

# **Invasion Coast** Blasted In 17th **Night Of Raiding**

Germany pushed her eastern front deeper into Russian territory today-according to Russian acknowledgment and German claim-while on her western front, with the coming of European darkness, the RAF blasted at the invasion coast in the 17th consecutive night of raiding. Informed German quarters, displaying optimism not borne out by any officially published details from the high command, declared that the main decision over Soviet Russia already had been won in victories all along the

1,000-mile active front. The Russians acknowledged that their forces had fallen back before a German mechanized thrust to new positions in defense of Vilna, Lithuania, and Baranowicze, occupied Poland-apparently fighting not in Russia proper but still in the occupied buffer zone.

The Russian forces withdrew during last night, said a Moscow communique, and were "effectively reformed for new military operations." The depth of the retirement was not given.

John Adams was wrong in his rediction of the date, but he was right in assuming that the event would mark the great American Festival. And now, if you care to look up the true meaning of the word "festival" you will find that "feast" is the essential stem of the word. 

#### The War Chickens Come Home To Roost

The war for whose outbreak Russia flashed the green light by its pact with Germany Aug. 22, 1939, now come to Russia itself.

This final collapse of the Stalin-Molotov policies of the past 21 months means that the whole world must back off and take a new look at the war.

Hitler's deliberate violation of his 10-year pact with ssia gives new proof—as if any new proof were ded-of his black-hearted perfidity. It now seems clear that he simply sucked the Russians into the pact of 1939 for his own purposes, never intending to keep the pact. Certainly all the objections he now makes to the Russians—that they are imperialistic that they are trying to disintegrate the German gov ernment, and so forth, were true in 1939, are true now, and have always been and will always be true of Russian policy in Germany and in the United States, for that matter.

The Communists have been calling this an imperialist war, So it is, now, in the sense that both Germany and Russia are imperialist, each having grabbed off all the territory it could grab ever since the war broke out.

We in the United States are naturally more interested in how all this affects us. Directly and immediately, it would seem, very little, We are committed to a policy of aid to Britain. We have not yet been able to provide anything like the aid to Britain which she requires.

So any question of aiding Russia is unrealistic Thanks at least in part to the opposition and obtruction of Communists in America, arms produc tion has not yet reached a point where there is any surplus for Russia. So any debate of direct help for sia is meaningless. Britain herself can probably do nothing for Russia except to pour it into Hitler in the west. Our interest in her success there remain

More direct is the fact that China will now almost certainly be cut off from the Russian aid which has been valuable to her. That means that China will depend more heavily on help from the United States. She should have it.

Whatever is the upshot of the German-Russian war, it can scarcely fail to benefit Britain in her struggle. Win, lose, or draw, in Russia, Germany must lose hundreds of planes and pilots, hundreds of tanks, thousands of trained men. Only quick, complete defeat of Russia could really help Hitler.

Britain gains precious time and breathing space The United States, too, gains precious time in which to perfect our own defenses and to make our program of aid to Britain really conclusive, American interest in the war between the two imperialistic dictatorships of Germany and Russia will be proportioned to its effect on the basic struggle between the free peoples of western Europe and Nazisn

WASHINGTON, June 27-A good many unorthodox things may have to be done before this war is over in welding the Americas, North, Central, and South. into an economic unit. But one of the more orthodox steps taken in furthering commercial relations between the United States and the 21 southern republics is the formation of a chain of inter-American development commissions, one for each country, to study foreign trade needs and the problems of internal economy so that all the countries can help themselves and help each other overcome the handicaps of having the pre-war trade channels broken by the messing

Ten of these inter-American development commissions have already been set up and are functioning, and the other 11 will get going just as fast as they can be organized. Impetus for their creation comes through the Rockefeller Office for Co-ordination of Commercial and Cultural Relations Between the American Republics, and young Nelson A. Rocke-



If the congress or senate is in session at the time of such vacancy or should convene before such election or before the results of same can be officially ascertained under law, the governor shall make temporary appointment of a suitable and qualified person to represent the state . . . until the election and qualification of a senator can

Whoever wins the senatorial elecion, he cannot qualify for at least 15 days after the election. The law provides that the returns shall be canvassed by the state election board on the 15th day following the election, the day of election excluded. The 15th day would be Sunday, July 13, a legal holiday, and presumably the canvass will be or Monday, July 14.

Governor O'Daniel might wish to honor someone by an appointment for the period between the election and the qualification of the election winner
