



It would be a 76-yard scoring drive in five plays as BHS used Thomas out of the backfield for gains of 10, 15, and finishing it off with the 26-yard touchdown run.

Not only did he rush in the drive, but also Thomas helped the cause with a 25yard pass to Pigford as quarterback turned receiver and picked up good yardage down the left sideline.

With 1:00 to play in the half, BHS led 22-0.

These snakes are moving out of the grass and vegetation into clear areas and roadways to warm themselves. The Borden County Sheriff's Office has received several reports in reference to rattlesnakes. We are equipped to handle a snake if one finds his way into your yard or home. Call 806/756-4311 and we will dispose of the snake.

It is important to watch where you walk and do not

reach into any place where you cannot see. It is recommended that you wear long pants and closed toe shoes, or other appropriate clothing while working outdoors. Be cautious in areas around concrete or pavement where snakes go to warm themselves in the cooler hours of the day.

Anyone bitten by a rattlesnake should seek medical assistance immediately by contacting Borden County EMS at 806/750-5111. It would be helpful to identify the snake as a rattlesnake. Contact the sheriff's office if you are unsure what kind of snake it
