



# Golden Gloves Activity at Regional Tourney Tonight

Tonight the Golden Gloves regional meet opens at the Auditorium in Amarillo. The Pampa team, headed by Jim Arndt, made its way over there this morning for the weighing-in ceremonies, which started at 9 a.m. The weighing-in will continue until late this afternoon, when the pairings for the tournament will be made.

The only change on the Pampa team from the district winners will be at the 135-pound weight in the high school division. There, Alex Bradford, runner-up from the district, will probably replace Johnny Vineyard, champion from the district. Johnny is suffering from injuries sustained in the fight with Bradford and will be unable to make the trip.

The rest of the team going to Pampa are: Donnie Ray, Shamrock, 112 pounds; Joe Landrum, Shamrock, 126 pounds; James Moore, Clarkston, 126 pounds; James Bowers, Pampa, 147 pounds; Francis Hunt, Pampa, 160 pounds; Leon Kelly, Pampa, 175 pounds. All of these boys are in the high school division. In the open class will be Gilbert Stewart, Clarendon, 160-pound; Tom Landrum, Shamrock, 135-pound; Dana Howerton, Pampa, 135-pound; Eugene Cooper, Pampa, 147-pound and John Lowe, Pampa, 175-pound.

Also fighting for the Pampa team, though he didn't win his weight championship here due to a cut eye, will be Jim Bill Windsor, 126-pounder in the high school class.

Tournament headquarters for the Pampa team will be in the Herring Hotel. Incidentally, the trophies for the district meet, which were snowbound, arrived this past week and were distributed to the winners by Jim Arndt.

The regional meet is under the sponsorship of the News-Globe with Harry Gilstrap and Frank Godson, Jr., at the helm. Harry Godson is completing the three referees for the tournament will be, Ernie Andrews of Oklahoma City, J. C. Oakley of Amarillo and Oliver Ball from Fort Worth. 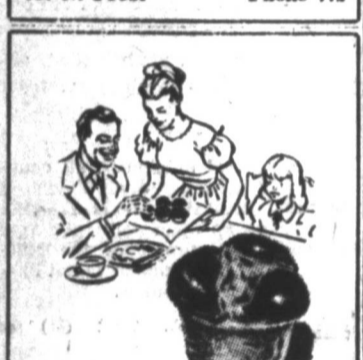

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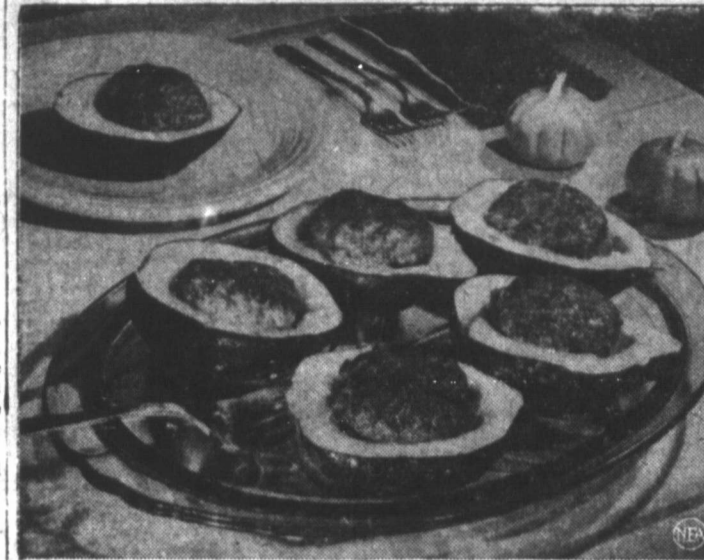

### Baked Squash Is Easy on Budget



Stuff acorn squash with seasoned sausage meat

Stuffed squash makes an ideal budget main dish. Bake it in the oven with other foods for the meal, thereby saving labor and fuel.

**Acorn Squash With Sausage**  
(8 servings)  
Three acorn squashes; 1 tablespoon butter or fortified margarine; 1/2 teaspoon salt; 1/4 teaspoon pepper; 1 pound sausage. Wash squashes and split lengthwise. Scrape out seeds. Dot inside of each squash with butter or margarine; sprinkle with salt and pepper. Arrange halves if squash on heat-resistant glass well-and-true platter. Bake in moderate oven (350 degrees F.) for about 50 minutes or until squash is tender. Form sausage into six patties. Brown sausage patties; place one patty in hollow of each squash half. Return squash to oven and continue baking for about 20 minutes longer. Here's another stuffed squash recipe that uses the minimum of meat:

**Stuffed Acorn Squash**  
(4 servings)  
Two medium acorn squashes; 1-4 pound sausage meat; 1 egg, slightly beaten; 1 3-ounce can chopped broiled mushrooms; 1/2 cup fine dry bread crumbs; 1 teaspoon salt; dash pepper 1/4 cup finely diced celery.

