"Contrary to common belief." he said, "the American driver is a good Samaritan. When cars stall or pull to the shoulder it doesn't take too long until another motorist stops to offer help."

The project is financed through September and negotiations are in progress with the Bureau of Public Roads to extend the period of the experiment.

The government paid about 80 per cent of the original \$400,000 outlay. The Michigan Highway Department and the Detroit Street and Traffic Department contributed money and personnel.

"In general, when we do have blockage and put up a red light it is observed quite well," he said. The speed signs are not always fully satisfied and this is an area in which we want to do more extensive research.

During the week-long ramp control portion of the experiment, a spokesman for the Detroit Traffic Association said, the accident rate on the expressway fell sharply.

Police Inspector Arthur Sonnenberg, head of the traffic department, said he thought the system was doing the job it is supposed to. "I have no records to substantiate it but if they say there is something (an accident) ahead you can always get off. . . it is a convenience," he said.

Television In Review

HOLLYWOOD (UPI) - Danny Kave, the noted Los Angeles Dodger fan, opened his own season on CBS-TV Wednesday night, and like his baseball confreres he was all form and no punch.

It's a funny thing, though; When Jerry Lewis' new ABC-TV series laid an egg last Saturday, I resented it because he seemed to think he was doing everybody a favor just by being there. But when Kaye's one-hour premiere turned out mediocre in its first weekly effort, it was hard to get annoyed because how can anyone get angry at Danny Kaye?

I guess that's what CBS is counting on in the long run, why it shelled out all that money. It's no secret what the prospect of a weekly grind does to performers, but it was really awesome in a way and depressing too to see how the boob tube can level even the greatest entertainers who sign for a full season.

Kaye has such immense personal style and showmanship that at times he made the hour seem is that it was a very routine variety outing, with litle music or riety outing, wih little music or comedy of disinction. Kaye seemed to realize this, and he radiated the confidence of a man who doesn't see the sense of hurrying things because he's sized up the competition and know's there's not much to worry about. Maybe he should be rooting for the New York Yankees, at that:

What was good was that he appeared to be feeling out the television medium for the long run, like a boxer in the first round who plans to go the full 15. What was bad, very bad, was the apsence of the comedy writer who knows him best and brilliantly, his vife, Sylvia Fine.

On hand for the hour was a young woman singer called Lovelady Powell, who had an interesting face to go with her name, but I'm afraid not much else. The showstoppers were two young fellows named Joe and Eddie, who sang an exciting syncopated song. Kaye's best moments were at the end when he recalled his recent Russian trip in personal concert style, telling stories, singing a little, displaying his flair for the sound of foreign languages. That is the real Danny Kaye, the great one, and for my dough that's all he needs to do for an hour.

Miss Glynis Johns, Plovely thing, turned up Wednesday night in "Glynis," a ghastly thing, but which is described by CBS-TV as a half-hour situation comedy about a scatterbrained wife of a lawyer who gives him headaches by looking for material for her mystery stories. In the premiere, a homicidal butler almost bumped her off, but, in keeping with the show, was incompetent.



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

United Press International BONN (UPI) - German drivers seem to consider their cars to be chargers and the highways tourney places where they mount their steeds to joust with one another. As a result, 11,123 persons died in car crashes last year.

The courts finally are making an effort to do something about death on the highways.

The convictions of two drivers for "attempting to coerce others" on the highways" were recently

upheld by the Federal Court. West Germany is justly proud of its fine four-lane autobahns. There are 2.920 kilometers (2,125 miles)

Bicycles and horses are banned from the autobahns, but any other kind of vehicles can and do use them, ranging from 12 horsepower midgets through trucks and trailers hauling 12 tons of cargo to racy sports cars that reach 100 miles per hour.

Slow lanes have been built on some of the steepest slopes in recent years. But for most of the length of the autobahn, all this conglomeration of vehicles shares two lanes in each direction.

Drivers of slow cars seem jealous of the bigger ones and refuse to make room. Big car drivers follow a smaller or slower vehicle. The two recent Federal Court verdicts concerned typical autobain maneuvers.

One involved a young man from Frankfurt, driving along a section of the autobahn which has a 100 kph (62 mph) speed limit.

Moving in the left lane, the fellow drove to within 30 feet of another car driven by a women who was going just the allowed speed and slowly overtaking a pair of trucks. The man honked his horn and flashed his lights. He saw the woman ahead glance at him in her rear vision mirror but she remained in the left lane, slowly gaining on the trucks.

The man grew impatient. Still honking, he gunned his motor until he was within six or eight feet of the woman. She saw him close in, decided he was trying to ram her and cut hard right. But she was too close to the truck in that lane, and had to brake hard. She lost control. went off the road, and flipped over. Miraculously, she was only slightly hurt.

In the other case, a car driver in the Ruhr found himself behind a bus in the left lane slowly overhauling a line of trucks. The effrontery of the bus driver trying to pass trucks made the car driver so furious that as soon as he could get around the bus he cut sharply in front of it and slowed down. For many miles, everytime the bus attempted to pass, he maneuvered to block it. He was sentenced to 30 days in prison for coercion causing danger to life.





LAWYER'S JOB REQUIRES RESEARCH

Perhaps you have been in a 2:00 - All Ages Trampolining courtroom and heard your attorney argue forceably to the court that such and such a case clearly governs the case at hand. But did 7:30 - Calico Capers Square you ever wonder about the intricate processes that have been directed toward finding that case which is often referred to as "controlling precedent.

The lawyer's training received in law school enables him to recognize and analyze problems. In most law schools he will have studied what is known as the "case method." In the standard threeyear course usually following his graduation from a four-year general college education, the law student will read hundreds and sometimes thousands of cases especially selected to illustrate the various phases of the law.

The case method of study enables the lawyer to recognize and classify problems created by the relationship of real persons to each other. It also emphasizes that the outcome of each case depends upon the application of principles of law to its own peculiar

When a client seeks legal advice from his lawyer, the lawyer's mind immediately classifies the problem. Sometimes the problem is such that he may be able to give an immediate specific answer. However, more often the problem will have ramifications that will cause resort, as the lawyer says, to "the books." This means that research is in order.

It may take hours, and in many instances, days, of research to unravel a knotty legal problem. The process is involved. Cases must be ound, analyzed, compared, and checked to determine whether they have been overruled by later decisions, before counsel can stand before the court and say, 'Your Honor, we believe that our case is controlled by the case of such and such."

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
