

Gulley tabbed for state award

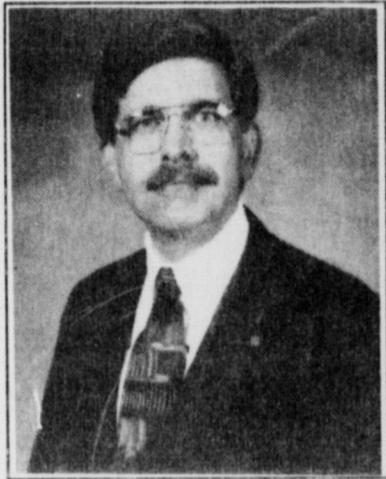

The Muleshoe Independent School District Board of Trustees began its regular meeting Monday night by presenting a certificate of commendation to John Gulley, who has been recommended for a Texas Excellence Award.

Gulley, a teacher of Spanish II and United States government/economics at Muleshoe High School, has been nominated by his peers at the high school as 1996 Outstanding High School Teacher in Texas.

Nominees are teachers who are "inspiring supportive of their students, who bring credit to the teaching profession, and who are held in the highest regard by their current and former students, fellow teachers, administrators, students' parents and the community," according to information provided by the University of Texas.

Dacia Steward, one of

Gulley's students, says that while maintaining the professional distance required of a teacher, "Mr. Gulley shows his concern for his students and the challenges they face as teenagers."

Kerry Moore, head of the MHS theatre department and a former teacher of the nominee, says "laughter and listening" are two of Gulley's major teaching tools to help students learn and remember.

True test comes soon for MHS

Don't be fooled by the Muleshoe High School Lady Mules fast start.

They aren't.

Muleshoe won for 11th time in 13 games Tuesday night, beating Lubbock Roosevelt, 52-28, in what has become almost routine.

Muleshoe builds a double-digit lead, then bounces back-and-forth between a comfortable win and blowout the rest of the night.

"We're not satisfied with our play," MHS junior point guard Brandi Harrison said. "We're playing sloppy and we're not putting people away."

Senior post Mandy Cleavinger, who scored 14 against Roosevelt and is the Lady Mules' leading scorer, agreed.

"I don't think we've show our true potential yet," Cleavinger said. "It's exciting to be 11-2. But we aren't even close to playing our best."

Although she delivered the meal by herself (her children Cade and Skylar were visiting their grandparents, and her husband Weldon had to work that day), she decided to visit the Colsons again for Christmas—with her whole family this time.

Recently, the Smiths visited the Colsons so their children could meet Comedith and Vera and take them some Christmas cards.

The two ladies showed the children their picture album, from when they lived in Tennessee and a guest bed covered

with gifts they had been sent—including a life-sized doll.

While the Smiths were there, a poinsettia arrived from Inez Bobo, and the spirit of Christmas giving and receiving filled the house of Vera Colson.

The Smiths plan to take not only a 'Christmas on Wheels' dinner to the Colsons on Christmas day, but also a basket of presents demonstrating their newfound friendship.

Many other such experiences were shared by givers and receivers during the special Thanksgiving on Wheels.

Barry and Sondra Wilson took meals to seven or eight

people, L.D. and Debbie Clark from Lazbuddie and her Sunday school class took meals to recipients, Rama Smalling cooked dinner for a couple of people, and Mike and Maria Richards got their Cub Scouts together to participate in Thanksgiving on Wheels.

Carelan Hamilton, Kay Madis and others contributed funds for Thanksgiving meals.

Dudley assumes position as interim Healthcare director

Ed Dudley was hired as interim director of the Muleshoe Area Healthcare Center three weeks ago.

He replaced former director Vicky Hutton, who tendered her resignation on Nov. 2 due to what Hospital Administrator Richard Murphy termed "personality conflicts."

Hutton, who has an unlisted phone number in Lockney, could not be reached for comment on Friday.

Dudley will be responsible for "the overall running of the nursing home—coordinating departments to make sure people are taken care of the best way possible," he said.

"Sometimes as rest home is the last stop for people who deserve all the dignity that can

be afforded them," Dudley said. A sign at the healthcare facility reflects his philosophy of running a nursing home: "Our residents don't live in our facility; we work in their home."

Hood is replacing Three Way Superintendent Don Parker, who retired this month.

Paris, retired principal of 17 years from Wellman Schools, will move to Maple and serve as principal for the spring semester at Three Way.

