Supreme Court Tells Cops To Do Real Detective Jobs

WASHINGTON — (AP) — The Supreme Court has told American cops to do a real detective job instead of trying to pressure a suspect into making a confession against himself.

The pressure doesn't necessarily mean beating a prisoner. It may mean talking to him so long that he finally confesses.

But how long do cops have a right to question a prisoner without depriving him of his Constitutional rights? The court did not say.

So police undoubtedly will still use their own judgment about holding a man indefinitely, questioning him in relays to get a confession, and then using it to get him convicted.

When that happens and the convicted man appeals to the Supreme Court, there's a good chance the court will throw out his confession and the conviction which followed it.

That's how the court acted yesterday in the case of three Negroes, all found guilty of murder: one in Pennsylvania, one in Indiana, and one in South Carolina.

In each case the men were questioned in relays for days. None was beaten. All three confessed and were convicted.

Until he had confessed, none of the men was allowed to see friends or a lawyer, and none was told he had a Constitutional right not to say anything which might later be used against him.

In all three cases the Supreme Court ruled the men had been deprived of their Constitutional right of "due process" of law.

Which means it was contrary to the Constitution to hold them so long for questioning before letting them see a lawyer — who would have told them not to confess — or before charging them.

Said the court: "There is a torture of the mind as well as of the body. The will is as much affected by fear as by force."

51st Legislature Votes to Step Up State Efficiency

AUSTIN — (AP) — A three-pronged stab at stepping up state government efficiency has been voted by the 51st Legislature.

Ranking high among jobs done by the waning session were these three measures:

1. Creation of a legislative Budget Board with broad police powers over state spending, as well as authority to submit a budget each session.

2. Creation of a Legislative Council to make a continuing study of state departments, to gather any information that might be useful to the Legislature, and to recommend laws.

3. Submission of a Constitutional amendment calling for annual sessions of the Legislature and providing for appropriations on an annual basis, rather than every two years.

The first two are accomplished facts. The Constitutional amendment, which also provides annual salaries of \$3,500 for members of the Legislature, must be approved by the people at an election this fall before it is effective.

Under a rider to the departmental appropriation bill, the legislative budget board would have authority to require quarterly approval prior to expenditure of any money voted to state agencies. This was aimed at keeping close control of spending and at cutting down on deficiency appropriation requests.

The Budget Board would in effect constitute the legislative branch's agency in recommending how much the state should spend. This would be in addition to recommendations made through the Governor and the Board of Control. That would give each session two early versions of how much should be spent: its own, and the executive department's.

From the efficiency standpoint, it would give each session additional information from the beginning for use of the House and the Senate Finance Committees.

The Budget Board will be made up of four representatives, four senators, the lieutenant governor and speaker of the House. Membership would include House Appropriations and Taxation Committee chairmen, Senate Finance and State Affairs Committee chairmen. The board will get \$50,000 a year to finance its own operations.

The Legislative Council would have these among other duties:

1. To investigate departments, agencies and officers of the state and to study their functions and problems.

2. To make studies for use of the Legislature.

3. To gather information for use of the Legislature.

4. To make other such investigations, studies, and reports as may be deemed useful to the Legislature.

5. To work between sessions, make recommendations and draft proposed legislation to give its work effect.

It will get \$110,000 to finance its operations during the next two years.

Backers of the annual session annual appropriation idea included in the Constitutional amendment have argued it as an efficiency measure. It would enable the Legislature to keep closer abreast of changing economic conditions in providing for

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This Is Piece-Meal Business Recession Says AP Analyst

(EDITOR'S NOTE) How deep is the business recession in the United States, and how long will it last? What is in store for the public as we slide away from the all-time record boom of 1948? Sam Dawson, Associated Press business news columnist, surveys the scene at the half-way point of 1949 in three articles. The first follows.)

NEW YORK (AP)—This is a piece-meal recession. Times will get worse before they get better, and when they get better it will be piece-meal, too. That's the way it looks half-way through 1949.

year range from soothing cluckings in Washington to gloomy headshakings of the bears in Wall Street.

But most middle of the road observers expect the slump to hit bottom about the first quarter of 1950. They think it will not go as far down the economic scale as did those of 1920-21 and 1937-38, and certainly nowhere near as low as in 1929-33.

The economy is expected to start upgrade again next spring, and slowly climb back during the last nine months of 1950. Most doubt it will get back to 1948 levels until 1951 or '52.

Most business indicators here—but not all—are lower than in 1948, but most people expected that, even back in 1948. And this

time most businessmen were well prepared for the slump.

Indicators less favorable now than at the start of this year include: the Federal Reserve Board's industrial production index; electric power output, lowest since April but four percent higher than a year ago; steel production, lowest since April, 1948; crude oil production, lowest since March, 1947; business loans, lowest since spring of 1948; business failures, steadily mounting; and retail trade, down four percent so far this year.

But indicators which are more favorable than at the start of this year include: freight car loadings, highest since November, until the coal mine holiday; auto production, highest since 1929; soft coal production, higher until the holiday stoppage; engineering awards, up seasonally to the second highest level of the year; bank clearings, also a seasonal high for the year.

