Economic development an ongoing local effort

Oil mill bid an example of various groups working toward common goal

Citizens and officials interested in economic development recently worked together to develop a land and incentive package to entice Plains Co-op Oil Mill to relocating near Muleshoe.

"We hoped we had made them an offer-like the Godfather-that they couldn't refuse," said David Marricle, president of the Muleshoe Area Industrial Foundation. "We are always looking for opportunities. We'll try again."

Marricle said oil mill officials told him that Muleshoe made a good presentation and a good proposal, but the site is just "too far from the central cotton market and lacks proximity to available seed."

The land package offered to the oil mill consisted of a 657-acre land package bordered by pavement, with railway on one side. Twelve water wells, nine interconnected, would have provided a water source to the site, and the land has access to gas, electricity, and telephone lines.


Recent initiatives by the Muleshoe Area Industrial Foundation, supported by the Economic Development Corporation, Bailey County, the City of Muleshoe and the Hospital District have brought to light ongoing behind-thescenes work by city officials to benefit Muleshoe's lifestyle and economy.

"There is a lot of talent represented in this room," said City Manager Dave Marr, Jr. after Marricle presented the final proposal at a joint meeting of the Economic Development Corporation and City Council the morning of Dec. 1, just before he took the package to the oil mill's corporate offices in Lubbock.

When Mayor Robert Montgomery commended the city manager for the hours he spent finalizing the proposal and coordinating group efforts, Marr said, "I appreciate all the help I have received. I do this for a living . . . the others don't."

Marr later added, "These

It's not always fair to keep score

Randy Adair didn't fail as a person, or as a teacher, and that's what coaches are teachers.

What the Muleshoe High School head football coach failed to do is win.

That's a sin in West Texas, where on Friday nights the scoreboard shines brighter than the moon.

And that's how coaches are judged, by hundreds of little light bulbs that ultimately determine their success or failure.

"Yeah, the 0-10 season had a lot to do with it," said Muleshoe Independent School District Superintendent Bill Moore, who asked Adair to resign late last month. "I told him we needed to make a change in the program."

Adair's coaching record at Muleshoe was 4-32.

Moore said when he hired Adair four years ago, they made a gentleman's agreement.

"He told me that if at anytime there needed to be a change in leadership, to let him know," said Moore.

Adair was an assistant coach under Moore at White Oak in the late 70s and early 80s. They've known each other for more than 20 years.

"If I can't make tough personnel decisions about family or friends, they need to find another superinten-

dent," Moore said when asked about a rumor that he was not involved in the decision.

Perhaps it was the Texas Cadillac Club? Moore said it was his

decision, and his alone. Make no mistake, Adair

doesn't want to leave. "I'm not the problem,"

Adair said earlier in the year and reiterated later. "I'm part of the solution. If I thought I was the problem, I'd leave." Adair wrote in his letter of

resignation to the school board: "Please be aware that I did not create a negative, losing situation. It predated my arrival. Sorry, but I will not wear that hat." Muleshoe, which has had

29 coaches in its 70 years of football, was 0-10 and 1-9 the two years prior to Adair's arrival. The Mules were ranked 212 out of 213 Class 3A teams by the Harris Poll (the rating service for Texas high school football) the year before he arrived.

Muleshoe has made the playoffs eight times in nearly three quarters of a century of playing football. In the last 15 years, there have been more than 50 assistant coaches at Muleshoe.

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
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Acosta dares to dream of helping others By MARTHA TOLES FROST


In the first round, Garbarino scored 15 points to led a balanced attack as Muleshoe beat the Odessa JV, 69-60.

The game against winless Tulia (0-9) was little more than a tuneup for Muleshoe (7-1) between premier tournaments.

The Lady Mules finished third at the Canyon Classic last weekend and played in the I-27 Tournament this weekend, which included Nazareth and Hereford.

"I was afraid we we're going to be flat," Muleshoe coach Jim Gruhlkey said. "And we were flat."

That was until Brandi Harrison and a full-court manto-man press gave the game a tempo infusion.



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

HIGHLIGHTS

Once again this year, the bowl alliance has lucked out, at least as far as the national championship is concerned. Thanks to Ohio State's loss to Michigan Thanksgiving weekend, Nebraska's showdown with Florida in the Fiesta Bowl Jan. 2 will produce a clear-cut No. 1 team, and we think the Huskers will solidify the position they've held for most of the season with a four-point win. Nebraska QB Tommie Frazier and his Gator counterpart, Danny Wuerffel, are two of the best-known and most talented players in the college game — they're true team leaders — and they should make the post-season finale a memorable one.

We've been criticizing the bowl alliance for a while now, but we promise to ease up if the Big Ten and Pacific-10 con-

ferences can be persuaded to join it next season. If Ohio State or Northwestern or U.S.C. should go undefeated in 1996, we'd hate to see them left out of the hunt in the non-allied Rose Bowl. In the meantime, look for the Buckeyes to mix it up with Tennessee in the second-best bowl game — the Citrus — and for the Northwestern Wildcats to cap their unforgettable season with a win over Southern Cal in the Rose Bowl.

We like to gauge the best college teams' long-term success — and popularity — by checking the percentage of bowlgame returnees. This year it's down from recent years: Only 19 of the 40 teams that played in a bowl last year are back. The other major statistic we chart is much higher. This season we picked a total of 1,761 games right and 591 wrong. (with 42 ties), a forecasting average of .749.

Finally, we present our annual list of the top 20 college conferences, based on the average of our power quotients for the teams in every conference in the country. With Ohio State and Northwestern leading the way, the Big Ten tops our list for the second year in a row. Here's the breakdown:
