House approves aid to Agent Orange victims

by approving a bill that would direct the Veterans Administration to provide medical care for Vietnam veterans exposed to the herbicide Agent Orange. is telling the former GIs "we're listening." says a congressman who

served in Southeast Asia. By its 388-0 vote Tuesday, the House sided with the argument that veterans' health may have been impaired by contact with the herbicide, which contains dioxin, considered one of the world's most dangerous chemical substances

The measure was sent to the Senate.

The bill would require the VA to provide hospital care and medical attention for Vietnam veterans who think their health problems may have arisen from exposure to Agent Orange.

The VA has argued that scientific evidence has failed to show that contact

damage. Besides, the agency says, it provides medical care to any veterans needing it, regardless of the cause of their problems.

But in a report accompanying its bill, the House Veterans Affairs Committee said "until the scientific community has been able to make a determination as to the possible cause-and-effect relationship" of Agent Orange exposure and later illness, the VA should do everything possible for Vietnam veterans whose health may


have been affected by the spray And Rep. Thomas A. Daschle, D-S.D. one of a handful of House members who served in the Southeast Asian war, told colleagues that passage "will tell the Vietnam veteran. Yes, we're

During the war, the United States

with Agent Orange did any such sprayed 12 million gallons of the herbicide on jungle and farming areas to deny food and hiding places to communist forces. More than 40,000 veterans have sought VA medical examinations to see if their health was affected by the herbicide

Veterans have attributed a variety of ailments, from cancer to birth defects in their children, to Agent Orange, but the VA said it has found no evidence linking the spray to any disease except chloracne, a skin disorder

The bill would also broaden a VA study comparing the health of Vietnam veterans with that of other men of the same age. The study originally was intended to determine dioxin's effects. but the new survey would take other factors into consideration in determining whether Vietnam veterans

College construction on agenda for summer legislative session

Clayton says a 50 percent state university tuition increase might have passed if legislators had reached agreement on a college construction

Another go at the college building issue, which has been around since 1974, is expected when Gov. Bill Clements calls the Legislature back into a special session this summer.

Clements told reporters at an oilmen's convention in Fort Worth on Tuesday he probably would call the session "somewhere in late July or early August" to handle their unfinished business from the regular session that adjourned Monday night.

The list of subjects for the session will include a water fund, congressional redistricting and renewal of the Texas Medical Practices Act. Clements didn't

add college construction if legislators failed to act

Colleges outside the University of Texas and Texas A&M systems want a dedicated source of money for their construction. building repairs. equipment and library needs. UT and A&M have supported creation of such a fund ever since the Legislature threatened in 1974 to spread the Permanent University Fund among all state schools.

HJR111. the latest attempt to set up a dedicated fund, died in a conference committee Monday when legislators couldn't agree on the source of money.

Clayton said he favored raising tuition by 50 percent as a source of \$40 million a year for the fund

If we'd gotten close on HJR111. I think it (a tuition increase) would have worked." he said.

CANADIAN - A Spearman family of three remained in critical condition in an Amarillo hospital today, after their auto was broadsided Tuesday afternoon by a semi-tractor trailer at the intersection of Texas 33 and U.S. Highway 83, seven miles south of Canadian

The trick driver was being held on a traffic violation in Hemphill County Jail early today, authorities said. He was identified by a sheriff's spokesman as Ervin Joe Sieler. 24. of Billings.

The injured were identified by authorities as William McBroom. 46. his wife. Mrs. Nell McBroom. 45, and the couple's son, Bill McBroom, 14; all of Spearman

Following treatment at Hemphill County Hospital in Canadian, the three victims were transported to Northwest Texas Hospital in Amarillo, A hospital spokesman said McBroom and his son were "critical but improving" in the intensive care unit. Mrs. McBroom was listed in "very critical" condition.