Unemployment is increasing, and may get higher. But employment is up, too, reflecting both the steady increase in the total labor force and the seasonal

trek to the season.

Corporate earnings are sliding from their peak in the last quarter of 1948, but are still about as high as this time last year.

Inventories are being held down, but are higher than this time last year—most observers think they are not dangerous this time.

The total of Americans' personal incomes has been dropping this year from its all-time December high. It's still about two percent higher than this time last year. Savings continue high.

Consumer buying remains remarkably steady, although lower priced goods are being bought. Prices mostly have settled down quietly. Exceptions are the Johnny-come-latelies to the recession—such as metals, where the bottom seemed to drop out overnight.

Propping the economy this time are such things as social security, farm price supports and Federal Reserve bank controls.

The overall pace of the decline has been slowed because this recession has come in stages, bowling over one industry or so at a time.

Muddying every one's crystal ball just now, however, are some possibilities that can't be ignored. 1. strikes this summer in key industries; 2. a fourth round of wage increases; and 3. the course of the cold war.

At mid-year, most businessmen are braced against some rough sailing in the months to come. A few still hope they'll be proved wrong.

Rural Church Should Have a Pasture for Preacher's Cow

FORT WORTH (AP)—The ideal rural church might have a pasture for the preacher's cow.

That's what Rev. J. Howard Williams of Dallas told a rural church conference last night. He was outlining the ideal plant for the rural church.

Such a plant would have about five acres of land, situated just off a major highway and would consist of a church building, playground, parking area, garden plot and perhaps a pasture for the preacher's cow.

Williams, executive secretary of the Texas Baptist Convention, also said last night that an average of \$1,000,000 a year is going into rural Baptist church buildings.

"The local churches are putting up 90 percent of the money," he declared.

The second annual rural church and community conference opened last night. It is sponsored by Southwestern Baptist Theological Seminary.

Survey Shows Texas Schools 'Too Crowded'

COLLEGE STATION (AP)—A one-man survey of educational wants in Texas shows most people feel schools are "too crowded."

That's what John Ben Sheppard of Gladewater said his survey disclosed. Sheppard said he wrote hundreds of letters to laymen over the state and also polled parents in and around Gladewater on what people want from public schools.

Sheppard told of the findings of the survey at a joint session of the County Superintendents and Supervisors and the Texas School Administration Conference at Texas A&M College yesterday.

"A large majority feel that schools are too crowded," he said. "Sixty-three percent favored increasing taxes rather than cutting school services."

He said 72 percent felt that teachers were not paid enough and 75 percent believed the federal government should pay enough to guarantee every boy and girl a good education.

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Lone Star Steel Loan Is Refused

WASHINGTON (AP)—Lone Star Steel Co.'s request for a \$74,100,000 RFC loan has been turned down.

The way was left open by the Reconstruction Finance Corporation's decision yesterday, however, for a possible loan of half the amount. The requested funds were for expansion.

RFC officials said the Texans were advised that if they would raise 59 percent equity capital, the RFC would consider matching the equity investment to help promote the proposed expansion.

Rejection of the initial application was explained partly on grounds that the RFC is "not making 100 percent loans."

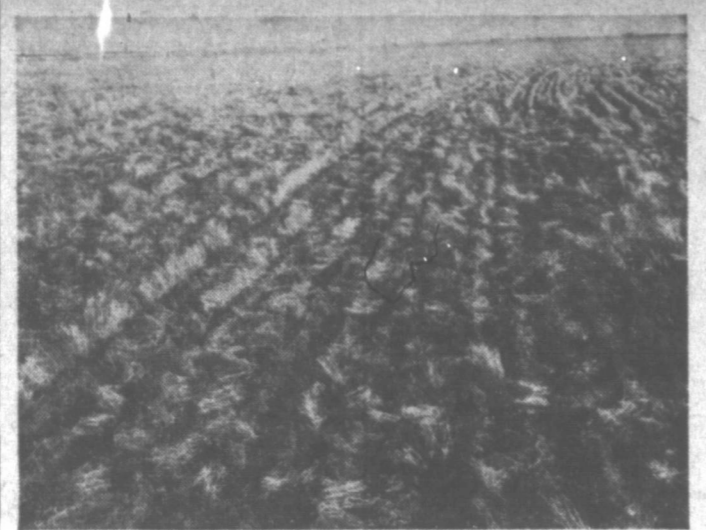

41 Farmers and Ranchers Planted Pasture Grasses

Approximately 1,200 acres were planted in pasture grasses this spring by 41 farmers and ranchers carrying out soil conservation plans in cooperation with the Gray County Soil Conservation District.

Most of the planting was done on land no longer suitable for cultivation, but which should still produce a reasonably good growth of grass.

Varieties used on the sandier soils include: side-oats and blue grama, Indian grass, big and little bluestem, sand lovegrass, switch grass, weeping lovegrass and Canada wild rye.

Varieties used on the tighter soils were blue grama, buffalo, crested and western wheat. Mid-rid and other varieties of biennial sweet clover were included in some of the plantings.

