

ONDON, April 20. (AP)—Authoritative sources said today that Great Britain would expect the United States to take the responsibility for initiating any retaliation or protest against Japan's announcintention to participate in China's foreign relations.

MART ACT HAS 'TEETH' IN IT, DECLARES PECORA

CENTS A MILE

WASHINGTON, April 20 (AP) Spectators whistled in surprise when Postmaster General Farley ripped open the envelopes and read the bids today for carrying air mail on the 21 routes the government intends to place in private hands for at least the next three, months.

Some of the companies bid as low as 19 cents an airplane mile in offering to fly the mails. The maximum range stipulated in the specific cations was from 41 to 45 cents per airplane mile.

The small room where the bids vere opened was jammed with postoffice and justice department officials and aviation men.

Meantime, while the senate was getting ready to debate the airmail bilt, which would provide for a congressional commission to study the whole aviation situation, Senator Black (D., Ala.) announced that officers of the International Mercantile Marine corporation would be summoned soon for questioning by his investigating committee.

WASHINGTON, April 20 (AP)-The revised stock market control bill was approved by the senate banking a two-year investigation of Wall Street practices and weeks of conflict over provisions of the meas-

The bill was reported to the senate in a form which Ferdinand Pe-cora, committee counsel, said had plenty of "teeth" to prevent repetition of the practices he and his predecessors uncovered during the long inquiry into market operations.

Yesterday a NEWS representative walked for nearly an hour in the sweet-scented apple orchard at the L. L. Palmer place north of Alanreed. Ten acres of apple trees in bloom is a gorgeous sight and one many persons would not believe existed in this county. But last year the trees bore 2,500 bushels of apples, and the outlook now is even better.





ADVANCED RACE LIVED IN PREHISTORIC TIMES



JAPANESE BEWILDERED BY HOSTILE VIEW OF WORLD

BY GLENN BABB, (Copyright, 1934, By The Associated Press.) TOKYO, April 20 (A)-The world as represented by foreign dip-lomats in Tokyo seemed dazed today to Japan's "restatement of pol-icy" toward China and what the diplomats regarded as her audacity

in issuing it. The representatives of other powers, still wondering at the exact meaning of the declaration, labelled it variously a "white-hands-off-China" statement and an "Asiatic Monroe doctrine.

Japanese officialdom appeared be-wildered by the world's hostile, reception of Tokyo's declaration which, in part, holds Japan is solely responsible for maintaining the peace east Asia.

There is almost unanimous concurrence among the diplomats on two points: First, that Tokyo's statements

constitute the most startling and most ambitious declarations of policy the Orient has witnessed since Japan's 21 demands to China in 1915; Second, that how far Japanese to 52.

dectrines menace world peace will depend entirely on how Tokyo inon the latter point, authorities do not believe Japan intends to at-

tempt to expel Maj. Gen. Hans von Seackt, German chief military adviser to the Chinese nationalist government. Nor, in the same connection, do

well-informed persons believe Nip-ponese attempts may be expected to expel the American aviators now in China or to hold up shipping carrying American airplanes to China. Ratner, it is believed Japan de

sires to post a warning for the world to read against interference in Japan's determination to dominate China's destiny, when in the "restatement" she says she objects to other nations supplying China with military airplanes and instructors. In a new statement, a foreign office spokesman attempted somewhat allay the fears of Washington and London that Japan plans to flout the nine-power and other

treaties, but the note of defiance to white nations still is dominant. After saying Japan "does not de-sire to interfere with China's independence, or infringe upon existing treaties," the new pronouncement "Japan shares responsibility for

maintenance of the peace in East Asia only with Asiatic powers, particularly China.
"The time has passed when other powers or the League of Nations can

prosecute their policies for the ex-ploitation of China." Town of Brady

Named as Result Of 1847 Mistake

BRADY, April 20 (A)-The names of many towns have sprung from queer origins, but Brady is, perhaps, the only town in the United States named as the result of a mistake. The town got its name from Brady creek on the banks of which it is located, but Brady creek got its name through a mistake and the error was perpetuated in the town's