The personnel change was made at the Three Way School Board meeting on Monday.

In other business at the board meeting:

- Principal Hood was selected as Regional Advisory Committee representative, replacing Parker.

- Trustees discussed the Weighted Average Daily Attendance (WADA) agreement with Sudan, a property rich district which provides funds for Three Way Schools.

- The district considered a request to sell computers on a personal bid basis, for the purpose of receiving market value for computers in use at the school before they become out of date and their value drops.

Gulley, who demonstrates his interest in the speech and drama program by helping Moore direct one act plays in the spring, was selected to deliver the commencement address by the MHS seniors of 1989, 1991 and 1995.

MHS Principal Al Bishop calls Gulley an "innovative and dynamic" teacher who is viewed by his peers as one of the "rocks" of the campus.

"Gulley continually looks for ways to inspire his students and for ways to impress upon them—without disparagement but with encouragement—the need for a good education," Bishop says.

Gulley, a 1968 graduate of Muleshoe High School—with a bachelors' degree in government and masters' degree in

public administration from Texas Tech University—has been teaching at Muleshoe since 1984.

He views teaching as a worthwhile way to spend life helping others experience the joy of discovery and intellectual awakening—a way of life that is never boring, he adds.

"I teach because I love to teach. I delight in those moments of victory when the light goes on, and a student understands a difficult concept for the first time, or when they finally succeed at a task after many tries."

Selection of the Outstanding Teacher will be made in February, and the top ten finalists will be honored with a commemorative sculpture and awarded \$1,000 by the Col-

lege of Education and the Ex-Students' Association of the University of Texas at a ceremony in Austin.

The recognition is part of the university's program to raise public awareness of contributions teachers make and to raise the esteem of the teaching profession in communities across the state.

The teaching philosophies of the nominees will be shared with future teachers in the College of Education at UT.

- Update 50 (the 50th revision of MISD's school board policy) from the Texas Asso-

ciation of School Boards Policy Service Department was discussed.

- Trustees reviewed the campus report from the initiative team which visited Muleshoe High School recently.

- Final business was a discussion of construction projects for the district. Current construction projects include a new weight room and new tennis courts.

Also during this school year, wooden stadium seats will be replaced with metal seating, and new press boxes will be constructed on both sides of the field.

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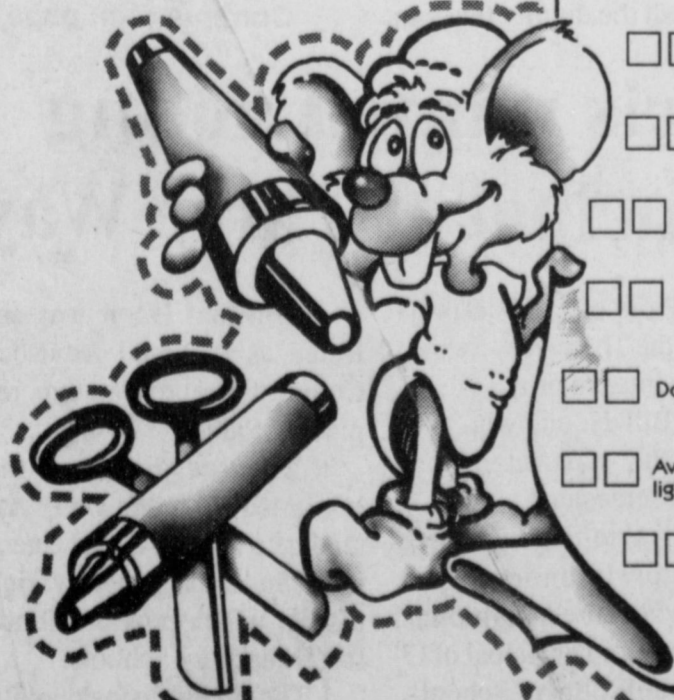

- Use waterproof lighting equipment outdoors. Hang sockets downward and don't leave a socket empty.