Most of the planting was done with the special grass drill, purchased by the Soil Conservation District last year, with the assistance of the Pampa Chamber of Commerce.

The largest plantings were made by C. P. Pursley, James G. Glet and R. E. Darsey, McLean, who each planted more than 100 acres.

FARM FACTS WORTH KNOWING

1. I have a young Jersey cow that sucks herself. Is there any preventive?

The question of cows sucking themselves is a serious problem but so unusual that not many animals are affected. The best plan would be to keep the animal tied or send her to the butcher. If the cow is valuable, you might try a harness, made somewhat as follows: Fasten a rope or strap back of the front legs around the body, and tie quite tight. Then put a halter on the cow, and from each side of the halter fasten a light rope or strap back to the strap on her body. The ropes should be adjusted so that she can move her head sideways but not clear around to her body.

2. What is the best type of hog for marketing?

Consumer preference plays a big part in determining the best type of hog. The "medium" or "middle of the road" type is more desirable than either the "chunky" or extremely fat hog or the rangy, underfed hog. The ideal type of hog should have a maximum of lean in proportion to fat and should have not more than 1 1/2 inches of fat over the back, loin, and hams.

South's Income In Agriculture Shows Increase

Southern agricultural income has increased from about two and a quarter billion dollars in 1940 to more than eight billions in 1947.

These figures are reported in an article by Louis Bromfield in the July issue of Country Gentleman, titled "You Can Make Money in the South."

Well-known for the conservation and soil-building methods employed on his own Malabar Farm, near Lucas, Ohio, Bromfield recently toured fifteen Southern states to observe agricultural progress.

He discovered this impressive 400 percent increase in farm income which he contrasts in his article to the 300 percent increase for the whole country in the same period.

In explanation of the renaissance in the South's agricultural economy Bromfield says: "It has come about through government financing and the devoted work of ill-paid county agents, soil-conservation and TVA agricultural engineers, through the contributions of experiment stations and agricultural-college professors in finding new crops for the South."

Bromfield describes the "chain" of limestone, livestock, legumes and grasses which has increased immensely the organic content of soils which in the past, under single-crop cotton, had been reduced to zero.

The article also points out that until recently most of the milk consumed in the South came from the North and Midwest. "It has at last been realized," says Bromfield, "that the Southern livestock grower and dairyman has great advantages over farmers in the North and Midwest. Through most of the South, investment in barns and equipment to house livestock during the long winter is unnecessary; also, it is possible to keep livestock on pasture the year round. This means little or no labor costs either in winter feeding or in summer harvesting and storing of forage."

One of the soundest developments in the South, according to Bromfield, is the gradual disappearance of the old absentee landlord and the passing of land into the hands of men working as owners rather than under the tenant-farmer, sharecropper arrangement.

Bromfield sums up his findings: "From being a liability of the nation's greatest assets, the South is becoming rapidly one of its record is ample proof that most

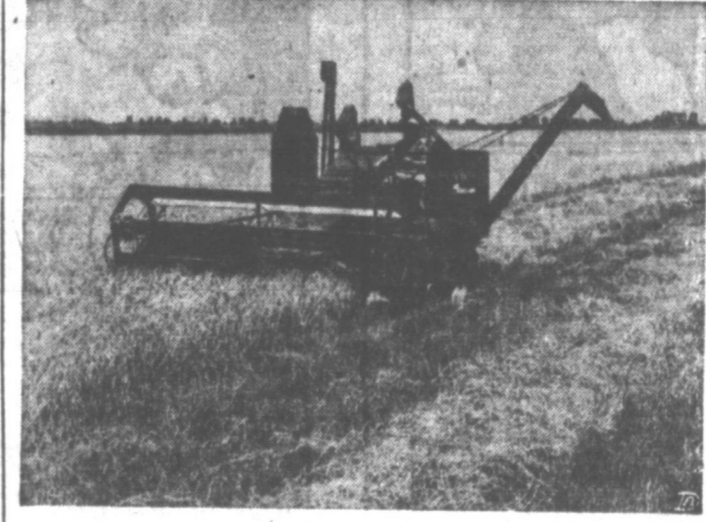

NEW YORK—(AP)—Ever wonder what happened to good old Frank Merrill after he left Yale? He seems to have been lost in the crush of years, but a number

of Old Eli's other sons have done right well by themselves. Yes, sir, the lads who stayed up all night a quarter of a century ago singing "Booia, Booia" can sleep late now because they are making plenty of "moola moola." The class of 1924 has done all right for itself. In fact I have come to the conclusion, after studying some statistics compiled for the class's 25th reunion this year, that one of the signs of a mispent life is not to have been graduated from Yale University the year Calvin Coolidge was elected president. The statistics show that 25 years after leaving Yale's ivory tower

the boys have an average earned income of \$17,210 and an average of \$55,282 in life insurance. The largest single income was a tidy \$400,000. The boys have turned out to be good steady husbands. They carry an average of 16 bankers, 31 educators, 22 insurance men, 37 lawyers, 22 investment brokers, 22 physicians and 68 manufacturers.