The sheriff's spokesman said Sieler was taken to the Canadian Hospital where he was treated for shock, then taken to the county jail

The sheriff's report said the accidentoccurred about 1:26 p.m. Tuesday. when the Freightliner tractor - trailer rig driven by Sieler, went through a yield sign at the intersection of the two highways and plowed into the 1979 Ford sedan, driven by McBroom

The McBroom family was trapped in the crushed vehicle, and an extrication rescue tool was required to free the victims. Two ambulances were called to the scene

The truck was owned by Georgina R Sieler of Billings, Mont, the spokesman said She said the rig was loaded, but she did not know what the truck was carrying at the time of the wreck



School hires Levelland man as tax assessor

Following a lengthy, closed personnel session, the Pampa Independent School District board of trustee's hired Charles D. Rand of Levelland to fill the city school tax assessor - collector vacancy

District Superintendent Bob Phillips said today Rand will begin working as tax assessor - collector July 1. He said Rand is presently employed as assistant tax assessor - collector and appraiser for the Levelland school

In addition, Phillips said Rand's wife, Rudelle Rand has been hired as an elementary school teacher for the district. Phillips said Mrs. Rand has not yet been assigned to a class.

Current tax assessor for the school district Dwain Walker resigned in April to take a position with the Amarillo Independent School District. Walker will be assistant superintendent for business services for the Amarillo school system

A report by Marjorie Gaut, assistant to the superintendent for educational services, on the Texas Assessment of Basic Skills tests was heard by the board in Tuesday's meeting in Carver Educational Center

The tests were given to third, fifth, and ninth grade students in April 1981. "These are the minimum skills we

expect our students to know," Mrs. Gaut explained. "As you know, the state board (of education) and the legislature say our students weren't learning anything in the basic skills, so we have to give these skills tests."

She said the purpose of the tests was to identify low - achieving students and to help plan educational programs for these students

of great concern in the third grade Pampa third graders scored 100 percent in the ability to follow directions. "What more could you ask?

Mrs. Gaut said. "There were no areas

That's perfect!" Mrs. Gaut said. In the handwriting, the 98 percent of the 325 students wrote legibly, she said. However, fifth graders were not as strong in their basic skills, Mrs. Gaut

Weaknesses were apparent in solving word problems using multiplication and division, 75 percent mastery; identifying equivalent fractions. 72 percent: and interpreting place value.

The average mastery level should be 85 percent or above, Mrs. Gaut said.

Fifth grade students showed strength in units of measure - 97 percent; interpreting graphs - 97 percent; adding whole numbers, dividing whole numbers, and solving word problems using addition and subtraction at 90 percent

Mrs. Gaut said reading is the weakest of the higher level skills for the Pampa fifth graders. She said a new reader, adopted by the district, will emphasize the higher thinking skills.

Areas of concern for the fifth grade were interpretive comprehension skills which included a mastery of 72 percent in predicting outcomes: 71 percent in distinguishing fact and non - fact; and 71 percent in drawing conclusions.

The weakest scores for the ninth grade class was mathematics. Mrs. Gaut said

We were weak here last year. especially in personal finance and problems with ratio and proportion. she said

Of the students tested, 54 percent mastered personal finance and 58 percent, the ratio and proportion.

The education service assistant said materials in the current textbooks do not sufficiently cover these areas. She said efforts are being made to find the appropriate books

In reading skills, 93 percent of ninth grade students mastered following directions and 90 percent mastered reference skills.

Ninth graders showed more problems mastering skills in the use of maps and charts, 68 percent; different portions of a book, 66 percent; and in making generalizations, 55 percent.

Mrs. Gaut said the school board's long range planning committee has approved a course in basic reading skills to be introduced in the 1982 - 1983 school year. She said the class will be geared to students who are having reading difficulties.

Correct English usage and punctuation gave the ninth graders problems, test results show. English usage is mastered by 69 percent, and punctuation 67 percent

The students did well on spelling - 94 percent; and capitalization - 91 percent. Over 95 percent of the students submitted an acceptable handwriting

Mrs Gaut's conclusion was: "All the test performances cannot be attributed to one factor which would cause the scores to be low. All kinds of factors are involved and they all interact.

Israel shells Palestinian center

TEL AVIV, Israel (AP) - Israeli gunboats lobbed shells into a Palestinian guerrilla headquarters in northern Lebanon during the night, the military command said today. It was the northernmost Israeli attack in Lebanon in two years

A communique said the boats returned safely after hitting a building used by the Marxist Popular Front for the Liberation of Palestine at the Naher el Bard River, about eight miles north of Tripoli and 48 miles north of Beirut.

