## Exercise 'Big Lift' Moves Through Second Day of Ocean Hopping

By CHARLES W. CORDDRY FRANKFURT, Germany (UPI) - Exercise "Big Lift" passed the half-way mark today with West Germany expressing skepticism about its effec-

tiveness and aims. While thousands of 2nd Armored Division troops continued to stream into Germany from Texas bases today, anxiety persisted here and elsewhere in Europe that the air mobility demonstration was a U.S. forces on the continent. The huge aerial troop movement was more than half over at noon today, the Army estimated.

In Bonn, the government has asked for official clarification of U.S. intentions about future troop deployments.

-Even with the speed of transocean air mobility being illustrated in Big Lift, American troops might arrive too late on the outbreak of a big war in Central Europe. They might find no bases to land on.

-If the troops are to be kept in the United States and flown here in vast numbers every time there is international tenthe effect of raising tensions rather than easing them.

Some American answers have been that it is premature to see a connection between Big Lift and troop reductions, that air mobility is for "reinforcement" rather than substitution for overseas forces, and that there is usually a slow build up of tensions that enables troops to be moved into trouble areas.

> DALLAS (UPI) - Russia's wheat crop failure is causing increased flour prices on the U. S. grocery market, Texas millers said today.

Texas flour mills said they Larry Dean Starbuck, Pampa are increasing flour prices 40 cents per one hundred poundsa two cent hike on a five pound bag at the grocery.

The price hike has resulted from Russia's failure to meet past quotas to other countries. The U. S. has had to step in to fill the gap, and the price of wheat is going up. The price increase has particularly resulted from the U.S. decision to sell surplus wheat to Russia. The U. S., Russia and Canada have been the leading exporting countries.

Canada and Australia have committed their wheat crop 10 to 12 months in advance. The U. S. is taking up the slack in the market, the millers said.

Texas millers said wheat prices have risen from 10 to 15 cents a bushel since Sept. 1.
