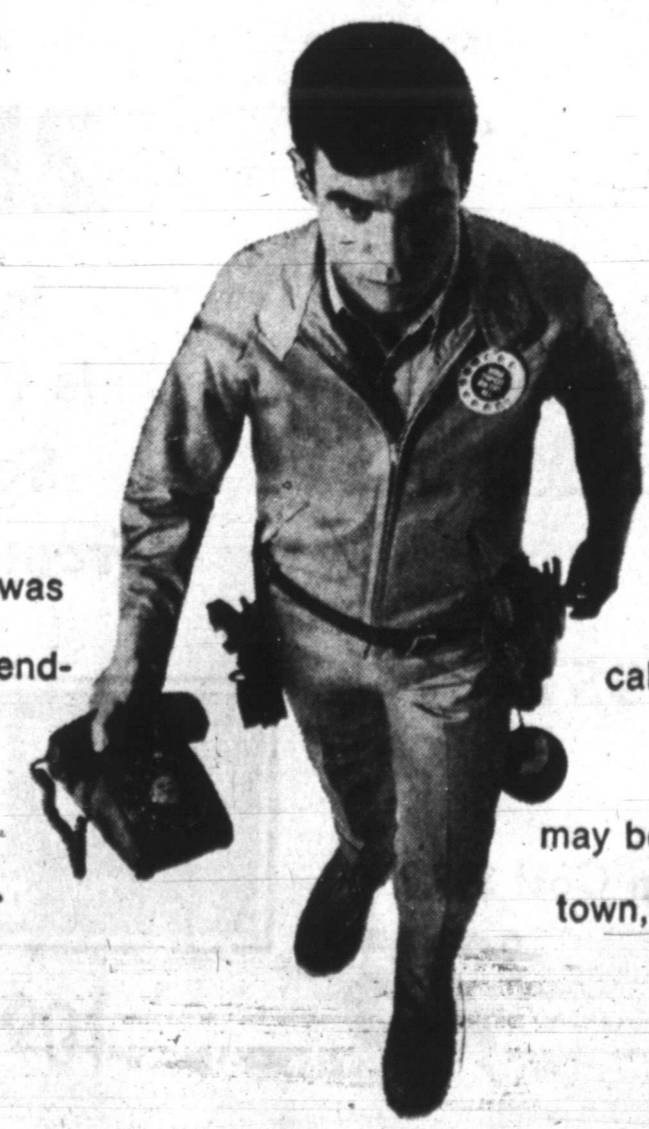

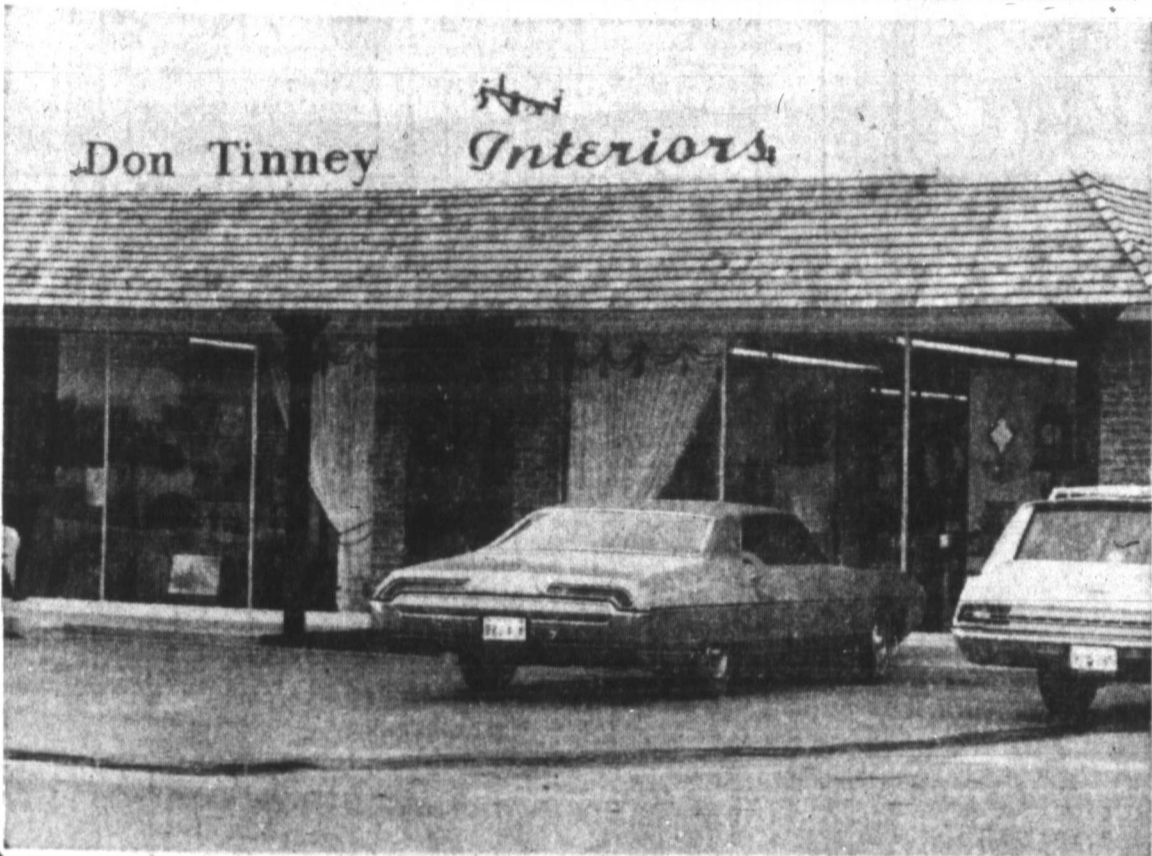

A leak on the dike! In panic, little Bobby stuck his finger into the hole to stem the flow of paperwork. Then he yelled for help, hoping to attract the attention of a passing antiwar demonstrator.

But no moratorium was scheduled that day and only his echo answered him.

All night Bobby stayed at his post. Although his finger grew cold and numb and inkstained, he knew that if he removed it, the leak would grow larger and larger until the city was flooded with paperwork.