A Palestine Liberation Organization communique issued in Beirut said a 90-minute shelling destroyed two houses in a refugee camp just after midnight, but caused no casualties.

Nahr el Bared houses almost 15,000 Palestinian refugees registered with the United Nations Relief and Work Agency. The camp has long been a major training center for Palestinian guerrillas, who control and govern the

The Israeli command said guerrillas

missions against Israel in the past. It was shelled by Israeli gunboats in April 1979, and the last time Israel struck that far north in Lebanon was in an air attack the following month.

Prime Minister Menachem Begin said Tuesday he would not halt Israeli raids on Palestinian bases in Lebanon despite Syria's demand for an end to Israeli military operations on the territory of its northern neighbor. An Israeli air attack Tuesday killed

six people and wounded 11 at guerrilla bases near the port of Tyre, about 12 miles north of the Israeli border, the Lebanese government radio reported. The Christian Voice of Lebanon

station said six Israeli F-4 Phantoms destroyed the three-story headquarters of the regional command of Al Fatah, the largest guerrilla group in the Palestine Liberation Organization.

Begin in an interview with CBS-TV said he told U.S. envoy Philip C. Habib "an uncountable number of times that

we are going to continue preventive operations against PLO terrorists."

The prime minister said he saw 'nothing in common'' between Habib's mission to prevent a new war between Israel and Syria and the Israeli attacks on Palestinian bases in Lebanon.

However, the Syrian government newspaper Tishrin said Tuesday if Habib's shuttle diplomacy is to succeed, the U.S. government must recognize that Lebanon must not be 'penetrated, attacked, violated or be the scene of any practice of sovereignty by outsiders.

It demanded that the United States end Israeli reconnaissance flights over Egypt and end Israeli attacks on Palestinian bases. It said the United States and Israel must also accept Syria's right to deploy all the troops and weapons it needs to keep peace in Lebanon.

Habib, who has been meeting with officials in Washington since last week. is to return to the Middle East this

Air Force officials said the launching codes were changed after Cooke's arrest, but added that they frequently are changed routinely.

Keagan hasn't retreated on Lefever

WASHINGTON (AP) - President Reagan says he has "not retreated one inch" on Ernest W. Lefever's nomination as human rights chief, and the White House is stepping up the pressure for confirmation amid warnings of a tough Senate fight and a probable filibuster

The president renewed his support for the embattled nominee late Tuesday after a hospital visit with wounded White House press secretary James S.

Earlier in the day, Lefever was called to the White House for a strategy session with chief of staff James A. Baker III on the next round of Senate confirmation hearings Thursday.

White House staff director David Gergen called the session "an effort to bolster" Lefever's nomination to be assistant secretary of state for human rights, and Baker said the possibility of withdrawing the appointment was not even mentioned.

'The president's ... not going to walk away from the guy," Gergen said. We're stepping up the pressure. Reagan did his part as reporters

Jim Ramsey, attorney for labor leader L.G. Moore, made the statemennt Tuesday as a Houston port commissioner and three union officials entered innocent pleas to charges they conspired to influence the awardng of health insurance contracts.

The pleas were entered before U.S. Magistrate Frank Waltemire.

Moore, regional director of the International Union of Operating Engineers, and Commissioner John

Garrett were charged last week with conspiracy and aiding racketeering. They were ordered to stand trial July 20 before U.S. District Judge Norman

The charges stem from their alleged attempts to influence the city of Houston to change its health insurance contract from Republic National Life of Dallas to Prudential. The indictments named two Lousiana men as unindicted co-conspirators.

Sherman Fricks and Harold Grubbs, officials of Local Pipefitters Union Local 211, entered their innocent pleas to charges of conspiracy and bribery. They were scheduled to stand trial July

20 before U.S. District Judge Gabrielle McDonald.

Moore will seek a single trial on last week's charges and those returned against him in the original Brilab case. Ramsey said.

"The two cases come out of the same government scam," Ramsey said. Texas House Speaker Billy Clayton and two others were acquitted last year in the first Brilab case.