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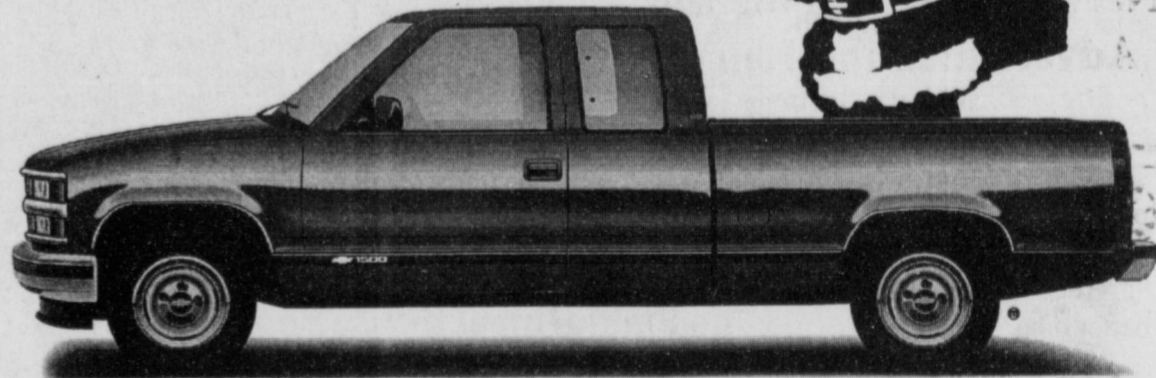
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Prehistoric Christmas continues tradition of Lazbuddie musicals

Mules prove explosive with return of seniors

Three seniors returned to the Muleshoe High School boys basketball lineup in the last week, and with them came added intensity and leadership lacking earlier in the season.

Playing together for the first time this season, Edward Olivas, Alfredo Gonzales and Daniel Garbarino helped the Mules undress Lubbock Roosevelt, 72-46, with a full-court press Tuesday night at WJHS gym.

Lubbock Roosevelt played more like Eleanor Roosevelt, but that didn't take away from the win.

"We took it to them," Muleshoe coach Ralph Mason said. "Usually they'll play you hard. But they didn't have a lot of fire in their britches (Tuesday night)."

"Still, I was really encouraged with our intensity," Mason added. "We can go play with anybody with that kind of intensity."

After a fast-paced first quarter, Muleshoe (4-8) ripped off a 14-0 run in the first two minutes of the second quarter to take a 31-10 lead. Game over.

The second half looked like a playground pickup game.

Alfonso Mendoza keyed the second-quarter run early with a conventional three-point play and a 3-pointer. Three straight steals off the press followed, all of which led to fastbreak layups.

Muleshoe forced 22 turnovers in the game.

"With Edward and Alfredo in there, it picks up the intensity," Mason said. "Add Daniel, and that adds a lot of quickness."

Mendoza had a season-high 25 points, four 3-pointers and seven assists. Garbarino had 18 points and five rebounds, Olivas had 10 points and seven rebounds and Josh Slayden nine points and seven rebounds.