Cut squash in two lengthwise. Cut thin slice from each so squash will stand evenly in baking pan.

Place hollow side down on greased shallow baking pan. Bake in hot oven (400 degrees F.) about 45 minutes. Meanwhile cook sausage over moderate heat in frying pan for about 15 minutes, or until lightly browned and crumbly. Combine remaining ingredients and add sausage meat, including fat. Mix thoroughly. Remove squash from oven. Turn hollow side up. Sprinkle squash lightly with salt. Fill hollows with stuffing mixture. Return to oven and cook, uncovered, until squash is tender and lightly browned, about 30 minutes longer. Serve immediately.

Melancon owns and manages the Columbus Bridge Club, and is known as a quiet, modest player, but one never to be underrated.

In today's hand, Mr. Melancon executed a very unusual and interesting squeeze play to make his contract. He won the opening lead of the queen of spades with dummy's ace, cashed the ace of clubs and led the small club, West winning with the king. West could not return his partner's spade, so he led back the five of diamonds. Melancon won this trick with the king of diamonds, then led the small heart, which held. He next cashed the high spade, returned to his own hand with the ace of diamonds, and cashed the balance of the clubs.

The last three cards in each hand are underlined. When declarer led the last club, East had to discard either the jack of spades, which would establish

### ECA May Seek Shipping Funds

WASHINGTON — (AP) — If Congress insists that half this country's recovery cargoes move in American ships, Marshall Plan officials will seek additional funds to cover the extra cost.

Economic Cooperation Administrator Paul G. Hoffman told reporters that ECA "would have to seek" such a shipping subsidy if the present 50 percent rule is made mandatory, as proposed in House and Senate bills.

Weeks ago Hoffman ordered but postponed abandonment of the 50-50 rule insofar as grain, coal, oil and other "bulk" cargoes are concerned, because of the higher freight rates charged by American shipping lines.

The same family," Judge Parker said this morning. "has been receiving groceries from each of the agencies and are regular customers every Tuesday morning when the Salvation Army hands out clothes. Yet, the judge could not have anything to wear."

Further investigation disclosed the family has a car and has been using it to travel from one welfare agency to another—always parking the car far enough away to avoid suspicion, then carting the loot home in the back of the car.

This was only one out of five cases along almost similar lines. All the men are capable of working, but won't work even when work is to be had.

Judge Parker added that the grown-ups smoke in all of the cases and most of them drink. The big question, Parker added, "is where do they get the money to drink, smoke and drive their cars if they don't have money to feed and shelter their children?"

Judge Parker said he was having the one family brought to him this morning to learn what became of the five new pairs of shoes that were given them two weeks ago.

The three agencies agreed yesterday afternoon to check with each other everytime a case comes to them for aid to avoid any more duplications. The formal Foreign Office statement said: "With the reference to the transfer of the seat of the government southward, the Ministry of Foreign Affairs, in accordance with the decision of the government has this evening, Jan. 25, sent identical notes to foreign embassies and legations in Nanking."

The note followed the failure of the government to get the embassies to move southward when they were notified on Jan. 19 that certain ministries would be moved to Canton.

The Red radio broadcast its offer to meet the peace envoys of the government as Communist patrols reached the opposite bank of the Yangtze River.

A radio spokesman for the Communists said the talks could be held in Peiping as soon as that ancient North China city, taken Saturday by the Reds, "is completely liberated."

He said acting President Li Tsung-jen's five-man peace delegation was acceptable to the Communists except for one member of the strong rightist clique of the Kuomintang (government) Party.

Other members of the delegation are Shao Li-tze, Chang Chih-chung, Huang Shao-hung and Shung Tien-sin.

The Red spokesman listed "certain conditions" to which the government must agree for the peace talks to be held. Among them were the eight points laid down by Communist leader Mao Tse-tung on Jan. 14. Li already has said he would accept them—and they mean virtually total surrender.

## Boyle Says Everyone Loves Businessman but Himself

Aboard a Redup in the Deep South—Everybody loves the American businessman except himself.

He is his own worst critic. Why doesn't he himself like him? Who gave him his false sense of inferiority? Perhaps they need a session on a psychiatrist's couch to find out what's itching their id.