The defensive argument for Moore will be that the entire thing is a government conspiracy," Ramsey said. "That was proved in the Clayton case, and I expect it will be proved in

The special interests manipulating media

return to honest employment, it has not been surprising to see them fighting back, using whatever means are at hand to protect their places at the public trough. Most of them have extensive resources at their disposal.

Each public agency has a Public Information Office, consisting of a number of professional writers and publicists whose primary job is building public support for bigger appropriations for their agencies. More films are made in Washington than in Hollywood, and most of them are directly or indirectly designed to tell the people that the government is doing a dandy job and ought to have more money.

These professional people are adept at the planted story, the heart tugging example of the person who just doesn't know how he or she will survive (or continue to help those less fortunate) if this or that budget cut is actually made. Their fulltime iob is to find the kind of stories that might attract reader interest or sympathy and then point them out to media people. Of course, in the vast panoply of federal programs, they are going to find some. Some agencies even provide pre - written. ype - set stories with pictures or illustrations for low budget

newspapers or magazines. Sometimes wire service reporters allow these stories whole, culling their prefab quotes from one side and passing them along as news. Sometimes these stories make their way into newspapers.

Thus in recent weeks we have seen

Goldwater's retreat on conscription

What's a nice guy like Barry intensify such problems. Goldwater doing with an idea like

Senator Goldwater, as he himself once noted, was one of the first public officials to come out against the draft, back when it was in full force. Now he's come full circle, and it's more than a little sad. He's contending that the volunteer military is a failure, and suggesting that what we might need is universal military training, or some form of compulsory government service for everybody who turns 18. That's a quintessentially socialist idea, one that seems especially dissonant coming from Barry Goldwater.

The idea that the real and imagined shortcomings of U.S. military forces can somehow magically be cured by some sort of enforced conscription program is a durable one. Unfortunately, it is also

a tragically mistaken one. Put to one side, for the moment, the violence that the idea of conscription does to traditional American ideals of voluntarism. Consider, for a moment, whether an army of conscripts, many there against their will and deeply resentful, would provide a superior lefense force. Think of how many of the problems in the Vietnam fracas - fragging, drug abuse, mutiny in the ranks, rock - bottom morale. desertion, and poor performance were at least partly attributable to the fact that many of the soldiers were draftees who didn't want to be there. A new draft, or some kind of universal service, would only ended

Any form of conscription is detestable to people who believe that no purportedly "higher" goal justifies the enslavement of human beings. The tragic aspect of a military draft is that there is little evidence that it would even give us an improved defense force in exchange for violating American

Rather than listening to the Goldwaters, we hope the Reagan administration will remember its own promises regarding the draft. Reagan opposed the reinstitution of registration when the Carter administration began requiring it last year. The time has come to redeem that promise and cease draft registration.

In lifting the wheat embargo against the Soviet Union, Reagan has demonstrated a more sophisticated understanding of the interrelationship between foreign policy and American ideals than have some of his supporters. He has shown that it doesn't mean you're 'soft on communism" just because you don't support every possible anti Soviet idea that comes along. He has shown a commendable willingness to drop ideas that are ineffective and inconsistent with

American traditions. Draft registration is another such idea. Creating a computerized list doesn't impress the Soviets, but it does undermine the idea of a free society. Registration should be

The auto makers and the police

Suppose you had hired a construction company to build you a house. You paid them the agreed - upon price, the house was completed, and after you moved into it, the roof collapsed, the foundation sank, and the plumbing failed to work. You confront the construction company with your complaint and they tell you: "If you will pay us more money, we will come in and fix it properly." Would you do so? Would you consider yourself a prudent person for having thrown good money after bad in order to get what you thought you had paid for?

That very approach is presently being suggested in city after city across this nation as police departments respond to soaring crime rates with pleas for more money. "If only we can hire more officers, raise salaries, purchase more equipment, etc., we can deal with all this crime." they intone. But how different from the house building hypothetical is this? Aren't the police departments making the same limp plea for more compensation to overcome prior incompetencies? Having failed, in other words, to deal adequately with the crime problem — a problem that has, in fact, greatly increased in spite of the injection of billions of tax dollars into the system the incompetents are back for more: 'Just give us more money and this time for sure . . . maybe.