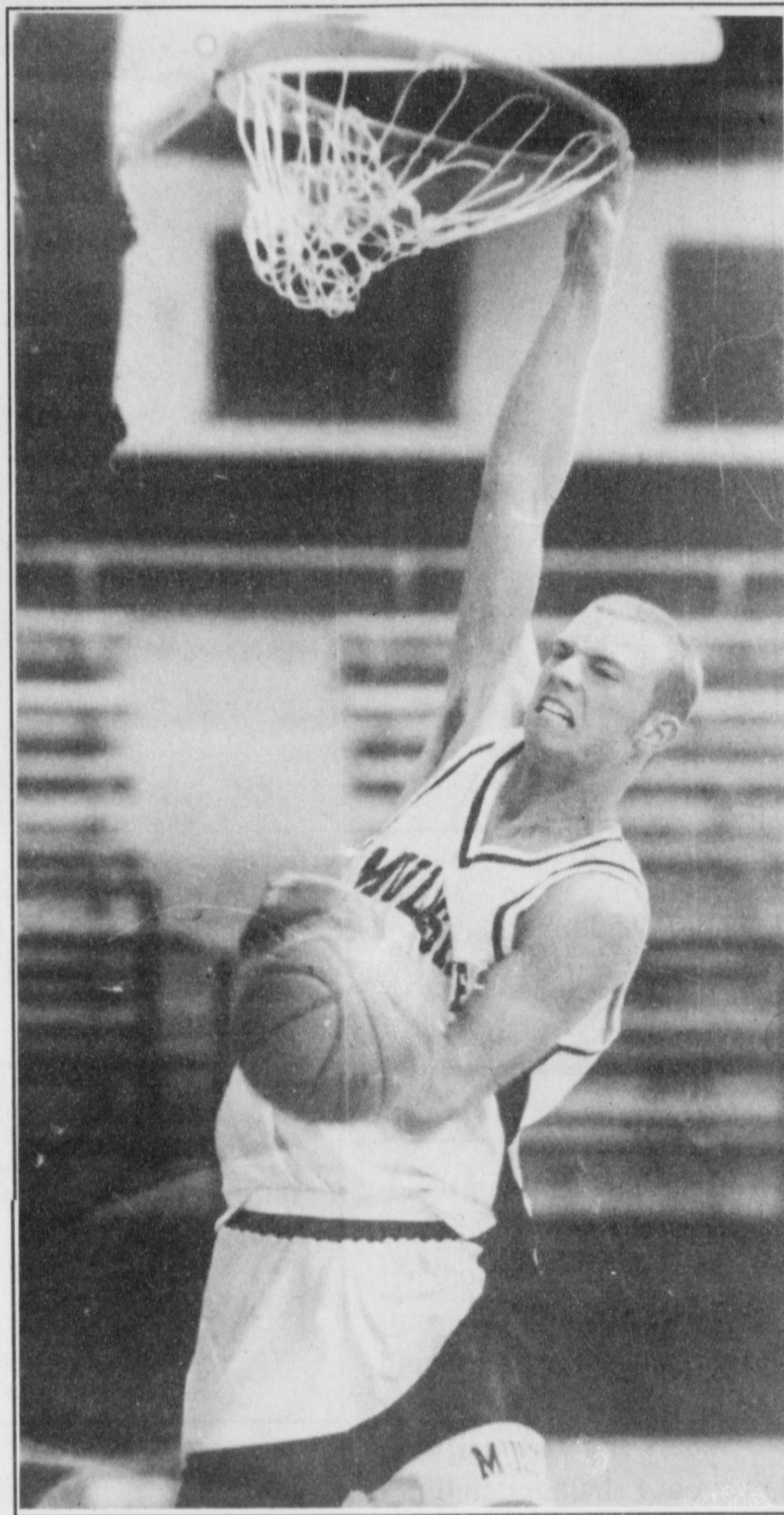
Muleshoe had 40 rebounds against Roosevelt after getting 13 against Canyon in its last game, which pleased Mason.

Garbarino was playing his fourth game since returning from a knee injury. It was the second game of the season for Gonzales and Olivas' first. Both returned after being academically ineligible.

Jermie Patton led the Eagles with 17 points and Casey Martin added 10.