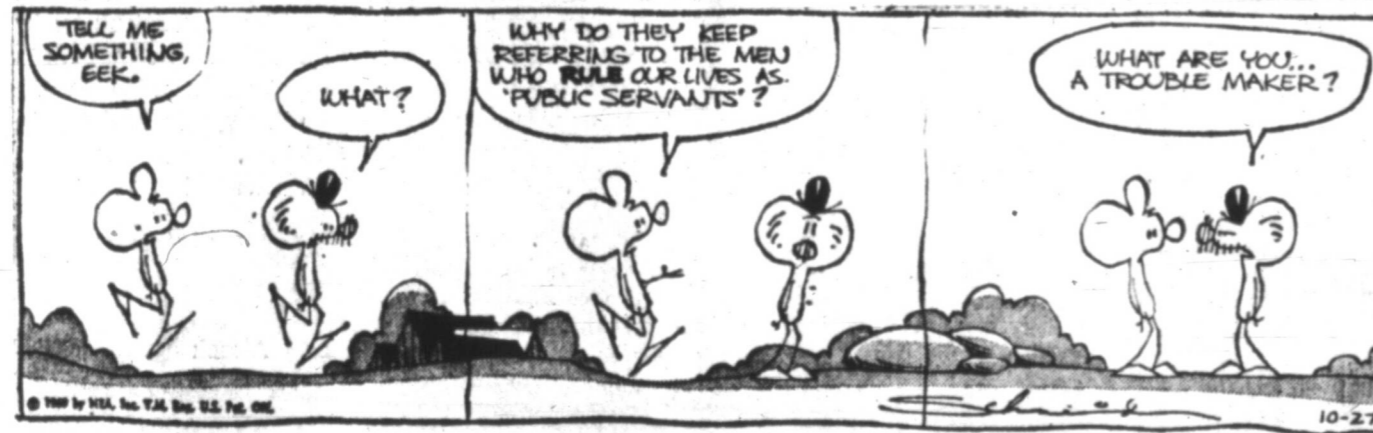

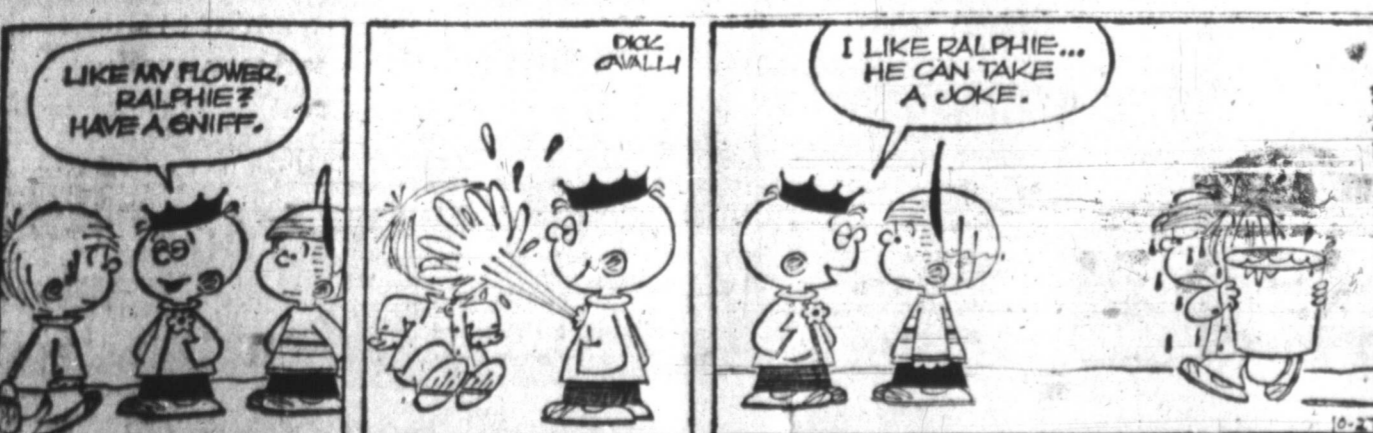

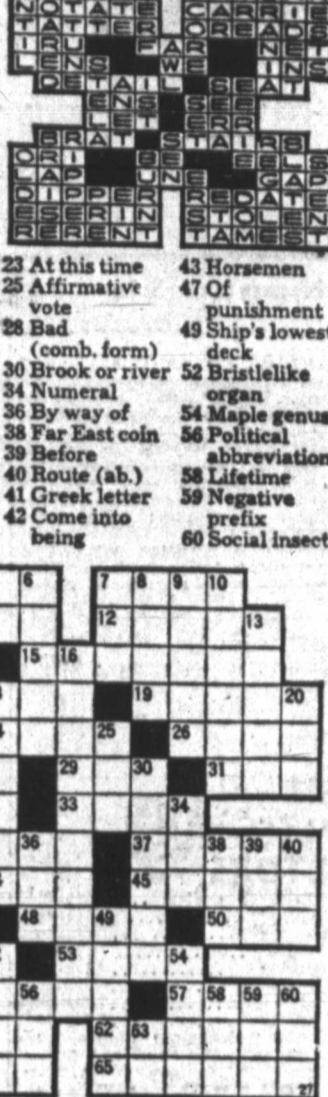

Groundbreaking Ceremonies Held For Perryton Feeders

PERRYTON (Staff) — Rep. Bob Price of Pampa was the keynote speaker here Saturday at the groundbreaking ceremonies for a \$1,250,000 cattle feeding operation.

Prior to the groundbreaking activities 12 miles south of here on Highway 70 for Perryton Feeders, Inc., a 25,000-head lot, an agri-business tour began at 9:30 a.m. at the First Methodist Church. Those on the tour traveled first to the Perryton airport to greet Price.

From the airport, tour members drove by bus to Waka for an inspection of the Rogers Sales and Service Manufacturing Co., traveled to the Joe Paul Farm south of Waka to see soil conservation practices and then to the Perryton Equity Feed Mills.

Following the noon luncheon at the First Methodist Church where Price spoke, the aggregation went to the 640-acre site for the groundbreaking. Others speaking along with Price were R. D. Lemon, Perryton Chamber of Commerce president and Grady Yearly, president of the feeding operation.

Completion is scheduled in March of 1970 for the operation which can be expanded to about 50,000-head capacity, according to Jim Jacobs of Pampa, manager of the facility.

Last Week In Review

Strife in the Middle East pitted Arab against Arab this week. There was an open threat to the government of Lebanese President Charles Helou whose nation has never gone to war against Israel, and a threat of Israeli intervention if Helou goes.

