## Heavy Bollworm Infestation Found

Several fields in the West Camp area proved to be heavily infested by small bollworms and poisoning according to the cotton insect guide was recommended by J.K. Adams, Bailey County Agent.

Adams said the bollworm situation is as serious as he's ever seen it in the last 25 years. Adams also stated it is very important to determine that all the eggs found on cotton leaves are actually bollworm eggs.

Light to heavy bollworm infestations have been found on cotton in much of the area. Boll weevil activity has increased in several areas and several newly infested fields have been reported above the Caprock. After the recent moisture a very close watch should be kept on the insect situation.

### C of C Checks Information On Austin Firm

Chamber of Commerce Manager Jerry Hutton, along with Alex Williams of Williams and Merriman, has been conducting an investigation into an Austin firm.

The investigation began after several farmers took form letters to Williams, who is an accountant. The farmers had received the letters, which are in questionnaire form, in the past several days.

The firm uses the name of U.S. Tax Service Survey, with the address given as Statistical Division, Drawer 5607, Austin, Texas.

The chamber of commerce manager said he checked with Dick Mathias, executive vice president of the Austin Chamber of Commerce on the firm. Mathias said the firm is not a government agency, is not listed with the Better Business Bureau and has no telephone listing.

Alex Williams, who also conducted an investigation, said that apparently the questionnaire was merely some firm compiling a list of names and addresses for possible insurance sales purposes.

The Austin C of C executive said that investigation showed the Austin P.O. Box is being rented by an individual in Houston.

Bollworms—Over the past week a survey was conducted to determine the amount of Heliothis bollworm larvae which was present on the High Plains. This survey was conducted in 26 counties by sampling three fields per county with 4 samples being made in each field. The percent of tobacco budworm has not been determined as of this date. The Heliothis population ranged from a low of 225 larvae per acre in Garza County to high of 13,471 larvae per acre in the fields sampled in Lamb County. Most of the populations, however, were at non-economic levels at the time of the survey. A population of 2,000-2,500 larvae per acre or 1.5-2 larvae per 10 feet of row was considered to be an economic infestation. Those counties having economic infestations in the survey were Lawson, Bailey, Briscoe, Terry, Hockley, Lamb, Floyd, Gaines, Cochran, Lubbock, Hale and Swisher. Bollworm populations may vary considerably from field to field. The only way to determine what the producer's individual situation might be is to carefully check

### Grain Referendum Explanations Set

A series of seven meetings will be held the week of September 2-5 on the High Plains to explain a grain sorghum referendum which will come before a vote in early October in 29 counties.

Grain sorghum producers are urged to attend the meeting in their locality to familiarize themselves with the upcoming referendum, says County Agricultural Agent J.K. Adams.

On September 4 a meeting will be held at 8 p.m. at the high school auditorium in Bovina and on September 3 a Hereford

meeting will be held at the Bull Barn at 8 p.m.

Keynote speaker at each of the seven meetings will be Dr. Bill Black, Extension economist in marketing and policy, headquartered at Texas A&M University.

Purpose of the referendum is to develop, carry out and participate in programs of research, disease and insect control, education and promotion designed to encourage production, marketing and use of grain sorghum. The referendum calls for an assessment of five cents per ton to be collected at the point of first sale.

A two-thirds majority vote is required or a vote of approval by farmers producing at least 50 percent of all the grain in the 29-county area.

In addition to voting on the five cents assessment, producers will also select a 12-man governing board, points out Adams. This board will be

### Alfalfa, Corn Acreage Increase Through Area

Hay hauling is big business in West Texas. With the increase in feed lots in this part of the state, feeders are pushing demands for more hay for the thousands and thousands of cattle being fattened for ever-increasing markets.

County Agent J.K. Adams said some 8,000 acres of alfalfa are being grown in Bailey County with some farmers reporting up to six cuttings per growing season.

Chris Seeman, who farms east of Muleshoe, raises alfalfa. He said that he is raising better hay, as are all of the farmers. He commented that the yield is better, more tons per acre and of a higher quality. Seeman told the Journal that in the Roswell-Artesia area, which in the past has been a strong region for alfalfa, a severe drought has drastically

cut the yields.

Some alfalfa producers have gone the cubing route and some utilize harvesting alfalfa for dehydration purposes while a few farmers use alfalfa for grazing.

County Agent Adams emphasized, however, that grazing on alfalfa has been kept to a minimum because of the danger of bloat to cattle.

Adams reported that a test plot of corn at the L.V. Kolar farm yielded 27.16 tons per acre with two and one-fourth acres being heavily fertilized according to soil test.

On the heavily fertilized corn, Kolar added 113 pounds of nitrogen to the irrigation water on July 11. He harvested approximately one and one half

tons per acre less than on the soil tested acreage.

Kolar said the irrigation water ran out 25 percent faster in the following irrigation where anhydrous ammonia had been applied in the water.

He stated that this had brought about a two hour shortage of watering in the heavily fertilized corn.

He said that he felt that this shortage of water contributed to the lower yield in his heavily fertilized corn.

A 12 year veteran with the US Army, Sgt. Kinard was reported killed in a plane crash in South Vietnam sometime Sunday. No details on his death have been released to the family at press-time.

He was on his second tour of duty in Vietnam, having spent 13 months in that country and returned to Vietnam some time ago.

He listed his home as Fort Worth, although his wife and three children have been residing in Hawaii while he was serving overseas.

Survivors other than his two brothers in Muleshoe are his mother, LaVada Kinard, Ralls; a brother, Roy, Floydada; four sisters, Dannee Priddy, Cone; Martha Green, Paris; Marie Kinard, Springfield, Mo. and Linda of Vernon. Two other Kinard children died in infancy.