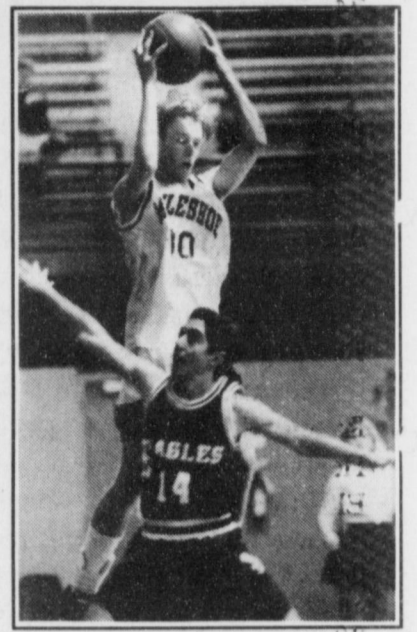
Canyon gets physical with Mules, 72-49

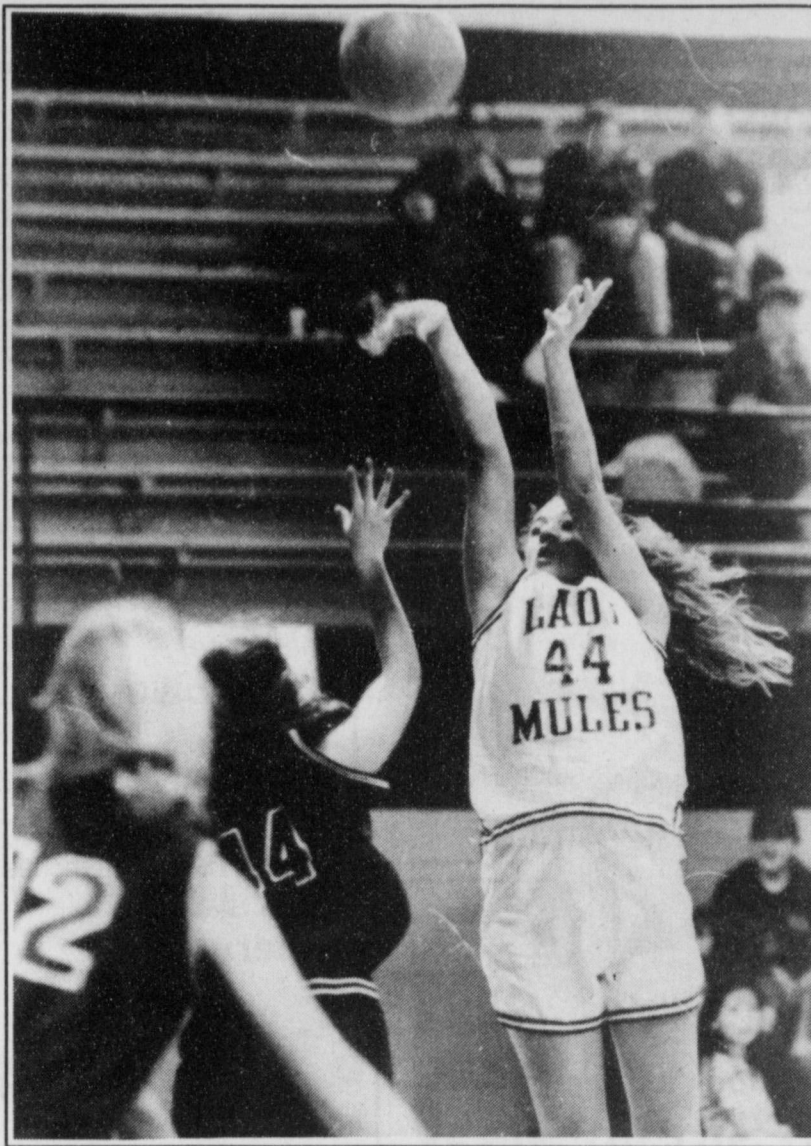

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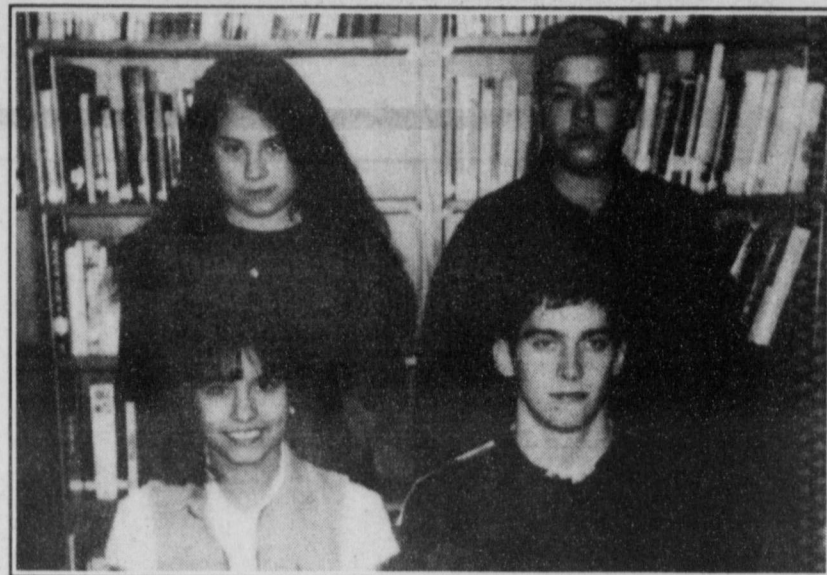

Hood said the district will use the proceeds from the sale of the computers, along with funds budgeted for new computers, to purchase replacements.

• During his principal's report, Hood discussed the policy for eligibility for exemption of students from taking semester exams.

Juniors and seniors may be exempted from semester tests

if they have at least an 80 average in a class and no more than two absences.

But Three Way's policy permits 9th and 10th graders to be exempt from only three semester tests—even if they meet the requirement of a 90 average for freshmen and 85 for sophomores, also with no more than two absences.

"We didn't want some students to go through high school without ever having taken a

semester test," Hood explained. "Semester tests resemble the kinds of tests they will be taking in college."

• Hood announced that four semester tests will be administered Wednesday, Dec. 20, and three will be administered on Thursday, Dec. 21, which is the last day of classes before the Christmas holidays.

School at Three Way will resume Monday, Jan 8.

