Potatoes Diablo Are Something to Celebrate

For many, the Labor Day weekend winds up vacations and relaxed summer living. School is just an alarm-clock ring away. So families and friends get together at this time for backyard cookouts and picnics. A special treat that goes well with almost any meat or poultry main dish are Baked Potatoes Diablo. In fact, those who still cling to thoughts of dieting can make a meal of this baked potato stuffed with canned deviled ham and topped with grated cheese.

BAKED POTATOES DIABLO

- 4 hot medium baked potatoes
- 1/4 cup milk
- 1/4 teaspoon salt
- 1/4 teaspoon pepper
- 2 tablespoons parsley
- 1 1/2 ounce can deviled ham
- 6 tablespoons grated cheddar cheese
- French fried onion rings (optional)

Bake 4 medium-sized potatoes. Preheat oven to 400 degrees. Cut rectangle from top of each baked potato and scoop out insides, leaving thin shells. Mash potatoes until no lumps remain. Add milk a little at a time, beating after each addition until potatoes are smooth and fluffy. Stir in salt, pepper, parsley and deviled ham. Fill potato shells with mashed potato mixture and top each with 1 1/2 tablespoons grated Cheddar

cheese. Bake in preheated oven for 20 minutes until filling is golden. Garnish with onion rings, if desired. Potatoes may be baked in advance and filled. Place in oven when ready to serve. Makes 4 servings.

CHEESE RING WITH FRUIT SALAD

- 1 pkg. cream cheese
- 1 lb. cottage cheese
- 1/2 cup mayonnaise
- 2 Tbsp. plain gelatin
- 1/3 cup cold water
- 1 cup pineapple juice
- 1 green pepper, finely chopped

Cream the cheese and blend with the mayonnaise and cottage cheese. Cover the gelatin with the cold water and let stand a few minutes. Heat the pineapple juice to boiling point. Pour over the softened gelatin and stir until well dissolved. Stir in the cheese mixture and the green pepper. Grease your round mold with oil and pour in the mixture. Chill until set. When ready, unmold onto a platter and fill the center with fresh fruits. Place lettuce leaves all around the ring.

MARINATED STEAK
Worcestershire sauce helps give the meat tangy flavor.
2 1/2 pound boneless round or chuck steak
1/2 cup dry red wine
1/4 cup Worcestershire sauce
1/4 cup salad oil
1/4 cup minced onion
Trim excess fat from steak. Mix wine with remaining ingredients; pour over steak; refrigerate and let marinate, turning several times, for about 6 hours. Broil over hot charcoal until done as much as desired, brushing often with marinade. Slice thin. Makes 8 servings.

A Sweet Spiced Pot Roast is a definite change-of-pace meat dish for a holiday

weekend. Especially important with this roast is that it calls for more economical cuts of meat such as boneless shoulder, brisket or chuck.

DINNER IN A KETTLE
Camping or boating chefs can offer just as nutritious dinners as landlubbers or "at homers" and still only use one kettle. Hearty stews, chowders, or full-meal soups are well-known popular "kettle" meals. Spaghetti heated with franks and a sprinkle of cheese is even easier, and nutritious, too.

- ### SWEET SPICED POT ROAST
- 3 to 3 1/2 pounds boneless shoulder, brisket or chuck
 - 2 teaspoons salt
 - 1 1/2 teaspoons apple pie spice
 - 1/8 teaspoon ground black pepper
 - 1 1/2 cups water
 - 1/2 cup onion flakes

DINNER ON A SKEWER
A "skewered" dinner can be just as nutritious as a formal dinner whether you are in your own backyard or camping out. Try beef steak cubes, mushroom caps, canned potatoes, and strips of green pepper. Or spear cubes of lamb with lamb kidneys, tiny whole onions, sweet potatoes, and wedges of tomatoes. Colorful, nutritious, and appetizing—a dinner-in-one on a skewer!

In a Dutch oven or heavy saucepan brown meat well on both sides, turning once. Sprinkle with salt, apple pie spice and black pepper. Add water and onion flakes. Bring to boiling point. Cover, reduce heat and simmer 2 1/2 hours or until tender. Thicken gravy with flour, if desired. Makes 6 to 8 portions.