It is expected to be some weeks before his body is returned to the United States and funeral services will be held in Fort Worth when he is returned.

comprised of area grain producers who have been nominated prior to the election.

Any producer may have his name on the ballot by submitting it in writing, along with the signatures of 10 other grain farmers, to the Grain Sorghum Producers Association in Lubbock by September 1.

This board will have the responsibility of developing programs of research, promotion and education which they believe most vital to the grain producers of this area and use the funds for this purpose. No funds will be used for political purposes.

The program if approved, will be voluntary in that any producer may get his money back if he so desires within 60 days after the date of the collection.

Ballots will be sent to all grain producers in the area in early October. These will also be available in the county Extension Office.

Counties other than Bailey involved in the upcoming referendum are Armstrong, Briscoe, Carson, Castro, Dallam, Deaf Smith, Floyd, Hale, Hart-

varying infestations. The polyhedral virus appears to be reducing the populations in some areas. Control has been poor with nearly all of the materials which have been used for control. If damaging infestations of bollworms are not present, spraying for loopers may increase the probability of having bollworm problems.

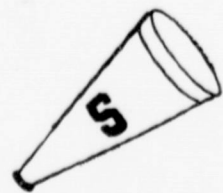

## United States Senate

COMMITTEE ON ARMED SERVICES

A recent report of the National Commission on Causes and Prevention of Violence has re-kindled the continuing controversy over gun controls. The commission recommended restrictive nationwide licensing of hand guns and increased controls on the ownership of long guns. The commission argued that the availability of hand guns in particular contributes to the high rate of crime in our nation and particularly in our urban areas. I do not argue with that contention. However, I do not believe, from a practical point of view, that a national gun registration and licensing law can be effective.

I have supported in Congress and will continue to support the most strict possible, constitutional measures to keep firearms out of the hands of irresponsible, immature persons. For that reason, I voted for the bill passed last year which regulates mailorder gun sales. We do need effective methods of keeping firearms out of the hands of minors, criminals and the insane. At the same time, I see no need to make it unlawful for the average good citizen to own a gun if he wishes. I will not support any federal legislation which would deny responsible sportsmen and

legitimate collectors their privilege of owning lawful firearms. Nor would I agree to and federal registration measure or to any sort of confiscation of firearms owned by law-abiding citizens. Dr. Milton Eisenhower, the chairman of the commission, encouraged development and sales of an effective non-lethal weapon which honest citizens could use for defense in their homes without risk to human life. He suggested a weapon which could fire a soft pellet, which would tranquilize an intruder for a short period of time until police arrived. The weapon he envisioned would have no ill after-effects on a human victim. That is a sound recommendation and I would also hope that such a purely defensive weapon could be developed. But we have no such weapons now available to the average law-abiding citizen, I am not certain one could be developed. Tranquilizer guns are now used to aid in the capture of large and dangerous animals; but, the animal is not incapacitated immediately. If the same weapon were used on an intruder, the homeowner would be in grave danger for a period of at least many seconds before the tranquilizer took effect. I believe that confiscation is

particularly dangerous. In areas with a high incidence of crime, it is asking too much of the responsible citizen to force him to turn in his gun, and make him a criminal if he does not. We all know that a man harboring criminal intent certainly will not turn in his gun. He will keep it and he will become bolder knowing others are unarmed. He will be encouraged to commit more crimes, because he believes the chances of his success and his escape are much greater. Indeed, he will be absolutely correct. I believe it is unlikely that any additional gun control legislation will emerge from the Senate this year. However, several bills are pending in Senate committees and one of them could emerge early next year. There is one bill in this area which could be acted upon this year and it is one which I favor and am co-sponsoring with my colleague from Utah, Senator Wallace F. Bennett. That bill would exempt from current legislation the registration of persons purchasing hunting ammunition. The bill specifically exempts from registration requirements, purchases of shotgun, rifle and .22 caliber rimfire ammunition or component parts thereof. In my opinion, this legisla-

tion would correct a serious error. The current law is an unnecessary and burdensome regulation affecting legitimate sportsmen. Comparatively few crimes are committed with sporting rifles and shotguns. Further, the areas of our country where hunting and other rifle and shotgun sports are carried on with some frequency are the rural areas of our country where the incidence of crime is comparatively low. In my judgement the registration of firearms is a matter best left to the discretion of the states. States which are predominantly urban or which suffer from a higher incidence of crime have needs completely different from states which are predominantly rural or which suffer from a comparatively low level of criminal activity. The real way to control crime is not to burden our honest citizens with unnecessary gun controls. It is to enforce our existing laws and to cooperate with law enforcement officials in crime prevention and arrest of the offenders. Effective law enforcement must also include court reforms designed to dispense justice fairly and efficiently and in a manner which will convince potential criminals that they are not likely to go unpunished.

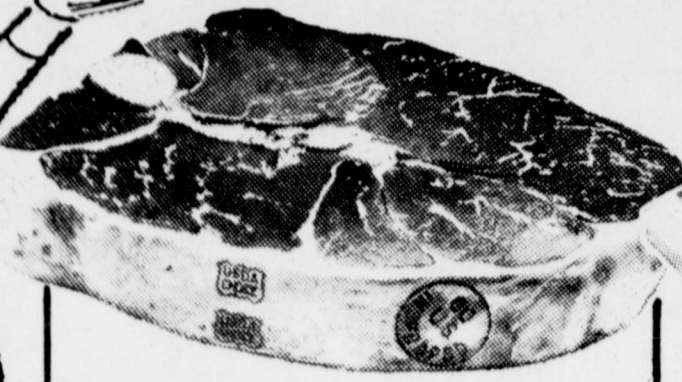
