PAMPA — Pampa High School counselor Leslie Koetting says she feels "lucky" that the school's Student Assistance Program hadn't received any funding from the Texas Commission on Alcohol and Drug Abuse for the past year.

TCADA pulled grants funding from grants last week from a dozen statewide programs working to prevent alcohol and drug abuse in Texas.

One of those programs the Workers Assistance Program - helped the school get their drug and alcohol program off the ground with a four-year grant.

WAP also provided further assistance in the past, but Koetting said since she came to the school in 1992, WAP has been used only minimal-

HUNTSVILLE (AP) — The 127,000 inmates who call the Texas prison system home will be joining all other Texas residents in paying state sales taxes on snacks.

Signs are going up at prison commissaries warning of the tax burden beginning Oct. 1.

The new tax is expected to raise more than \$500,000 for the state's general revenue

The tax on snack food like candy, chips and soft drinks has been absent since 1961 for state prisoners and state hospital patients. The Legi-slature, however, now has changed that to include the prison commissary sales which totalled \$38.5 million last year.

"I'm sure it sets well with the people of Texas to see inmates paying the same taxes as the rest of us,' James A. Collins, executive director of the Texas Department of Criminal Justice, said today. "Besides, doing away with the exemption simplifies our bookkeeping."

Bosnian forces agree to Serb state

GENEVA (AP) - In an "important milestone" toward peace in the Balkans, the former Yugoslav republics agreed today to create a state within Bosnia for the rebel Serbs while maintaining the country's unity.

The deal, reached after a day of U.S.sponsored talks, was a major concession to the Bosnian Serbs, while also meeting the Muslim-led Bosnian government's demand that Bosnia remain a single country.

There was no mention of a cease-fire in the 3 1/2-year-old war, and it was unknown whether the agreement would mean an end to NATO's 9-day-old bombing campaign against Bosnian Serbs.

U.S. mediator Richard Holbrooke earlier had disavowed any connection between the talks and the bombings.

At a news conference today, he called the agreement for recognition of Bosnia's

international borders "an important mile- thirds of the country since then. The goal the statement added stone in the search for peace." He stressed that "significant differences remain," especially regarding how to divvy up the country and what kind of ties the Bosnian Serb state would be able to forge with Serbia.

"Clearly much remains to be done," Holbrooke said.

The agreement was reached after talks among the foreign ministers of Bosnia, Croatia and Serb-led Yugoslavia, who were to report back to their capitals tonight. Negotiations between the parties and the major powers trying to end the war were to resume next week in Geneva. Yugoslavia was negotiating on behalf of the Bosnian Serbs.

The Bosnian Serbs rebelled against the republic's 1992 decision to secede from Yugoslavia and have captured some two-

European Union negotiator Carl Bildt said that, under the deal, Bosnia will include "two democratic entities," with the Muslim-led Bosnian government controlling 51 percent and the Bosnian Serbs 49 percent.

"This territorial proposal is open for adjustment by mutual agreement," according to a joint statement agreed to by the foreign ministers and distributed after the talks.

"Both entities will have the right to establish parallel special relationships with neighboring countries, consistent with the sovereignty and territor- Herzegovina is one country within its ial integrity of Bosnia-Herzegovina,"

Bosnia's ambassador to Washington, Sven Alkalaj, said that meant "Bosnia stays within its internationally recognized borders, and Bosnian Serbs cannot join their territory with Serbia.

"It is a concession to the Serbs but it leads toward peace," he told The **Associated Press**

Asked what kind of "special relationship" would be allowed, Holbrooke said that would have to be worked out at future talks.

He said: "There is nothing in this plan that would suggest in anyway shape or form that Bosnia-Herzegovina would be divided into two countries. On the contrary ... it is now accepted that Bosniaborders."

Hispanic Caucus wants Amarillo judge ousted

bers of the Congressional Hispanic Caucus are seeking the ouster of a Texas district judge who ordered an Amarillo woman of Mexican descent to speak English to her 5year-old daughter.

In a letter Thursday to the executive director of the Texas State Commission on Judicial Conduct, the 11 lawmakers expressed "outrage" over the Aug. 16 ruling of State District Judge Samuel Kiser.