One begins to understand how and why the police system is dependent

upon the continuing — if not escalating — presence of criminals. As long as the rest of us are foolish enough to keep falling for this racket of paying someone more for doing less, we create a premium for incompetency. Were this a marketplace arrangement - like the faulty house example - we would stop dealing with the admitted incompetents. If we were hiring a private security company to protect our home, and we experienced an increase in burglaries, we would not take too well to the security firm's suggestion that we pay them more money. We would more likely put in a call to the local screwball farm for a rubber wagon. But let a grim - looking, jut jawed police chief get on television with his horror stories of "crime in the streets" and many of us can't wait to get to the telephone to support his plea for more tax dollars.

Firms that operate in a free - market are not blessed with the benefits of such institutional insanity. If the American auto makers, for example, do not put onto the market the kinds of cars consumers want to buy, the consumers will take their business elsewhere - as they in fact have, to Germany, Japan, and other nations.

That is, of course, as long as the auto makers are operating in a free market. But, as we all know, they are not. Government import restrictions, emission and safety controls, and a seeming endless variety of other government regulations, have the

effect of altering the competitive advantages some firms otherwise enjoy over others, and the Detroit automakers are as disposed to take advantage of these controls as anyone else. The analogy between the police departments and the Chrysler Corporation are all too familiar to us. In a free market, Chrysler would have gone under and should have been permitted to do so. Their loss of earnings - like the soaring crime rates confronted by the police departments was a signal that Chrysler was not performing properly

The growing tendency of consumers to look to foreign auto manufacturers is also a signal that Detroit is not adequately serving the demands of the American car buyers. Whatever the quality of American automobiles might he in the abstract, the fact is that a sizeable number of Americans found Detroit cars less of a bargain than what Japanese and German manufacturers

Again, in a free market, Detroit would have to "take its medicine" and "return to the drawing boards." But again, like the police, the American auto manufacturers have an "out," a way to avoid many of the consequences of their own decisions: increase import restrictions in order to cut back on the numbers of foreign cars allowed into the country. At this point, Detroit is in the rather unenviable position of appearing to advocate an increased

amount of government intervention at a time when the Reagan administration is endeavoring to reduce the involvement of government in the economy. Corporate officials are suggesting, therefore, that the administration simply "talk" with the Japanese (in particular), without formally tightening import restrictions. But we ought to be able to see through his approach. Like it or not, the Detroit auto manufacturers are saying the same thing that local police departments are saying: please excuse us from the consequences of our past decisions, and make the American public pay the added costs of rehabilitating us. After all, as we have been so often reminded,"What's good for General Motors is good for America.

Perhaps that's just as well. Highly impressionable as I am, a steady diet of such could not be

Local standards may keep "adult" movie theaters and bookstores off the street - and yet cable TV is allowing local people to circumvent local standards by inviting counterpart entertainment into their homes.

And in Utah, where they passed a state law barring "indecent" material from home television channels, a federal judge is preventing enforcement of that statute.

Teamsters union refuses to form ethics committee

LAS VEGAS. Nev. (AP) - In an emotional response to the government indictment of interim Teamsters President Roy Lee Williams, convention delegate havafeject down overxhelmingly a proposal that the union police itself with an ethics committee

Resentment over the bribery-conspiracy charge and an earlier Senate investigative report accusing Williams of being a tool of organized crime burst onto the convention floor Tuesday when union dissidents pushed for creation of an ethics committee.

In the tense and bitter debate that ensued among the 2.200 delegates, a member of the Lawson of Vancouver said he had a better Teamsters for a Democratic Union suggested top officers have something to hide by opposing such a panel. And a delegate attending his first convention apologized to Williams for believing he was "a bad man."

The union's fighting mood - epitomized by Williams' refusal to cooperate with Senate investigators - surfaced on the floor the day before, when union members cheerfully approved a resolution denouncing the news

On Tuesday, Diana Kilmuray, a dissident Teamster from the union's Vancouver. British Columbia affiliate, sought approval of the ethics panel on behalf of the TDU faction and admit you made a mistake

"Are all these people working for your government agencies liars?" she asked as other delegates booed and told her to sit

But Williams urged the convention to let Ms. Kilmuray have her say.

