

# Coyotes Fall to Wellman-Union

Borden County Coyote varsity football team was defeated last Friday night by the Wellman-Union Wildcats, 23-14. The Coyotes just did not get much offense going against a Wildcat defense that has been stingy all year. The Coyotes were forced to take to the air early offensively as the rushing game would allow just 75 yards on the night. Quarterback Chase Pinkerton had a decent night completing 9 of 18 passes for 117 yards and two touchdowns. Garrett Thomas caught 4 passes for 51 yards and both touchdowns of 18 and 29 yards.

Garrett also carried the ball 9 times for 32 yards and had 4 tackles an interception and a fumble recovery. Derek Rodriguez caught 3 passes for 17 yards, he carried the ball 8 times for 41 yards and he led the team in tackles with 18. He caused two fumbles and had two

Defensively the Coyotes only gave up 299 yards and forced four turnovers. Clint Chapman had 16 tackles, five of which were unassisted. John Wilson had 10 tackles, 7 were unassisted, and he broke up a pass. Trey Soto had 8 tackles and a quarterback hurry. Michael Bullinger had 5 tackles and

recovered a fumble. Caden Nowlain had 4 tackles, one hurry; he recovered a fumble and caused a fumble. Andrew Lamming had two tackles.

The Wildcats put points up first early in the second period on a one yard pass reception. Their PAT kick was good and they led, 8-0.

The Coyotes responded with a score of their own on their next possession as Pinkerton hit Thomas on a 18 yard pass play for six points. The PAT kick was blocked and the Wildcats led

In the third period the Wildcats extended their lead by 6 points on a six yard

run. The PAT kick was not good and the score was 14-6.

The Coyotes responded again on their next possession on a 29 yard pass reception from Pinkerton to Thomas. Pinkerton kicked the PAT good and the score was tied 14-14.

With :54 seconds left in the fourth quarter the Wildcats scored two points as the Coyotes were penalized for grounding the ball in their own end zone and the Wildcats were awarded a two point safety; 16-14.

The Wildcats put up their last legitimate points in the fourth quarter to put the

Coyotes away for good on a 9 yard run to make the score 22 to 14. They threw the ball into the end zone for a one point conversion to push the deficit to 9 points; 23-14.

The Coyotes just did not muster enough offense to keep a drive alive, and were held scoreless throughout the fourth period.

The Coyotes are now 2-3 at the end of the non-district schedule. The Coyotes are open next week and begin district play October 8, with Westbrook coming to town for their homecoming.

The new school year has begun, and in addition to stocking up on school supplies and brushing up on their studies, students across Texas are gearing up for a healthier school meal environment. In March, the Texas Department of Agriculture released a new Texas Public

School Nutrition Policy in

response to the growing rates

of childhood obesity.

This School Year

The nationally recognized policy is effective at the start of 2004-2005 school year. Among other steps, the policy limits the number of grams of fat and sugar Texas school children are served each week and restricts portion sizes for chips, cookies, frozen desserts and beverages. The policy also calls for phasing out deep-fat frying in schools.

"Texas schools serve more than 400 million lunches and 200 million breakfasts a year,' said Agriculture Commis-sioner Susan Combs. "Since more than two million schoolchildren consume about 60 percent of their meals in school, schools are key settings to combat the obesity epidemic facing our young Texans."

To offer parents, teachers, school administrators and school food service professsionals additional resourcees and clarifications on the policy and general childhood nutrition information, TDA launched its Square Meals Web site this summer at www.squaremeals.org. The provides one-page

Pencils: sharpened. Back- overviews of the nutrition policies for elementary schools, middle and junior high schools and high schools. It also provides information on exemptions and answers to frequently asked questions about the new policy.

> "Ensuring our children's health will take all of us working together, Combs said. "In partnership, parents and schools are an unbeatable team with the ability to help turn the tide. That's why we want to support their efforts and keep everyone informed about this new policy.

In addition to other measures, the policy also limits the sale of foods that compete with a school's operation of the breakfast, lunch or after school snack programs. A school can lose up to \$1.23 at breakfast and \$2.24 at lunch in federal reimbursements for each meal lost to a competitive food sale.

At the elementary school level, Foods of Minimal Nutritional Value, candy and competitive foods are not allowed on campus at any time during the school day. However, the policy does allow one nutritious classroom snack to be provided in the morning or afternoon by parents, teachers or other

The elementary classroom snack must be a healthy, lowfat and low-sugar option. This can include choices such as fresh fruits or vegetables with low fat dips, pretzels, low-fat string cheese, dry cereal, rice cakes, animal crackers or low fat fruit or grain muffins. fundraisers. Materials in both English and Spanish also can be requested by calling the toll-free Square number at (888)TEX-KIDS.

The Texas School Nutrition Policy only impact schools participating in the national school nutrition program. It does not place restrictions on food items that parents provide for their own child's consumption. Parents should communicate with their child's school for information on local school policies that may include additional restrictions.

"A recent study showed that the rates of childhood obesity in Texas are among some of the highest in the nation" Combs said. "Our state cannot afford to look at the other way. The time to take action is now, and parents and schools are critical in leading charge."