"We request that the Texas State Commission on Judicial Conduct authorize formal proceedings for removal of Judge Kiser," they wrote.

"Denying a mother's right to speak to her daughter in whatever language she chooses raises serious constitutional questions," they added. "We are con-

WASHINGTON (AP) - Mem- cerned that Judge Kiser has Commission on Judicial Conduct. comes attempts to have Kiser taken excessive liberty in his interpretation of the law. It appears that he has allowed his personal prejudices to influence his judgment.

> Also Thursday, Mary Helen Berlanga, a member of the State Board of Education denounced Kiser's ruling, saying, "This action condemns both parents and children for speaking and hearing the native language of a proud and respected segment of our society.

> "If any language is perpetuated as inferior, the culture which is represented by that language will also suffer the stigma of inferiority," Ms. Berlanga said.

Stephanopoulos faces charges for leaving accident scene

WASHINGTON (AP) - White House senior adviser George Stephanopoulos faces charges of leaving the scene of an accident and driving with an expired permit after allegedly crunching the fender of a parked car outside a Georgetown restaurant.

Stephanopoulos, 34, was arrested at 11:45 p.m. Thursday, according to Police Lt. Peter

He was taken to the Second District Police Headquarters where he was booked and then released a couple of hours later.

Police spokesman Joe Gentile said today that Stephanopoulos struck another vehicle as he was leaving his parking space, "causing minor damage."

He described the accident as a "fenderbender" and said Stephanopoulos was scheduled to appear in court on Sept. 18. Gentile added that there was "no evidence

of alcohol."

In an interview outside the police station, Stephanopoulos said he was at dinner in Georgetown and was parallel parked when he brushed the car in front of him as he tried to leave the parking space. He would not elaborate.

Stephanopoulos did say: "I'll never let my driver's license expire again."

President Clinton's press secretary, Mike McCurry, told reporters he had talked to Stephanopoulos earlier today and, "It was not the best way to begin Friday."

The mishap happened in front of the Saloun restaurant in Georgetown. Stephanopoulos, who lives in the Dupont

AUSTIN (AP) – Some members of the State Board of Education, passed this year, changes the text- law's author, who wrote saying they aren't bound by the book selection process. 

Austin American-Statesman on concealed handgun ruling: Whether it's the state's new concealed handgun law or the legal interpretation of it that is the more stupid, it amounts to the same thing: an absurd situation.

Attorney General Dan Morales has ruled that under the law, which goes into effect Jan. 1, guns may be banned from certain buses, posted private property and county parks. However, cities do not have the authority to ban concealed handguns from their parks

The law, or at least its interpretation, sets up a wonderfully ridiculous tableau wherein the family preparing for a weekend picnic has to decide whether to include the concealed handgun depending on the park location.

Inflicting reality on that scenario, it isn't likely to happen. But it points up the silliness that often goes on under the guise of making law. ..

Counties may ban concealed handguns from their parks, but cities are specifically prohibited from doing the same.

Why the law was so drawn, or so interpreted, is anybody's guess. Maybe it shouldn't be surprising that this law is a mess, considering all the emotion expended on it.

Midland Reporter-Telegram on school discipline:

For years Texans have complained that the biggest problem in the public schools is a lack of discipline. Now legislators have handed teachers a state law giving them authority to help maintain discipline in classrooms and on school campuses

No doubt some people will think the rewritten Texas Education Code goes too far in requiring a one-year expulsion for students who bring a gun to school or those who assault other students or bring other weapons, drugs or alcohol to school. There is no question that the rewritten code takes a "get-tough" approach to student crime and vio-

But that approach was needed. One only has to look at the number of incidences of students carrying guns or knives to chool or the number of assaults of students or teachers to realize that a school campus is a microcosm of society in general, and as such, violence there is increasing dramatical-

Of course, schools are not intended to be violent places. That's where teachers are supposed to educate and students to learn. When criminals or violent students unleash their vengeance on teachers or other students, the process of education breaks down. Regaining that control is imperative.