The man who made the mistake did not have the slightest idea that three-quarters of a century later it would be commemorated in brick buildings and paved streets. Neither was he a prominent person. His only contribution to Texas history was the naming of Brady creek and he did that through miscalculation. His name was Peter Brady, a member of the John J. Giddings surveying party in 1847. When the party reconnoitered this Indian-in-habited wilderness, Brady insisted the creek was the Concho river which runs about 50 miles to the northwest. His fellow engineers bet him that it was not and proved it when they found the Concho river. Brady had argued so much about the identity of this unknown stream that they nicknamed it Brady's The name stuck.

The survey was made under a treaty with 20 Indian chieftains whose tribes inhabited this territory at that time. It was made for the 'Adelsverein" or Fredericksburg, German immigration company which had purchased the settlement rights to this section from Fisher and Miller to whom they had been granted by President Sam Houston

The treaty with the Indians was made at a colorful inter-tribal council meeting on the banks of the San Saba river, 11 miles south of Brady, March 1 or 2, 1847.

PLACARDS DUE TO BE UP BY FIRST OF MAY

WASHINGTON, April 20. (AP)-A new blue eagle will stretch its wings

UNION PRESIDENT SAYS LABOR BODY IS NOT REPRESENTED

WASHINGTON, April 20. (P)—Secretary Ickes charges that Harvey C. Fremming, president of the International Association of Oll Field Gas Well and Refinery workers of America, deliberately at-tempted to distort present condi-tions and hide completely facts, when he wrote a letter to the president on April 16 complaining that labor was not represented in the oil administration.

Fremming's letter said, in part, that "not one labor man can be found on any of the so-called regional committees, the planning and coordinating committee which is the code authority under the code of fair competition nor under the petroleum administrative board."

The secretary of the interior de-clared that when a labor advisory board was established, in compliance with a recommendation of the planning and coordination committee representing the industry under the code, there were three labor representatives and three representsaid Fremming was one of those

apopinted as a labor representative.

"The board held its first meeting late in November (1933)," Ickes ex-"Fremming prevented any work from being done by the point-blank declaration that unless the labor union which he represented, or the American federation of labor, with which Fremming's union is affiliated, should be given control not serve on that board.

"Apparently Fremming felt that labor could not be represented uness the representatives were hand picked by Fremming, whose organization contained a relatively small percentage of the total employes in the oil industry. I did not then and do not now feel that Mr. Fremming, or persons he designates, are the only persons qualified to speak for the employes in the petroleum industry.

After Fremming's refusal to serve as a member of the original labor olicy board, Ickes said, because of the necessity for a labor advisory board, he reorganized the board with the present membership of three impartial public representa-tives familiar with the problems of labor and of the industry.

"It appears to me that Fremming, in asserting that labor is not represented in the oil administration, is not only in error but is deliber-ately ignoring the fact that had he not refused to serve, he himself would have been a member of the petroleum labor policy board which he now wants abolished," Ickes con-







Home Mortgage **Scheme Brewing**

WASHINGTON, April 20 (AP)-The arm credit administration reported revival meeting continues with many day that interest rates on farm efinanced through the federal land bank have been reduced from a naximum of 9 per cent to a maxi-

num of 5 per cent. An analysis of more than half he loans closed in Texas by the land bank and land bank commisioners from June 1, 1933, through March 31 1934 the administration said, shows that interest charges which formerly ran from 5 to 9 per cent now carry a maximum interest rate of 5 per cent with a large proportion on a 4½ per cent basis

The analysis dealt only with inerest rates paid on first and second mortgages and upon short-term commercial bank loans. The total of loans closed during the June-March period was approximately \$67,400,000

The average rate paid by farmers on mortgage debts refinanced with land bank loans in Texas was 6.3 per cent, while the average paid on short-term, commercial bank loans was 8 per cent. Corresponding figires for mortgage and short-term debts refinanced with commissioner's loans were 6.9 per cent and 8.8