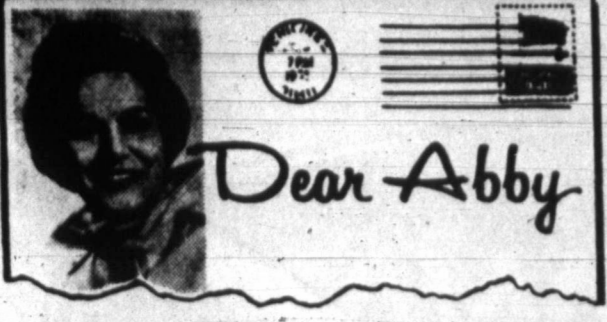

Wardrobe Planning, Selection Important

Editors note: This is the second of a two-part fashion series of fall wardrobes -- planning and selection -- prepared by the Texas Agricultural Extension Service. In Part I, which concerns wardrobe selection, Roxanne Schnorr, Extension clothing specialist, outlines tips for selecting fashions while staying within a budget.

COLLEGE STATION -- Getting the most satisfaction for your clothing dollar depends on your buymanship abilities, according to Roxanne Schnorr, Texas Agricultural Extension Service clothing specialist.

"Your season's wardrobe budget will have more buying power if basic rules, such as selecting the correct size, checking the fit, analyzing workmanship and reading hangtags, are followed," she advised.

In discussing effective selection of wardrobe items, the Texas A&M University specialist added that other considerations team with basic rules for success in buying. They are the budget itself, fabric care after purchase, and flexibility of style.

"Completing your wardrobe and being fashionably dressed can be done without overspending," Miss Schnorr insisted. "Your budget is the best guideline for getting the clothes you need at prices you can pay."

"Avoid impulse spending sprees," she cautioned. "It's wiser to buy one outfit at a time to coordinate with your total wardrobe and to observe the new arrivals at stores periodically."

"Be sure to set aside enough money for large purchases especially if they won't be the first selection you make in the season."

"Don't go overboard on price for any one article. Many changes may be more satisfying for an on-the-go female than one or two high-quality outfits. Fashion turnover seems to be frequent, and the 'in' look may be easier to achieve with a moderate price," the Texas A&M University specialist explained, adding that all fashions can be purchased on the ready-to-wear market at prices to fit a budget.

A second major consideration in selecting wardrobe fashions is upkeep required of the fabrics. Easy-care fabrics may be more suitable to the budget as well as the time schedule, Miss Schnorr said.

Flexibility of style marks the third consideration. "To extend your wardrobe as far as possible, think in terms of different effects you can get by switching separates around," she suggested. "Dual purpose outfits add flexibility to the wardrobe."

"Accessories are important, too, as they help make your wardrobe go further. They're fun to buy but often are fads, so you won't want to put a lot of money into any one thing. Remember, prices often are reduced to a modest level soon after they first hit the market," she cautioned.

Returning to the basic rules of buying, Miss Schnorr offered these tips for checking fit and style.

"Before you make the final decision, check the appearance of the outfit from all angles. Look to see how it appears from the back.

It should be comfortable and look well while you're seated and while you're walking.

"One of the best rules of thumb is never buy anything unless it does something for you," the specialist concluded. "It should emphasize figure assets, flatter you with color to highlight your skin tones, the color of your eyes and sheen of your hair, and it should make you feel great."

"Consider your selections carefully, and you'll love wearing your seasonal fashion wardrobe," she added.

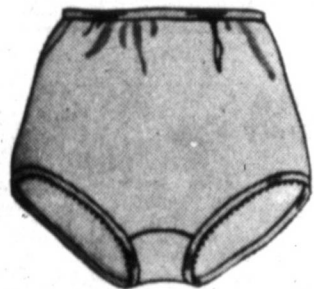

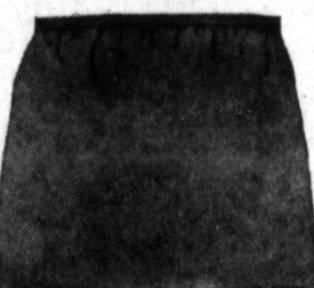

I've yet to meet a woman who lives up to the expectations of her children. If she's a pro swimmer or a track star, her children would prefer someone who didn't "look so muscular."

