THE CENTENNIAL IS UPON US

One hundred years ago last Wednesday—on January 3rd, 1834—Stephen F. Austin was arrested at Saltillo, while enroute back to Texas from Mexico City where he had induced the Mexican Congress to repeal the law prohibiting the further immigration of Americans into Texas, though failing to obtain separate statehood for Texas.

From all of which it will appear that we are already in the very midst of the centennial period. Indeed, there is a sense in which we have been in the centennial period since July 16th, 1921, the one hundredth anniversary of the day on which Stephen Austin first set foot on Texas soil.

It is not our purpose in recalling this to launch into an exhortation of our people to prepare for the celebration of the centennial of Texas independence. We have in mind rather to suggest that the present period be made the occasion of rededication to the object for which Austin labored and sacrificed—that of building Texas.

Austin was the father of Texas in a much truer sense than Washington may be said to have been the father of the United States. It was he who planted Anglo-American civilization west of the Sabine so deeply that it could never be uprooted. He was consciously and deliberately a builder. He went about his task systematically and patiently. And the Texas of today is his monument.

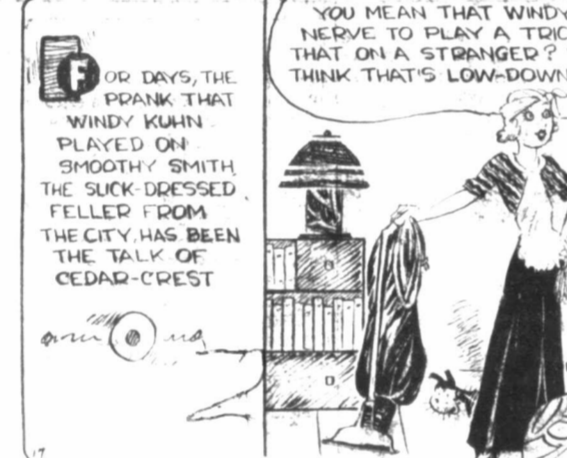

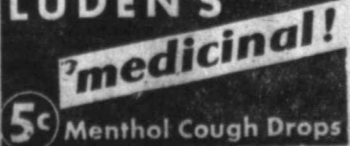

HARVESTERS SHOW IMPROVED PASSING ATTACK IN BEATING BORGER 45-18

BOXING BOUTS ARE PLANNED BY INDUSTRY

SCHMELING MAY FIGHT KING; DEMPSEY IS STILL DICKERING

NEW YORK, Jan. 17 (AP)—The cauliflower business was all of a flutter today, what with greeting the world's heavyweight champion, awaiting a former champion, and wondering what the future here holds for still another ruler from the past.

In order, the three are Primo Carnera, due today from Italy to prepare for his fifteen round title defense against Tommy Loughran in Miami, Fla., February 23; Max Schmeling, who will arrive Thursday from Germany; and Jack Dempsey, still dickering at long range with Madison Square Garden.

Carnera and Dempsey, who still looks longingly of the Italian's great body and wonders what would have happened had the planned fight took place in his prime, are intermingled in the Garden situation.

Dempsey, before he left a few days ago for Kansas City, was just short of a complete agreement with Col. John R. Kilpatrick, president of the Garden, for a heavyweight title match between the old mauler's protege, Max Baer, and Carnera in June. So far everyone seems to have forgotten that Loughran might turn Columbia on the boys and spring a Stanford on Carnera in Florida.

Schmeling's situation is different. At odds with Baer, the German who won his crown from Jack Sharkey sitting down and lost it back to him standing up is starting all over again. He has one engagement planned with Steve Hamm in Philadelphia, and a delegation from Chicago will wait upon him at the dock seeking to arrange a match with King Levinsky in Chicago. So important is the latter that the Kingfish has promised to appear in person, backed by his sister and manager, "You Tell 'Em" Lena Levinsky.

Up to the moment Dempsey's dickering with the Garden have not reached complete accord. The old champion holds the reins on Baer, who rose to stardom under his promotion by bowling Schmeling over. The Garden has Carnera tied to a contract through 1934.

Any idea that Kilpatrick might be seeking Dempsey's services as the Garden's year round manager of boxing was spiked after directors of the big boxing plant had met to consider all phases of this situation, among other things.

"We have not thought of offering Dempsey the position," Kilpatrick said. "Besides, he told me he would-

NEW YORK, Jan. 17 (AP)—Four new champions of contract bridge were installed early today.

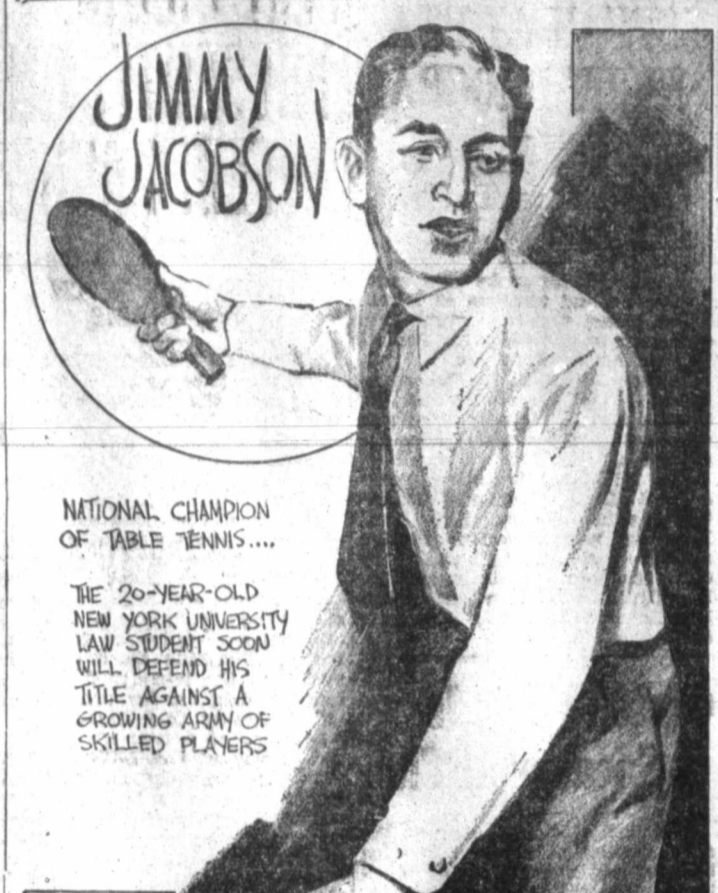
