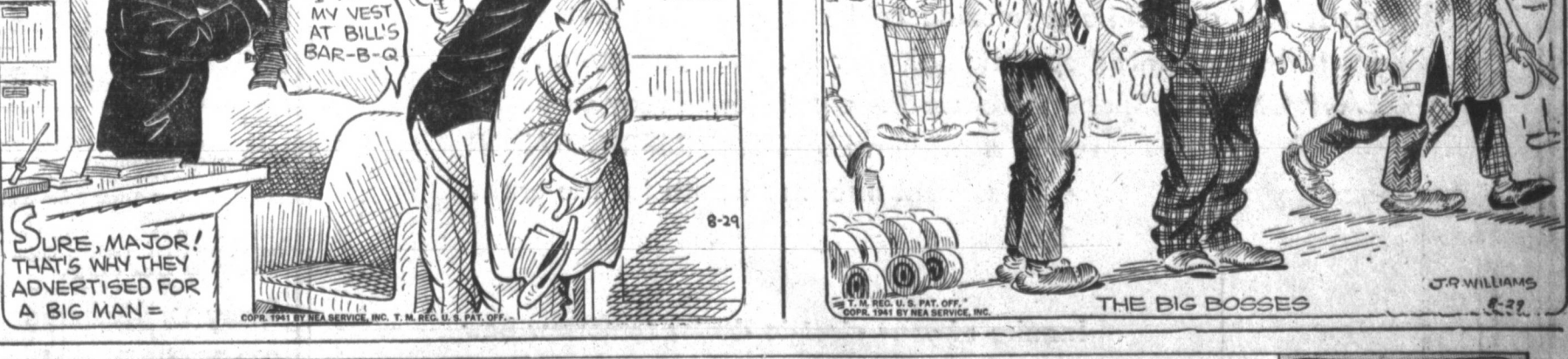
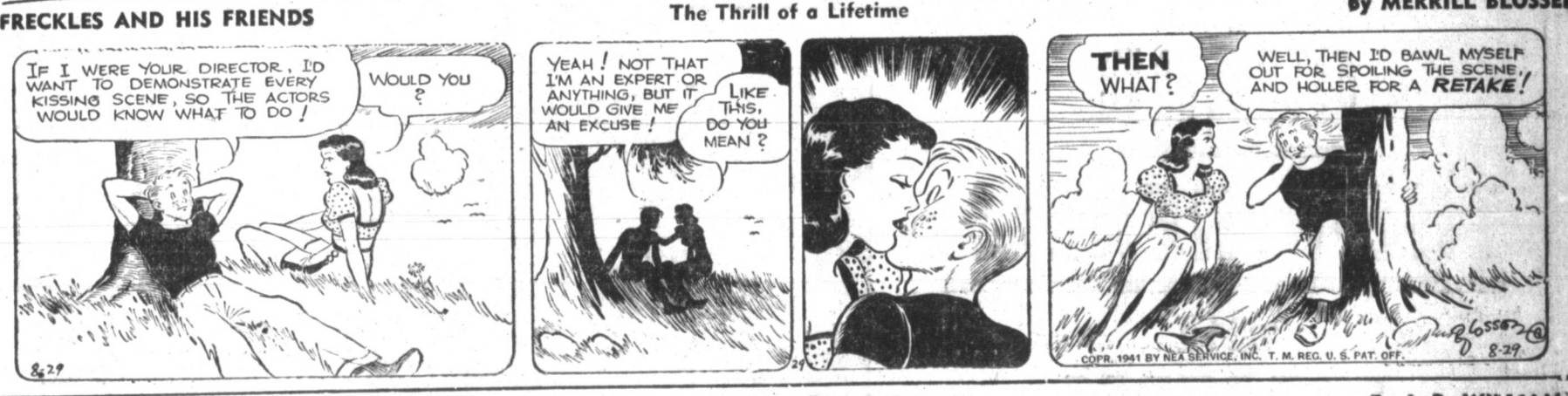
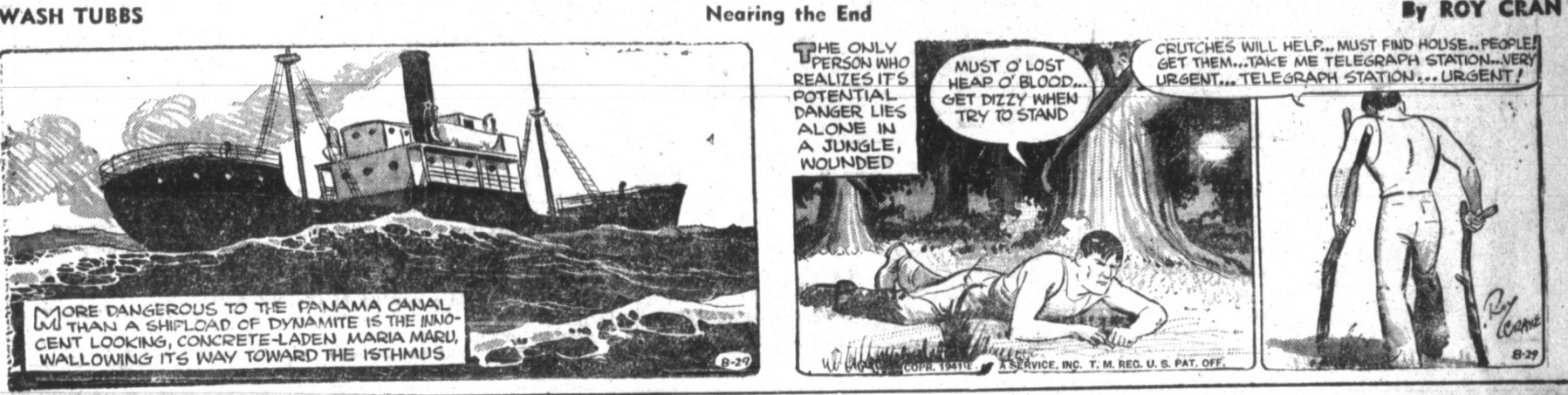