Center of the new conflict was the attempt by the Lebanese army to crackdown on the Arab guerrillas in southern Lebanon, halt their raids into Israel and thus prevent feared massive Israeli retaliation.

The rest of the Arab world reacted strongly, especially Syria, where the Al-Fatah guerrilla organization is strong. A force of 700 guerrillas invaded Lebanon from Syria on Thursday, and seized 24 hostages before they were driven back with tanks and rockets.

As the week drew to a close Arab guerrillas and possibly Syrian troops were reported massed on Lebanon's border with tanks and armored cars. Armed revolt flared in Tripoli where nationalist demonstrators battled regular army troops, seized government buildings and issued an ultimatum—they will hold the build-

ings until the government relaxes its drive against the guerrillas.

From Israel came a warning by Deputy Premier Yigal Allon that Israel cannot permit Arabs to seize the government of Lebanon—which would open a new front against Israel—and a defiant statement by Syrian President Nouruddin El Atassi that Lebanon must join the fight against Israel.

WASHINGTON—A \$4.9-billion housing bill intended to expedite Urban renewal was passed by the House of Representatives, 339 to 9. A last-minute amendment requires that any development financed by the bill must provide at least as much accommodation for middle and low-income families as the housing it replaces.

PARIS—U.S. negotiator Henry Cabot Lodge canceled a scheduled speech at the Paris peace talks, saying Communist "invektive" made serious negotiation "impossible."