You would never guess from watching them together that businessmen were frustrated. They whoop and holler and brag and fib to each other like happy school-boys. They speak the language of profits and losses—and they find it exciting.

But, if you get one of 'em off by himself, he'll say, "There's nothing exciting about me, I'm just a businessman."

And he says that in a way as if it amounted to committing a felony.

Another factor that may affect many businessmen's opinions of themselves is the growing power of government over them. They aren't the spirits, bold and free, they were a century ago.

So, for one reason or another, the businessman is slowly losing his self-esteem. Or seems to be. And that is a sad thing. For a complex civilization such as that of today, wherein a high standard of living is dependent on a wide exchange of goods and services, the businessman is the real, adventurous. He takes the chances, and he is the keystone of the entire structure.

Traveling about, I meet many well-to-do businessmen. It always amazes me how many have a strange feeling of diffidence because they have made a financial success.

"You're a writer," they say. "I envy you. You must have an interesting life."

Well, sometimes. But I have always felt there is as much romance in building up a national sales organization to peddle the better mousetrap as there is in sitting in a chair and looking at a blank piece of paper in a typewriter.

To me smart businessmen are among the people I like to listen to best. That is, when they relax and talk their own heady shop talk. Their true tales of gambles and gains and financial intrigues are better than any dime novel thrillers.

