# **Hitler Wants** Use Of Black Sea Waters

ISTANBUL, Turkey, Aug. 27 Axis quarters today said Adolf Hitler has warned Turkey that he may need to use Turkish territorial waters in the Black Sea, but has assured the Turks that he has no other demands.

This report said Germany has no intention of asking Turkey for con-cessions concerning the Dardanelles or other Turkish territory, nor will she ask for permission for German troops and war supplies to cross the country.

The use of Black Sea waters may be demanded, however, if and when German forces reach the eastern extremity of the Black Sea in their Russian drive. The extent that the Germans might then seek to use Turkish waters was not stated. Movements of German and Ital



# **Germans Claim Gains** In Gomel Fighting

(By The Associated Press) BERLIN, Aug. 28—German forces pursuing retreating Russians east of Gomel on the central front captured 2,200 prisoners today as two mechanized divisions ploughed deeply into Red columns, DNB reported. Fifteen cannon also were taken, the agency said.

The number of prisoners taken in the region of Velikie Luki was increased from 30,000 to 34,000, DNB stated, as the Germans continued mopping up operations in this sector between Smolensk and Lake Ilmen. Fall of the town itself was announced yesterday.

In addition, 452 guns have been captured or destroyed in this region where the 22nd Russian was said to have been mashed.

Russians on the lower Dnieper river in the Ukraine tried to shell German positions on the west bank from river boats, DNB said, but were repulsed by Nazt artillery fire. German infantry has cut the Moscow-Leningrad railway while Finnish and German forces have virtually destroyed two Russian mechanized divisions above the Arctic Circle near the Murmansk-Leningrad line, Germans reported

today.

Adolf Hitler's field headquarters reported operations "continued according to plan" on the entire Soviet front of nearly 2,000 miles, but military commentators said German, Hungarian and Rumanian troops had entered Zaporozhe, important Ukrainian rail junction east of the lower Dnieper river.

# East Gasoline Supply Reduced 15 Per Cent

WASHINGTON, Aug. 28 (AP) Ralph K, Davies, acting petroleum coordinator, announced today that gasoline supplies for filling stations in the east would be reduced 15 cent in September, compared with July

Davies' testimony opened a sen-ate investigation of threatened oil shortages. He presented a mass of figures which he said showed that the eastern coast faced an actual shortage of both gasoline and oil for heating and industry this winter. The east coast faced a deficit of 27,800,000 barrels of petroleum products during the last four months of this year, Davies testified. He said the reduction in gasoline plies to filling stations would help meet this shortage.

If present methods fail to elimidanger of shutdowns for industry and home heating plants, Davies said officials were ready to operate a rigid rationing plan. But he added they hoped to avoid such drastic action

Davies flatly disputed rumors he said had been circulated that the shortage "is being played up to foswar psychology; that a shortage has been created artifically to aspassage of a pipeline bill" or that a shortage of gasoline "was deerately precipitated.

The witness, who is a former vice ent of the Standard Oil company of California, told the committee that unless east coast supplies were brought into balance these conditions would result: "1. We could have all the gasoline

we want and not enough oil to heat "2. We could heat our homes and have all the gasoline we want, but







Damage to the plant, which is expected to treble America's magnesium production, was negligible. Workers said flames suddenly burst







The union sought vacations with pay, a general 17½ cent hourly wage increase, a closed shop and a system whereby the companies would deduct union dues and assessments from pay checks.

# Strike Hurts Mexico Telephone Service

MEXICO CITY, Aug. 28 (A)-A high premium has been placed on the already overtaxed facilities of the Swedish-owned Ericsson Tele-phone company by the current strike against the United States-owned Mexicana system which has paralyzed half of Mexico's telephone

The Ericsson firm has been unable to meet the heavy demand for telephone installations from Mexicana subscribers whom the strike has deprived of service.

As a result Ericsson users are now

advertising in the newspapers their willingness to sell their subscriptions, for as much as 150 pesos, to frantic Mexicana subscribers who cannot wait for solution of the strike.

### Fire Prevention Week

Each year in October, Fire Prevention Week is observed by proclamation of the president of the United tSates. It is a call on the citizens of this country to reduce loss of life and property by fire.