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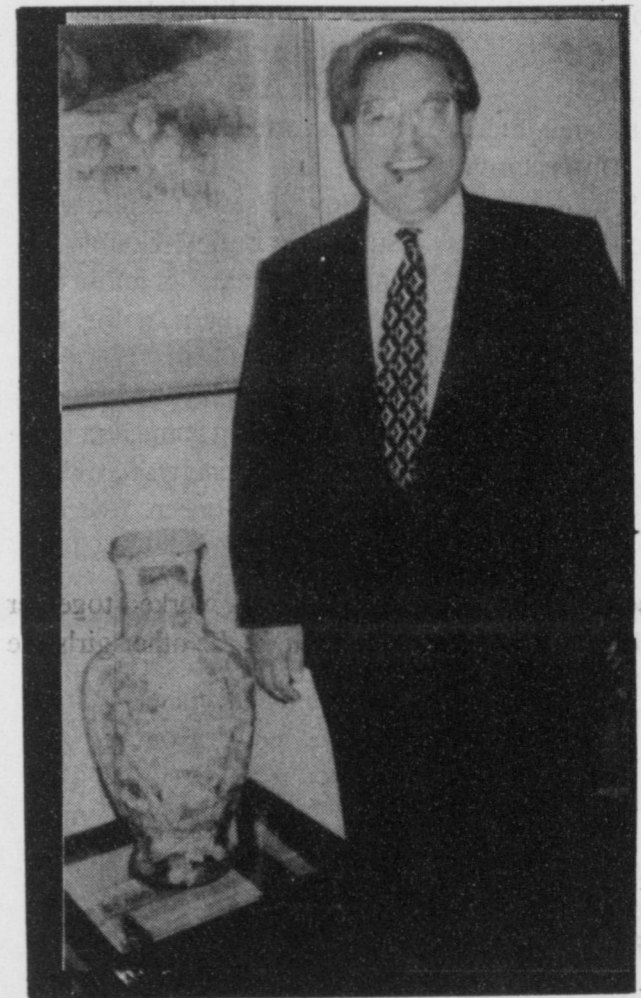

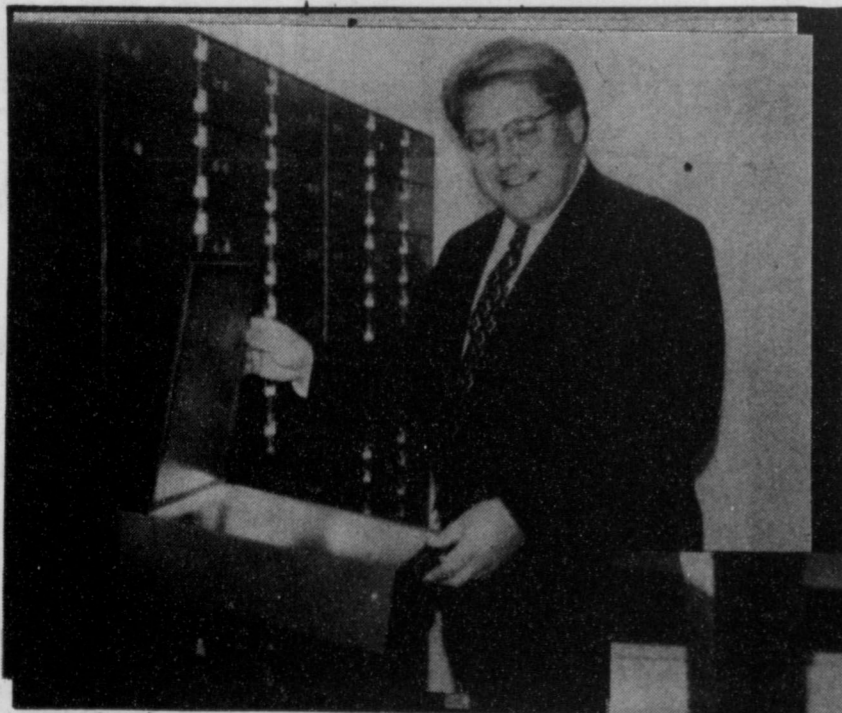
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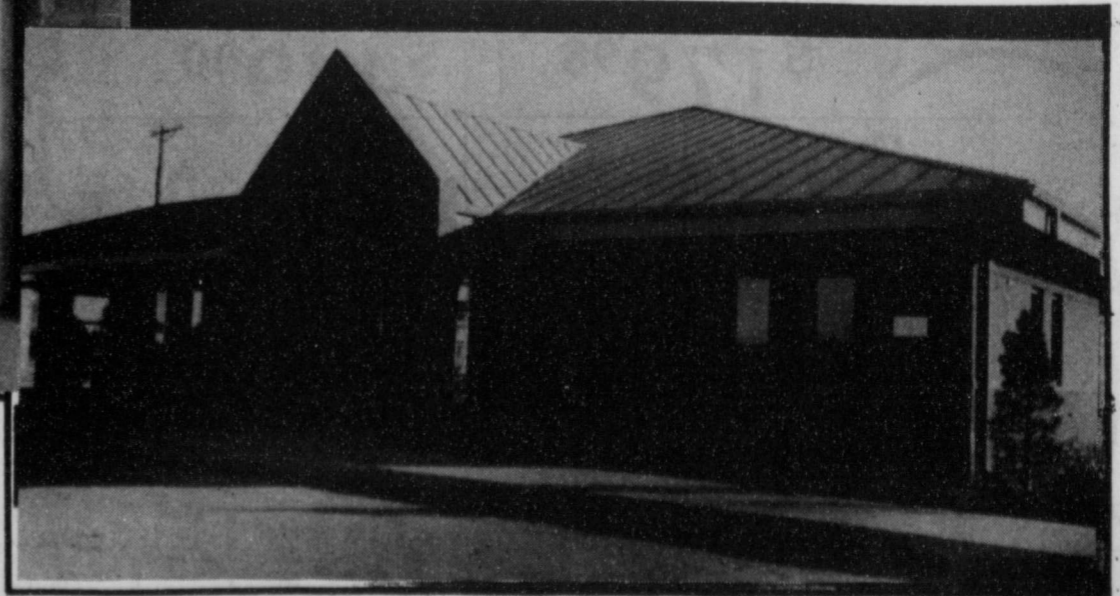

