Medal-Bedecked Capt. Tells Version

WASHINGTON (UPI) - Capt. Ernest L. Medina, the man who was in charge and at the scene for nearly three hours when the alleged Song My massacre took place, has denied seeing or ordering a mass murder of Vietnamese civi-

With combat medals on his chest and criminal lawyer F. Lee Bailey at his side, Medina told a Pentagon news conference Thursday his version of the March 16, 1968, assault

"No, I did not shoot any child in My Lai, and no, I did not order any massacre in My Lai. I did not see any massacre in My Lia," the 33-year-old Army Captain said. "I did not see any civilians shot at My Lai. I did see some bodies of women that had been killed in My Lai . . . there were approximately 20 to 28 civilians."

Medina's comments were his first public statements about what happened at My Lai 4, a hamlet in Song My village, hamlet after 10 a.m., and was since the case fell into the there until about noon. Unruh Announces Candidacy For Calif. Governor

LOS ANGELES (UPI)-Assembly Leader Jesse Unruh. depicting himself as a poor boy from Texas and Gov. Ronald Reagan as a puppet of millionaires, announced today his candidacy for governor.

In a statement made from his suburban Inglewood home, Unruh said he would enter the June 2, 1970, Democratic primary. He is the first announced candidate, but possible opposition was expected from San Francisco Mayor Joseph Alioto.

His candidacy statement was critical of Reagan. Unruh claimed a "handful of halfhidden millionaires call the shots in Sacramento." He said they must be told "You cannot buy our government like you bought a mansion for Ronald Reagan."

A long-time friend of the Kennedys, the 47-year-old son of illiterate sharecroppers has been a power in the state legislature for years.



A French legend tells how the Christmas rose came into being. A little girl, accompanying the shepherds on their way to see the Christ Child, was sad because she had no gift to offer. The angel Gabriel appeared and, taking pity on the child, caused a beautiful white rose to spring from the ground. Overjoyed, the little girl plucked the bloom, which she took as a gift to the Infant Jesus.

Called Noel by the French, Navidad by the Spanish, Natale by the Italians and Weihnachten by the Germans, Christmas in our part of the world is derived from the Old English term Cristes Maesse (Christ's Mass), a term first used in the 11th century.

One custom has it that, if the Yule log stays lit throughout the night, it's good luck. But watch out if a squinting person comes in while it's burning. That's bad

The large part children play in Christmas is legendary. If he was lucky, the 16th century child got a ride on a huge Yule log when it was dragged into the manor house or castle. While caroling and feasting went on during Christmas eve. the youngsters played Snapdragon, a game in which the players tried to snatch a raison from a bowl of burning spices and spirits.

(Background Scripture: Luke 15:11, 24).....

The story of the Prodigal Son is an example of man against himself. It is our story. Like the younger son, we take the many blessings which God has heaped upon us and separate ourselves from God. We live in the far country of our own willfulness and self-centered desire. It's a timeless picture of each of us as our blessings become our curse. Made to be children of God we rebel against God and try to live without Him. God gives us freedom, and we use that freedom to have nothing to do with God. All of us like the Prodigal Son, take our journey to a far country to escape from God, only to find that we become enslaved by those very desires that drive us on. We journey into that

wasteland away from God when we become mixed up about what really matters, and our standards disappear. We forget who we are, or why we are, or what life is for. When we refuse to accept the love of God for ourselves

we end up in the far country. God surrounds us with spiritual resources, but we refuse them or ridicule them. We can become so absorbed with the cares and pleasures of this life that God becomes as a little toy which we push around for our pleasure, satisfaction, and comfort.

When the Prodigal turned from the love of his father. he soon found himself living among the swine. Thus do we find ourselves in our pigpins of pampered prejudice, selfmartyrdom, self-assertion. With indifference and apparently unaware of the great realities and uncertainty of life we build our pigpens in the far country. Man is his own worst

enemy. His life is no idle dream, but a solemn reality; it is his own, and it is all that he will have to front eternity with. Each one of us have the God given right of choice in the spiritual realm of life. What are we doing with this freedom of choice? God give us the grace to leave our far countries and return to the Father who is longing to welcome us back



Hinge joint trouble may start because teeth are in poor occlusion; i.e., they do not come together normally, or in harmony. Over a period of months or years, this produces pressures which irritate the joints, causing changes which limit jaw movement and actually 'pulling' the jaw toward the

A case recently brought to my attention concerned a woman of 55 who had five upper left teeth knocked out in an auto accident many years ago. She was still wearing the original, removable, partial denture made to replace the missing teeth. But over the years, as her denture became loosefitting, she more and more limited chewing to the right side, where she had natural teeth in fairly good occlusion.