"I didn't say you all were a bunch of crooks," she continued. "I don't think that. But what I do think is that we've had rotten apples before and if you're too scared to have an ethical practices committee... then you must be up to something.

DEAR ABBY: This is in response to your request to hear from women who had been treated with radiation therapy instead of undergoing a mastectomy. On my 35th birthday I learned that a golf ball-sized lump that had been removed from my right breast a few days before was malignant. After discussing the situation with

my surgeon and learning that he felt he had removed all of the cancerous tissue (the procedure is called lumpectomy), I could not bring myself to accept the "usual" next step of a modified mastectomy.

My surgeon referred me to a radiologist who, after reviewing my medical record, decided that I was a good candidate for radiation therapy.

I then underwent six weeks of radiation therapy. Unlike the side effects experienced when many other parts of the body are treated, those produced by radiation on the breast are minimal - a slight cough, loss of hair under the arm, and the skin that is treated becomes less soft, darkens slightly, peels and becomes itchy.

It has been five years since my lump was removed, and the only visible evidence of my bout with cancer is a barely noticeable 11/2-inch scar!

DEAR SUZANNE: Thanks to Juliet R. Ristom, who refused to accept her doctor's decision to undergo an immediate mastectomy for breast cancer, California became the second state (Massachusetts was the first) to require every physician to give a written summary of all options available to breast cancer patients.

I would urge every woman with breast cancer to get several opinions before deciding on therapy. Ask to be referred to a surgeon and a radiation therapist. And please, practice breast self-examination faithfully every month, because the only women who even have a choice are the ones who detect it early.

DEAR ABBY: What do you think of a healthy young man, married one month, who says to his bride: "I won't bother you very often for sex. I want a pal, not a sweetheart." And he's living up to it, too.

DEAR NOT: He may be "healthy," but your marriage is sick. 

"Despite early excitement for school," he said, "most early entrants (ages 4, 5, 6) are tired of school before they are out of the third or fourth grades - already burned out at about the ages and levels they should be His findings indicate that their vision. hearing and other senses are not ready for continuing formal programs of learning until at least age 8 or 9.

Socialization takes place faster at home than at school. he maintains.

Little children are better socialized by parental example and sharing than by other little "children. according to Dr. Moore Negative, me - first sociability is born from more peer group association and fewer meaningful parental contacts and responsiblity experiences in the home during the first 8 to 12 years.'

Zucchini makes new main

Brewery waste eyed for shellfish food

GLOUCESTER POINT, Va. (AP) -David Gussman, a graduate student of the Virginia Institute of Marine Science here, is finding ways to turn the wastes from a nearby brewery into an inexpensive, nutritious feed for oysters and clams.

And, say officials of the institute, his research may have tremendous benefits for both the beer and shellfish

If his research is successful, it will remove a major barrier to development of large-scale shellfish hatcheries. Success would also give the Anheuser Busch Inc. plant in Williamsburg a safe, maybe even a profitable, way to dispose of its effluent.

Gussman, 28, got the idea for the project when he heard about the problems Anheuser Busch has in getting rid of the by-products of its brewing process.

"It occurred to me, 'I wonder if we can use some of these wastes in mariculture (cultivation of saltwater

plants and animals)?" he said.

First, he tried feeding the molasses-like wastes directly to his oysters. But because almost all the syrupy substance dissolved in water. they were unable to digest the food.

So now Gussman is using the wastes to grow certain micro-organisms, or flagellate protozoa, which in turn can be fed to oysters.

"This looks encouraging," said Gussman, who's doing the research as part of his dissertation for a doctoral degree in marine biology.

"I find that they (the protozoa) do extremely well" if the brewery by-products are properly diluted, he said. "We believe that the protozoa will be very good food for oysters.

In the research funded by the federal Sea Grant program and Anheuser Busch, Gussman is raising five kinds of protozoa, seeking the best diet for shellfish. He plans to feed his

concoctions to clams as well as oysters. Providing food for shellfish has been a significant problem for hatcheries, said Gussman, a student at VIMS - a division of the College of William and Mary - for about a year.

Oysters, for instance, reproduce quickly - a female can release a million egg s in a single spawning, he said - "but the food requirements have always been a

big hangup.