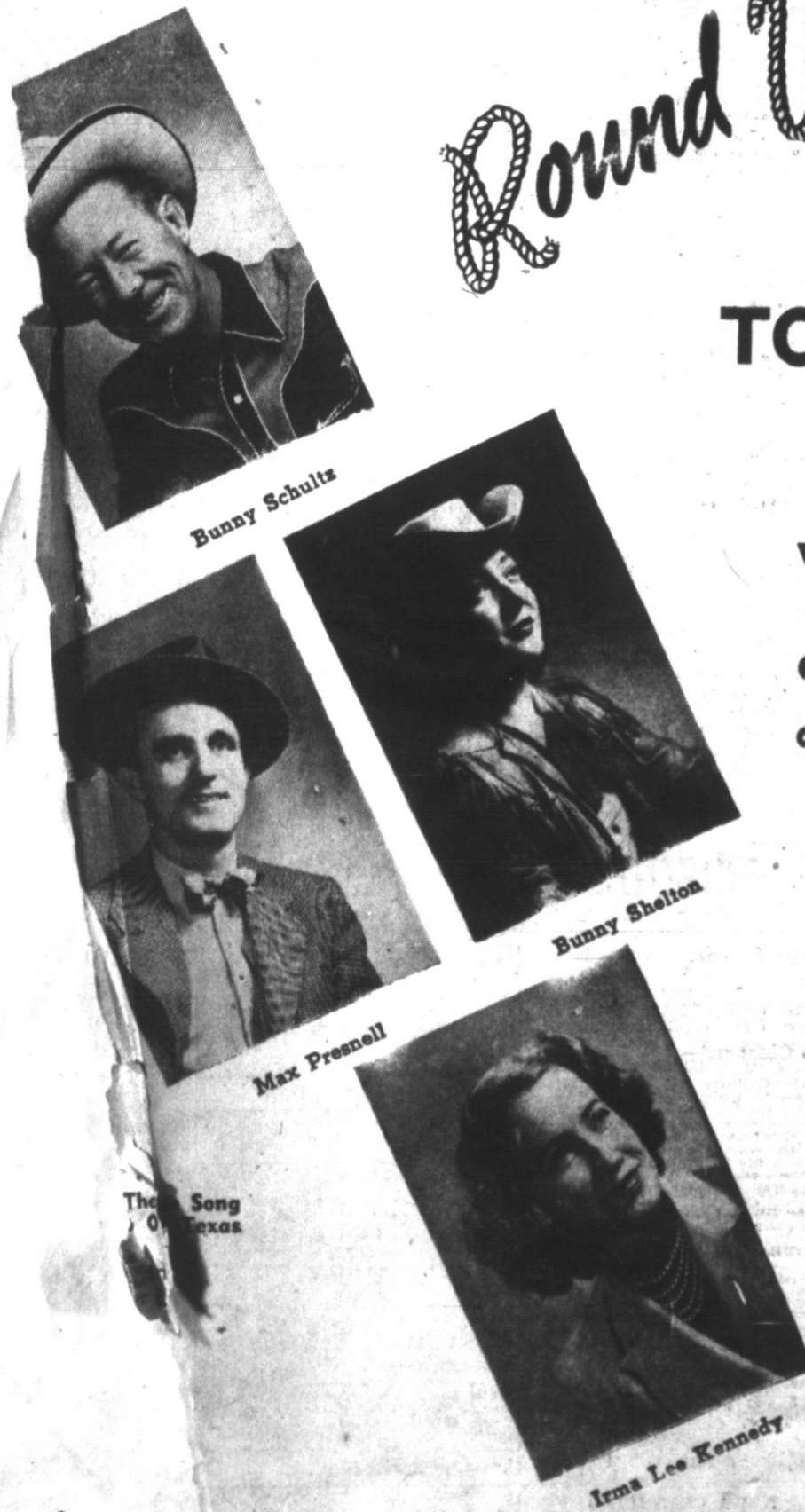

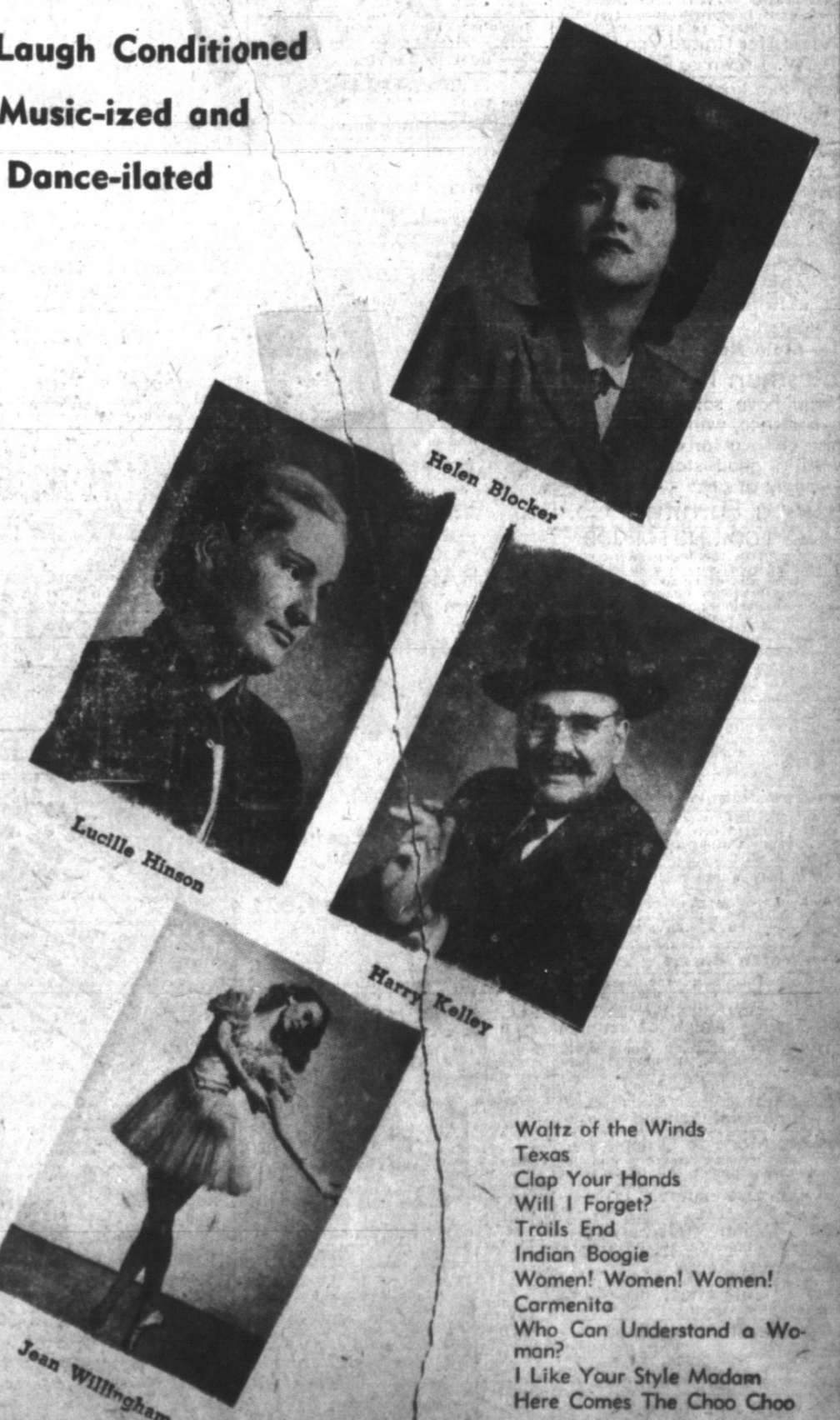