Extension service offering farmers financial advice

The new federal farm bill appears to be heading toward more flexibility for farmers to respond to the market as they decide what crops to plant, says an agricultural economist and management specialist with the Texas Agricultural Extension service.

But that means farmers must become more skilled in using available marketing tools, he says.

"This new flexibility will likely result in more price variability," says Dr. Jackie Smith, professor and Extension service economist at Lubbock. "This increased price variability and the likelihood that deficiency payments will be discontinued will force farmers to become more familiar with the available price risk management tools."

A cotton farmer can take advantage of profitable pricing opportunities only if he is prepared to evaluate the various alternatives. Smith said.

To help farmers be prepared to evaluate alternative pricing opportunities, the Extension Service will hold a series of one-day, in-depth, introductory cotton marketing workshops in

January. The workshops will be held at four sites: Jan. 23, Post; Jan. 24, Big Spring; Jan. 25, Plainview, and Jan. 26, Levelland.

Dr. Carl Anderson, professor and extension cotton marketing specialist from College Station, and Smith will be the instructors. Topics will include introduction to futures, localizing the futures basis, introduction to options, estimating costs of production, comparison of pricing alternatives, developing a marketing plan, cotton situation and outlook and an overview of current farm bill provisions.

Each workshop will begin at 9 a.m. and end at 5 p.m. The registration fee is \$30 and includes an extensive set of materials. Spouses are encouraged to attend; each husband and wife will pay only one \$30 fee. Registration should be made in advance with local county extension agents. A workshop at any site will be cancelled if 10 paid registrations haven't been made by January 12. Additional information may be obtained from county extension agents or by telephoning Smith at Lubbock (806) 746-6101.