That week is always important. This year, with the country engaged in the greatest defense drive in an history-a drive which means that a large part of the human and material resources of this country must be turned to the gigantic task of making us militarily impregnable-the week is a hundred times more important still. It has been said many times, and it should be said many times again, that fire is the enemy of defense. Fire is the waster, the implacable destroyer of time, of human effort, of life, of resources. Fire fights against the swift production of airplanes and cannons and battleships and tanks. Fire fights against the nation's safety.

In the past years, it has often happened that fire losses have gone down during the week and the period immediately following, only to rise sharply thereafter. In other words, we Americans have had short memories. The lessons learned during the week were quickly forgotten, and we relapsed into our old careless, thoughtless habits.

That must not happen now. We must regard every week as a fire prevention week. We must regard every day as a day in which to keep in mind the hazards that breed fire, and the means of eliminating them. Only if that is done, can fire, our ever-presnt foe, be beaten. The war against fire is a war for American safety in which every one of us can play an aggressive part.

### Shameful Wage Profiteering

The various railway labor unions are now making wage demands on the carriers which, if granted in entirety, would increase the railroads' operating expense by the incredible sum of \$900,000,000 a year.

A simple set of figures illustrates just what this would mean to the travelers and shippers of the

Last year, total passenger fares collected by all the American railroads aggregated \$417,000,000-less than half as much as the unions are now demanding in higher wages!

The railroads' average revenue per car of freight last year was \$129.89. So it would take nearly 7,000,000 carloads of freight to pay for only the incresed cost of the railway unions' demands. That is as much freight as was loaded in the first 21/2 months of this year-months when, due to the defense program, traffic was at unusually high levels.

And here, finally, is the most startling comparison of all. Nine-hundred-million dollars is more than the railroads ever earned in any year after paying expenses, taxes and other costs. Last year the railroads earned a net of but \$200,000,000-less than onequarter of what the unions are demanding!

The moral is clear. Granting of these astounding wage demands would make it necessary to immensely increase railroad charges for passenger and freight

It would disrupt the entire economy of this courtry. It would be a long step toward inflation. The cold figures tell the story.

# **Building Skills**

Defense training courses were building increased skill in 642,600 persons on June 30, according to the Office for Emergency Management.

That includes 90,000 training for jobs, 145,000 training on the job for better jobs, 270,000 unemployed youth taking vocational training, and 137,000 in the engineering defense courses.

Not only in lands, money, and resources lies the wealth of a people, but also in the total of its skills and abilities. Here again we are building assets not only for the current defense program but for the fu-

INDIVIDUAL ROBBERS VERSUS GOVERNMENT ROBBERS

We repeatedly hear a great deal about exploitation and the rich robbing the poor. We seldom, however, hear from this same source any complaints about the robbery the government is a party to.

As a matter of fact, in modern times governments are more dangerous robbers than individuals.

The United States, during the last quarter of century has become one of the greatest robbers in the world. They pay no attention to any universal rule. They take by the force of the majority any fraction they see fit to take of what some men produce and nothing directly from what others produce.

In short, they feel they have a right to take from those who make two blades of grass grow, where one grew before and give those individuals nothing at all in return.

Collective robbery is putting men out of work, lowering the standard of living just as the great English economist, J. R. McCulloch, said a century ago. And what he said is happening here now. He wrote:

"The finest soil, the finest climate, and the finest intellectual powers, can prevent no people from becoming barbarous, poor and miserable, if they have the misfortune to be subjected to a government which does not respect and maintain the right of property. This is the greatest of all calamities. The rayage of civil war, of pestilence and of famine, may be repaired; but nothing can enable a nation to contend against the deadly influence of an established system of violence and rapine."

The progressive or graduated income tax, inheritance tax, and gift tax are the greatest forms of collective robbery ever practiced by the American people. They are doing for this country exactly what McCulloch said they would always do to any country. There is no exception to the natural law, "Thou shalt not steal".

ROOSEVELT'S LINCOLN QUOTATION

Roosevelt's quotation from Lincoln shows that e has really committed this government to war. In the last few days, he gave the following quotation from Lincoln:

"The fact is that the people have not yet made up their minds that we are at war with the south. They have not buckled down to the determination to fight this war thru. . . . They have no idea that the war is to be carried on and put thru by hard, tough fighting, that it will hurt somebody; and no headway is going be made while this delusion lasts."

It is evident from the above quotation that Roosevelt has pledged to Churchill that the American youths will fight on foreign soil. It will be noted that in the above quotation, "they", means "we". That is we are in war. Practically no military authority believes that