Another benefit of Gussman's process is that it would use up the wastes from

Anheuser Busch. The sweet-smelling wastes represent the "bottom-of-the-barrel" sludge left over from the distillation process, Gussman

Right now, he said, the brewery's by-products have limited use. A poultry fa rm buys some of the wastes to coat corn fed to chickens.

Writer wants to go back to Afghanistan

MANCHESTER, Conn. (AP) - It's a long way from central Connecticut to Afghanistan, but Rhea Talley Stewart has made the trip eight times and would love to do it again.

But Mrs. Stewart is not a tourist. The 65-year-old woman was the last Western journalist to interview Afghanistan's former president. Hafizullah Amin, shot to death after being ousted in a Soviet Union-backed

She longs to be the first Western journalist to interview the country's current president, Babrak Karmal, a man she calls "the original communist. a perfect stooge." Karmal, installed as Afghanistan's president in December 1979, has been called a Soviet puppet by Western leaders.

It will not be easy for her to return to Afghanistan: the country no longer issues visas to American journalists.

I am part of their folk history now. she says of her involvement with the Afghan people and their reaction to a

book she wrote about them, published in 1973. The book traces Afghan history through 1929.

'It was the first book that I know of that is written about the Afghans from the Afghan point of view." she says. The British, in their histories, tend to be a little condescending.

Because of her book, called "Fire in Afghanistan." she has become very popular among the Afghan people and she maintains close friendships with the families of several former rulers.

I get along very wel, with the Afghans. They are very realistic and they believe I was fair." she says. During her last visit, "people greeted me in the bazaars and, you know, I'm like a curiosity. When they saw me. they would reduce their prices.

'I was doing an expose. There were a lot of things in their history that were just whispered about, things the powers that be preferred not to have come out. I told them.

Not many people want to visit Afghanistan these days, but Mrs. Stewart doesn't worry

"I won't be in any danger, at least not from the Afghans." she says. But she concedes. "The Russians, now, they're a different breed. The Afghans have a certain chivalry. They don't shoot

"The Russians are there to stay. The ower of the Russian war machine is hard to top, but they'll never control more than the roads and the cities." she says, referring to the moutainous terrain controlled by Afghan rebels.

Mrs. Stewart chose Manchester as a place to settle after years of jumping from city to city in pursuit of a journalistic career. She has written for newspapers and magazines in Richmond. Va., Louisville, Ky., and New York

She lives with her husband in a modest Cape Cod house." decorated with mementos from her eight visits to Afghanistan and pictures of American Indians "and some Asian ones, too.

She spends much of her time working on her second book, which will bring her first story up to date







Richard L. Solyom, a retired civil engineer living in Fort Lee. New Jersey, has raised the issue at a property condemnation proceeding before the Circuit Court for Montgomery County Maryland. His counterclaim asks the Court to compel the Maryland - National Capital Park & Planning Commissin to honor the "gold and silver clause" of the Constitution when it compensates him for taking a parcel of his family's land for public use as a park

Solyom bases his action on Article I; Section 10 of the U.S. Constitution which declares: "No State shall ... emit Bills of Credit; make any Thing but gold and silver Coin a Tender in Payment of Debts: " He notes that this provision is no less valid than those mandating "just compensation" for private property taken for public use or his right to have a jury determine the amount of compensation. Park Commission attorneys in court papers filed recently, termed his claim for payment in gold and silver a

"frivolous pleading. One who regards Solyom's position as anything but "frivolous" is Representative Ron Paul (R - Tex), who introduced HR - 391 on January 5.1981. Paul's bill will provide, among other things, that Federal Reserve notes be made redeemable in gold. The

In a case that could shake the foundations Congressman agrees with Solyom's basic contention that gold and silver coins are the only Constitutional money and that fiat paper money is clearly unconstitutional.

> Solyom contends that, in spite of the Constitution's explicit language, our government, since 1968, has been printing irredeemable paper money, the inevitable consequence being uncontrollable inflation.