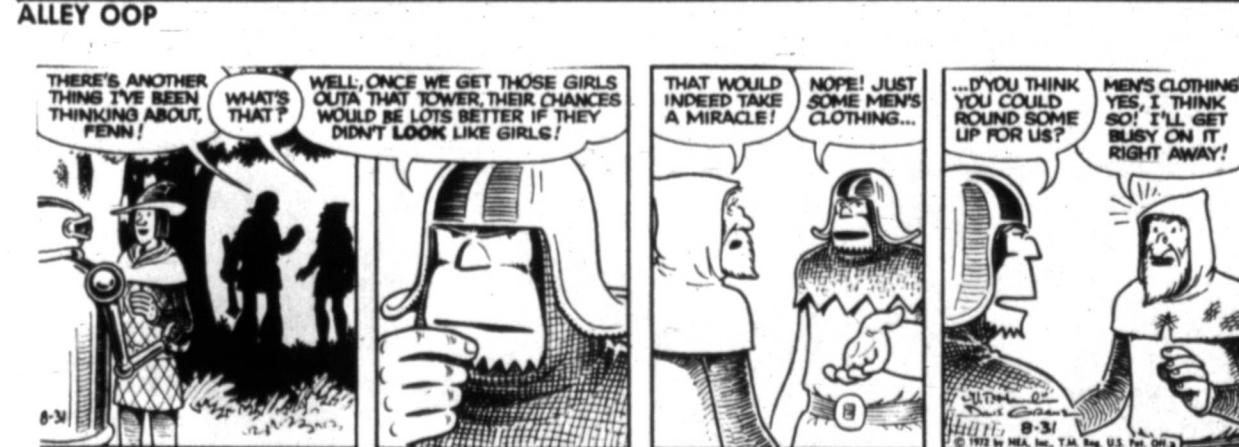
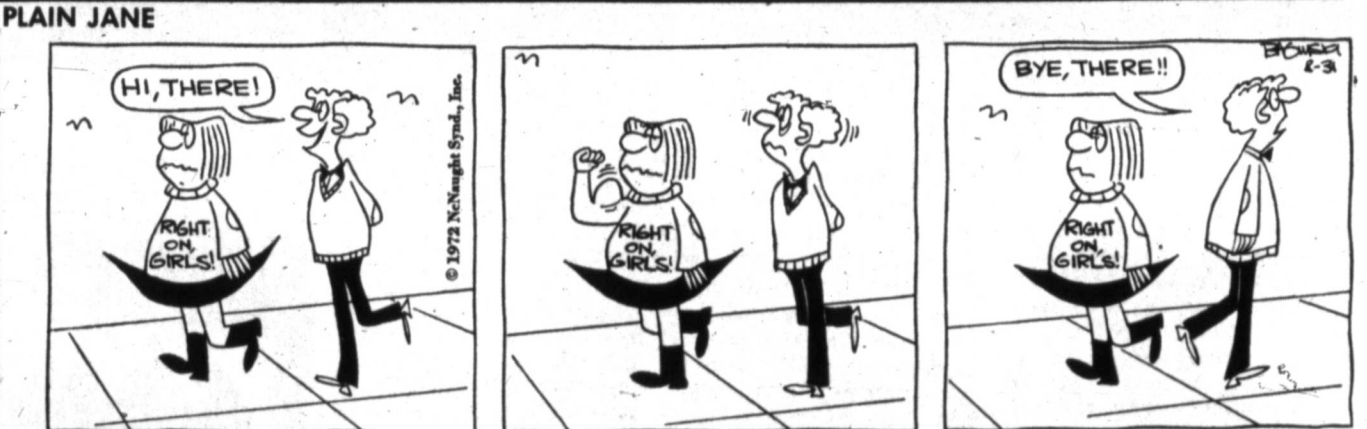
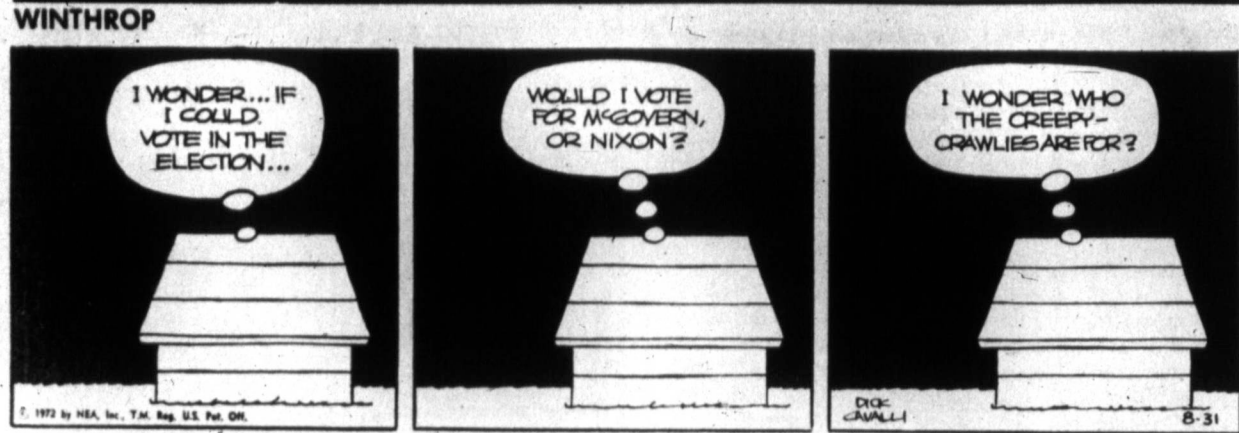
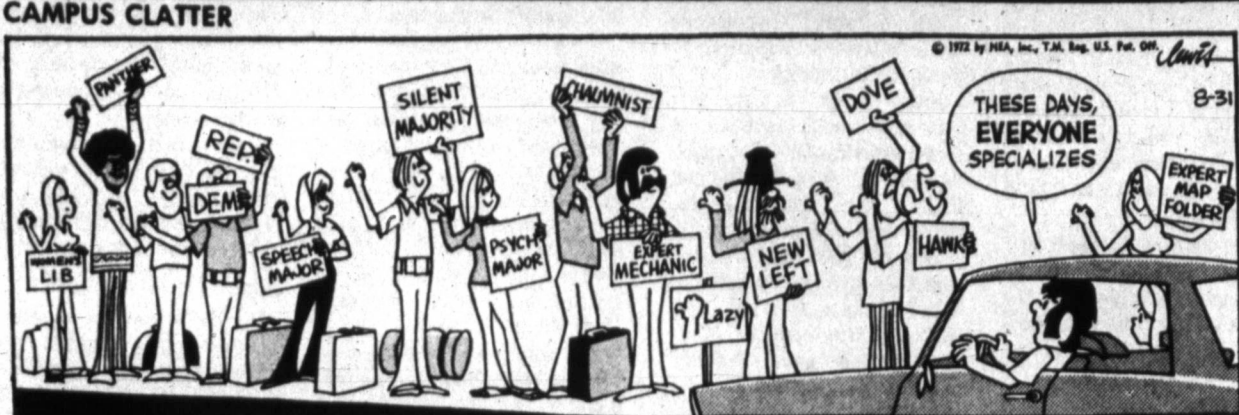
If she's the pretty-flower lolling-in-the-backyard type, her kids moan that their friends all have mothers who can play basketball.