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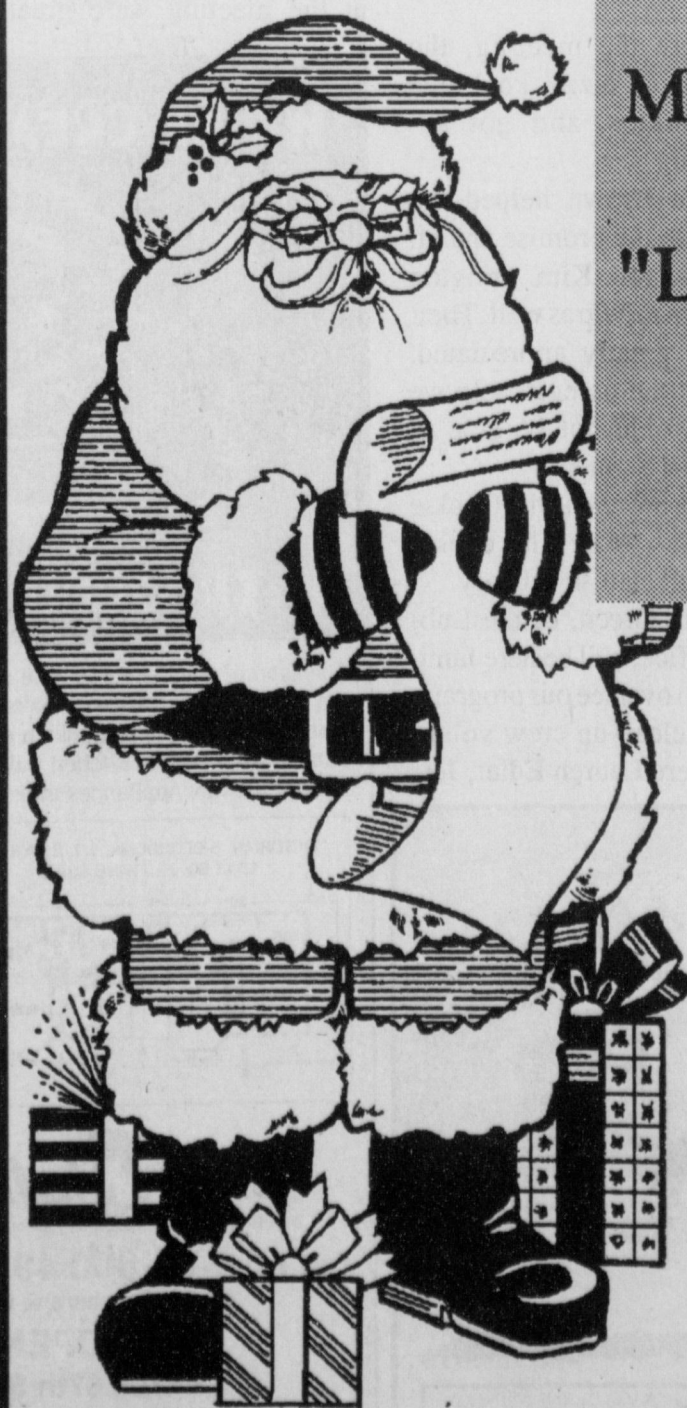

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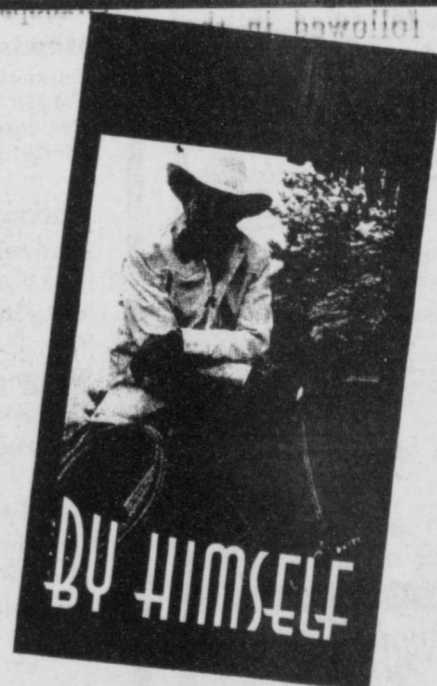

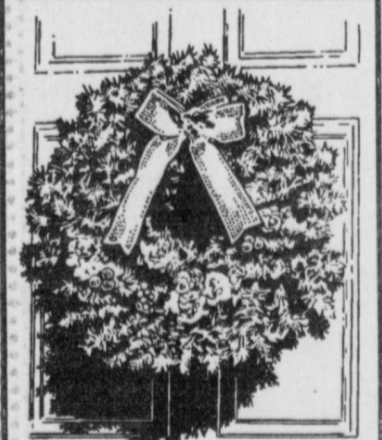

Monthly best losers are Loretta Lloyd, best loser; Evelene Harris, first runner-up and Marion Wilson, second runner-up.

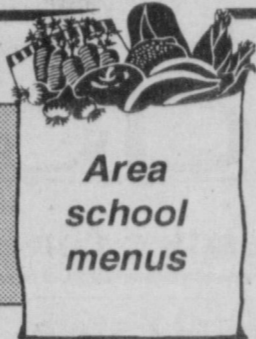