The visage of pure, cold evil

An out-of-town friend expressed a desire to see Washington, D.C.'s Holocaust Memorial, and so, despite some reluctance to subject myself to the emotional stomach punch such a visit would entail, I agreed.

When the memorial was still in the planning stages several years ago, I was skeptical about it. Does a memorial to a European nightmare belong alongside the monuments to American history and institutions? I wasn't sure. And I was concerned lest non-Jews see the memorial as some sort of special pleading about Jewish victimization - in an era when we have a belly

full of this and that group claiming victim status. But the finished memorial transcends such concerns and establishes beyond doubt that Washington is a proper site for recording, forever, what human beings are capable of at their most cruel and depraved. It is fitting to have the Holocaust Memorial here because one's overwhelming emotion upon emerging into the Washington sunshine after experiencing several hours of that horror is humble gratitude for having been born at this time in this place.

As for special pleading, after viewing the mindnumbing evidence of the genocide against Europe's Jews, it's hard to imagine anyone arguing that the Hølocaust isn't so special and everybody's got troubles. Besides, the memorial chronicles the genocide against all of Nazism's victims: Jews, political dissenters, the Polish elite, the handicapped (there is a photo of a beautiful, mentally retarded 8-year-old boy taken just moments before he was shot), homosexuals, Gypsies and prisoners of war.

It staggers the mind to think that most of the world declined to believe Hitler's genocidal intentions - though he had spelled them out clearly in Mein Kampf. Look at the photos from 1933 of German women being paraded through the streets wearing signs saying "I am the biggest pig in town and have defiled myself with a Jew." Or consider Hitlers remark, before the Final Solution began, "Who now speaks of the fate of the Armenians?"

But more shattering than the actual box car visitors walk through, more shattering than the model of the gas chambers showing hundreds of men, women and children herded naked into a room and then gassed for 20 minutes until dead, and more shattering than the photos of mounds of corpses 30 feet high are the personal stories.

The memorial contains videotaped testimony from thousands of Holocaust survivors. Near the end of the tour, you can sit and watch them tell their tales.

One woman spoke of how she, her mother and other daughter, "Take care of your sister."

In deference to the mother's religious sensibilities, the Polish rescuer bought a special pot and spoon in which to cook all of her charges food, so that it would be kosher. All three women survived the war. But when they returned to the village to thank their benefactress, she hushed them away, saying, "Don't come here. Don't let my neighbors see you. My Polish neighbors would never forgive me for saving Jews." Indeed, in 1946, there was an anti-Jewish pogrom in Poland, sparked by fear that Jews who survived the Holocaust would attempt to return to their homes and reclaim the property that had been stolen from them.

Carlin and the politically obscene

In the early 1970s, comedian George Carlin performed a routine concerning seven off-color words you couldn't say on television. It was fitting, then, that the almost-anything-goes cable network HBO had Carlin host its "20 Years of Comedy" retrospective.

At times during the 90-minute program, which featured clips from such comics as Robin Williams, the obscenities flew thick and fast. That must have brought a certain satisfaction to Carlin, who deems himself not just an eclectic comedian but a polemicist of sorts. I say that with certain trepidation because his beliefs are so loony as not to be taken seriously. Carlin is no fan of the free market, either. To Snyder, Carlin remarked that "besides religion, I Carlin was raised Catholic, but he has long been think the belief in private property is also a very crippling thing." On Whoopi Goldberg's talk show in 1992, he opined, "I think property is theft.

I don't think anybody owns anything 'cause when

you die, it's still there. ... All this property stuff is a way of keeping power."

Perhaps Carlin's most memorable rant on the topic had to do with - no kidding - country clubs and golf. In the early '90s, he performed a monologue that declared, in part, "I got an idea where we can put some low-cost housing - golf courses." (Golf is a) meaningless, mindless, arrogant, elitist, racist game. ... I say it's time to reclaim that valuable land from the wealthy and turn it over to the homeless."