Robbins has been running with the first offensive team this week since Jack King, the regular first string fullback, has been out with a cold. Johnson was also stricken with the bug and has missed practice.

The Harvesters have their final practice today before the scrimmage with Vernon tomorrow night. The Shockers scrimmage at 5 p.m. and the Harvesters take the field at 8.

Vernon scrimmaged Perryton last week and except for having three interceptions returned by Perryton for touchdowns in the early going, the match was about even.

Vernon has a good experienced quarterback in Eddie Pruitt and two good running backs in O'Keefe Cario (10 flat) and Jimmy Reese (9).

Coach Don Berry's squad generally runs out of a Wing-T formation with a strong flanker and the I-Slot on occasion.

Vernon's basic defensive formation is the 4-3 with a four-deep inverted secondary.

Pampa fans are urged to come out to Harvester Stadium tomorrow night and see the Fighting Harvesters wish-bone T and the "Mean Green Machine" (the defensive unit) in action for the first time this fall.

Lefors Pirates Seek To Continue Winning Ways

LEFORS — New head football coach Leonard Tolbert has inherited some quality players from his predecessor, Scott Dunham, including six offensive and seven defensive regulars from last year's District I-B champions.

Those returning ballplayers started for a team that went 7-3-1 for the season. They lost a close one in bi-district when they tied Newcastle 13-13 but lost the game on penetrations.

The Pirates lost two key players off the '71 squad by graduation and another when his father was transferred to Pampa.

Mike Robbins, an all-district performer at halfback and linebacker last season was lost to the team when he moved to Pampa. Robbins had been counted on to help spark the Pirates to perhaps another district championship.

Although hos loss was felt Tolbert stated, "We feel that we have found a better than adequate replacement for Robbins in our backfield."

Robert Gifford, 5-9-160, a starting guard last year, has been moved to fullback. Tolbert is convinced that will take up some of the slack caused by Robbins' departure.

Randy Klien, 5-9-160, has moved in at quarter back to take over for the graduated David White. The end position vacated by all-state Ronnie Sims is up for grabs right now with Larry Jackson, 5-11-190, and Mike

Dunn, 5-9-155, the leading candidates. At the other end position are returnee Dwight Keith 5-10-155, and Mike Marr, 5-10-170.

Gifford and Klien will be joined in the offensive backfield by holdover Steve Timmons (5-7-155) and Jimmy Crutcher (5-8-155). Crutcher saw regular duty last year at end.

In the line, Bill Bates, 6-1-210, and all-district performer and two-way starter last year at tackle returns and is joined by Larry Wallis, 6-4-230.

Henry Duckworth, 5-8-205, and Johnny Williams, 5-6-150, are the guards and Don Tinney, 6-1-170, a regular last year, is at center.

Tommy Wells returns at noseguard on defense where he was all-district in 1971. At 5-10 and 300 pounds, he is expected to give opposing teams second thoughts about attempting to run through the middle of the line.

Bates has moved to the left end slot this year on defense and is joined by Williams at the other end. The tackles are Wallis and Jackson.

Gifford and Duckworth are set in the linebacking positions where they both started at one time or another last year.

In the secondary, Lynn Shelton (5-7-150) and Timmons are the cornerbacks. Klien and Crutcher are the halfbacks.

"As of this week we've been progressing pretty rapidly," Tolbert said. "Our defense has been looking particularly good."

"On offense inexperience and a lack of speed are giving us a little trouble. We have a lot of boys who played last year but we've had to move them around a lot," he continued.

Attesting for the fact that the defense is moving along is the fact that in a scrimmage with Matador last week, the Pirates allowed their opponents only 1.5 yards per carry.

The Pirates scrimmage Happy this week and coach Tolbert feels that it will be a real tough test. Lefors opens its regular season Sept. 8 against Wheeler.

The 10 other sharpshooters are known collectively as the U.S. basketball team, whose supremacy of the game in the Olympics very nearly came to an end Wednesday.

"We needed a game like this where we had to come from behind," Coach Hank Iba said of his kids after they rallied from seven points down in the second half to pull out a 61-54 triumph over Brazil.

The victory was the fourth for the Yanks, now undefeated in 59 contests stretching back to the 1936 Berlin Games, when the sport was introduced to the Olympics.

The bitter high-flyer was Bob Seagren, America's premiere pole vaulter, angered over what he called "obviously a political decision" on the part of the International Amateur Athletic Federation to outlaw his green vaulting pole for the Games.