Cotton Stocking Factories For Texas Favored

AUSTIN, Aug. 29.—Cotton stocking factories for Texas are being urged by the 70,000 members of the Texas Federation of Women's clubs, according to a statement made here today by Mrs. Julius Waring Walker of Plainview, the state president.

Mrs. Walker said that the clubwomen feel that if eastern capital cannot be interested in placing a factory in Texas, then a sincere effort should be made to make Texas capital available for this purpose.

The cotton stocking factory plan for Texas is not a new thought for the federation for as far back as November, 1940, at a state convention of the club women, a resolution was passed to the effect "that the TFWC pledges heartfelt support to any movement to establish and operate in this state plants for the manufacture of cotton hosiery—helping such worthy projects to the fullest extent."

This resolution was introduced by Miss Ethel Foster, Sterling City, present state treasurer; Mrs. George A. Ripley, of Dallas, second vice president; Mrs. Hilton R. Greer, member of state board; and Mrs. M. B. Colbert.

"Texas club women are ready to face squarely the serious problem presented by the cotton industry of the state. They realize that 90 per cent of the foreign market has been destroyed through world conditions brought about largely by the present war crisis," Mrs. Walker said.

Mrs. Walker pointed out that club women throughout the state have pledged themselves wholeheartedly to wear cotton stockings, because they are confident that cotton hose of real beauty and durability can be produced.

Dirty Farmers Ask Special Session On Road Bond Issue

AUSTIN, Aug. 29 (AP)—The dirt farmers congress of Texas wants Governor Coke Stevenson to call a special session of the legislature to work out a solution on the controversial road bond issue.

President Bailey E. Ragsdale of the congress yesterday conferred with the governor, who presented a resolution urging him to convene the lawmakers and stated:

"We are in complete accord with Governor Stevenson's position of insisting that a compromise be arrived at dealing with the division of the \$2,000,000 road fund surplus prior to the convening of a special session.

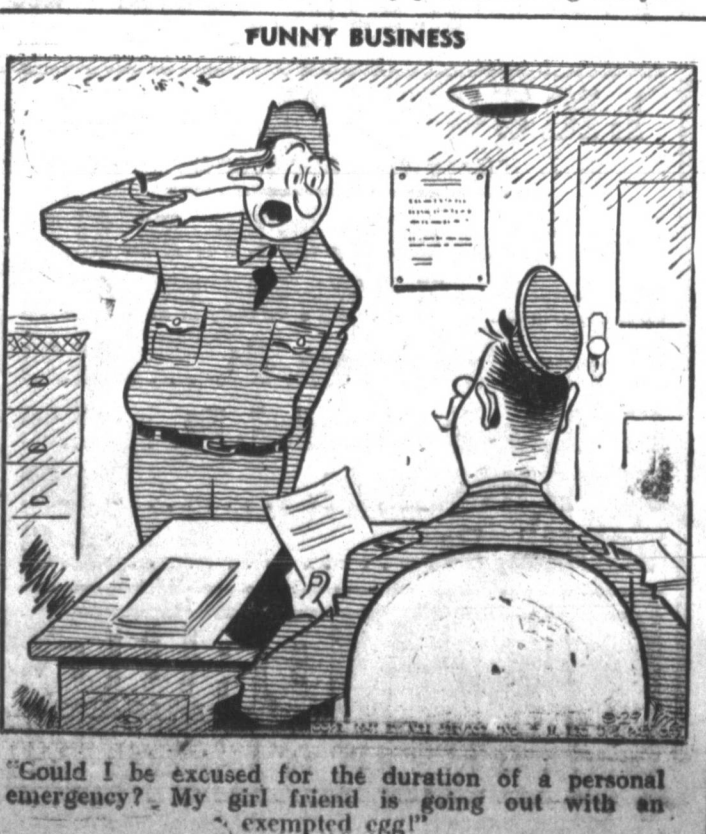