Discussing the golf course monologue in 1992 with Goldberg, Carlin expounded, "I like to think in symbols, (and) I see golf courses as an arrogant and adding, "Christians and Jews believe that symbol. ... Look at all (that) land. The ball is (very religion is indispensable to morality. That's a small). What do these pinheads need with all that interviews where no one dares challenge him -

vas a screed against the arrogance of the wealthy, that they think they have the right to appropriate all of (that) land, use all that water ...

If you're as cranky as Carlin is, there's just about nothing right with the world. In 1991, he told The Washington Post, "People talk about a breach of public civility. What public civility? We electrocute retarded people in this country. We execute minors. We just bombed and killed 100,000 people for nothing (in the Gulf War). Oh, well. This country is doomed eventually; I'm just glad I don't have an emotional stake in it."

The next year, he opined on Sonya Friedman's CNN show that Ross Perot "could be ... a wonderful dress rehearsal for our fascist leader who comes from the wings on a white horse, about whom we know little, who has all the answers because there's a deterioration of people's lives in this country ... and we want a fixer."

Some defend Carlin as the mellow guy whose musings deal with such whimsical matters as the non-existence of blue food. But Carlin demands to be taken seriously. Four years ago, he declared to The Boston Globe, "The sociopolitical humor in my work is stronger now than it has ever been. ... I work on things that will always be true - a woman's right to do what she wants with her body, the right of oppressed people to have more of the pie and be free of harassment, the warlike quality of American business and the falsehoods behind America in general."

How far does that kind of ugliness, coupled with anti-Christian bigotry, get you in the entertainment world? It gets Carlin endless celebrity falsehood. That's what drives these people to try land to play with a little ball? ... The monologue and his own recently canceled sitcom on Fox.

Government shutdown showdown

By now, the bluster and bravado have drawn the lines for Congress and President Clinton: Before they're finished struggling over the budget there's bound to be some sort of shutdown in the govern-

How much of it, how long d who, if anyone, really suffers are answers to come in the next month or so. It's happened before, when Republicans were in the White House and Democrats controlled Congress. Those shutdowns were partial, brief and

They didn't save money; they cost money. In the current situation, the opening phase of the 1996 presidential campaign hardens both the rhetoric and the positions. Clinton is running, Sen. Bob Dole is challenging, and Speaker Newt Gingrich hasn't precluded a run, so the leaders

They may also have to do it veto by veto, since at least six of the 13 bills that will appropriate funds to run the government in the fiscal year beginning Oct. 1 are on the White House list to be rejected unless they are changed to meet Clinton's

And that phase comes only after Congress settles on final versions and sends them to the White House; only one is near that point now.

Eleven appropriations bills have passed the House, seven the Senate; one is about ready to go to the White House. Given that, and the veto warnings, the chance that the government will be financed by the end of the month is nonexistent. The way out is to adopt a resolution that keeps finances going at prior levels, or at some point acceptable to both political sides.

Continuing resolutions have financed at least part of the government in all but two of the past 15 years. Those stirred trouble too. President Bush vetoed one in 1990 because he said Congress was trying to spend too much money, and that led to a federal shutdown that ran over a holiday weekend, closing national parks and monuments, but without a real impact on federal operations.

A compromise produced a settlement, and everybody went back to work, with back pay for federal employees who had lost any. Similar shutdowns occurred three times during the Reagan years, none protracted, none saving money.

But to get there this time, there will have to be at least a measure of accord between the Republicans, bent on sharp cuts in federal social spending, and the White House, determined to protect those programs, particularly in fields like

Clinton said he is sticking to his position, at the same time dismissing "some who say that there should be no compromise this autumn," meaning Dole, as obstructionist.

"We can do all this in a balanced way if we'll work for common ground with common sense," he said during a campaign-style swing in California

Back at the White House, his spokesman said it's up to the Republicans in Congress to decide which it will be, "whether or not there is going to be a train wreck, a series of vetoes, a period of uncertainty for the American people.'

While the administration has been making well-advertised standby plans for a partial shutdown of government, Clinton said there's no reason to have it happen. "There just needs to be ... a little more common sense, a little more working together," he said Wednesday.

Republicans counter that the outcome is up to Clinton. "I think the key at this point is to get a clear signal as to what they expect to do with the appropriations bills," said Sen. Mark Hatfield, R-Ore., chairman of the Senate Appropriations Committee.