The pole, with a newer weave of fiberglass than the old ones, came out last year and Seagren, rebounding from "knee surgery, used it to set his world record of 18 feet 5.3 inches.

After he set the record last month, the IAAF banned the pole saying it hadn't been available for world-wide use.

On Monday, the IAAF reversed itself, reinstating the pole. On Wednesday the federation reversed itself again.

Olympic Basketball Team Rallies For 59th Straight

MUNICH (AP) — It was the best of days for one sharpshooter. It was very nearly the worst of days for 10 others. It was the bitterest of days for one high flyer. It was the sweetest of days for another.

"I don't spend 30 hours a week at a hobby," John Writer said Wednesday after winning the three-position small-bore rifle and setting a bit of American Olympic history. "This is a sport. Real competition."

By winning the gold medal at these 20th Summer Games, the 27-year-old Chicago marksman gave the United States its second shooting medal, the first time the United States has won more than one in the traditionally European-dominated sport.

Writer scored a world and Olympic record 1,166 points out of a possible 1,200 in the prone, kneeling and standing positions. And the United States got its third shooting medal when Larry Bassham of Comanche, Tex., an Army marksmanship instructor at Ft. Benning, Ga., got the silver, finishing behind Writer with 1,157 points.

About Those Technical Words

Dear Dr. Lamb—I read your article on angiograms and coronary catheterization, and I was particularly interested—because I have had this procedure done. It wasn't a very comfortable feeling and it took a long time.

Dear Reader—Idiopathic is a fancy medical word that we doctors use to say we don't know what causes the problem. It sounds a lot better than saying I don't know.

The main effect of this problem is to obstruct the outflow of blood from the left side of the heart to the body. The muscular left heart chamber has to pump harder to force the blood past this narrow opening or obstruction.

Depending on the over-all heart status and the health of the individual, and depending on the question of whether the overgrowth of tissue will grow back again or not, some individuals with this problem can have heart surgery and the overgrowth material removed.