> 'The money question has been raised in court by many persons" he said "but, until now, the government has always been able to sidetrack the issue and avoid defending its position." Solyom believes his case will now force the government to face the money isue. He will accept whatever amount the jury decides is "just compensation" but will insist on payment in the same kind ofmoney (gold and silver coin) his grandfather used when he bought the old homestead 106 years ago

Solvom, who heads up the Sound Dollar Committee in Fort Lee. N.J. said: "A favorable decision by the U.S. Supreme Court will mean that the States can no longer use irredeemable Federal Reserve notes to extinguish their debts. 



Eutting dairy imports vould be very costly

WASHINGTON (AP) - Consumers would pay millions of more and the Treasury would save very little if ports of the milk protein casein were restricted, Agriculture epartment analysts conclude.

If casein were subjected to either a tariff or a quota, the nalysts say, "users of casein would shift to soy-based protein nd other ingredients wherever possible, although product

"Some casein use would be replaced by skim milk solids but ot enough to significantly affect (government) purchases nder the dairy price-support program," they add. "Import estrictions would increase the cost of producing goods ontaining casein and thus raise prices to consumers.

This might add to inflationary pressures at a time when forts are being made to reduce the general rise in prices.

The year-long department study on casein imports, issued onday, also noted that the "imposition of import restrictions ten has far-reaching impacts on relations between the nited States and its trading partners." It said some casein corting nations could retaliate by closing their markets to

The study's conclusions refute arguments of House and enate members that imported casein is competing directly ith non-fat dry and skim milk in food uses, forcing the overnment to spend more to keep the prices of U.S. dairy mmodities at specified levels.

Those legislators have been unsuccessful, however, in ning import restrictions on the grounds that casein terferring with the operation of the dairy price-support

The International Trade Commission, in a 1979 study found statistical correlation between casein imports and the cost the federal dairy price-support program during a five-year

William Lesher, the department's economics chief, said it ay be several weeks before Agriculture Secretary John R. lock is prepared to make any recommendations based on the w study's conclusions. Block has said restrictions would run ounter to the administration's free-market philosophy.

The United States imported about 152 million pounds of sein last year, using about 128 million pounds for industrial nd food uses and storing the rest. More than two-thirds of the nports come from New Zealand, Ireland and Australia.

No casein has been produced in the United States since the te 1960s, partly because federal dairy price-support levels ade production uncompetitive.

Casein is used in production of animal feed and pet food. offee whitener, immitation dairy and meat products, medical nd special diet products, glues and paint. The 77-page USDA study said the rapidly expanding use of

asein in food items, especially immitation cheese, could crease competition with non-fat dry and skim milk in the

'However, there has also been increased research and evelopment activity directed towards discovery of viable terntuives to dairy protein in many uses," the study said.

'Any import restrictions that result in a higher price for sein would increase the research effort directed toward ich development," it said. "Thus, domestically produced im milk solids would meet considerable competition in the arket even in the absence of imported casein.

Imposing the maximum 50 percent quota, cutting imports to out 76 million pounds a year, would more than double casein ices to the equivalent protein cost of non-fat dry milk, the

But the high price would reduce consumer demand for some oducts and force some manufacturers of others to begin ing non-dairy ingredients, it said, meaning demand for sein would exceed the quota by only 3 million pounds.

Making up the difference with non-fat dry milk would save e government only \$9.3 million in price-support payments. ss than 1 percent of the cost of this year's dairy subsidies, the port said, while driving consumer costs for the affected oducts up \$115 million.

WASHINGTON (AP) — The Farmers Home Administration s made six major changes aimed at tightening operation of farm disaster emergency loan program.

"The emergency loan program was never intended to mpete with commercial credit," said acting FmHA Iministrator Dwight Calhoun.

Emergency loans often completely replaced commercial ancing by offering loans for purposes and on terms with nich commercial lenders cannot compete," Calhoun said. "It important that we now take action to enable FmHA to use its sources to assist farmers who truly need federal assistance overcoming disaster-related difficulties.

ompted by natural disasters after May 26.

The changes call for: -The agriculture secretary insteadof state FmHA directors make a disaster declaration if more than 25 farmers are

volved in any one county. -A ban on using emergency loans to expand farm erations beyond the normal operation before a disaster -Borrowers to obtain the minimum level of all-risk crop urance if available