Actually, the signals are clear on both sides. Clear and conflicting. They will, in the end, have to be settled. And this phase of budget maneuvering prefaces one in which the stakes, and risk, will be far greater. Unless Congress raises the \$4.9 trillion federal debt ceiling by mid-November, the government would run out of borrowing power and effectively go broke.



Packwood bows to pressure, resigns from Senate

Street Journal reported today. "The first thing we have to find out is if the models in the photographs were minors," Justice Department spokesman Carl Stern told the paper.

The ads, which appeared in magazines, on television and on buses, were pulled Aug. 28 amid a furor from parents and childwelfare groups. Some critics charged at least two of the models were underage.

Dole bashed during MTV video awards

NEW YORK (AP) - Politics. Foul language. Loud music. Yes, the always entertaining MTV Video Music Awards were back for the 12th time - and Madonna used the occasion to lash out at Sen. Bob Dole for his condemnation of rap music.

Madonna's verbal assault, complete with the f-word, was the highlight of Thursday night's show. Host Dennis Miller was bleeped twice in his monologue; Red Hot Chili Peppers bassist Flea cavorted in black bikini briefs; Michael Jackson sang, danced and grabbed his crotch during the opening number.

In between, awards were handed out. Pop-rap trio TLC won four, including video of the year, for its cautionary AIDS tune "Waterfalls"; alternative rockers Weezer matched that total with "Buddy Holly," their video homage to television's Happy

Madonna, in a green silk shirt unbuttoned below her bra, minced no words in presenting the best rap video award to Dr.

"Bob Dole is sorry he couldn't be here tonight to give out the award for best rap video. ... Rap has proven itself a force to be reckoned with. Either listen up, or get the f- out of the way,' she said to cheers from the soldout Radio City Music Hall crowd.

Three months ago, the Kansas Republican and presidential candidate criticized the violent and sexist lyrics of several rappers.

Madonna and Miller weren't alone in using four-letter words. Green Day, performing from Sweden via satellite, was bleeped, as was Courtney Love when she sang with her band Hole.

Love raged through the song "Violet" after dedicating it to her late husband, Kurt Cobain, and to drug overdose victim River Phoenix.

The show also featured Bon Jovi playing live in Times Square before a huge crowd and R.E.M. playing before winning the Michael Jackson Video Vanguard Award for lifetime achievement

Other bizarre non-award tableaus abounded through the three-hour live show. Basketball bad boy Dennis Rodman proclaimed himself "the baddest, craziest son of a b—— in this building," and no one disagreed.

World briefs

French schools put on maximum security alert

PARIS (AP) — The French government today ordered all schools on maximum-security alert, a day after a car bomb outside a Jewish school near Lyon

wounded 13 people.
Police will prevent cars from parking in front of schools and make sure students do not create targets by gathering in groups, said Francois Bayrou, the minister of national educa-

Bayrou urged parents "above all not to give in to psychosis" after Thursday's bloody attack, the sixth in a series of bombings or attempted bombings in France since late July.

"Calm and vigilance are two indispensable elements of the response we have to muster," he said on French television.

The car bomb exploded Thursday afternoon just before 700 students were about to pour out of the Jewish academy in Villeurbanne, a suburb of Lyon, the nation's third-largest city. Two children and 11 adults

were hurt, but lives were saved when a faulty school bell kept most children inside a few minutes longer than usual.

Japan cuts discount rate to record-low 0.5 percent

TOKYO (AP) — As economic planners warned of a slip back into recession, Japan's central bank today sliced its key interest rate in half to a record-low 0.5 percent.

The move, combined with more than \$2 billion in dollarbuying intervention by the Bank of Japan, sent the U.S. currency

and stocks surging.
The Nikkei Stock Average jumped 3.7 percent on four times the previous day's volume, while the dollar hit the 100-yen level for the first time in eight months.

The cut puts Japan's official discount rate far below those in other leading industrialized

The rate currently stands at 5.25 percent in the United States and 3.5 percent in Germany.