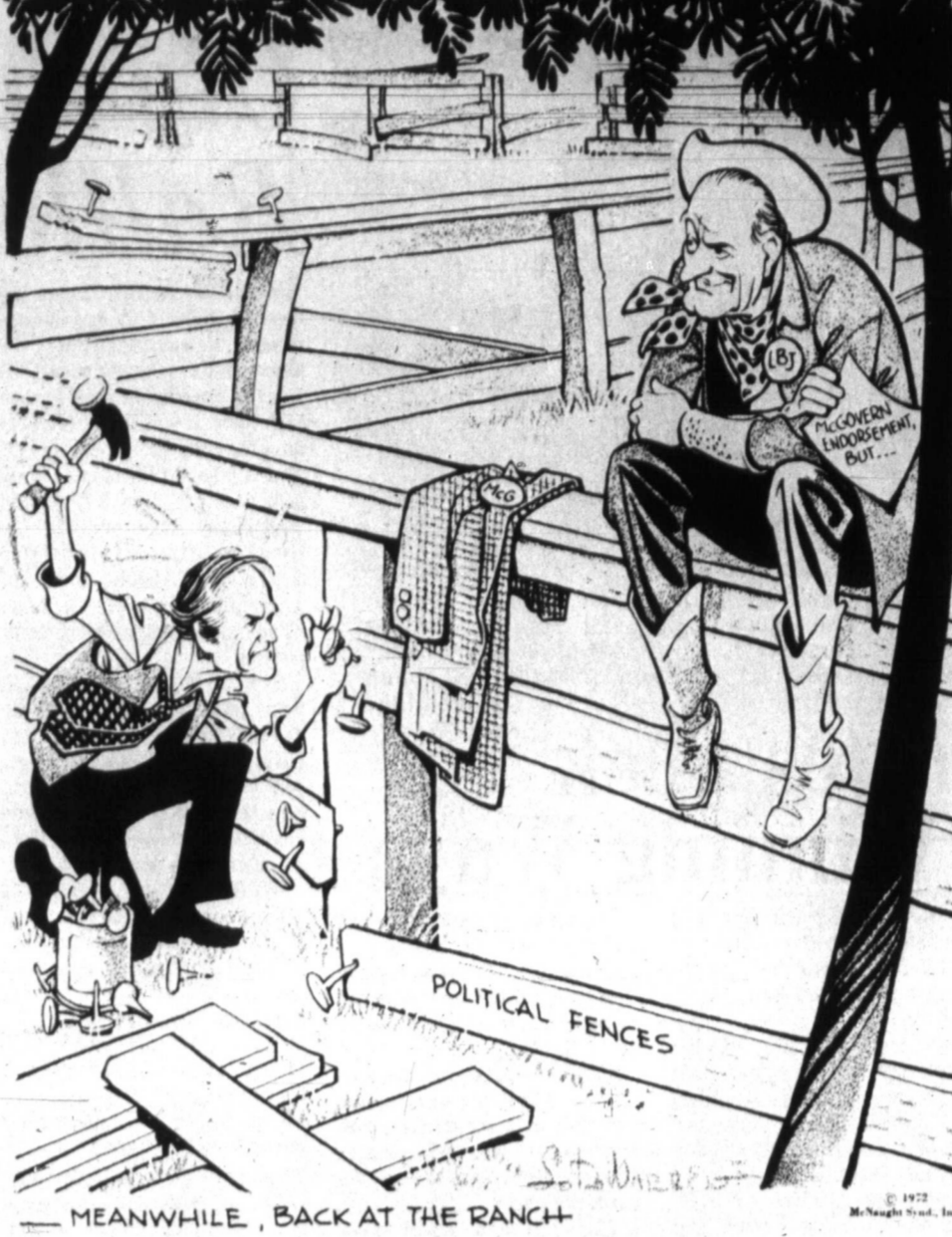

GOP Conservatives Not Overly Thrilled With Agnew

MIAMI BEACH—When a young Congressional aide helping conservative forces in the rules fight at the Republican National Convention turned one morning wearing a "Spiro Is My Hero" button, Mississippi state chairman Clarke Reed ordered him to take it off and stick it in his pocket.

In their successful fight for a 1976 delegate formula over-balanced for conservatives, they definitely were not regarding Agnew as their choice for the succession. On the contrary, they delivered this implicit message to Agnew: You will have to work your passage to 1976 by showing you can be elected, as of now, we doubt it.

Agnew's serious obstacles in working his passage lie not with beleaguered Republican liberals, pessimistic about the prospective candidacy of Sen. Charles H. Percy of Illinois. His problems are in convincing his own conservatives.

Even more surprising is one plains state leader counted as a supporter by Agnew. And early advocate of Barry Goldwater, he is haunted by the 1964 catastrophe.

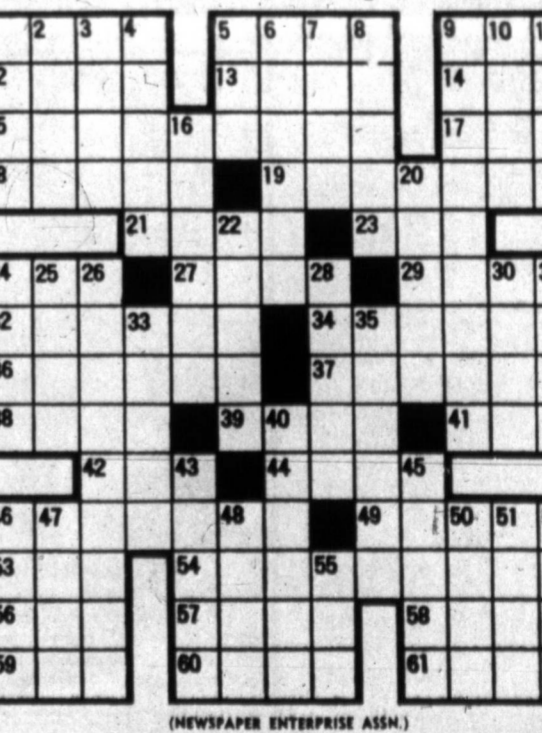
Many readers will think this is fantastic. So is the Tribulation, the Rapture, and the Second Coming! And I believe they may soon occur, too. (Are you ready?)
